THE GAME

The University of South Florida (7-5, 3-4 BIG EAST) will play in its sixth consecutive bowl game when it travels to Charlotte, N.C. to take on Clemson (6-6, 4-4 ACC) in the Meineke Car Care Bowl on Friday, Dec. 31. This will mark the Bulls second trip to play in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. They made their first-ever bowl appearance in the 2005 game, dropping a 14-0 decision to N.C. State.USF finished the



regular season winning four of their last six games. With a bowl victory, the Bulls would extend their streak of consecutive eight-win seasons to five. Clemson also will be playing in its sixth consecutive bowl game. This will mark the first meeting between the two schools.

THE BROADCASTS

The game will be televised nationally on ESPN. Carter Blackburn (play-by-play), Mike Bellotti (analyst), Brock Huard (analyst) and Shannon Spake (sidelines) will have the call. USF's radio broadcast with Jim Louk, Mark Robinson and Mike Pepper can be heard on 13 affiliates statewide and nationally on Sirius satellite radio channel 158. In addition, 1300 WQBN will broadcast the game in Spanish with David Cuevas and Angel Rodriguez behind the microphones. Both USF radio broadcasts can be heard through BullsVision Radio on GoUSFBulls.com.

THE PROGRAM

USF has an all-time record of 102-62 (.622). The Bulls overall winning percentage of 62.2 ranks 18th among FBS schools in all-time winning percentage. In addition, the Bulls have posted an 82-49 (.626) record since joining the FBS in 2000. Their winning percentage of .630 (76-43) from 2000-09 ranked 26th nationally over that time span. USF joined the BIG EAST in 2005 and is one of only six schools that has made a bowl appearance in every season as a BCS league member, joining Florida, Florida State, Georgia, Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech. It also is the only school since 1998 to join a BCS member conference and make a bowl appearance every year (2005-09).

BOWL STREAK

Thanks to a 7-5 record during the regular season, USF is heading to a bowl game for the sixth consecutive season. The Bulls are 3-2 in their previous five bowl games, including victories in each of the last two seasons. Last year, USF defeated Northern Illinois, 27-3, in the International Bowl. In 2008, the Bulls cruised past Memphis, 41-14, in the MajicJack St. Pete Bowl. Prior to 2008, USF fell to Oregon, 56-21, in the 2007 Brut Sun Bowl, won the 2006 Papajohns.com Bowl, 24-7, over East Carolina and dropped the 2005 Meineke Car Care Bowl, 14-0, against N.C. State in the program's inaugural bowl appearance.

DEFENSE STIFFENS LATE IN BOWL GAMES

USF has won three of its five bowl games in program history thanks in large part to a defense that has kept the opponents off the scoreboard late in games. The Bulls defense has not allowed a point in the fourth quarter of its five bowl games. The only score in the five games came on an INT return by Oregon in the 2007 Sun Bowl. Overall, USF is allowing just 18.8 points per game in its five bowl games. The Bulls gave up 56 points to Oregon in 2007, but only gave up 38 points in the other four games combined for a 9.5 points per game average.

2010 SENIORITY

A group of 18 seniors will playe their final game as Bulls, when USF takes on Clemson. Collectively, the group has helped USF to a 32-19 record over the last four years. The class' 32 victories are tied for the second most in USF history with the 2008 class (32-19) behind the four-year victory record of 34 set by last year's senior class (34-18). The group has gone 17-8 at Raymond James Stadium and 7-2 against teams from the state of Florida. This senior class is bowl eligible for the fourth consecutive year, having gone 2-1 in the three previous bowl games. The group has combined to play in 602 games (275 starts). DE David Bedford (31 games/15 starts), DE Craig Marshall (32 games/13 starts), DT Terrell McClain (48 games/32 starts), S Mistral Raymond (24 games/15 starts) and LB Jacquian Willams (25 games/13 starts) have all started on the defensive side of the ball, while OT Jamar Bass (23 games/14 starts), WR Dontavia Bogan (48 games/22 starts), C Sampson Genus (43 games/29 starts), TE Kevin Gidrey (52 games/31 starts), FB Richard Kelly (48 games/11 starts), TE Andrew Ketchel (39 games/3 starts), WR A.J. Love (33 games/19 starts), RB Mo Plancher (43 games/27 starts) and OT Jake Sims (47 games/31 starts) have all earned starts for the offense. In addition, S Chris Lane (24 games), K Eric Schwartz (18 games), LB Donte Spires (24 games) and CB Dennis Wideman have contributed throughout their careers.

DABO SWINNEY (ALABAMA '93): Dabo Swinney is in his second full season as head coach at Clemson after taking over midway through the 2008 season. He holds a 19-14 record in his two-and-a-half years, leading the Tigers to a 9-5 campaign last year, which included a victory in the Music City Bowl. Prior to being named head coach, Swinney had been an assistant at Clemson since 2003.

SEASON OF FIRSTS

With Skip Holtz being in his first season as head coach at USF, the Bulls have managed to do some things they haven't done in school history. It started when they traveled to Cincinnati, a place they had never won. USF ended up outdueling the Bearcats, 38-30, to score their first conference victory of the season. Then, they traveled to Louisville, another place they had never won, and pulled out a 24-21 win in overtime. Next up, the Bulls broke a four-game losing streak to Rutgers. That victory marked the first time USF defeated the Scarlet Knights in Tampa. Then, the Bulls defeated Miami for the first time in school history, a 23-20 overtime win.

NOVEMBER TO REMEMBER

After struggling to a 2-4 record in November over the last two seasons (1-2 in both 2008 and '09), the Bulls surged to the finish line in 2010, going 3-1 in the year's 11th month. USF opened with a 28-27 victory against Rutgers before pulling out an overtime win at Louisville, 24-21. After dropping a game to Pitt, 17-10, the Bulls bounced back with their first victory over Miami in school history, a 23-20 overtime decision.

COMEBACK KIDS

Prior to the Rutgers game, the last time USF posted a fourthquarter comeback was in 2007 against Auburn. But, with comebacks against Rutgers, Louisville and Miami, the Bulls did three times in a four-week span. USF trailed Rutgers 24-22 entering the final stanza and went on to win, 28-27. Then, at Louisville, the Bulls were down 14-13 entering the fourth. They took a 21-14 lead after a 48-yard TD and two-point conversion, but Louisville was able to tie the game at 21-21 with 1:21 left. In overtime, USF turned a fourth-down stop on the first possession into a 37-yard game-winning field goal from sophomore Maikon Bonani. At Miami, the Bulls trailed 17-10 before they put together a nine-play, 81-yard drive to tie the game with two minutes left, forcing overtime. After Miami kicked a field goal on the first possession, USF used three plays to travel the 25 yards for the game-winning score.

WIN NO. 100

USF earned the 100th victory in program history when it defeated Rutgers, 28-27, on Wednesday, Nov. 3. The victory gave the Bulls a 100-60 all-time record, making them the fastest team in the BIG EAST to 100 victories based on games played. It took West Virginia 171 games (100-63-8) to reach the milestone followed by Pittsburgh at 174 games (100-67-7). The Bulls are also the fastest of the BCS-league teams

in Florida to reach 100 victories. Their 160 games bettered Florida (164 games, 100-51-13), Miami (180 games, 100-68-12) and Florida State (188 games, 100-78-10).

EIGHT-WIN SEASONS

USF has recorded four consecutive eight-win seasons after going 8-5 in 2009, 8-5 in '08, 9-4 in '07 and 9-4 in '06. The Bulls have posted at least eight wins in seven of their 13 seasons and have posted school-best, nine-win campaigns on three occasions (2007, '06 and '02). USF has produced seasons of .500 or better in 11 of its 13 years, including 10 winning seasons. The only years USF didn't reach .500 were its inaugural season in 1997 and again in 2004. The Bulls broke even in 2005, going 6-6.

