Life Scout Chris Mayhew receives The Medal of Merit from the National Court of Honor, Boy Scouts of America

On July 27, 2012, Chris Mayhew and his family were returning from Virginia Beach on Interstate-64. Suddenly, a car in front of them swerved and went off the road, flipping over as it went down an embankment. Chris immediately directed his mother, who was driving, to stop the car to help. He jumped out of the car, asked his mother to dial 911, and ran down the hill to the wrecked car, which was barely visible from the road. The car had landed on its wheels and the driver and passenger were able to get out of the car. The driver had numerous cuts from broken glass, some deep, on his arms, face and head. The passenger was not injured. Chris ran back to his own car and got the first aid supplies he could find – paper napkins and a bottle of water – and ran back down to help clean up the driver's cuts and apply pressure to one deep cut to slow the bleeding. He continued to provide first aid until the rescue squad arrived in about ten minutes. Once the professionals had arrived, Chris hurriedly grabbed some plastic bags from his car and helped retrieve the victims' personal gear that was thrown from the car when it flipped over, because thunder from an approaching storm had become frequent and very loud. Chris put the bags of belongings in the ambulance with the victims. His family resumed their trip just as the rain began – and bought a proper first aid kit for their car when they got home.

For his prompt response to the accident, Chris was awarded the Medal of Merit, for an "outstanding act of service of a rare or exceptional character that reflects an uncommon degree of concern for the well-being of others"..." that need not involve attempts of rescue or risk to self but puts into practice Scouting skills and/or ideals." Patriot District Spring Camporee

April 26 – 28, 2013 Verdun – Adventure Bound

The theme for the Patriot District Spring Camporee is Outdoor Adventure. Scouts and Webelos will have numerous choices to challenge themselves and have fun. All day Camporee events will include a high ropes challenge course for scouts 13 years and older, a low ropes challenge course for boys 10 to 12 years old and Pioneering merit badge. Scouts are encouraged to sign up for the challenge courses. They are exciting, unique and spread throughout the trees and fields. The high challenge course includes a traverse *slide –for-life* that carries a scout over 1000 feet through the forest and over the fields. Most events in the high ropes course take place over 30 feet in the air using specially constructed apparatus. The low ropes course takes place at ground level and requires the completion of several intriguing events. Although the challenge course is an additional \$36 it is about half the cost of similar courses in Fairfax. There is no limit to the number of scouts and Webelos taking the challenge courses. The other full day program is Pioneering Merit Badge. Scouts taking Pioneering merit badge can complete the merit badge at the camporee and will construct several useful items to include a rope bridge. There is a limit of fifty scouts for Pioneering merit badge. Instead of a full day event, Scouts and Webelos can choose two half day events, one in the morning and another in the afternoon. The choices are Native American Lore, fishing, marksmanship and archery, and volley ball and a nature hike. Each event is open to forty scouts and Webelos at a time.

The camporee will have the traditional events that bring us together as a district; Opening and Closing ceremonies, outdoor church services, a Saturday night campfire, the Order of the Arrow call-out and a senior patrol leader/scoutmaster cracker barrel. The camporee will be held from Friday night, April 26 till Sunday morning, April 28, 2013 at Verdun – Adventure Bound, 17044 Adventure Bound Trail, Rixeyville, Virginia 22737, telephone (540) 9374920. The cost is twenty dollars (\$20) per scout, Weblelo, or adult. There is an additional charge of thirty six dollars (\$36) for scouts or Webelos taking the high or low challenge course. There is no charge for adults that are just helping out on Saturday and are not camping for the weekend.

It is important that units notify Joe Casey by e-mail or phone by March 18, 2013 that they plan to attend the camporee. His e-mail is jmccasey@verizon.net and his phone number is (703) 455-9050. Units need to notify Joe of the approximate number of participants, and the number of scouts/Webelos for each event. A scout can attend either one full day event (High Challenge Course, Low Challenge Course or Pioneering merit badge) or two half day programs. Troops must notify Joe of the number of Challenge course participants so that facilitators can be hired. Final camporee registration and payment will take place Friday evening on-site as units arrive.

