




#### ALICE-TEACHER'S NOTES

#### SYNO PSIS

Our modern day Alice falls as leep under a tree whilst reading Alice in Wonderland and is woken by the sound of the white rabbit in a panic-he's very late. Following him, she discovers she is suddenly in Ire land, at a St Patrick's Day Parade where a Leprechaun explains all about St Patrick. He tells her to follow the white rabbit as he will help her return home.

On her way she finds herself at the Mad hatters' teap arty where she learns all about food times in England including of course — teatime. However tea is interrupted by the arrival of the Queen of hearts, who is upset because she doesn't have any Valentines cards. She mistakes Alice for the postman and when Alice tells her she has no cards for her, Alice is sent off to prison. "Off with her head!"

In prison she meets a sad skele ton that is missing Halloween. He's stuck in jail because he's not scary enough and he hates Halloween, so Alice decides to help him. She escapes with the rabbit's help and she finds he rself on a sleigh, with Santa Claus who tells her all about the various Christmas traditions.

Finally Alice catches up with the rabbit, and after learning all about Easter including an Easter egg hunt, she finally returns home, back to her book, wondering if it all really was a dream.....

Note: This is not Lewis Carroll's Alice in Wonderland, it's a play inspired by his story and characters.

#### AIM:

# To become familiar with the characters of the play

#### WORKSHEET1

#### Use the flashcards to introduce the characters.

The se flashcards introduce the main characters of this play: Alice, the White Rabbit, the queen of Hearts, Leprechaun, the Mad Hatter, a Skeleton and Father Christmas.

Those from **C.I.** can learn the characters' names, parts of the body, clothes and accessories, colours, etc. Those from **C.M.** can write comparative sentences. Those from **C.S.** can write comparative and superlative sentences and describe the characters (physical, psychological description).

#### AIM:

#### Get to know the celebrations/festivi ties that are important in English-speaking countries

#### WORKSHEET2

#### Part I: writing words and matching exercise

Write the words under their corresponding festivity. Those from C.I. can do the easier words and say which festivity is their favourite. Those from C.M. can write the words under the corresponding festivity and also say which is their favourite. C.S. can write the words and say which is the most interesting festivity for them and explain why.

ANSWERS: CHRISIMAS: stocking; sleigh; North Pole; tree, reindeer. EASTER: bunny; egg hunt; basket; eggs. STPATRICK'S: leprechaun; shamrock; pot of gold; Ireland. HALLO WEEN: trick or treat; ghost; pumpkin. ST VALENTINES: Valentine's cards; cupid; heart.

#### Part II: Calendar

Circ le the dates of the festivities in the calendar. Use a different colour for the different festivities. Compare with your classmates. Don't forget that Easter is not always on the same date! Have your students write down the dates (Christmas is on the twenty-fifth of December, Saint Patrick's is on the seventeenth of March, etc..)

To boost their creativity you can ask your students to create their own calendars and then hang them in your classroom.

#### WORKSHEET3

Explain to your students the origins of Saint Patrick's Day and about le pre chauns. Be low you've got links to we b sites where you can get some info. **Those from C.I.** can colour the leprechaun according to the instructions.

For the more creative and older ones, you can divide the class in small groups and with the Christmas vocabulary have them write another verse to the song and sing it. Lots of games can be played with these cards. In pairs, students can read the cards while his/herpartner tries to guess the correct word. #### ALICE TEACHER'S NOTES - TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS AND GUIDELINES

#### TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS FOR SHOWS FOR BIG GROUPS

- ✓A clear space of 4m x 6m. If there is a stage, the stage must be no more than 1m high. The space must be empty of fumiture/children when the actors arrive.
- ✓ A small table.
- ✓ 4 x c ha irs (a d ult size d)
- ✓2 x plug sockets in the performance space for the sound and light equipment.
- ✓General lighting.
- √The actors need 1 hour to set up the lights, music and sound, and an hour minutes to set down.

#### G UIDELINES FOR A SUCCESSFUL SHOW

In order for the children to enjoy and follow the play performed in another language, we recommend the following guidelines:

- ✓ Ensure that the students have done at least some preparation from the Workpack, so that they know who the characters are and are familiar with the story.
- √To avoid distraction, limit the number of times teachers or students need to enter/leave the room during the performance.
- ✓ The students will be asked to be quiet and listen in some moments and asked to participate in others. Ple a se a skall teachers/monitors/parents present during the session to encourage the students to be a good audience and respect the actors.
- ✓ Tum off all mobile phones.
- ✓No eating ordrinking.





Alice: 6 o'clock?


The Mad Hatter: Yes, 6.00 and that means time for dinner.

The Mad Hatter: Yes!! Finally she is learning something. Sandwich?








#### CHRISTMAS ALL AROUND THE WORLD

In Costa Rica, children receive gifts from the Three Kings on January 6th. Children put grass under their beds for the camels. In the morning the grass is replaced by presents.

In Italy, Babbo Natale, which means Father Christmas, is Santa. Children put a pair of their shoes by the door on the day before and the following morning they find them filled with small presents and sweets.

In Spain, children leave their shoes under the Christmas tree the night of January 5th and presents from the Three Kings appear the next morning. Santa Claus is called Papa Noel and some children receive presents both days on December 24th (from Papa Noel) and on January 6th (from the Three Kings).

In Morocco, he is known as Black Peter.

In Japan, Santa Claus is called Santa Claus or just "Santa". Children often call him "Santa no ojisan", which means "Uncle Santa".

In Sweden, Jultomten visits the evening before Christmas day, pulling a big bag of julklappar (Christmas presents) in the deep snow.

Pã Norsk (in Norwegian) "Julenissen" arrives on the evening of the 24th.

In the Netherlands, he is called Kerstman.

In Finland, he is called Joulupukki.

In Holland he is Sinter Klaas. He is much thinner than the American Santa Claus. He rides a white horse and gets help from numerous Zwarte Pieten (Black Petes) handing out presents and sweets. He arrives the first Saturday in November by boat. In the evenings, Dutch Children sing songs in front of the fireplace or in the living room and leave their shoe with a present. In the mornings they will find their shoe filled with presents and sweets. On 5<sup>th</sup> December Dutch households have a "Pakjesavond" (Presents night) and exchange presents.

In Russia, he is called Grandfather Frost. He brings presents to children and often delivers them on person in New Year's Eve. His helper is his granddaughter, whose name in Russian means "Snow Maiden".