HOME COOKIN'

USF has posted a 69-21 (.767) record in home games since the program started in 1997. They played their home schedule in 1997 and the first two games of the '98 season in Tampa Stadium, going 6-3. Then, the Bulls moved into Raymond James Stadium for the Citadel game in '98 and have gone 63-18 (.778) since. USF has notched a winning home record in 13 of its 14 seasons. It's gone undefeated three times (2002, '01 and '00) and suffered just one loss five times (2007, '06, '05, 1999 and '98). The Bulls only season with a losing home record came in 2004, when they went 2-4. Since joining the BIG EAST in 2005, USF has gone 25-10 (.714) at home overall and 12-9 (.571) in conference matchups.

ON THE ROAD

USF has posted a 32-38 (.457) record in true road games during the program's 14-year history. Including 2010, in which USF went 3-2 on the road, the Bulls have had four seasons with winning road records (2010, '07, '03 and '02) and four where they finished at .500 (2009, '08, '06 and 1998). USF's road success has increased over the last four years, producing a 16-12 (.571) record over that time span. In the first five seasons of program history, the Bulls were only able to manage a 6-15 (.286) record in road games, but in the eight seasons since then, USF has gone 26-23 (.531), including seven of nine seasons at .500 or better. Since joining the BIG EAST in 2005, USF has posted an 18-16 (.529) road record.

CONFERENCE COMPETITION

After spending the first six seasons of program history as an independent, USF joined Conference USA in 2003, and then, in 2005, moved to the BIG EAST. Overall, USF is 28-30 (.483) in eight years as a conference member. The Bulls were 8-8 (.500) over their two-year span with C-USA and have gone 20-22 (.476) in the BIG EAST. First-year head coach Skip Holtz has posted a 53-34 (.609) conference record in his 11 years as a head coach and has won two conference championships (C-USA: 2008 and '09).

NON-CONFERENCE RECORD

USF has gone 27-8 (.771) in regular-season, non-conference games during their eight seasons as a conference member. Since joining the BIG EAST in 2005, USF has gone 24-5 (.828) in regular-season, non-conference matchups. Even better, since 2007, the Bulls have posted an 18-2 (.900) record, including wins at Miami (2010), at Florida State (2009), at N.C. State (2008), vs. No. 10 Kansas (2008), at Auburn (2007) and vs. North Carolina (2007). USF posted a 3-3 (.500) record in non-conference games in two seasons of Conference USA play.

USF USHERS IN A HOLTZ NEW ERA

A new era began at the University of South Florida with the hiring of Skip Holtz as head coach on Jan. 14, 2010. Holtz, who is just the second head coach in the program's 14-year history, comes to USF after five seasons at East Carolina and is riding a streak of back-to-back Conference USA Championships. Holtz is one of just four coaches nationally to lead his teams to league titles each of the last two seasons. While at ECU, Holtz led the Pirates to four-straight winning seasons, a quartet of bowl game appearances and back-to-back Conference USA championships. Prior to his arrival, ECU had won just three games out of its last 25. After a 5-6 season in 2005, Holtz led ECU to a 7-6 record in 2006, an 8-5 ledger in 2007, a 9-5 mark in 2008 and another nine-win campaign in 2009.

HOLTZ AS A HEAD COACH

Holtz is in his 11th season as a head coach. He spent five seasons at Connecticut (1994-98: 34-23, .596) and is coming off a five-year run at East Carolina (2005-09: 38-27, .585). Overall, Holtz is 79-55 (.590) in 11 seasons as a head coach. He holds a conference record of 53-34 (.609) and a non-conference mark of 26-21 (.553). Including 2010, Holtz has led his teams to winning seasons in eight of his 11 years. He has only posted one season under .500 in conference play. He won his first conference championship in 2008 at ECU and followed that with another league title in '09.

HOLTZ TURNS IT AROUND

In five seasons at ECU, Skip Holtz turned around a program that had recorded just three wins in 25 games prior to his arrival. After posting a 5-6 record in his first season in 2005, Holtz produced four consecutive winning seasons, which hadn't happened at ECU since the late 1970s, went to four bowl games and won Conference USA titles in 2008 and '09, its first league crowns in 32 years. It also marked the first time in league history that a team won consecutive conference championships. Overall, Holtz led ECU to a 38-27 (.585) record during his five-year run. That was a huge improvement compared to ECU's 21-38 (.356) record in the five seasons prior to his arrival.

ALL-BIG EAST HONOREES

USF had seven players recognized by the BIG EAST coaches when the All-BIG EAST teams were announced. Seniors C Sampson Genus and DT Terrell McClain and sophomore KR Lindsey Lamar were named to the first team. Lamar also was named the Special Teams Player of the Year for the conference. Seniors WR Dontavia Bogan, CB Mistral Raymond, OT Jacob Sims and LB Jacquian Williams earned second-team honors. In addition, USF had four freshmen recognized by ESPN.com with DE Ryne Giddins, S Mark Joyce, LB DeDe Lattimore and PR Terrence Mitchell being named to their All-Freshman team.

GAME CAPTAINS

Prior to the season opener against Stony Brook, head coach Skip Holtz announced that seniors C Sampson Genus, DB Mistral Raymond and LB Jacquian Williams would serve as team captains in 2010, as selected by a team vote. In addition to the three season captains, the special teams player of the week from the previous game has served as the fourth captain. Previous captains were Maikon Bonani (UC/Pitt), Justin Brockhaus-Kann (WKU/UConn), Lindsey Lamar (WVU), Terrence Mitchell (FAU), Armando Sanchez (Stony Brook/Syracuse/Rutgers/Louisville) and Donte Spires (Florida).

BULLS TRAIN AT DODGERTOWN

The USF football team traveled across the state to the Vero Beach Sports Village, formerly known as Dodgertown, for 12 days of preseason training camp, Aug. 8-19. The venue served as a practice facility for the 2010 team and housed the entire team of 105 players, as well as coaches and support staff. Along with practices, the players participated in team-building events such as the Bulls Olympics, a talent show and held a barbecue. The time at the former spring training home of the Los Angeles Dodgers was made necessary by the extensive Athletics District construction. Due to the construction, USF only has access to their primary practice fields, which are not suited for the wear and tear of 15 practices without any significant breaks for the grass to re-grow. In previous camps, USF used both their practice fields and the recreation fields adjacent to the Training Center. With the construction, the team would lose access to 2 ½ of the four fields. The tradition of moving camp off-site is something that Coach Holtz has done as a head coach at both East Carolina and UConn, as well as an assistant with South Carolina and Notre Dame.

BULLS IN THE NFL

In just 13 seasons, USF has produced 48 players that have garnered NFL experience. Currently, USF has 10 players on NFL rosters, including a school-record five players taken in the 2010 NFL Draft. The Bulls have had eight players drafted over the past three years and 16 total since the first USF player was taken in 2001.

"FAN" DEMONIUM

Since the 2004 season, the Bulls' faithful have increased the average attendance at home games by 94.2 percent, the largest increase in all of college football during that time frame. In 2004, USF averaged 27,060 fans per home game, and in 2009, the average increased to 52,553, an increase of 25,493 fans per game. One of the key elements of USF's rabid fan base is its students. The Bulls have the largest student section in the entire BIG EAST Conference with an allotment of

12,501, which has led the conference for the past three seasons. The Bulls' faithful also has continued to grow throughout the years, as USF distributed 24,185 season tickets in 2009, which is the second-best mark in program history. In 2008, USF distributed 27,879 season tickets to establish the school record. The previous record was 20,619 set in the inauqural season of 1997.