Troops are requested to volunteer to provide the Camporee Senior Patrol Leader and the Flag Detail for the Opening and Closing ceremonies. The Camporee Senior Patrol Leader is responsible for conducting the Camporee Opening and Closing ceremonies and acting as Master of Ceremonies for the Saturday night campfire. This is a great opportunity for a senior scout to display his leadership abilities. Also, the camporee is looking for at least two scout buglers or trumpet players. As always, the camporee staff is in need of adult volunteers to support the different events. Patriot District will conduct an Introduction to Outdoors Leader Skills (IOLS) training course at the camporee. The director for the IOLS training is Philip Sternberg. He can be reached at phil.sternberg@gmail.com or (703) 960-0205. Scouters need to contact Phil to register for IOLS. When scouters taking the IOLS training arrive at the camporee, they need to check in at camporee registration and pay the twenty dollar (\$20) camporee cost. They will be directed to the IOLS site. At the site, they must pay Phil Sternberg an additional fee for food and supplies to be consumed during the course.

A New Recipe: What to Expect from the Cooking Merit Badge Redesign

What's on the menu for the revamped Cooking merit badge, served up later this year? The BSA's volunteer-led team isn't ready to dish on the main course just yet, but I was authorized to give you a taste — an appetizer, if you will. OK, enough cooking puns. Here's what I know:



Eagle required: Cooking MB is set to become **Eagle-required on Jan. 1, 2014**. Any Scout who has already earned Cooking *will not* need to re-earn it. His existing, Cooking merit badge will count toward the Eagle rank beginning on Jan. 1, 2014.

A Scout who has sewn the green-ringed Cooking merit badge onto his sash may replace it with a silver-ringed version beginning on Jan. 1, if he chooses. It's not required.

Release date for redesign: The volunteer-led team hopes to release the revamped Cooking MB **before Thanksgiving 2013**. Just in time for all those teenage boys to help Mom and Dad prepare their family's feast.

What are the big changes? The new requirements will merge four sets of materials into the improved Cooking MB:

- 1. The best parts of the existing badge pamphlet
- 2. Insight into nutrition from the Cleveland Clinic, one of the nation's top heart hospitals
- 3. Suggestions from the BSA's volunteer-led team
- 4. Additional content, including indoor/life-skill cooking, more information about careers in cooking, better nutrition and menus, new material on food allergies, and more on preventing food-borne illnesses

Types of cooking: To better prepare Scouts for life, the new Cooking MB will focus on three kinds of cooking: indoor, outdoor, and backpacking. That makes sense, because not every meal is prepared outside, and encouraging a complete understanding about food will make for better-rounded Scouts.

And the emphasis on healthy cooking will make sure Scouts don't become *too* well-rounded, if you know what I mean.

What else is new? Other expected additions include:

- Cutlery kits: How to create one for home use, personal use on a campout, and patrol use
- **Heating**: Home appliances, fires, at-home grills, and camp/trail stoves
- Cooking methods: Baking, roasting, broiling, pan frying, stir frying, microwaving, foil packs, and more
- **First aid:** Choking, allergic reactions, food allergies, and food-related diseases
- Choosing what to eat: My plate, serving size, limiting fat and sugar intake, special diets
- Planning/shopping: Considering whom you're cooking for
- Backpacking/trail food: Leave No Trace, weight considerations, special equipment

With the cooperation of several Patriot District Scout Leaders, we prepared several very good nominations for the District Award of Merit and Silver Beaver Awards that require Council approval. The District Awards Committee is in the process of evaluating several nominations for the Distinguished Patriot Scouter Award. It is now time to identify outstanding Scout Leaders for two more Awards for the 2011-2012Scouting year: the Patriot Spirit Award and the Patriot Certificate of Appreciation (Minuteman Sam says Thanks) described below. All award winners will be recognized at the 15th Annual Patriot Recognition Event being held Tuesday, May 21, 6:30 PM, at the St. Stephens United Methodist Church, 9203 Braddock Road, Burke, VA 22015.

