REPORT FROM THE PRIEST IN CHARGE

I arrived at Grace Church on September 1, 2014 following the call to serve as your Priest in Charge. My first day moving into the Grace Church office at 67 State Road was eventful. But I soon learned that this community is incredibly effective in restoring order and providing support in times of unexpected events. Working closely with Kathy Clausen, Senior Warden, and Rick Gore, Junior Warden, the "water feature" in my office has been completely concealed by a handsome and functional cabinet.

My first two months were filled with meeting people of Grace Church, being introduced to clergy in the Berkshires and Western Massachusetts, and learning about mission partnerships in our community. I met with ministry groups at Grace. I attended Foyers Groups, Year-Round Stewardship Meetings, and with Pam Mott, Canon to the Ordinary for the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts, met with vestry and council members from Grace, Christ Trinity and St. Paul Churches. These gatherings offered the community of the three churches opportunities to share fellowship, planning, and worship as we seek to serve God and our neighbors in this part of Massachusetts.

I was able to join the last two of the four Community Network Dinners held at the Guthrie Center sponsored by the Wisdom Group of Grace Church and a grant from the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts. These dinners allowed our three churches to meet people who live in our area and to imagine ways in which we could work together. At the third dinner, I was able to learn about the nutritional and emotional needs of people who are isolated due to age, disability, or illness. The final dinner invited children and youth who participate in our Gideon's Garden to share what they have learned working in the garden and how their work has affected the way they view service to the community. The Community Network Dinners initiated a meeting between Ananda Timpane, Director of the Railroad Street Youth Project, Gwendolyn Van Sant, Founder and Director of Multicultural BRIDGE, and members of Grace Church to discuss ways we could partner with these established organizations to support youth in the Southern Berkshires. A project was proposed and in December, our Vestry approved a grant to support JV Van Sant's work with youth in Pittsfield and Great Barrington.

Since I have joined Grace Church, we have worshiped in many exciting and beautiful settings. I began worshiping with the community at Crissey Farm, but the next Sunday we pitched our tent at Gideon's Garden. The choir set up on a platform with the piano. The Rev. Don Peet and Rick Gore brought grills to cook, Rob Clausen set up the sound system, and many people contributed wonderful food as we celebrated together and then joined in fellowship under a cool, but brilliant fall sky. We celebrated St. Francis' Feast Day by blessing the animals at Taft Farm. Pennie Curry and Harley J. Margraf led our group of worshipers to visit and bless each animal rescued and cared for at the farm. We have recently changed the orientation of our worship space at Crissey Farm so that we face the windows that look out on the garden, allowing a wonderful view of God's beautiful creation. We will continue to explore our space for the best placement to worship God and provide a welcoming place for all who gather on Sunday mornings. On Christmas Eve, we celebrated the Eucharist at Taft Farm in their greenhouse surrounded by children's stockings, bunnies, and turtles. Two weeks before, we hung a banner at the entrance to Taft Farm inviting people to join us in worship. Pennie Curry and Sue Hayden created a lovely setting for our service, Chris Clark played the guitar to accompany our singing, and many family members and guests joined us in celebrating the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. We plan to offer at least two worship services at Gideon's Garden in 2015.

On Thursdays, our Eucharist and Healing Service continues to gather a small, but committed group. Sue and Rick Gore have prepared wall hangings that will allow us to double the size of our Chapel for larger services to be held in this space.

A Celebration of New Ministry was held on Sunday, October 26. Bishop Douglas Fisher served as the Celebrant, the Rev. Pamela Mott, Canon to the Ordinary, served as Assistant Clergy, and the Rev. Peter Elvin preached at a service that was filled with joy and love. Members of Christ Trinity Church in Sheffield and St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Stockbridge joined us in worship. The Rev. Anne Ryder, rector of Christ Trinity and the Rev. Tom Damrosch, rector of St. Paul's served at the Eucharist. Members of their choirs joined our Grace musicians to create a beautiful chorus. Sey's and my sons and grandson, as well as two beloved colleagues from St. Patrick's Episcopal Church and Day School in Washington, D.C., traveled to be present. Lee Cheek made an exquisite umbrella composed of ribbons containing blessings offered by the Grace Church community. A sumptuous lunch, organized by Susan Gray, followed the worship service. I received a "ceremonial" snow shovel and other gifts to celebrate my new home at Grace Church. It was a wonderful day to recognize the joy of our new beginning.