OFFENSIVE RETURNEES

The Bulls returned eight players from the offensive side of the ball that contributed as regular starters from 2009 and a pair of players who split time as starters last year. Dontavia Bogan (48 games/22 starts) returned for his senior season as the most experienced wideout in 2010. A pair of receivers in Sterling Griffin (13 games/10 starts) and A.J.Love (33 games/19 starts) returned with prior starting experience, but both have been unable to play this season due to injuries. The Bulls returned an experienced offensive line with OT Jamar Bass (23 games/14 starts), C Sampson Genus (43 games/29 starts), OG Chaz Hine (32 games/24 starts), OT Jake Sims (47 games/31 starts) and OG Jeremiah Warren (32 games/25 starts). RB Mo Plancher (43 games/27 starts) returned for a sixth year of eligibility, while QB B.J. Daniels (26 games/21 starts) is in his first full season as a starter after being named to the BIG EAST All-Freshman Team in 2009.

CONSECUTIVE 200-YARD GAMES

USF rushed for over 200 yards in consecutive games against Florida and WKU. The Bulls tallied 244 yards against the Gators and returned home to post 226 against the Hilltoppers. It marked the ninth time in program history that the Bulls posted consecutive 200-yard rushing games.

USF got off to a great start against No. 8 Florida in their second game of the season. After the defense forced a three-and-out, the Bulls proceeded to go on a 17-play, 96-yard march that resulted in a two-yard TD pass from QB B.J. Daniels to TE Andrew Ketchel. The drive, which took 9:58 off the clock and saw USF convert all four third-down opportunities, consisted of 13 runs and four passes. After the first quarter, the Bulls held a 7-0 lead and a 102-to-32 advantage in total yards.

ONE-PLAY SCORE

After the USF defense forced a three-and-out on the opening drive of the season, the Bulls' offense took the field against Stony Brook with 12:11 left in the first quarter. It took just one play and 10 seconds for the Bulls to notch their first score of the season as WR Dontavia Bogan went 59 yards on a pass from QB B.J. Daniels. It marked the first time in the 14-year history of the program that USF scored on its first offensive play of a season, but it was the fourth time the Bulls scored on their first offensive play of a game.

UNDER CENTER

Although just a sophomore, B.J. Daniels is the elder statesman for USF at guarterback. Entering the season, Daniels was the only quarterback on the USF roster that had seen game action, having played in 13 games last season, starting 10. In his first season, Daniels threw for 1,983 yards and 14 TDs (nine INTs), while leading the Bulls in rushing with 772 yards and nine TDs. This year, he's gone 123-of-218 (56.4%) for 1,496 yards and nine TDs (12 INTs). Overall, Daniels has played in 26 games (21 starts) and thrown for 3,565 yards and 23 TDs on 249-of-450 (55.3%) passing, while rushing for 1,011 yards and 13 TDs. Daniels played in two games during the 2008 season prior to redshirting. With sophomore Evan Landi moving to wide receiver full-time, two true freshmen battled for the back-up job with Bobby Eveld getting the nod over Jamius Gunsby. Eveld saw the first action of his career against Stony Brook and completed his first eight passes. His next significant action came at Miami, where he took over for an injured Daniels to start the second half. Eveld led USF to a come-from-behind 23-20 overtime win after going 8-of-15 for 120 yards, while adding a rushing TD. Eveld then earned the first start of his career against UConn in USF's regular-season finale, going 22-of-41 for 195 yards and a score. For the season, he's gone 42-of-75 (55.0%) for 454 yards and two TDs (three INTs).

ONE OF TWO

B.J. Daniels became just the second quarterback to rush for 100 yards against Florida since 1996 when he posted 107 yards on 17 carries (6.3 ypc). Daniels joined Ohio's Dontrell Jackson, who rushed for 118 yards against the Gators in 2002. It was the fifth time in Daniels career that he rushed for at least 100 yards.

EFFICIENCY AT ITS FINEST

B.J. Daniels has produced two of the most efficient passing days in USF history this year. He opened the season by going 15-of-22 (68.2%) for 264 yards and two TDs (no INTs) against Stony Brook for a 199.0 rating, which ranks fifth on USF's single-game list. Then, at Cincinnati, he went 13-of-16 (81.3%) for 286 yards and two TDs (no INTs) for a 272.7 rating. The 272.7 rating easily eclipsed USF's previous single-game best of 243.1, which was set by Marquel Blackwell against Liberty in 2000.

A FIRST IN BULLS, BIG EAST HISTORY

Daniels became the only player in USF and BIG EAST history to rush for 100 yards and pass for 300 yards in a single game, accomplishing the feat against Louisville (304p/141r) in 2009. He was the 28th player in FBS history to complete the feat. Interestingly enough, Daniels outgained Louisville as a team, which had 313 yards on the day. His 445 yards of total offense stands as the second-best single-game mark in USF history.

EVELD'S INTRODUCTION

After having played in just four games coming into the Miami contest, true freshman walk-on Bobby Eveld was called upon to sub in for an injured B.J. Daniels to start the second half against the Canes. He went on to lead USF to a come-from-behind 23-20 overtime victory. Eveld finished the game 8-of-15 for 120 yards to go along with a rushing TD. After Miami had run off 17 straight points to take a 17-10 lead with just under 9 minutes left in the game, Eveld calmly marched USF down the field on a nine-play, 81-yard TD drive to tie the game with 2 minutes remaining. On the drive, Eveld went 3-of-5 for 63 yards, including completions of 27 and 21 yards, capping it with a one-yard TD run. Then, in overtime, after a running play gave USF first down at the 10, Eveld calmly threaded a pass to Joel Miller for a nine-yard gain to the one, which set up a one-yard scoring run by Demetris Murray to win the game.

EVELD'S FIRST START

Bobby Eveld got the nod for USF's regular-season finale against UConn, filling in for an injured B.J. Daniels. Instead of relying on the ground attack, USF used the passing game to the tune of 41 pass attempts. It marked the most passing attempts by USF in a game since the 2008 Rutgers contest, a span of 29 games, when the Bulls posted 48 pass attempts, including 43 by Matt Grothe. Eveld completed 22 for 195 yards and a TD and helped make up a 10-point, fourth-quarter deficit. With USF trailing 16-6, Eveld converted a turnover in to a TD, when he hit Dontavia Bogan for a 28-yard score. Then, two drives later, Eveld led an 11-play, 74-yard drive that resulted in a field goal and a tie game with 1:16 left in the game. On the two scoring drives, Eveld went 6-of-9 for 70 yards and a TD.

THE BACKFIELD

Sixth-year running back Mo Plancher and sophomore Demetris Murray have joined forces to help boost USF's running game in 2010. The duo has combined to rush for 1,286 yards and eight TDs on 274 carries (4.7 ypc). Plancher has started 11 of the 12 games this season and run for 743 yards and four TDs on 162 carries (4.6 ypc). Murray ranks second on the team in rushing with

517 yards and four TDs on 112 carries (4.6 ypc) despite being limited for three games with an ankle injury. Plancher's 61.9 yards per game rank eighth in the conference, while Murray's 51.7 ypg rank ninth.

STEADY MO

Senior Mo Plancher entered the season nursing a shoulder injury, but has come on strong to boost USF's running game this season. During the regular season, Plancher rushed for a team-high 743 yards and four TDs on 162 carries (4.6 ypc). His best game of the season came when he posted career highs in rushing yards (135), receiving yards (45) and all-purpose yards (180) against Rutgers. He added another 100-yard effort with 101 on a career-high 24 carries at Miami. For his career, Plancher has rushed for 1,689 yards and 15 TDs on 374 carries (4.5 ypc). His 1,689 rushing yards rank fourth on USF's all-time list, while the 374 carries are fifth. His 15 TDs are tied for eighth.

