### PSAT October 20, 2007

The PSAT is given only once each year and is excellent practice for the SAT. It is also the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test for the class of 2009. For many students the PSAT is the first official step on the road to college.

**The PSAT is recommended for all juniors.** Sophomores are also encouraged to take the PSAT to practice for the official results when they take it their junior year.

The PSAT will be given on October 20, 2007 here at South. The test begins promptly at 8 a.m., so students should check in by 7:30. Registration will begin in September at the South Career Resource Center. The cost will be approximately \$15.

Test results should be returned by the College Board in December. Counselors have the actual test booklet used by each student and will return the test booklet along with the student's scored answer sheet to each individual. This gives the student the opportunity to review and further prepare for the SAT, or in the case of sophomores, for next year's PSAT.

The **ASVAB Career Exploration Program** is a comprehensive career exploration and planning program that includes a multiple aptitude test battery, an interest inventory and various career planning tools designed to help students explore the world of work.

The ASVAB Career Exploration Program is intended for use with students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades, as well as students in post-secondary schools. The Program provides tools, including the test battery and interest inventory, developed by the Department of Defense to help high school and post-secondary students across the nation learn more about career exploration and planning. Results of the aptitude test and the interest inventory enable students to evaluate their skills, estimate performance in academic and vocational endeavors, and identify potentially satisfying careers. These results are integrated with work values to help students identify and prioritize possible career choices. Students are encouraged to consider their own work-related values and other important

personal preferences as they explore the world of work and learn career exploration skills that will
benefit them throughout their work lives.

## Electronic Communication Devices

Students are permitted to use cell phones and other electronic devices <u>only before</u> <u>school</u>, <u>after school and during lunch</u>.

The likely consequence for their misuse is confiscation and the requirement that they have to be retrieved by a parent.

### **SAHS Dress Code**

Students must dress in a manner that does not detract from the educational environment. Clothing, jewelry or accessories are prohibited that do any of the following:

Is hazardous to the wearer or other students (clothing with spikes, industrial chains).

Imply or indicate affiliation with gangs or prohibited organizations.

Reference or glamorize drugs, alcohol or tobacco.

Display profanity, obscenity, sexual innuendo or harassing or demeaning messages.

Is sexually provocative or revealing (over exposed midriff)

Sagging trousers are prohibited.

A review of the **SAHS Student Handbook** was held in every classroom the second week of school. If your student did not bring a Handbook home, you may pick one up in the front office.

## PARKING PERMITS

Parking Permits MUST be purchased BEFORE parking at school. Security will ticket vehicles without permits beginning Sept. 4th. Permits are \$50 per semester or \$100 per school year. Please provide the following:



- . Alaska Drivers License
- . Current Copy of Vehicle Registration
- . Current Proof of Insurance

Parents are required to sign the Parking Permit Application Form in the presence of a SAHS staff member or have their signature notarized.

ALL OVERDUE FINES MUST BE CLEARED BEFORE A PARKING PERMIT WILL BE ISSUED.

## STUDENTS WALKING OFF CAMPUS DURING LUNCH

Students who wish to walk home at lunch need to have a parent's signature on the "Permit to Walk Off Campus at Lunch" form. These forms will be available from the Student Services office.

## From the desk of Juliana Armstrong, Staff Services AP 742-6332



Welcome back to another great year at South! To all those parents and new students who attended our recent Strategies for Success Workshop, I hope you came away with some useful information concerning how to best utilize the many resources we have available. Our goal is that all students will experience success at this school as they journey toward graduation.

At this time of life, a student's primary job is going to school. If one comes to school on time, avoids missing classes and makes a place for homework in his day, he is acquiring some wonderful attitudes toward work and responsibility that will serve him well in life. Good attendance is a major factor in academic success. Classes missed are often hard to make up. This is especially true for those students enrolled in our honors and AP classes.

At this time of year, a fishing metaphor might be appropriate. My husband often says, "You can sit in your boat all day, but you won't catch any fish unless your hook is in the water." In the same way, a student can be enrolled in school, but if she skips class or is chronically late, there is no education going on. It takes the day-to-day attention, where each step builds upon the previous one, for learning to occur.

Parents, please take our calendar into account when planning family vacations. December 19 and 20 are reserved for finals, which may not be taken early. Although teachers will work on Dec. 21, your children will be off that day. Please don't give them the albatross of undone finals to drag around during the holidays.

Likewise, May 21 and 22, 2008 are also reserved for second semester finals for underclassmen. Surely any student will be less successful on a final after several weeks or months have passed. Please help us teach respect for education and celebrate your child's accomplishments by delaying travel until after the school year has concluded. We love your kids so much we want to see every one of them every single day!