Opportunities for adult formation included our weekly Tuesday night Lectionary Group where a group of engaged parishioners gather to study and explore the scripture for the following Sunday. Once a month, people in our church and other communities gather to share their reading in our Books and Bread group. In Advent, we gathered to discuss our experiences of darkness and how we can find God in the midst of challenging times. We used Barbara Brown Taylor's book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark*.

We are a church that loves to be together. Our fellowship time after worship on Sunday mornings is always filled with wonderful food and great conversation. On the third Sunday of each month, a group of Grace Church folk gather at a restaurant to share food and stories. I am very grateful to George Raymond for making restaurant arrangements and gathering us together.

Pastorally, your priest has had the opportunity to offer care for parishioners who are ill or in need of spiritual support. I have officiated at the funeral services of one parishioner and the family members of two other parishioners since my arrival. We hold these families in our prayers as they grieve the loss of those they love and see no longer.

Finally, I am working to continue to develop relationships with our surrounding community. I have visited Bard College at Simon's Rock and met with Kuukua Yomekpe, Spiritual Life Director, to identify ways Grace Church can serve as a resource for students. We will also explore a new ministry serving five persons in our area who are in need of a visit and possibly nutritional support. I am very grateful to be a part of the ministry and community of Grace Church, an Episcopal Community in the Southern Berkshires. May God continue to bless our worship and our work.

REPORT FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

At our Annual Meeting in January of 2014, as we sat in a big circle, we realized that we were at the threshold of another new beginning. We had just begun to get to know the Rev. Bill Eakins, who was going to be our supply clergy for seven months, our search committee was reviewing the first batch of candidates, and we were preparing to steer our own ship for an unknown number of months. It seems like two years ago!

Much of the work of the Vestry entailed keeping the business side of the church fully functioning and healthy. We monitored finances and kept abreast of the various committees that energized our members. At every vestry meeting, we took time to delve into scripture through the practice of Dwelling in the Word. Our most important function though was to keep focused on what God was calling Grace to be and do

in this community. So we were very attentive and supportive when initiatives came from the Wisdom committee this year and worked to fully support those efforts.

In February, I met with the Rev. Annie Ryder, rector of Christ Trinity, the Rev. Tom Damrosch, rector of St. Paul's, the Rev. Pam Mott, Canon to the Ordinary of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, and a few of the laity of the respective churches to begin to explore how we can connect as congregations. The initial goal of these conversations was to get better acquainted and to look for collaborative projects. There was much discussion about joint services at first, which we have done for years, and we did find ways to accomplish this over Holy Week. Additionally, the three churches jointly donated to Construct's fund-raiser in May.

In March a number of us attended the Wardens, Vestry & Leadership Gathering sponsored by the Diocese. We were energized by the speakers and workshops and truly embraced the words of the Rt. Rev. Greg Rickel, Bishop of the Diocese of Olympia, in his presentation at the Church Buildings Fund Symposium on "Inertia." (There is a link on our website under "Episcopal Church.") We felt validated in that Grace Church is continuing the process of listening to the Spirit as we discover innovative ways to be a church while still honoring our traditions. We do not feel that we are stuck in the past, nor do we feel we do things just because "that's how we've always done them." We are in uncharted territory and hearing many of the comments at the Leadership Day helped us to feel confident that the way forward will be blessed by the Spirit's guidance.

We managed to make it through the winter (!) and were inspired by Bill's sermons each Sunday, as we continued our commitment to one another and to the vision of a fully missional church. The Rev. Noreen Suriner continued to preside at the Thursday noon Eucharists at the chapel. On April 27, the Sunday after Easter, we were delighted to welcome the Rt. Rev. Douglas Fisher, as our celebrant and preacher. Bishop Doug had declared, "The Sunday after Easter is often referred to as 'low Sunday'...make 'low Sunday' into "Momentum Sunday." He did just that at Grace on that Sunday. He was encouraging of our continued progress when he met with the Vestry at lunch, assured us that there was a priest somewhere who would answer our call, and we were, in turn, inspired by him.

