My name is Elizabeth. What does it mean for my family to go hungry? The answer is simple. There's nothing in the cupboard. Our table is bare.

My husband made a reasonable wage before he became disabled, but now we have nothing. We are homeless and we are frightened. One of the worst days of my life was when I had to walk away from our home to start living with family members and in motels.

I've always been able to have a roof over my children's heads. Now, we're never sure where that roof will be. I'm so worried about my children. It pains me to see them hungry. If you're a parent or grandparent, you can imagine the feeling you'd have if those you love went to bed hungry.

This evening my children will not go to bed hungry...and that means I will sleep with a smile on my face tonight.

We won't be able to come to the food pantry for a while, though. That's because we need to save up for the gas for the 14-mile trip. But we'll do what we have to do to feed our family. Haven House, the Montana Food Bank Network and you who are so generous are saving our lives. Oh, how I thank you.


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A WORD OF GRATITUDE