MURRAY ADDS A BOOST

Sophomore RB Demetris Murray has posted two 100-yard rushing efforts this season. The first one came against WKU, when he tallied 115 yards on 15 carries (7.7 ypc) to earn BIG EAST Honor Roll mention. Then, against Louisville, Murray posted 106 yards on 13 carries (8.2 ypc) to help USF to an overtime win. Murray got off to a solid start to the season, posting 55 rushing yards and 57 receiving yards, including a TD, in the season opener. He increased that total to 62 yards at Florida, before the 115-yard performance against WKU. Despite being hampered since midseason with an ankle injury, Murray's 469 yards rank second on the team and his 52.1 yards per game rank ninth in the BIG EAST.

THE RECEIVING CORPS

With senior A.J. Love (knee) and sophomore Sterling Griffin (ankle) dealing with offseason injuries, the Bulls wide receiver unit has been led by senior Dontavia Bogan. New to the receiving corp this year are junior Faron Hornes, sophomore Evan Landi, a converted quarterback, junior Joel Miller and sophomore Lindsey Lamar, who both switched to wide receiver from running back in the offseason, sophomore transfer T.J. Knowles and freshman walk-on Stephen Bravo-Brown.

BOGAN'S BITS

Dontavia Bogan has played in 48 games, starting 22, and posted 106 receptions (No. 5 on USF's all-time list) for 1,519 vards (No. 3 on USF's all-time list) and 11 TDs (No. 3 on USF's all-time list). This year, Bogan leads the Bulls with 46 catches for 670 yards (14.6 ypc) and five TDs. He opened 2010 with a bang, scoring on a 59-yard TD reception on USF's first offensive play of the season. Bogan finished the game with three receptions for 86 yards. He added a 12-yard reception at Florida, but was injured on the play, which slowed him the rest of that game and forced him to miss the WKU game. He returned for the FAU game and posted five receptions for 66 yards, including a 38yard TD. Bogan matched the USF single-game record with 11 catches (98 yards) at West Virginia and then had three receptions for 85 yards, including a 64-yarder that set up a score, at Cincinnati. He added a 48-yard TD at Louisville. Against Miami, Bogan posted three receptions for 56 yards, including 27 and 21-yarders on USF's late TD drive that forced overtime. Bogan continued his stellar play with seven catches for 70 yards and a TD against UConn.

SINGLE-SEASON WATCH

With 46 receptions for 670 yards and five TDs, senior Dontavia Bogan is having one of the best seasons by a wide receiver in USF history. With one game to play, Bogan's 46 receptions fifth on the Bulls' single-season list. He needs just four catches to move into fourth on that list. The 670 yards are already second on the single-season chart behind Carlton Mitchell's 706

yards last season. Bogan's five TDs are tied for fifth. Elgin Hicks holds the single-season record with seven TD receptions, while three players are tied with six TDs.

THE NEW RECEIVERS

Sophomore Evan Landi, who converted from quarterback to wide receiver in the offseason, has begun to settle into the position. So far this year, he's posted 26 receptions for 354 yards (13.6 ypc) and two TDs. Last year, in a slash role, Landi played in 12 games and hauled in five passes for 39 yards, rushed six times for 11 yards and completed 3-of-5 passes for 36 yards and a TD. Junior Faron Hornes had his most productive game of the season at Cincinnati, where he had two receptions for 75 yards, including a 70-yard

TD, and 14 yards rushing. Sophomore Lindsey Lamar made the switch from running back in the offseason and has started three games this season. He's tallied 20 receptions for 121 yards this season and has 30 catches for 157 yards during his career. Also a dangerous kick returner, Lamar, who was named the BIG EAST Special Teams Player of the Year, posted a 94-yard TD return against Syracuse, which is tied for the fourth-longest return in USF history. He then matched USF's longest return with a 100-yard kickoff return TD at Louisville. With two return TDs this season, Lamar set the USF single-season record and became the only Bull to return two kickoffs for TDs in a career. The two returns also matched the BIG EAST single-season mark. True freshman walk-on Stephen Bravo-Brown has seen action in all 12 games, including two starts, and has posted 10 catches for 100 yards. Junior Joel Miller and sophomore transfer T.J. Knowles are also adding depth to the receiving corp. Miller had the best game of his career at Miami, where he led the team in both receptions (4) and yards (60). He also posted a TD catch in the season opener against Stony Brook. Knowles has caught three passes this season.

THE HOGS UP FRONT

The starters along the offensive line make up one of the most experienced groups on the team. Senior C Sampson Genus, junior guards Jeremiah Warren and Chaz Hine and senior tackles Jake Sims and Jamar Bass have combined to play in 177 games, making 124 starts. Genus returns at the center spot after being named second-team All-BIG EAST in his first year at the position last season. After playing in six games as true freshman on the offensive side of the ball, he played in 12 games at defensive tackle, including five starts, in 2008. Genus moved back to offense for the 2009 season and started 12 games, missing the regular-season finale against UConn due to an ankle injury. Overall, he has played in 43 games, starting 29. Genus is flanked by Warren and Hine at the left and right guard positions. Warren has played in 32 games, starting 25, while Hine, a former walkon, has appeared in 32 games, starting 24. Sims and Bass began the season as the bookends of the line, Sims on the right and Bass on the left. Sims, who has appeared in 47 career games, starting 31, is capable of playing all of the line positions and has played as many as three positions during a single game. Bass has played in 23 career games, starting 14.

DOIN' IT ON DEFENSE

USF's defense has kept the Bulls in each game this season. The Bulls are allowing just 19.5 points per game (19th NCAA) and are giving up just 319.8 yards per game (21st NCAA). USF also has been able to get off the field. The Bulls have only allowed 65 third-down conversions on 179 attempts (36.3%), which ranks 28th nationally. In addition, the Bulls' D has only given up 208 first downs (17.3 per game), which ranks 22nd nationally. In

the red zone, USF has only allowed 15 TDs on 35 drives inside their own 20. The 15 TDs allowed is tied for the seventh fewest nationally and their four rushing TDs allowed in the red zone ranks second only to West Virginia, which has allowed just one rushing TD in the red zone. In fact, the Bulls have only allowed seven rushing TDs all season, which is tied for the third fewest nationally. Overall, the USF defense has only allowed a total of 26 TDs in their 12 games (2.2 per game), which is tied for the eighth fewest in the nation. The Bulls have only allowed three teams to score more than 21 points this season.

PICK PARTY

The USF defense made things difficult for Stony Brook QB Michael Coulter in the season opener. After allowing him to complete 4-of-7 passes for 71 yards in the first quarter, the USF pass defense clamped down for the final three stanzas. After the first quarter, the Bulls held the Seawolves to just five completions and 41 yards, while intercepting four passes. It was the most interceptions in a game for USF since they picked off five passes last season against Syracuse. The four INTs were highlighted by Mark Joyce's 33-yard return for a TD on a pass that bounced off a lineman's helmet.

SHUT'EM DOWN

Western Kentucky running back Bobby Rainey rushed for at least 100 yards in nine of his 12 games this year and finished the season ranked third nationally at 137.4 yards per game. But, against USF, he could only manage 64 yards on 21 carries (3.0 ypc), which was his lowest output of the season. Fourteen of his 21 carries went for three yards or less, including seven that went for no gain or negative yardage. Overall, WKU ended up with just 88 rushing yards on the day, which was half of its single-game average of 175.5 for the season.