In May under the expert leadership of Ian Booton, assisted by his wife, Mary, we held an Open House at the office. Ian and Mary had hand delivered invitations around the neighborhood and we were ready with refreshments and balloons. It is true that the only attendees were members of Grace Church, but it was an important exercise in outreach and experimentation.

During the summer under the leadership of Elizabeth Holland and George Raymond, a steering committee planned a series of dinners called Foyer Groups among the three churches. In these Foyer Group dinners, members of all three churches form small (6-8 members) groups who dine together at one of the members' houses and enjoy casual conversation. The three vestry/councils enjoyed a mini-retreat in late September, which allowed the leadership to become better acquainted. In February of 2015, there will be a joint vestry/council meeting which will include a review of the Foyer Groups and perhaps planning for more joint activities. All three churches are facing issues common to all New England Protestant churches: declining and aging membership and the effects of the general marginalization of institutional religion. At this time there is no road map for these three churches in the Southern Berkshires; we are still exploring how we relate to one another and what we might do together to continue being a witness to God's love in our geographic location.

This summer and into the fall saw the Wisdom Group leading us into new conversations with our neighbors through the four Community Network Dinners. A full report is included later in this booklet, but I must give a big shout out to the co-chairs, Pennie Curry and Doreen Hutchinson, along with the members of the

Wisdom Group: Dindy Anderson, Sally Brooke, Sue Gore, Margaret Layton, Dutch Pinkston. Countless hours went into the planning and execution of each of these meals and even more time went into the reflection on what was learned and how it will shape our work as Grace.

It was a glorious day in June when the Search Committee finalized its recommendation to the Vestry and we called the Rev. Dr. Janet Zimmerman to serve as our Priest in Charge. There were a truckload of prayers of gratitude offered that day! Certainly the biggest event this year for Grace was the welcoming of Janet as our new Priest in Charge. By accepting our call, she certainly demonstrated a faith that is incredibly strong, a spirit that is adventuresome and trusting of God's guidance, and a wisdom developed from living a life open to learning from others. What a joy it has been for me personally to get to know her over these past four months and see how she has moved into the leadership position with confidence, generosity, and care. Thank you God for Janet!

After welcoming her on September 7, her first Sunday, in our usual worship space at Crissey Farm, we enjoyed a joy-filled service the next Sunday, September 14, at Gideon's Garden. Many hands made that remote service possible and it enabled many members of the Gideon's Garden crew and their families to celebrate with us. The BBQ lunch that followed was the icing on the cake.

The Celebration of New Ministry on October 26 gave us all a chance to truly roll out the 'red carpet' and welcome Janet, her family and friends, along with Bishop Fisher and Pam Mott plus local clergy and members of St. Paul's and Christ Trinity to an incredibly festive service and luncheon at Crissey Farm. What a beautiful service it was, with innumerable details attended to by worship leaders, Chris Clark, and members of the choir . We were treated to the preaching of the Rev. Peter Elvin of St. John's, Williamstown who, during his sermon, asked the people of Grace to stand and he said to us, "This new pastoral union calls you to present yourselves as bearers of encouragement and support, bearers of grace, as you keep recognizing where and how God is active in this world, as you keep growing what you're doing, as you keep shaping a circle ever wider, workers at work in fields of grace."

Much of the work of the Vestry this year centered around planning, preparing, and praying for a new leader. But in addition always present at our meetings are discussions about how to make Grace better known in our community. We continue to support the efforts of those who serve as our communicators, Elizabeth Holland and Sally Brooke. In November, Vicki Ix the Diocesan Minister of Communications, attended a vestry meeting, reviewed our website and Facebook page, and their contents. She praised our efforts in these 'new' modes of communications and underscored the vibrancy of Grace's story in the world. She encouraged us to continue to explore ways to reach new members of our local community.

