Headteacher's News

We recently heard the very sad news of the deaths of two members of the Paternoster 'family':

Our former cleaner Linda Norris, who retired two years' ago, died suddenly. Linda was mum to former pupil Daniel, who left six years ago. She had been receiving treatment for cancer and had just been given good news regarding her prognosis and then suffered a stroke. I attended Linda's funeral on 22nd April with a group of staff and former staff.

We were also very saddened to hear of the death of much-loved former pupil Joshua King. Josh had moved to Cumbria last year. He had battled severe chest infections with great spirit over many years.

This term we welcomed Michael Blick to Class 5 and Poppy Gough to Class 1, taking us to 49 pupils on roll. We welcomed Lisa Tripp back from maternity leave last week – she will now work two days a week in Class 2.

The inset day on 22^{nd} April included sessions for all staff on maths calculation methods, THRASS (both run by Clare Duncan), iPads (run by Jennie Walsh) and training in using the pool light and sound system. At our inset day tomorrow staff and governors will be thinking about our school values, as we begin to identify school developments for next year

Thank you to everyone who helped by running stalls or attending the Spring Fayre last Saturday – it was lovely to see so many pupils, former pupils, staff and friends of the school. A very big thank you to Emma Sutton, chair of the Friends, Cathy Brown, vice chair, Kate Kinsey, Anita Larrard and Jamie Nesbit, Friends' treasurer, for all their hard work in organising the event.

Our school budget has been cut again this year and is £36,000 less than last year. Governors are supportive of maintaining existing staffing levels and so we have had to cut back on items such as building repairs, staff training and resource purchasing in order to balance the budget.

We have had a high number of parents cancelling annual review meetings this year. Please be mindful of the impact this has on us, as it is not always easy to reschedule the meetings due to the high number of staff commitments. Changes also impact on the workload of the office staff. It is a legal requirement to review the statement annually and we are obliged to do so within one year of the previous review. Next school year, please let us know if you need to change the date when we notify you during the autumn term.

One of our pupils has recently been seriously ill in hospital for several weeks after catching a very heavy cold in school. Please be mindful of our more vulnerable pupils and ensure you keep children off if they have heavy colds.

I hope the sun shines for the holiday and you all have a good week.