Patriot Spirit Award (PSA)

Description/Criteria: A certificate to recognize singularly outstanding service to youth in a District unit. Consideration will be given to nominee's scouting position, scouting spirit and service to the unit. More specific selection criteria are left to the unit committee. The PSA is awarded annually on the basis of one award, or in deserving cases, two awards, per chartered unit.

Every Unit Committee is asked to submit the name of an outstanding Scout Leader in its Unit for a Patriot Spirit Award. Names of leaders to be recognized with the PSA should be submitted to the District Awards Committee by April 27. Also, units are encouraged to register their PSA awardees and their significant other for the May 21 Recognition Event.

Patriot Certificate of Appreciation (Minuteman Sam says "Thanks")

Description/Criteria: A District certificate of Appreciation to acknowledge substantial contributions in the planning or conduct of District-level events, programs, or training. Award criteria will be determined by event organizers/committee chair.

All District Committee Chairs are urged to submit names of "Minute Man Sam" awardees to the District Awards Committee by May 15.



National Youth Leadership Training

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT), called Impeesa in our Council, is the premier leadership training for scouts. The National Capital Area Council will conduct three NYLT courses this year. This summer, there will be two week long courses and a weekend course. The first week long course will be June 23-28. This course will be near Cheltenham, MD. The second week long course will be July 14-19 at Camp Snyder. The third course, the weekend course, will be July 26-28 and August 2-4. This course will also be at Camp Snyder. All courses are open to Venturing youth as well as Boy Scouts.



Scoutmasters and Venture Crew Advisors, if you have ever wished there was a leadership training course you could send your prospective youth leaders to, this is it! It is a serious and challenging training course intended to support the training you do in your own unit. It is exciting, action-packed, and designed to provide scouts with leadership skills and experiences they can use in their home troops and crews and in other situations demanding leadership of self and others.

The course is run by scouts for scouts, and uses a variety of training methods to share the leadership experience. The course centers around the concepts of what a leader must BE, what a leader must KNOW, and what a leader must DO. The key elements are taught with a clear focus on HOW TO, with participants getting a chance to live the lessons they are taught. Through a wide range of activities, games, and adventures, participants will work and play together as they put into action the best Scouting has to offer. Scoutmasters and Venturing Crew Advisors must approve a youth's application.





Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills

April 26-27, 2013, Verdun Adventure Park, Rixeyville VA



Patriot District is offering Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS) in conjunction with the Spring District Camporee at the Verdun Adventure Park. The course runs Friday evening through Saturday afternoon. The IOLS fee is \$20 per participant in addition to the camporee registration fee and covers supplies and meals for participants. Attendees will camp as a training troop in a separate area from the main camporee.

IOLS is one of two training courses for **Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmaster** to qualify as trained leaders. The other course is Boy Scout Leader Specific Training, BSLST. Scouters don not need to have taken BSLTS to take IOLS. IOLS is also a **prerequisite** for attending the top training for Scouters, **Wood Badge**. **IOLS** is also a great training opportunity for Venturing Advisors, 2nd Year Webelos Leaders, Troop Committee members and others who desire to improve their ability to help teach basic outdoor skills.

At IOLS, you will learn about first aid, setting up camp, cooking, working with woods tools, tying knots and lashing, planning campfire programs, map reading & compass skills, hiking & packing techniques, nature identification, leave no trace principles and how boy led troop and the patrol method work in the outdoor program - all the skills necessary to see the outdoor program of the Boy Scouts of America come to life. You will leave the training experience knowing how to show your Scouts outdoor skills they need to fulfill rank requirements through First Class.