SACK-TASTIC

USF tied the school record for sacks with seven against FAU. The Bulls had seven different players record a sack in that game with four coming from the defensive ends, two from defensive tackles and one from a safety. In addition to the sacks, the Bulls posted 12 TFL, which was the most in a single-game since the 2007 UCF game, when USF tallied 16 TFL. Overall, USF has tallied 28 sacks on the season. Its 2.6 sacks per game are tied for 23rd nationally and rank fourth in the BIG EAST.

SHUT'EM DOWN PART 2

BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year Jordan Todman (UConn) rushed for at least 100 yards in nine of his 11 games this season, but he could only manage 93 yards on 33 carries against the stout USF defense. It was the only time this season where Todman had at least 20 carries and didn't eclipse the 100-yard

plateau. In fact, it was only the second time in the last two years that Todman didn't get to 100 yards with at least 20 carries and the only time in his career where he had at least 25 carries and didn't get to 100 yards rushing. The USF defense held Todman to just 2.8 yards per carry and no TDs.

INTERIOR DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

Leading the group of interior defensive linemen is senior defensive tackle Terrell McClain. McClain has 48 appearances under his belt and has started 32 of the last 37 games in which he has appeared. A

first-team All-BIG EAST selection, McClain has tallied 23 tackles, three sacks and 4.5 TFL. For his career, he's posted 88 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 17 TFL, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. At the nose position, sophomore Cory Grissom has started all 12 games this season, posting 15 tackles, a sack and three TFL. He played in eight games, starting three, as a redshirt freshman in 2009 and one game as a true freshman in '08 before an ankle injury forced him to redshirt. For his career, Grissom has posted 28 tackles, a sack and 3.5 TFL in 20 games (14 starts). Also working on the line is junior Keith McCaskill, who has played in 37 games over the last three seasons, including five starts in 2009. He's posted 42 tackles, 3.5 sacks, eight TFL, five PBU and a forced fumble during his career. He added a safety to his ledger against Rutgers. Adding depth to the line are sophomore Anthony Hill and redshirt freshman Luke Sager. Hill has played in eight career games, posting six tackles and a half TFL. Sager saw the first action of his career against Stony Brook and has tallied a tackle and a pressure in nine games this season.

DYNAMIC DUO AT END

Seniors David Bedford and Craig Marshall have been the starters at defensive end for much of the season. With Marshall returning from a broken foot, the pair is back together again for the bowl game. The duo has combined to post 67 tackles, five sacks, 12 TFL, two INTs and two forced fumbles this season. A junior college transfer, Bedford has appeared in 31 career games, starting 15. This season, he's posted 36 tackles, a sack, four TFL, an INT and a forced fumble. For his career, he's tallied 50 tackles, three sacks, 7.5 TFL, an INT and a forced fumble. Despite missing four games due to the broken foot, Marshall has notched 31 tackles, four sacks, eight TFL, an INT and a forced fumble this season. For his career, he's tallied 70 tackles, nine sacks, 18 TFL, two INTs, four PBU, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

DEPTH AT DEFENSIVE END

Junior Patrick Hampton and redshirt freshmen Julius Forte and Ryne Giddins have added depth at the defensive end position in 2010. Hampton has played in 30 career games, including all 13 in 2009, mainly on special teams and as a reserve defensive end. He earned the first start of his career against Rutgers (two tackles and a TFL) and followed that up by posting five tackles, 2.5 TFL and a PBU at Louisville. He added a half sack and a fumble recovery against Pittsburgh, but was forced to miss the Miami and UConn games due to an ankle injury. For the season, Hampton's posted 20 tackles, 2.5 sacks, seven TFL and two PBU this season. Forte has added eight tackles, a sack and a PBU this season. Last year, he earned the team's Strength & Conditioning Overachiever Award and the Golden Bull Award for the most outstanding defensive scout team player. Giddins, the program's first prep Parade All-American, appeared in three games last year before an ankle injury ended his season. His first two career tackles were both sacks against Western Kentucky last season. Giddins missed this year's season opener with a foot injury but has returned to play in 11 games, starting the last two. He's posted 19 tackles, 3.5 sacks and six TFL this year. Giddins added his first career INT against Louisville off a tipped pass.

THE BACKERS

Senior Jacquian Williams is the leader of the linebacking unit this season. Williams, who was voted captain by his teammates, has played in 25 games, starting 13, with the Bulls. For his career, he's tallied 96 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 10.5 TFL, an INT and two PBU. This season, he leads the team in tackles with 68 to go along with 2.5 sacks, 9.5 TFL, an INT and two PBU. Sophomores Sam Barrington and Michael Lanaris have split time in the middle this season. Barrington served as the top reserve behind Kion Wilson in 2009. He posted 41 tackles in 13 games (one start). After being slowed by a shoulder injury during the offseason, Barrington returned and has started the last 11 games. He currently ranks second on the team with 61 tackles, including five TFL, two PBU, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Lanaris played in 12 games last season, while working almost exclusively on special teams, but a strong fall camp helped him earn playing time at linebacker this year. He's taken advantage with 29 tackles, a half sack, 3.5 TFL and two INTs. Redshirt freshman DeDe Lattimore, who was named to ESPN.com's All-BIG EAST Freshman team, earned the starting position on the weakside and ranks third on the team with 60 tackles to go along with two sacks and four TFL.

CORNERS

Despite the departures of S Nate Allen and CB Jerome Murphy, who combined to play in 100 games during their careers, due to the 2010 NFL Draft, the USF secondary has played well this season. Senior Mistral Raymond made the switch from safety to corner this season after playing in all 13 games in 2009, making four starts. This year, he's tallied 52 tackles, four TFL, an INT and seven PBU. A walk-on turned starter, Raymond has tallied 92 tackles, six TFL, two INTs and seven PBU during his 28-game career. Junior CB Quenton Washington has played in 35 games, starting 22. He's posted 98 tackles, 2.5 TFL, five PBU and three fumble recoveries, while also blocking three kicks, during his career. This season, Washington has posted 54 tackles, a TFL, four PBU and a blocked punt. Sophomores George Baker and Kayvon Webster also have seen plenty of action at corner this year. After redshirting in 2008, Baker played in 12 games last season, earning a start against Charleston Southern, and has seen action in 11 games this year. He posted his first career INT in the season opener against Stony Brook. Webster has played in 25 career games, starting nine, and has recorded 58 tackles, 3.5 TFL, an INT, two PBU and a fumble recovery. This year, Webster has played in all 12 games, starting three, and posted 28 tackles and a TFL. Redshirt freshman Ricardo Dixon has also added depth. He's played in 11 games, posting eight tackles and two PBU.

MEET SKINNY

USF senior defensive back Mistral "Skinny" Raymond, who was recently tabbed second-team All-BIG EAST, continues to be a nice surprise for the Bulls. After posting 67 tackles at Ellsworth (Iowa) C.C., Raymond walked-on to the USF team in 2008 and provided depth in the secondary. Then, in 2009, Raymond became a factor at safety, playing in all 13 games and starting four. He finished the season with 40 tackles, two TFL and an INT. Based on his performance, Skip Holtz rewarded Raymond with a scholarship earlier this year, and in return, Raymond has worked himself to the top of the depth chart and was voted captain by his teammates. So far this season, he's tallied 52 tackles, four TFL, an INT and seven PBU despite missing the Louisville game due to a quad injury. For his career, Raymond has posted 92 tackles, six TFL, two INTs and six PBU.