This has been a look back at 2014 from my perspective as Senior Warden. I have been incredibly thankful for the efforts of the members of the Vestry and the unflagging faithfulness of each and every member of all our worship groups who create a sacred experience for us each Sunday. I have been literally held up by the prayers of this community more than once this year and am deeply grateful for the challenges and joys of serving in this position. It has given me a chance to explore and learn and thereby deepen my faith. I'll leave you with a thought from a blogger I am fond of reading. In this quote he seems to echo the words of Peter, that we must be "shaping a circle ever wider, workers at work in fields of grace":

INFORMATION ABOUT PEOPLE'S PANTRY reprinted from Grace Church Annual Report, January 19, 2013

People's Pantry, our Great Barrington Food Pantry, was founded in the mid- 90's, and was then housed in the small garage behind St. James' Church. Over the years it has moved several times, but has continued to serve people in need of assistance in procuring food for their families, people who live in the Great Barrington area and surrounding "Hill Towns". The Pantry is now housed in the lower level of the Calvary Christian Church on Route #41 which is located about a mile and a half north of downtown. It is open every Thursday from 10AM to 1PM. The Pantry is staffed by volunteers from local churches, synagogues, and other organizations in the area. Food that is collected for the Pantry comes from religious communities, secular organizations, businesses and many individuals. Food is also purchased as needed with money donated by groups and individuals. Farm produce is provided by local markets and farms and by gardening groups like our Gideon's Garden.

GIDEON'S GARDEN~SIX YEARS AND GROWING

We are so blessed that our garden continues to serve so many in so many different ways. This will be our seventh year serving our community with fresh produce that our youth maintains. We had 56 youth from age two to age 22 working in Gideon's Garden this year. The youth come at different times spending as much time as their schedule allows. We have learned that once we get someone in the garden they really want to come back.

Kyle Gangell continues to be a very competent Youth Supervisor along with Adult Supervisor Ethan Novick. Anyone who has driven past the garden this year saw how beautiful that garden looked all summer and fall. We added the greenhouse to the garden and started picking tomatoes in early July. We were able to deliver lettuce two months earlier than ever before and extended the season by an additional thirty days due to the planting in the greenhouse. Kyle learned a lot this year about greenhouse growing and planning the garden on the two acres and in the greenhouse. Ethan has been such an added asset to Gideon's Garden. During the time Kyle is still in school Ethan is the one that oversees the care of the garden.

We will be adding a drip irrigation system this next year. We are all so excited to install drip irrigation and

do away with our little watering cans which took the youth hours to water the many rows of produce. We will be buying a water pump, rows of drip tape, drip line fittings, and filters. T-Tape Drip Tape is installed on the ground or under plastic. This tape is used in a variety of crops to help reduce water consumption, increase crop quality, and increase crop yield. We have lots to learn before we install our system and Kyle and Ethan will have their homework cut out for them this winter. Sue Hayden, Taft Farm Greenhouse Manager, will work with Kyle and Ethan supervising the layout of the system and its use. Our greenhouse will also have drip irrigation which means we will plant more during our season from June to the end of October. A big thank you to our anonymous donor who is making our dream come true for a drip irrigation system in the field, bless you. We are happy to report to you that our chickens continue to do a great job fertilizing our garden. We have also shared fresh eggs with the community provided by our gorgeous hens.

Our youth distributed fresh produce to six organizations five days a week for five months. We were able to host five families who came to the garden each weekend to pick their own vegetables in order to receive a little help with feeding their families.

I think the participation of our youth in the Wisdom Group's Community Network Dinners was really wonderful. SEARCH COMMITTEE

After the announced retirement of the Rev. Francie Hills a search committee was convened by Grace Church. It was determined by the Bishop and the Diocese that it would be best to call a priest in charge instead of a rector because of our uncertain future with or without building ownership.

The committee was at first co-chaired by John Cheek and Debbie Holmes. The other members were Ed Hutchinson, Dindy Anderson, Tom Doyle, Pennie Curry, Sue Gore, and Dutch Pinkston. We began our meetings in November 2013 and formulated interview questions. The diocese submitted names and CVs of interested priests. We studied and discussed these, read résumés, conducted many interviews via Skype, interviewed references by phone, invited candidates here for in depth interviews and visits, and made visits to the candidates home parishes to observe them conduct services and to interview parishioners whenever possible.

The first round of names did not reveal a match for us, so we continued with a second set submitted again by the Diocese. At this point Debbie Holmes needed to leave the committee because of other commitments and she was replaced by Carmen Perkins. John Cheek continued as sole chair. We continued with the same interview methods as before and in early June made the unanimous decision to call the Rev. Dr. Janet Zimmerman as Priest in Charge.

I am deeply grateful for the very long hours of hard work put in by our committee and am also especially grateful for the wonderful work of the profile committee who in a very short span of time drew up a profile that gave a vivid sense of who we are and where we wanted to go. This was of incalculable worth in generating interest and in attracting the right match for us.