## Cyberbulling Deb Ward, School Psychologist

Cyberbullying involves intimidating, humiliating and overpowering others; however, instead of using fists and spoken words, cyberbullies establish power electronically through e-mails, cell phone or pager text messages and instant messages (IM). The goal of cyberbullies is to gain power and control over another person whom they perceive as weak and vulnerable. While the intent is the same, cyberbullying differs from physical bullying in several key ways. First, it is more difficult to observe because students have nearly continuous access to electronic communication. Next, it can be sent to a huge audience at the same time. Last, the aggressor can attack almost anywhere, often at home, which was once a safe haven.

Parental awareness and monitoring of the friends, activities, and interests of their children can help decrease the risk of problems. However, if cyberbullying occurs, parents can encourage students to:

- Refuse to pass along any messages that are cruel or demeaning.
- Refuse to open or read messages from cyberbullies and block the bully's messages.
- Resist erasing the messages, as they may be needed to take action.
- Tell any friend who is cyberbullying...to STOP.
- Think about the possible consequences before clicking SEND.

The Anchorage School District prohibits the use of cell phones and pagers during classes and denies access to most social networking sites on school computers. However, if electronic communication is sent during school activities (i.e., dances, sports, etc.) or on school property, it is important for students to alert security staff or administrators. The district has established policies relating to electronic communication and cyberbullying. If negative electronic communication creates substantial disruption to the educational process, then disciplinary and or legal actions may be taken. Here are some tips for students if they feel they are being harassed:

- Contact school officials if the message was sent during school/suggests potential harm at school.
- Contact the School Resource Officer or Anchorage Police Department if threatened with harm.
- File a complaint with the website Internet Service Provider or telephone company.
- Print copies of messages, as they may be needed to take action.

#### **Immunizations**

Many students need their Tetanus 10 year booster and are at risk for being excluded from school in September 2007 Please remember to provide documentation of your child's shot record every time they receive an immunization at their Health Care Provider's office. These health records are NOT automatically forwarded to the school nurse. Reminder letters were mailed in May 2007 to inform parents of this requirement. Please check your child's shot record and provide an updated copy of your child's immunizations to the school nurse.

#### Asthma/Seizures/Diabetes

Students with Asthma, Seizures, or Diabetes should have an "Action Plan" provided to the school nurse. Both the parent and the physician complete the "Action Plan." Students are able to carry their medications at school if the parents and the physician have signed the form stating this is permitted.

#### Medications

All student medications must be provided in the original container from the pharmacy or the grocery store and be accompanied by the parental/physician written request for administration at school. Parents must complete the necessary Anchorage School District medication forms and provide the medication for their child.

All medications, with the exception of "Rescue" medications must be kept in the nurse's office and administered by the school nurse or nurse's assistant. "Rescue" medications include inhalers for Asthma, Epi-Pens for Anaphylactic reactions, and Glucagon for Diabetes. These medications can be carried by students only with permission from the MD, the parents, and the nurse. The "Self-Administered Medication" form is available on-line and from the school nurse.

## Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Literacy

Our goal at South is to ensure that students heading off into the world are information literate. Information literacy includes the ability to access, locate, evaluate, and use information; it involves communicating information and ideas; it means using information in a socially responsible and ethical manner. All of these skills are intended to make the student an independent consumer of information. Information literacy also means reading, listening and viewing a variety of media for personal enjoyment and lifelong learning.

To start the school year, all incoming freshmen will receive an orientation to the library and the school's computer network. We also offer lessons introducing students to the various electronic resources, evaluating web sites, how to avoid plagiarism, proper citation format, using Microsoft tools, and how to create spreadsheets and graphs. These lessons are not just for freshmen, however. The technology coordinator and I will be working with teachers in all the core subject areas to integrate information and communication technology skills into the curriculum.

## South Anchorage High School AK-20041 Air Force Junior ROTC

**Congratulations** to the cadets of South Anchorage High School!! For the third consecutive year, the "Wolverine" Squadron has been recognized by the Air Force's Air Education and Training Command with the **Distinguished Unit Award.** This recognition is a result of the individual efforts of every assigned cadet who helped the unit achieve and exceed its established goals. Eighty cadets accrued over 2,600 hours of community service while 59% achieved 20 or more hours resulting in recognition from the Mayor's office and four Presidential Service Awards. One such goal cadets initiated and exceeded was to accrue 2,600 hours of community service.

