a truly amazing group of individuals that 25 years ago had the foresight, dedication and commitment to start the first steps that have led us to the Hospice service we have today. We have a big responsibility to ensure we are celebrating another milestone birthday in 25 years' time.

So with that in mind we are about to take our message to the community via a 'Hospice Needs Your Help' campaign. We do want to be here in another 25 years and we need community support now more than ever. We continue to face increasing operational costs such as petrol, electricity, our medical equipment and supply costs are ever on the increase and our funding from the NDHB has remained static for many years. We have an operating budget of approx. \$1.3 million, we receive \$450,000 from the DHB, we raise approximately \$550,000 from our second hand shops and every year we have a budget shortfall of approx. \$350,000. We know the numbers of our patients are likely to grow given our population's demographics and we want to keep our services free to patients. We need help to maintain our day to day services for our community.

With that in mind there is no time like the present to begin our 'Hospice Needs Your Help' campaign. You can participate through donations of goods for our shops, volunteering your talent and expertise, signing up to a regular giving programme and by joining our soon to be launched bequest programme. Please also take a look at the wish list in this newsletter to see if you can help us with items for our patient's improved comfort. Also watch out for the upcoming Hospice and Harcourts Art and Collectables auction on October 17th... it's going to be popular so get your tickets early, put on your glad rags, get a group together, have a fun night and bag yourself a wonderful item or two. to our first newsletter from our new home! Since our last newsletter we have moved from our rented property into our new home and we have celebrated a milestone birthday, 25 years of Hospice Mid-Northland. It's been busy, busy, busy! Our move to our new home has been a big journey, thank you to all our helpers... we couldn't have managed this without you. Many long hours later we feel proud to open our doors to patients and whanau in this beautiful, calm, peaceful space. Thanks to

When I reflect on my first 6 months as Chairman of our Society I simply think "WOW". For all of us here at Hospice Mid-Northland it's been a time of great excitement and celebration, underpinned by some incredibly hard work by our staff and volunteers under the wonderful leadership of our General Manager, Bernie. Following three months of intensive work we moved to our new home at 464 Kerikeri Road at the end of June. A Powhiri, followed by a formal opening by Mayor John Carter on 30 July was a chance for us to show guests and community leaders through our new home. We got great coverage in the local media and hopefully that helped to dispel some of the myths floating around about the Board's decision to purchase the property. Yes, we paid \$945,000 for the property but

in our building

fund and we

did get a substantial grant from Pub Charity so we only needed to borrow slightly over \$600,000 to complete the purchase and fit-out. It is important to note that the debt servicing cost is not much higher than the rents we have been paying so the purchase has not had a significant negative impact on our operating expenses. But we are keen to reduce the debt as quickly as possible and we are actively seeking a philanthropist to help us meet this objective.

August 9th 2014, was another special day when we celebrated the 25th birthday of our Society. It was great to be able to meet many of the people who had the vision to establish our Hospice all those years ago and to see the joy with which they viewed our new Home.

Unfortunately it's not all chocolates and roses - our Board focus is on Finance, Finance and Finance! We are having serious challenges meeting our income targets. The various organisations that have supported us in the

past are receiving larger numbers of applications for funding yet have less funds to distribute so our grants have significantly reduced. We have been receiving far less donations than in the past which is also putting real pressure on our ability to balance the books. Our three shops are doing well but we do need far more donated goods for sale - please have a look in your garages and spare rooms and see if there is anything (especially furniture) that you are able to donate for sale in our shops. And if you can't deliver it just phone and we will arrange for it to be collected. Hospice really does need your help.

25 years! Amazing! Thank you to all those who had the vision to establish the foundations that underpin what we have today. Thanks for all your hard work and dedication, and thanks to everyone, staff and volunteers, who help us to keep that original dream alive and vibrant.

"My favourite part of working with Hospice, is the comradery of fellow volunteers; like-minded people who get a sense of satisfaction from helping others," John Hedges says. The Kerikeri resident has volunteered his time and skills to the Hospice Distribution Centre for seven years. "My job is to evaluate donated electrical goods such as heaters, fans, refrigerators, lighting equipment and kitchen appliances. I run a safety check on each item. If it needs fixing I decide whether the cost and time involved will be worth it.


John has the ideal background for working with electrical goods. He began a four year electrical fitter and turner apprenticeship in 1943 after joining the English Navy at the age of fifteen. He immigrated to New Zealand in 1964 to join a computer firm. "I applied for the job after leaving the Navy in 1958, but they turned me down. A few months later they changed their mind but I said that I had already been accepted to do a course in England. They told me to complete the course and then take up the job. That way they didn't have to pay for my training," he chuckles.

"When I first heard about Hospice, to me it was like a death call, I was frightened of it. But then one year later I realised there is more to it than just that".

I mean I can ring Hospice all hours of the day and night and they come out and help me or talk me through it, awesome support.

Last night I was confident enough to administer my own pain relief and that's from the Hospice nurses educating me and providing guidance, they became a family to me.

To know hospice is there for me and knowing you are there is like an angel on my shoulder.













In partnership with Harcourts Bay of Islands

The Hospice Mid-Northland inaugural Art and collectibles auction is being held at the Turner Centre on *Friday 17th October, from 6.30pm onwards,* the evening will include a silent auction of donated collectibles that will run through the evening with items ranging in price from \$50 upwards and including pottery and ceramics, fine bone china, art glass, paintings and some unique pieces such as a Crown Lynn vase hand painted by Frank Carpey and Tribal Art Pacific Island musical instruments dated circa 1886.

At around 7.30pm a live auction of substantial artworks will be held, with work from both upcoming and well known artists.

Once again the local community has been incredibly generous – we have the use of a pop-up shop donated by Anna Uliana and we've received some significant donations of work by talented local artists as well as a Cristina Popovici triptych donated by a local resident valued in excess of \$14,000. Sponsors, Harcourts Bay of Islands has purchased an artwork by local artist Herb Foley for the live auction on the evening. Harcourts auctioneer, Ross Paterson, promises the live auction will be a lively part of the evening!

While there will be some big ticket items, we've also made sure that there's auction items available for all budgets on the night so that everyone who wants to can take part in bidding.

Tickets are \$25 per person, which will include a champagne cocktail on arrival and canapes. Tickets are available from the Kerikeri Hospice Shop, Harcourts Kerikeri and as from Thursday 2 October, the Auction preview popup shop at 99 Kerikeri Road (next to Vodofone) where all artworks and collectibles will be on display.

The preview pop up shop will be open from 2-16 October. Bids on the silent auction items can be made at the pop-up shop right up until the 16th. The event is part of the **Hospice Needs Your Help** campaign.


