A message from the Principals Federation: The Budget just announced has left principals and parents deeply disturbed by the direction in which the government is taking education. When you put the reforms together as a whole, it is clear that our high quality public schooling system and community controlled, self-management model is being undermined:

- Our rich broad curriculum is being narrowed and replaced by an over-emphasis on assessment and the 3Rs
- Class sizes will be increased
- There will be fewer teachers and they will have heavier workloads
- Learning support programmes will be compromised including special needs and gifted and talented
- Years 7 & 8 specialist teaching is under threat

The current Budget announcements have come directly out of the Treasury and are about saving money, not about improving or even maintaining our education standards.

The Kiwi way of educating has been very successful. You as parents see this every day and we can see it by our international achievement results. Kiwis rank right up there in the top group of countries in the world, even though we rank lower than most when it comes to government investment in education. We have locally controlled, self-managed schools so that we can be more responsive to individual needs; we are inclusive and accommodate a variety of children with special needs into our mainstream classes; we also accommodate children for whom English is a second language; we are innovative, and provide a rich and diverse curriculum coconstructed by our school professionals and our local communities. Our standards are high and our expectations of children are high. Our teachers work very hard to provide the very best education they possibly can.

The government is telling us that the increase in class size is a trade-off for increased quality teaching. We do not agree there should be a trade-off. And many of you as parents instinctively do not agree. No matter how great your classroom teacher is children are not going to get the attention they need in bigger classes than we have now. Each child will get less teacher time and there will be less flexibility and resource to respond to priority learning needs. The very children who the government wants us to prioritise are the very children who need small class and group instruction.

Principals and parents want the same thing for children. We want an innovative, personalised, 21st century learning programme. We want a high quality teaching force delivering a broad, rich curriculum that reflects the values of our communities. This Budget puts money ahead of these ambitions for our children's future.

We urge you to take any opportunity to voice your opposition to increasing class sizes.
