INFORMATION You Can Use

Consumers' Counsel provides information on natural gas pricing, other utility services

Natural gas prices have been on the rise over the past few years with no indication that rates will be coming down any time soon. The temperature outside will play a significant role in whether prices will increase this winter and, if so, by how much. The Office of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel, the residential utility consumer advocate, brings consumers the following information on natural gas pricing.

There are three factors that impact natural gas prices:

Weather - Speculation about hurricane season and its impact on natural gas production sent summer natural gas prices soaring to record highs. The hot summer resulted in an increased demand for electricity from natural gas fired power plants. Temperatures this winter also may affect natural gas prices since lower temperatures result in a higher need for natural gas heat.

Limited Production – Prior to 2000, there had been a number of mild winters, which created a natural gas surplus. The surplus resulted in lower natural gas prices and a decrease in production. Although natural gas exploration and drilling have increased in the last couple of years, there is now a greater demand from electric generators on these new natural gas supplies.

Oil Prices – This year, world oil prices have dramatically increased due to uncertainty in key production areas, increased demand from other countries and the current economy. Many large industrial plants use either oil or natural gas as fuel, which causes the prices for both to be closely linked.

Currently, the Consumer's Council is advocating for Ohio's utilities to offer energy efficiency programs that will enable their customers to control their energy usage and ultimately lower their monthly bills.

The Council is committed to educating Ohioans about their electric, natural gas, telephone and water utility services. The state agency also advocates for quality service and reasonable prices while working to ensure the interests of Ohio's residential utility consumers are represented in important policy matters.

Part of the Council's mission as an advocate is to provide educational materials that assist residential consumers in making utility issues easier to understand and helps them make sound, knowledgeable decisions about their service. The Council brings utility information directly to consumers by providing presentations to community groups and organizations. Amy Carles (Marketing and Sales '97), an Owens Community College alum, is responsible for bringing utility information to consumers in Northwest Ohio.

Whether you're back for a big game, an outstanding performance at the Center for Fine and Performing Arts, or to exercise at the Student Health and Activities Center, it's important that you obtain a parking pass to park on either of Owens Community College's campuses.

Owens Alumni Association members are offered a parking pass when they sign up to join the Association. Completed forms are sent to the Safety and Security Department to verify and register vehicle information. If the Association member does not renew their membership in the Alumni Association, the parking pass expires with their membership.

If you haven't obtained a parking pass and visit Owens, remember the following information to avoid those pesky citations!

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- Park at a meter for a maximum time of two hours (25 cents per hour).
- If you park at a malfunctioning meter, be sure to contact the Safety and Security Department at (567) 661-7575 to give them your license plate and the meter number.
- Meters are enforced from 7:30 a.m. 8:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- Meter violations are \$20.
- All Toledo-area Campus citations may be paid at the Bursar's Office (Administration Hall) or at the Safety and Security Office (Alumni Hall). All Findlay-area Campus citations may be paid at the Bursar's Office or at the Safety and Security Office.

Scholarship Created in Memory of Owens Alumnus/ Faculty Member

"Never give up. There's always a way around an obstacle." – Bill Buck, Jr.

That maxim shaped the life journey of Owens Community College alumnus and faculty member, William "Bill" Buck, Jr. A gifted speaker, published author and invaluable educator, Bill dedicated much of his life to others. He strived to create change, and teaching at Owens Community College was an avenue for his mission.

Having been stricken with severe polio at an early age, Bill lived his life exclusively from a wheelchair. Even though he had a disability, Bill chose to live in such a way that illustrated his abilities. This one-time Teacher of the Year graduated from Owens Community College in 1987 with an Associate of Applied Science in Computer Programming Technology. He went on to become a 1997 graduate of Spring Arbor University (BA, Management) and signed on at Owens as a part-time faculty member teaching Business Management, Marketing and Computer Programming. Bill was known for actively pursuing personal development and strived to be a better communicator, motivator and leader.

"With a smile on his face, Bill would do all that he could to enhance his abilities so that he could help others," said Line (pronounced Lynn) Buck, Bill's wife. "Through all of his accomplishments, he helped others – with and without disabilities – to increase their confidence and make them better listeners, thinkers and leaders."

"He was a phenomenal individual. Bill had a way of making people feel comfortable with his disability. He challenged us to appreciate all that we have and reminded us not to worry about the little things."