THE SAFETYS

At free safety, junior Jerrell Young has helped fill the void left by the departed Nate Allen, who was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles. Hampered by a dislocated elbow suffered in the 2009 opener, Young played in nine games, making six starts, last year. He's continued his development and posted 38 tackles, 1.5 TFL, three INTs and three PBU so far this year. For his career, Young has tallied 84 tackles, 2.5 TFL, three INTs and six PBU in 33 games (16 starts). Sophomore Jon Lejiste worked his way into the starting role opposite Young. In 2010, Lejiste has posted 39 tackles, three sacks, two of which resulted in forced fumbles, 6.5 TFL, an INT, two PBU and two forced fumbles. Last year, he played in all 13 games, earning a start against Connecticut. For his career, Lejiste has tallied 68 tackles, three sacks, 7.5 TFL, an INT, three PBU and three forced fumbles in 25 games (13 starts). Redshirt freshman JaQuez Jenkins and true freshman Mark Joyce have supplied depth to the group. Jenkins has tallied 10 tackles, a TFL and a fumble recovery so far this year, while Joyce, a member of ESPN.com's All-BIG EAST Freshman team, has 27 stops, a forced fumble and a 33-yard INT return for a TD.

RETURN RESULTS

Cousins Lindsey Lamar and Terrence Mitchell, who both played at Tampa's Hillsborough High School, have provided a major contribution in the return game this season. Lamar was named the BIG EAST's Special Teams Player of the Year, while Mitchell was earned ESPN.com All-BIG EAST Freshman honors. Lamar has returned 30 kickoffs for 842 yards (28.1 ypr) and two TDs. His 28.1 ypr average ranks 13th nationally and second in the BIG EAST. He is the only Bull in school history to return two kickoffs for TDs and his two this season tied the BIG EAST single-season mark. Lamar had a 94-yard return against Syracuse, which is tied for the fourthlongest kickoff return in school history. Then, Lamar tied Mike Jenkins' school record with a 100-vard return against Louisville. Mitchell had the best day of his young career against WKU. In that game, he returned two punts for 94 yards, averaging 47.0 yards per return. His long of 67 yards is tied for the fourth-longest return in USF history. For the season, Mitchell has returned 19 punts for 194 yards (10.2 ypr). His 10.2 ypr average ranks 27th nationally and fourth in the BIG EAST.

TAMPA (AP) -- B.J. Daniels threw for 264 yards and two touchdowns, helping the University of South Florida launch the Skip Holtz era with a 59-14 rout of Stony Brook in the season opener for both teams. Daniels teamed with Dontavia Bogan on a 59-yard score on the Bulls' first offensive play. The third-year sophomore later threw a 27-yard TD pass to Joel Miller. Holtz became the head coach of the Bulls in January after five seasons at East Carolina. The son of former Notre Dame and South Carolina coach Lou Holtz is only the second coach in USF's 13-year history. Stony Brook QB Michael Coulter threw a first-quarter TD pass that gave the Seawolves a brief 14-7 lead, however he also tossed three interceptions and had one of them returned for a touchdown that put USF up 52-14 late in the third quarter. Daniels completed 15-of-22 passes before leaving the game after leading a five-play, 80-yard TD drive to start the second half. The game was Stony Brook's first against a Football Bowl Subdivision opponent, and the Seawolves have already signed contracts to play three more FBS schools - Buffalo, Army and Boston College in the next three years. Miller did not have a career reception before Saturday night. Daniels found him slanting into the end zone with six seconds remaining in the opening half, finishing a nine-play, 61-yard drive that put USF up 31-14. USF mistakes on special teams led to both of Stony Brook's touchdowns, with Faron Hornes fumbling on a punt return at his own 35 and Bulls punter Justin Brockhaus-Kann being ruled down at the USF 27 for a 15-yard loss after going down on one knee to field a bad snap. Coulter threw 31 yards to Jordan Gush to set up a 3-yard TD run by Edwin Gowins. The junior's 27-yard scoring pass to Brock Jackolski, a transfer from Hofstra, gave Stony Brook a 14-7 lead less than 10 minutes into the game. Coulter completed 9-of-21 passes for 112 yards and one touchdown. Miguel Maysonet led Stony Brook in rushing with 72 yards on 11 carries. The Bulls rushing attack was led by freshman Marcus Shaw, who posted 77 yards, including a 63-yard TD run. Sophomore Demetris Murray added 55 yards, while senior Mo Plancher and Daniels each had TD runs. Sophomore Evan Landi, who was playing in his first game as a full-time receiver, notched five receptions for 92 yards, while true freshman walk-on Stephen Bravo-Brown had four cathces for 48 yards. Bogan finished with three receptions for 86 yards. Defensively, USF got interceptions from freshman Mark Joyce, who returned his 33 yards for a TD, senior David Bedford, sophomore Mike Lanaris and sophmore George Baker. Junior Curtis Weatherspoon led the team with six tackles, while freshman DeDe Lattimore and Patrick Hampton chipped in with four stops.

GAINESVILLE - During its short 14-year history, the University of South Florida football team has made a name for itself as a team that could step up and shock the college football world with a big upset. They did it in 2001 in just its second year as an independent Football Bowl Subdivision member when it handed Pittsburgh a 35-26 loss, in 2007 when it defeated Auburn, 26-23 in overtime, and last year when it beat Florida State, 17-7. All three of those wins came on the road and in front of stunned home crowds. On Saturday, it looked early on that USF was poised to possibly shock the nation once again, as it traveled to Gainesville to take on No. 8 Florida. The Gators, however, would find their groove, scoring 21-unanswered third quarter points en route to a 38-14 win over the Bulls in front of 90,612 fans at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium, the second largest crowd that USF has ever played in front of. The Bulls would come out of the locker room looking to establish the tempo of the game and take control, and that's exactly what they did. After the USF defense gave Florida nothing in its first series, forcing the Gators into a threeand-out, quarterback B.J. Daniels and the Bulls' offense would take over on the Florida four yard line and proceed to go on a 17-play, 96-yard drive which would end in a two-yard pass from Daniels to tight end Andrew Ketchel with 3:53 left in the first quarter. That initial drive would consist of 12 rushing attempts and just two passing completions - out of five attempts - using up 9:58 of the clock, and seemingly taking a toll on the Florida defense. USF also converted on five third down plays during the drive, including a third-and-eight play, from the USF 48-yard line, when Daniels hit wide receiver Dontavia Bogan for a 12-yard connection, and then on third-and-two from Florida's 32-yard line, wide receiver Lindsey Lamar would scamper for 21 yards down to the Gator 11-yard line. The big play of the series came on third-and-goal when Daniels looked to connect with Bogan, however Florida defensive back Jeremy Brown would be called for pass interference setting up the strike to Ketchel on the next play to put the Bulls up 7-0. Each team would end up punting on their next two series, respectively, before the Gators would put together their own drive and threaten to get on the scoreboard. Starting at its own 10-yard line, Florida used a series of runs to get out to its own 41-yard line before quarterback John Brantley threw a 21-yard completion to running back Jeffery Demps where he was knocked out of bounds at the Bulls' 38-yard line by safety Jon Lejiste. The Gators eventually got deep into USF territory, giving Gator kicker Caleb Sturgis an opportunity at a 39-yard field goal attempt that would go wide. The Florida defense, however, would strike on the Bulls' next series when safety Ahmad Black intercepted a Daniels pass and returned it two yards to the Bulls 29 yard line. The Gators took advantage just two plays later, when Brantley went up the middle to wide receiver Carl Moore for an 11-yard touchdown strike to tie the game at 7-7, a score that would hold up at the break. At the beginning of the second half, USF was poised to get back into the Gátor end zone. The Bulls took over possession at their own 32 yard line and quickly gave the ball to running back Demetris Murray who would rush for 33 yards down to the Florida 35 yard line. After back-to-back runs by Murray and Daniels, Murray would look to take the ball from Daniels on a hand off, however never got a grip on it. The fumble would be recovered by the Gators on its own 12-yard line. Just two plays after the miscue, Demps would go 62 yards for a touchdown to give Florida its first lead of the game. The Gators would eventually go up 28-7 before the Bulls scored again on a three-yard Murray touchdown run with 25 seconds left in the third quarter, cutting the lead to two touchdowns. That would be as close as USF would get the rest of the day. The scoring play was set up by a 51-yard reception by wide receiver Evan Landi. Although the Bulls recorded just 86 yards passing on the day, the USF running attack would find a pretty good rhythm rushing for 244 yards on 39 carries. Daniels rushed for 107 of those 244 yards doing so on 17 carries. It was the fifth time that he ran for more than 100 yards in a game in his career. In addition, with his 107 rushing yards, Daniels becomes only the second quarterback to rush for more than 100 yards against the Gators since 1996. On Sept. 14, 2002, Dontrell Jackson (Ohio)rushed for 118 yards. Murray would also finish with 62 yards rushing on 11 carries and running back Mo Plancher surpassed the 1,000-yard plateau for his career rushing for 32 yards on six carries.