From 9-14 August, 43 select cadets were invited to attend our **6-day Summer Leadership School.** Cadets were mentally and physically tested during the duration of the encampment. Cadets received Advanced First Aid and Survival training. Canoed, fished, cooked meals, and participated team building activities. While on Elmendorf AFB, cadets received several tours of Air Force base organizations and training operations. The unit toured the 381<sup>st</sup> Intelligence facility, the airfield tower, and the Regional



Air Operations Center. Additionally, cadets flew state of the art C-17 simulators, airfield operations simulators, drove F-15 armament load equipment and explosive ordinance disposal unit robots. The tours and the camp culminated with white water rafting, freefall rappelling from a 30ft tower, and flightline tours of F-15 and the new F-22 fighter aircraft. These students took away lifelong memories and a new understanding of professionalism, accountability, teamwork, and individual responsibility to strive for excellence.

If you weren't involved in the JROTC last year, you missed competing in 4 military **Drill Competitions** including travel to Eielson Air Force Base in Fairbanks Alaska. You also missed the best dance in Anchorage-**The Military Ball**. This year, this catered event will be

held at the Anchorage International Airport Train Depot. You missed the opportunity to be recognized for your efforts and achievements by over 30 military and private support organizations with plaques, trophies, medals, and scholarships during our formal **Military Dining Out and Awards Ceremony**.

You missed Incentive flights on Army and Air National Guard Blackhawk helicopters, C-12, and KC-135 aerial refueling aircraft. Lunch with Governor Palin, the 3rd Wing Commander, Brigadier General Carlisle, 9/11 New York City Fire Commissioner Mr Thomas Von Essen and dinner with too many local dignitaries to even mention. We conducted 46 color guard performances in the community supporting the Martin Luther King Day Celebrations and DARE Graduation ceremony to name a few. You missed a picnic, a holiday party and the opportunity to work with some wonderful people in support of the Special Olympics and MLK celebrations.

If that isn't enough...you just plain missed out on some great fun, including rock climbing, pingpong, miniature golf, bowling, basketball, dodge ball, and the Anchorage-area Wacko games. You missed hands-on curriculum on rocketry that resulted in students building and then launching their own rockets. You missed the opportunity to visit the Battle Command Training Center on Fort Richardson where cadets were put in a state-of-the-art, virtual world. This simulator enabled cadets to safely handle "mock" military weapons such as the M16, M4, M136 and AT4 rocket launcher and test their skills in several virtual scenarios.

Lastly, over **\$50,000** in Air Force and locally sponsored **college scholarships** were given to graduating cadets. *Don't miss THAT opportunity*. The **2007-2008 school year** is already looking like a benchmark year. Our **cadets will learn** how to manage resources, set goals, motivate peers, and lead by example. These young students and future leaders, continuously volunteer in the community, test themselves and compete physically, travel, learn about the aerospace sciences, and develop strong bonds of friendship. This right to privacy form will remain in effect throughout the student's time in the Anchorage School District until said student chooses to allow release of private information.

Federal public law 107-110, section 9528 of the ESEA, "No Child Left Behind Act" requires school districts to release student names, addresses, and phone numbers to military recruiters upon their request. Students may then be called at home by recruiters about joining the military. The law also requires the school district to notify you of your right to Opt-Out from this by requesting that the district not release your information to military recruiters. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a federal law, requires the District, with certain exceptions, to obtain your consent prior to disclosing personal information from your student's education records. The law recognizes, though, that schools often desire to publish student information, for example, to recognize students through awards or athletic programs. Additionally, outside organizations such as colleges, legislators, the military, and vendors for items such as photographs or class rings, often seek contact information for students. To meet this need, FERPA allows the District to designate as "directory information" any personally identifiable information in a student's educational records that would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. School officials may release directory information about a student without first obtaining parental consent, unless you object by returning this form.

The District has identified the following information as directory information: student name, address, date and place of birth, dates of attendance, grade level, degrees and awards received, date of graduation, name of secondary school most recently attended, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, and height and weight of members of interscholastic athletic teams. This list is found at Anchorage School Board Policy 343.34. A copy of this policy in available for review in the office of all of our schools, or on the District's website.

In two instances, the District is required by law to release certain contact information regarding junior and senior high school students, unless you object. First, the District is required to provide to the University of Alaska the names and addresses of those students eligible for UA scholarship programs. Second, upon receiving a request from military recruiters and/or institutions of higher learning, the District must provide names, addresses, and telephone listings. The form below specifically allows you, as a parent, to object to release of phone numbers and directory information to military recruiters and colleges.

If you do not want the District to disclose directory information from your student's education records during the 2007-2008 school year, you must notify the District, in writing, by returning this form. If you have no objections to the release of directory information, you do not need to take any action.
