# **Theology of Work**: God's Plan for it, the Problem with it, and a Gospel-view of it (Activity: taking a Gospel-view of our work)

### I.) GOD'S PLAN FOR WORK (Genesis 1-2)

- The earliest work: In the beginning, God worked. Work was <u>not</u> a necessary evil.
- Since we are made in the image of God (Gen.1:26-27) and were originally commanded to work and maintain God's creation (Gen.2:15), working is in our DNA or design.
- There is dignity in manual labor as God planted a garden during Creation (Gen. 2:8) and Jesus was a carpenter (Mark 6:3)
- The material creation we're called to care for is good; God will redeem it and us. (Rom.8:20-25)
- In six days, God created, formed, and then *partially* filled the Earth. People continue His work of development by rearranging raw material in a way that helps society flourish.
- In New Testament, we learn <u>God calls us to serve the world through work</u> (1 Cor.7:17)
- a. Luther's reformed work theology: both church and secular work are God's work **Conclusion**: Christians should appreciate the work of everyone, including non-Christians. As Keller says, "Our gospel-trained eyes can see the world ablaze with the glory of God's work"

# II.) THE PROBLEMS WITH WORK (GENESIS 3:8-19)

- Work can be fruitless-- "thorns and thistles" (Gen.3:18)
- Work can seem pointless "for all is vanity and a striving after wind" (Ecc.2:17)
- Work can be selfish "Come, let us build ourselves a city and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves..." (Genesis 11:4)
- Work can reveal our idols (e.g., power, fame, money, etc.) ""You shall not make for yourself any gods of cast metal" (Exod.34:17; READ: \*Luke 18:18-27)
  - o <sup>25</sup> For it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." <sup>26</sup> Those who heard it said, "Then who can be saved?" <sup>27</sup> But he said, "What is impossible with man is possible with God."

### III.) THE GOSPEL AND WORK

- The world typically blames society's problems (e.g., oppression, crime, financial troubles) on something within the physical world, and looks for the ultimate solution (e.g., better leaders/laws, more policemen, more money)
- Without the gospel, we will either be demonizing something that isn't bad enough, or idolizing something that isn't powerful enough to save us from the problem.

#### Phil. 2:3-4

3 Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. 4 Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.

• In response to the <u>idol of 'Most Funding'</u>:

#### Matt.16:26

For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?

• In response to the <u>idol of Fame:</u>

#### Phil. 2:5-7

<sup>5</sup> Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, <sup>[a]</sup> <sup>6</sup> who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, <sup>7</sup> but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, <sup>[b]</sup> being born in the likeness of men. <sup>8</sup> And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

## c.) A Christian approach to doing my work:

- Work to achieve: Excellence (e.g., good work ethic), <u>not</u> Success (e.g., best paper). [From Men's Retreat message (Dr. Bruce Bickel)]
- **Be an Example via**: <u>Humility</u> (serving others like Christ did), <u>Graciousness</u> (forgiving mistakes of others like Christ) did, <u>Repentance</u> (when I fail, repent)
- Focus on developing my people, not my empire