To honor his legacy and champion his life's mission, the Bill Buck Memorial Scholarship was created in 2003 by Bill's peers and awarded for the first time in Fall 2005 to Valerie McCampbell, an Owens Community College student majoring in office administration. The scholarship will be awarded annually to students with disabilities attending Owens. The goal is that, each year, the fund will grow in size and support to assist students.

To apply: Interested students are encouraged to apply for the Bill Buck Memorial Scholarship. 2006-2007 Scholarship Information booklets are located in the Owens Community College Financial Aid Office. All Scholarship Applications are due February 15, 2006.



The Owens Community College Foundation offers a variety of scholarships through the generosity of businesses, organizations and individuals in the community. In an effort to publicize these scholarship opportunities, Owens has created a 2006-2007 Scholarship Information booklet.



Featured in the Scholarship Information booklet, is the Owens Alumni Association's Alumni Legacy Endowed Scholarship fund, a scholarship fund established to open new doors for future generations of students to pursue their career aspirations at Owens.

The selection criteria for this scholarship is not based upon financial need. Rather, the applicant must be a son or daughter of an Alumni Association member and carry a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA as an Owens student or soon-to-be high school graduate. An applicant's parent or legal guardian must be considered a current Alumni Association member on February 15 in order to be considered for this scholarship.

Alumni Legacy Scholarship information, along with other scholarship opportunities, is listed in the 2006-2007 Scholarship Information booklet and also on the Owens website under the Foundation link.

Applications for all scholarships are due by February 15, 2006. For scholarships based on financial need, a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for 2006-2007 must be on file in the Financial Aid Office by February 15. Scholarship award notification is sent to students in March.

Owens students are making their presence known not just on campus, but in the community and on a national scale as well.

In response to Hurricane Katrina, Student Government organized the Hurricane Hustle to benefit victims of the natural disaster. Supplies from bottled water to pet food were collected in several locations on campus and donated to the American Red Cross for relief efforts.

"We felt this would be an opportunity to reach out on a national scale and help many people," said Student Government President Brooke Affholder.

Student Government also recently partnered with Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) to host Veteran's Day memorials on the Findlay-area and Toledo-area campuses. Events included speeches, a viewing of the film "Saving Private Ryan" and the display of an actual flag from the USS Arizona that survived the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Students Give Back to North Star BlueScope LLC

North Star BlueScope LLC is getting a big return on its investment in Owens. The company has donated as much as \$140,000 in steel to help certify 400 Owens welding students annually.

Now, the students are returning the favor. As North Star embarks on a beautification project for their Delta facilities, a team of Owens students and faculty has created a set of sculptures to contribute to the project.

"Participating in this is a great way to say thank you for all they do for us," said Charles Stewart, Owens Manufacturing Technologies faculty member.

The three sculptures have 12-foot wingspans and weigh 175 lbs. each and reflect one bird in a landing sequence. The team features Stewart, faculty member Bob Williams and 12 Owens students.

The blue heron sculptures are now visible from County Road 9 and Route 2 in Delta.

Tip-Off Classic Opens the Express Basketball Season

The Owens Express Men's and Women's Basketball teams got off to strong starts at home in the annual Owens Community College Tip-Off Classic. The tournament took place in the Student Health and Activities Center on back-to-back weekends in early November.

The Men's team toppled Kellogg Community College on Friday, November 4, before losing a hard-fought championship game to Hillsbrough Community College to finish second.

The Women's Express squad first defeated Fanshawe College to advance to the championship on Saturday, November 12. There, they were overmatched by a powerful Schoolcraft Community College team, finishing second in the tournament.

Both teams look forward to another successful year of competition. It will also be the last season for the Men's Express coach Jim Welling, who is stepping down after 20 years with the team.

Owens Events Take Students *Beyond the Classroom*

November provided two excellent venues for Owens students to take their academic experience beyond the classroom.

For the first time ever, the Ohio Shakespeare Conference was hosted by an Ohio community college. This highly respected seminar brought experts from around the nation to Owens' Toledo-area Campus to discuss the continued relevance of the works of Shakespeare and their relation to modern legal issues. Students were invited to attend seminars, keynote lectures on topics such as "Teaching Shakespeare in Prison" and enthralling performances by the Shenandoah Blackfriars Stage Co. Atomic Fission Tour.

In addition, Owens students celebrated International Education Week with several events designed to explore international issues and their relation to the Owens community. Activities included art contests, multi-cultural speakers on Hispanic and Islamic issues, a showing of the Israeli film, Yana's Friends, and a display booth from 10,000 Villages, an organization that promotes fair trade by marketing products from diverse cultures around the world.

Alums Go For -The Kill!