TAMPA - The term running with the Bulls couldn't have been any more appropriate than it was at Raymond James as the University of South Florida football team returned to action following its bye week and handed Western Kentucky a 24-12 loss in front of 40,276 USF faithful. The Bulls got touchdown runs from Mo Plancher, Richard Kelly and B.J. Daniels as USF ran for 226 yards on 44 carries on the evening, highlighted by a 115-yard performance from Demetris Murray. WKU took the opening kickoff from its own 30-yard line and drove the ball 45 yards to the Bulls' 30-yard line using 7:28 of the clock only to have a 46-yard field goal attempt by Casey Tinius go wide right. After back-to-back three-and-outs by USF and then the Hilltoppers, the Bulls looked like they would get their chance to get on the board. USF got a 27-vard punt return from Terrence Mitchell, bringing the ball to the WKU 28-yard line. Daniels would collect 15 yards on the first play of the drive getting to the Hilltoppers' 13yard line. A sack forced the Bulls back to the 21-yard line and after a Plancher five-yard gain and a Daniels' 12-yard scamper fell just short of the first down, kicker Eric Schwartz would look to give the Bulls a three-point advantage. However, like his WKU counterpart, Schwartz would put his attempt wide right. Tinius would get another chance to redeem himself after the USF defense held on a third down, but he put another attempt wide right. On the next series, Plancher would finally break through and give the Bulls the advantage with a 13-yard TD scamper with 5:09 left in the half, capping a five-play, 79-yard drive. Murray gave the Bulls a boost on the drive with a 39-yard run that ended with a facemask penalty, giving USF another 15 yards and a first down at the WKU 24. After Tinius missed his third field goal of the first half with 40 seconds left, the Bulls took a 7-0 lead into the locker room at the intermission. USF would come out in the second half and look to extend the gap. Kelly took a Daniels handoff and rumbled two yards into the end zone to give the Bulls a two-touchdown lead, capping an 11-play, 82-yard drive that ate up 6:27 on the clock. After the Bulls defense held on the ensuing drive, Mitchell would strike again in the return game, taking the punt 67 yards to the WKU 13 yardline. Daniels would cap the drive with a one-yard run with 1:50 left in the third, making it 21-0. WKU would finally get on the board with 11:28 left in the contest when Quinterrence Cooper caught a five-yard pass from Bobby Rainey. After a Maikon Bonani 33-yard field goal, WKU would close the gap when Jack Doyle took a 25-yard pass from Jakes and found the end zone with 3:46 left in the game. But, it was too late and the Bulls notched the 24-12 victory. Murray finished with 115 yards on 15 carries (7.7 ypc) to register the first 100-yard game of his career. His backfield mate, Plancher, would finish the game with 79 yards on 17 carries, while Daniels posted 30 rushing yards. USF would only attempt 11 passes, completing seven, with Evan Landi accounting for two of the Bulls' seven catches on the night. The USF defense also stifled the Hilltoppers' running game, which came into the contest averaging 170 yards per game in their first three games against Nebraska, Kentucky and Indiana. On the night, WKU logged just 88 yards on 31 carries for an average of 2.8 yards per carry. Bobby Rainey, the Hilltoppers' top rushing threat, who came into the outing rushing at a 148-yards-per-game clip with five touchdowns this year, was held to just 64 yards on 21 carries and didn't find his way into the end zone. Sam Barrington led the defense with six tackles, while DeDe Lattimore, Mike Lanaris and Jacquain Williams chipped in five stops. Lanaris also had two TFL with Williams adding a TFL of his own. Jon Lejiste was also active, finishing with three tackles, a sack and forced fumble and a PBU.

TAMPA - The University of South Florida entered their game against Florida Atlantic with three sacks through the first three games of the season, but by the time the clock hit 0:00, the Bulls had sacked the Owls seven times, holding them to just three points in the 31-3 victory. The Bulls brought down the FAU quarterbacks seven times in the win, tying the school record, for a total of 65 yards lost. The seven sacks is the most in a single game in program history, which the Bulls have done on four separate occasions with the most recent coming in 2006 against Syracuse. Seven different Bulls contributed to the sack parade, while the defense as a whole held the Owls to just 208 yards offensively, 136 in the air and 72 on the ground. It wasn't just the USF defense that had success in the 31-3 thumping of in-state foe FAU, as the Bulls' offense collected 291 total yards, 136 on the ground and 155 on the arm of quarterback B.J. Daniels. Daniels had an efficient night in the pocket, completing 14-of-19 pass attempts on the night for 155 yards and a touchdown, while adding 27 yards on the ground. For the second consecutive game, the USF offense did most of their work on the ground, combining to run for 136 yards as a team including a pair of scores. Senior runningback Mo Plancher, got a majority of the carries, rushing 20 times for 93 yards and a pair of scores. The Bulls got a much needed jolt to their receiving corps, as senior wideout Dontavia Bogan, returned after missing one game with an ankle injury. Bogan hauled in five passes for a team-high 66 yards, including a 38-yard touchdown reception on a flea-flicker from QB B.J. Daniels. After collecting 226 rushing yards as a team in the 24-12 win over Western Kentucky a week ago, the Bulls stuck with their ground attack from the get-go. On second and seven from their own 35, Florida Atlantic quarterback Jeff Van Camp dropped back to pass and was intercepted off a deflected pass by USF safety Jerrell Young, his first his career, to give the Bulls outstanding field position to begin the game. USF stuck with their bread and butter from a week ago, handing the ball to Plancher five times on the opening drive, along with a five-yard offsides penalty to set up a five-yard touchdown scamper by Plancher, putting USF up 7-0 and giving them a lead they would not relinquish. Both teams would then exchange possessions, and after a five-yard sack by Terrell McClain ended the next FAU drive, Quenton Washington sped around the edge of the line to block the Owl punt. The blocked punt was scooped linebacker Armando Sanchez who rumbled 11 yards into the endzone for the score. The touchdown was the first of Sanchez' career, and extended the USF lead to 14-0 with under two minutes to play in the opening quarter. On their very next drive, the Bulls marched down the field 69 yards in 15 plays, but was eventually derailed by penalties in the red zone, before kicker Eric Schwartz pushed a 35-yard field goal wide right. The Owls responded, by putting together a 15 play 68-yard drive of their own to set up a Ross Gornall 29-yard field goal with nine seconds remaining in the half. The Bulls opened the second half with a long pass to Bogan, which fell to the ground, but the Owls were called for defensive pass interference, to give USF good field position at the FAU 48. After a 10-yard run by Plancher, offensive coordinator Todd Fitch dialed up a flea-flicker from Daniels to Bogan for the 38-yard touchdown. After the Bulls' defense forced another three and out, Daniels and the offense strung together a 13 play, 51-yard drive which ate up 5:29 off of the clock resulting in a Maikon Bonani 46-yard field goal to put the Bulls up 24-3. The Bulls forced their first fumble of the 2010 season, as linebacker Sam Barrington jarred the ball loose from David Muniz, which was recovered by safety Jaquez Jenkins to give the Bulls' offense the ball at the FAU 45. After a pass to Evan Landi, and a personal foul penalty, the Bulls ran the ball five straight times, leading to a one-yard touchdown by Plancher, his second of the night. With 12:00 remaining in the fourth quarter, trailing 31-3, the Owls got a 49-yard scamper from Willie Floyd, but could not capitalize with points, as linebacker Mike Lanaris picked off a Graham Wilbert pass at the USF five to all but seal the game. The Bulls were able to run out the remainder of the clock on a pair of drives, to improve to 3-1 on the season heading into conference play.

