### **PROPOSED CHANGE TO GCSC BY-LAWS**

he board is requesting the following changes to Article 3, Section 4: Expenditure of Chapter Funds of <del>\$50.00</del> \$100.00 or More

Any expenditure of Chapter funds of \$50.00 \$100.00 or more to pay debts or for any other purpose shall be brought up to the membership present at a regularly scheduled business meeting. A majority vote will be required by the membership present before any funds can be expended. If an emergency should arise and an expenditure of \$50.00 \$100.00 or more has to be made before a regularly scheduled business meeting, the Board may make the expenditure. A full disclosure of the expenditure shall be made by the Treasurer in the report given at the next business meeting, and in the report published in the Chapter publication.

As costs keep rising the current \$50.00 limit requires the membership approve most normal operating expenditures. This increase would allow the board to approve payments under \$100.00. Membership approval would still be required for amounts over \$100.00.

The by-law change will be voted on at the Chapter's April meeting.

have been talking to a lot of new people lately and most appear to know what a Studebaker is and most peoples' parents drove a Stude at one time or another. A lot of people say that the car they learned to drive on was a Studebaker. This is great



and very interesting. I also hear a lot of people say that they didn't know Studebaker made a truck. They think the only car made was the bullet nose and they refer to it as the car that you can't tell if it was coming or going. I think it is time we take charge and make an attempt to show what Studebakers are all about.

Just how is this to be done you ask? We have the largest single manufacturer car club in the world and still people don't know about the existence of Studebakers today. There are a lot of things that are not well known about Studebakers, even by owners. There has been a lot of hype lately about Danica Patrick driving a race car. I was reading about a more interesting lady called Paula Murphy. Paula set no fewer than 360 world speed records. She started out being invited to a drag race. She saw a ladies race said I can do that. She was offered an Alfa Romero to drive and won her first race. Then she raced in a Porsche, a Maserati and a Ferrari.

Paula started Stock Car racing after getting a call from Studebaker and Andy Granatelli. She drove an Avanti coast to coast and border to border and set four transcontinental speed records. She didn't finish there because Paula then went to Bonneville with Studebaker in 1963, and set over 360 production car records in a range of new models. Paula set a 1,000 mile record in a 6 cylinder Studebaker Lark of 100.31mph on a huge circular course at Bonneville. Andy asked if she wanted to go faster and go for a land speed record. She answered "sure". They put her in a Studebaker Hawk and she went 154mph for the flying mile. Then she went in the Avanti and went 161mph. That was quite a thrill she stated.

Paula Murphy was the first woman to drive alone at Indianapolis Motor Speedway in a racing car, which was a major achievement at the time. It was in a supercharged Studebaker Novi race car, and she set test laps with an average speed of over 100 mph.

What does all this mean? These are just a few more facts that can be used to remind others of the wonder of Studebaker and to show them the survivability of the Studebaker cars and trucks. You don't always have to show a restored car to get people to recognize the brand. Carry a picture, talk the name, ask them to join us at an event. Come out and support your club.

### **Fun and Fascinating Arizona Facts!** Submitted by Scott Grainger February was a special month for those of us who live in Arizona. Happy 100th Birthday, Arizona! Arizona has 3,928 mountain peaks and summits-more mountains than any one of the other Mountain States (Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming). All New England, plus the state of Pennsylvania would fit inside Arizona. Arizona became the 48th state and last of the contiguous states on February 14, 1912. Arizona's disparate climate can yield both the highest temperature across the nation and the lowest temperature across the nation in the same day. There are more wilderness areas in Arizona than in the entire Midwest. Arizona alone has 90 wilderness areas. while the Midwest has 50. Arizona has 26 peaks that are more than 10,000 feet in elevation. Arizona has the largest contiguous stand of ponderosa pines in the world stretching from near Flagstaff along the Mogollon Rim to the White Mountains region. Yuma, Arizona is the country's highest producer of winter vegetables, especially lettuce. Arizona is the 6th largest state in the nation, covering 113,909 square miles. Out of all the states in the U.S., Arizona has the largest percentage of its land designated as Indian lands. The "Five C's" of Arizona's economy are: Cattle, Copper, Citrus, Cotton, and Climate. More copper is mined in Arizona than all the other states combined, and the Morenci Mine is the largest copper producer in all of North America. Clark Gable and Carole Lombard, two of the most prominent movie stars of Hollywood's Golden Age, were married on March 18, 1939, in Kingman, Arizona. Covering 18,608 sq. miles, Coconino County is the second largest county by land area in the 48 contiguous United States The world's largest solar telescope is located at Kitt Peak National Observatory in Sells, Arizona. Bisbee, Arizona is known as the Queen of the Copper Mines because during its mining heyday it produced nearly 25 percent of the world's copper and was the largest city in the Southwest between Saint Louis and San Francisco. Billy the Kid killed his first man, Windy Cahill, in Bonita, Arizona. Arizona grows enough cotton each year to make more than one pair of jeans for every person in the United States. Famous labor leader and activist Cesar Chavez was born in Yuma.

