# Get Hooked on Books!

#### Scribble, Scribble

Help your child experiment with writing using pencils, crayons, markers and chalk



on different kinds of paper and cardboard. Encourage him or her to make scribble-like strokes that will be used later to form letters: straight lines, curves, and circles. Suggest drawing a story. This can be as simple as three pictures: one for the beginning, the middle, and the end of the story. Have your child dictate the story to you and create captions for the pictures.

#### **Name Games**

Find as many ways as you can think of to play with the sounds and letters of your child's name. Help your child find the letters of his or her name in print around the house or when you go to the store. Help your child write down each letter and repeat the sound it makes.

#### Write It Down

Help your child understand that written words stand for spoken words and that writing has a purpose. Use a chalkboard or magnetic letters on the refrigerator to write family messages.


