# **RABBI'S MESSAGE**

Some years ago I heard a comedic critique of the changes that American society was undergoing. I call it the magazine analysis. The idea is that you can track our thinking and our major interests just by looking at magazine titles. First came People magazine. That was nice: we wanted to know about other people and read "human interest" stories.

Some years later a new magazine was produced to compete with People. A simple knock-off would have been silly. The publisher was trying to catch the eye of the American reader and the tenor of the times. The title would have to convey the fact that this magazine was more in tune with what we seemed to be interested in. So the magazine "Us" came into being. Implicit in the title was a narrower focus and the creation of a group called "Them." "They", obviously, are less interesting and less deserving of our concern.

Finally, a publisher came along who felt that both People and Us had run their course. There was a perception that our society had continued to change and the public needed another new magazine. The direction of the change was clearly evident in the title, "Self." We had moved from People to Us to Self. The popular expression, "It is all about me", also came into being.

I am old enough to remember when a person might be described as "a rugged individualist." This was a positive characterization: strong, independent, true to ideals. But I also learned that the rugged American pioneers did barn raisings. Neighbors, who did not live just a stone's throw from each other, would get together and put up a barn for someone trying to establish a new farm. People reached out to help others in part because there was sense that we really did need each other. We could be stronger as a community than we could be as individuals.

It turns out that 2,000 years ago Judaism said the same thing in the Book of Ecclesiastes, "... the three fold cord is not easily broken." This quote is not just about the strength of threads and ropes. It tells us that when we join together to achieve a common goal, we can manage almost anything. This concept of coming together runs as deeply in Judaism as one can imagine. Not only are we suppose to gather as a minyan when we pray, but the phrasing of our prayers is clearly aimed at a group. "Blessed are You **our** God, You have made **us** holy, and taught **us** to ...".

Judaism may seek to elevate, change and improve the individual, but it does so in a group context. It teaches that we are each responsible for one another. It is a community obligation to pass Torah on to our children. It is virtually impossible to do it alone. As communities, we used to raise barns; now, as congregations, we raise children. Temple Beth Shalom tells us, tells our families, tells our children, that we are not alone.

If you ask people what makes a great synagogue, they might say it is the Rabbi, the Cantor, the sermons, the services, religious school, High Holy days. All of those answers are correct but, to me, what makes a synagogue great are the connections members make to one another. What cements friendships is history. History is what Temple Beth Shalom is all about.


# SUKKOT/SIMCHAT TORAH

### Women of the Bible: A Presentation / Book Signing with Sara Novenson Sunday, September 29 at 7 pm

Sara Novenson will present a slide show of the paintings of her Women of the Bible series while telling their stories. The stories are beautiful, powerful and mostly unknown. Each is a powerful archetype and teacher. Defying the boundaries of their time, the Women of the Bible reach out to guide and strengthen us in our "modern" lives. Novenson's book, "Illuminated Visions, Women of the Bible", is at the heart of the presentation. In addition to her own research, Novenson studied for eighteen years with an esteemed Torah and Kabbalah scholar. Sara will speak of her personal journey as a Jewish woman and artist, focusing on how and why she began this body of Jewish work, and how her spirituality has affected her art and life. This strange and serendipitous story brought Novenson from Germany in the 80's full circle back to her Jewish roots.

Sara Novenson's work has been exhibited for the past 30 years in galleries, museums and numerous one-woman shows in Switzerland, Germany, and New York City. Her work has appeared as cover art on many publications, was used by UNICEF, and has been published in books, magazines and newspapers in the US, Europe and Israel, most recently in the Jerusalem Post. She has taught and lectured all over the world, receiving a grant from The Levinson Foundation in 1994 to revive the tradition of Jewish Folk Art though teaching workshops nationwide.

Evening Beit Midrash: "Walking in the Footsteps of the Prophets". Following our two-year study of the Hebrew prophets, we now will track the movement of the prophetic expression as it emerges in contemporary times. We will explore selections from Martin Buber, Emanuel Levinas, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Pablo Friere and Vaclav Havel as well as some Latin American liberation theologians. Tuesdays, September 17 – May 27, from 6:00-8:30 pm. Cost: \$18-22 per session, paid monthly (scholarships are available).

Daytime Beit Midrash ("House of Exploration") is a learning circle that creates a safe and loving community in which people of all faiths and no faith can engage in deep exploration and find profound insights. ### "Nice Jewish Cowboys and Cowgirls" at the New Mexico History Museum

Sunday, October 27 at 2 pm

Prompted by the current special exhibit "Cowboys Real and Imagined" at the New Mexico History Museum, the program "Nice Jewish Cowboys and Cowgirls" will be co-sponsored by The New Mexico Jewish Historical Society, the New Mexico History Museum and Temple Beth Shalom.

Surprisingly, Jewish ranching and sheep-raising families have played a prominent role in New Mexico's rich and diverse economic and social landscape from around 1850 to the present day. Professor Emeritus Noel Pugach will provide a historical context for this largely unknown topic. Ms. Meredith Davidson, a curator at the Museum, will then show slides from the Wurmser photo collection. The program's focus will be a panel representing Jewish families who have remained active in the ranching industry in New Mexico (including our own Todd Wertheim). The panelists will describe how their families became involved in this enterprise, telling some fascinating stories. The audience will then have an

opportunity to ask questions and share their own experiences.

# SOCIAL JUSTICE

It has been an exciting summer at TBS! Our recent panel event "It Takes A Village: Strategies for Excellence in the Santa Fe Public Schools" attracted over 125 people from all over Santa Fe to hear Joel Boyd, Superintendent of Schools, Communities In Schools NM, the Santa Fe Community Foundation and the Children and Youth Commission discuss challenges and opportunities for our school system. As Brian Byrnes, president and CEO of the Community Foundation stated, "I believe that there's an enormous opportunity at this moment in time to bring together a shared strategy to leverage each other's resources and passion for change." He went on to comment "While there are many groups in the community that work to support the schools, for too long they've worked in isolation. All the small efforts won't add up to a shared strategy." While panelists spoke to the various efforts each are making to try and support a broad strategy for our schools, clearly there is much work to be done.

Julia Bergen, Executive Director of Communities In Schools of New Mexico hopes to link these various organizations and city agencies together. With support from the SF Community Foundation, there was discussion of how CISNM might collaborate with the Children and Youth Commission further down the road. Also highlighted at the event was CISNM's plan for addressing challenges at the Transformation Zone Schools. Site coordinators in each school will serve as the contact point for volunteers, teachers, and administrators -- providing support and guidance to individuals working with students. Communities In Schools of New Mexico will also pay for and arrange the fingerprinting and registration required by the school district. 