In 1912, President William Howard Taft was ready to make Arizona a state on February 12, but it was Lincoln's birthday. The next day, the 13th, was considered bad luck so they waited until the following day. That's how Arizona became known as the "Valentine State."

The copper star is rising from a blue field on the flag. At the top of the flag are rays, like a setting sun.





### Valve Cover Racing Rules

As printed in the January/February The Copper Starlight, newsletter of the Southern Arizona Chapter

These are the official rules for a Studebaker Valve Cover Racer to race at March Madness, March 24th.

- 1. Total weight cannot exceed 10 pounds. There will be an official scale.
- 2. Must be a Studebaker valve cover.
- 3. Total length must not exceed 10% over stock length of original valve cover.
- 4. Dimensions may be no longer than 12" high or 12" wide.
- 5. No sharp edges or sharp protrusions on the racer.
- 6. Must be gravity powered. Absolutely no other power source allowed.

# **Restoring a Steering**

Wheel By Dan Andersen



My biggest car related project for the last month has been the restoration of two steering wheels. The wheel for the '37 President was completely devoid of any plastic. It was just the hub and a ring of metal with no remaining plastic. Sales literature, other pictures and viewing Dave's '37 and Bill's several '37's convinced me that there was originally a nice coating of plastic all around that metal ring. Started with a kit (from Eastwood) that included two part epoxy filler and an instruction booklet.

The process was quite time consuming at least for the wheel that had no plastic. It is necessary to build up layers of the filler, wait for it to cure, grind/file it to some semblance of required shape, sand and paint. The filler (called PC7) is typical of the stuff we use in this hobby in that it sticks best to tools and fingers rather than where you want it to stick. But, it is not the worst I have used.

If you have a steering wheel that needs help and are like me and don't have a lot of money, I would encourage you to rebuild it yourself. It takes some work, but it is not hard work. The kit is probably not necessary if your wheel is not too bad. Just replicate (with the filler) what is intact, file/grind/sand to smooth and then paint.

I used rattle can ivory colored paint with a few coats of rattle can clear. Paint is not included in the kit and the color will, of course, be determined by the original or from pictures of surviving cars or from promotional materials. The instructional booklet even tells how to replace a portion of all of the outside ring. They were probably thinking that if you had no plastic on your wheel, you would want to replace the ring with one that has at least some. Huh, I fooled them.

I am happy with the end product. And if it continues to look good, I can tell people that I did it myself. Of course, if it starts to come apart, I won't mention it.

# **BACKSTOP, THE REST OF THE STORY**

n the November/December 2006 issue of *The Antique Studebaker Review*, Richard Quinn wrote a very good narrative on the history of the hill holder, a device attached to the braking system that prevents a car from rolling when releasing the clutch while stopped on a hill. The other day, while doing research on another topic, I stumbled on to some related history that Richard Quinn did not include in his article.

In 1906, after manufacturing the first motorized bicycle, the Thomas Motor Company began manufacturing the famous Thomas Flyer. In 1908 the Thomas Flyer won the one and only around-the-world auto race. During the race the Thomas Flyer was the first automobile to cross the United States, in a little over 41 days. The race was scheduled so the entrants could cross from North America to Russia on the ice pack across the Bering Strait. The cars actually crossed the Pacific to Asia on a ship. This important event in automotive history set the stage for the 1965 slapstick comedy, *The Great Race*. Although the movie did not get good reviews, it is noted for its beautiful music by Henry Mancini and a four minute pie fight that included real pies and cost \$200,000 to stage.



The Thomas Flyer was fitted with a hill holder system called the Backstop Safety Device. It operated quite differently than Studebaker's Hill Holder in that it was not part of the hydraulic brake system that debuted in the 1936 cars and trucks. The Backstop Safety Device's operation involved fitting both rear wheels with a powerful ratchet and pawl system operated with a lever located near the driver's seat. The system was very effective in preventing the Thomas Flyer from rolling backwards when operating the vehicle on hills.

According to Mr. Quinn, Stutz came out with a hill holder system in the late 20's, called the No Back System. This was followed by the No Roll System in the early 30's, manufactured by the Wagner Electric Company. Studebaker's Hill Holder System was available on their cars from the end of 1935 until 1966 when the Studebaker Corporation ceased automobile manufacturing operations. As a side note, my 1963 Avanti has this option; it operates very smoothly when releasing the clutch on a hill. Today, Subaru and a select few other foreign manufacturers continue to make available a hill holder system on their cars manufactured with a standard transmission. It is strange, that a hill holder has never caught on in this country. It is probably because the automatic is the transmission of choice in America. A standard transmission is not even available on a new Dodge pickup.

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