We give many thanks to our faithful Altar Guild this year for their exquisite and loving preparations for the Lord's Table before each service. Their care is always evident, no matter where the table is set: Crissey Farm, Gideon's Garden tent, Taft Farms greenhouse, or 67 State Road in Great Barrington. On June 15, Trinity Sunday, Gabriel and Olivia Perkins were commissioned as new altar servers along with others, some of whom have served many years but have never been commissioned in a worship service: Kathy Clausen, Cathy Haywood, Louise Robitaille, Ethan Novick, and Ed Hutchinson, Acolyte Warden. We offer thanks for Ed's five decades of training altar servers in The Episcopal Church. We are blessed by his ministry of holy attention and teaching.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Douglas Fisher, Bishop of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, visited Grace Church twice; the first occasion was on what is now called "Momentum Sunday," the Sunday after Easter (formerly "Low Sunday"). Kayla Dillon from St. Paul Episcopal Church, Stockbridge, was confirmed. The bishop's second visit, October 26, was the occasion of Celebration of New Ministry for our new Priest in Charge, The Rev. Dr. Janet Zimmerman: a combined 10 am service for Grace, St. Paul, Stockbridge, and Christ Trinity, Sheffield. The altar guild preparations were augmented by ficus trees and other greenery provided by Taft Farms. The Grace Choir was augmented by choristers from Sheffield and Stockbridge. Vestments were worn by all choristers. The room orientation was changed to accommodate the enlarged choir and liturgical participants, with the altar in front of the eastern windows of the entry hall. Acoustics were enhanced with the hard wood floors there as well as the great height of the ceiling. This configuration was enthusiastically received and is now the arrangement for our Sunday morning services.

A liturgical umbrella was introduced in this service and accompanied the bishop in the procession and recession. The fringe on the umbrella was created from the colorful fabric ribbons that parishioners inscribed with their thanksgiving during the month of September as a part of the "Season of Creation Care." Acolyte Ethan Novick was Grace's first liturgical umbrella bearer, possibly the first in Berkshire County.

In addition to a noonday Ash Wednesday service at the Grace Office Chapel, services were shared with Christ Trinity and St. Paul. Holy Week services were shared with Christ Trinity (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday) and St. Paul (Good Friday). No Easter Vigil was planned for this year.

After Janet's first Sunday September 7, a Eucharist and Parish cookout was held on September 14 in a tent at Gideon's Garden. The challenges of a couple of days of soaking rain were overcome with nifty work and preparations by Pennie Curry and her farm crew. Rick Gore and his crew brought chairs and tables from the office chapel. It was a sunny day and a joyous service. During the service four parishioners were blessed and commissioned to walk in the Climate March in New York City on September 21: Dindy Anderson, Elizabeth Holland, John and Lee Cheek.

The Rev. Zimmerman presided at the Christmas Eve Eucharist at Taft Farms, 3 pm. Most of the Spanish-speaking families were away this year, but a large crowd, including customers at the farm stand, joined for this lovely, simple, and humble service. Bunnies, turtles, and guinea pigs were in attendance as well. Music Director Chris Clark accompanied the congregation on the guitar. More carols will be planned for next year!

In addition to Bill Eakins and Bishop Fisher, other preachers and celebrants during 2014 included The Rev. Ted Cobden, The Rev. Pam Mott (Canon to the Ordinary), The Rev. Libby Wade, The Rev. Jane Tillman, The Rev. Peter Elvin, and Mrs. Lee Cheek, licensed lay preacher. The Rev. Noreen Suriner continued to preside at the noon worship on Thursdays, held at the church office and chapel on State Road. Our new Priest-in-Charge began September 7.

Many thanks this year to those who prepare and proofread the bulletin in cyberspace via many emails, to Valerie Smith who staples the bulletins, and to John Cheek who picks up the bulletins in time for choir rehearsal.

Chris Clark, music director, continued to lead the Grace Church musicians who have been faithful and flexible as they provided solid support and inspiration for congregational singing in a variety of styles with beauty and rhythmic aliveness. Sara Keene continued as keyboardist, bringing her talent and grace to the worship service. The choir rehearses from 9:00-9:45 on Sunday morning.