TAMPA - With the college football prognosticators deeming the BIG EAST Conference as potentially a crazy wide open race this year, the University of South Florida and Syracuse football teams proved them correct as the Orange handed USF a tough 13-9 loss in the conference opener for both schools at Raymond James Stadium. After back-and-forth play for most of the first quarter, USF managed to get on the board first just under two minutes into the second half when Maikon Bonani capped off an eight play, 48-yard drive with a 31-yard field goal to make the score 3-0 with 13:20 left in the first half. The Orange would retaliate immediately following the Bulls' score with a Ross Krautman 35-yard field goal of his own following a 10-play, 55-yard drive. USF was able to move the ball getting to the Syracuse 31, 37 and 24 yard lines in the first 30 minutes, however the Bulls weren't able to punch the ball into the end zone as both teams went into the locker room deadlocked at 3-3. The second half would see the Orange come out of the locker room and go down the field using 11 plays over 49 yards, however were only able to settle for another Krautman field goal, this time a 41-yard strike with 10:26 left in the third quarter to take their first lead of the game, 6-3. On the ensuing kickoff, the Bulls would get the big play that it would need and the momentum change that it was hoping to take advantage of, when Lindsey Lamar took the ball on the USF six yard line and proceed to return it 94 yards for a touchdown, and a share of the fourth-longest kick return for a score in school history. Syracuse would then put together its longest scoring drive of the season - and the longest scoring drive by a USF opponent this year - going 98 yards on 14 plays and using up 6:34 as the drive was capped off by a three-yard touchdown pass from Orange quarterback Ryan Nassib to Marcus Sales with 6:34 left in the game. The Bulls would get two more opportunities in the final six-plus minutes to get into the end zone; however the first would see USF go three-and-out, and their final series would use up just 38 yards on eight plays, and end with a B.J. Daniels incompletion to receiver Evan Landi with just over a minute left in the contest. On the afternoon, USF would muster just 219 yards in total offense on 60 plays, including 124 yards through the air. The Bulls were led on the offensive end of the ball by Dontavia Bogan who was Daniels' main target catching four passes for 67 yards, including a long of 32 yards in the first quarter that would help set up Bonani's field goal. On the ground, USF got 58 of its 95 rushing yards from Mo Plancher on 15 carries, and 30 yards on seven carries from Demetris Murray. One of the bright spots of the day was found on the defensive side with the play of defensive end Craig Marshall and defensive back Kayvon Webster. The defensive tandem each recorded eight tackles on the day and kept the Bulls in the game by making things tough for the Syracuse offense. In addition to his eight tackles, Marshall would also log a career-high three sacks for a loss of 22 yards for the Orange. His three sacks are tied for the third most in a single game for USF, and it is also a school record for sacks in a BIG EAST Conference game, surpassing Chris Robinson's 2.5 against Syracuse on Nov. 11, 2006.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. - Generating few yards on drive after drive, West Virginia went to some trickery from normally conservative coach Bill Stewart and seized control of its Big East opener. Geno Smith, Jock Sanders and Noel Devine combined to execute a hook-and-lateral for a short touchdown just before halftime, a play that stuck out in an otherwise dull offensive showing in No. 25 West Virginia's 20-6 win over USF. The Mountaineers made the most out of their limited scoring opportunities while the nation's seventh-best defense held South Florida without an offensive touchdown for the second straight game. Quarterback B.J. Daniels found no room to roam and the Bulls were outgained 298-202. South Florida's previous low for offense this season was 219 yards in a 13-9 loss to Syracuse last week. Robert Sands set the stage for the Mountaineers just before halftime, stepping in front of Daniels' pass to Evan Landi and returning the interception 27 yards to the South Florida 7. West Virginia called the hook-and-lateral on the short side of the field. Smith threw a screen pass behind the line of scrimmage to Sanders. He immediately flipped the ball behind him to Devine, who went around right end from 11 yards out for the score and a 17-3 halftime lead. West Virginia ate up clock time in the second half to post its 12th straight home win. Both teams crossed midfield twice in the second half and managed only a field goal apiece. Last year Daniels went through the Mountaineers for 336 yards of offense in a 30-19 win, but West Virginia had a better plan for him this time. Daniels ran 14 times for just 4 yards and completed 20 of 30 passes for 119 yards. "The defense did a very good job at containing us, and we've just got to get back to the drawing board," he said."We're not going to throw in the towel and make excuses." South Florida was successful in slowing down Devine for the second straight year. Devine led the Mountaineers with 13 carries for 29 yards. His longest run was 13 yards. Instead, the Mountaineers relied on Smith for an arsenal of mostly short, controlled passes. He completed 13 straight passes spanning both halves and finished 24 of 31 for 219 yards and two scores. West Virginia forged ahead with an unusually imbalanced approach, throwing on 23 of its 33 first-half plays. Brad Starks had his fourth TD catch in two games, grabbing a 31-yarder with no defender near him in the first quarter for a 10-0 lead. After that, there was little movement from either offense. The teams punted on seven straight possessions in the second quarter. Sanders did a lot of catching with little to show for it. He had 10 receptions for just 31 yards. According to WVU statisticians, that's the fewest receiving yards in school history for a player with at least 10 catches in a game. West Virginia's Keith Tandy caught a tipped pass early in the fourth quarter for his fourth interception in three games. Brantwon Bowser had his first career interception for the Mountaineers. The Mountaineers evened the all-time series at 3-3.

CINCINNATI, Ohio - B.J. Daniels' about-face ended one of the Big East's longest winning streaks. The struggling sophomore quarterback had a breakout game, throwing for two touchdowns and running for two more, and South Florida got its first significant win under coach Skip Holtz, knocking off twotime defending Big East champion Cincinnati 38-30. South Florida hadn't scored a touchdown on offense in its last two games, done in by Daniels' five interceptions. He had 10 interceptions overall. No flubs in this one. He got the Bulls going by completing one long pass after another against Cincinnati's inexperienced defense. Daniels' 64-yard completion to Dontavia Bogan set up a third-quarter touchdown, and his 70-yard pass to Faron Hornes put the Bulls up 31-16 late in the third quarter. The Bearcats had won 13 straight Big East games, tied for third-longest streak in league history. They hadn't lost at Nippert Stadium since 2008. They had a chance to keep the streak going in the closing minutes. Zach Collaros threw three touchdown passes, going 30-of-53 - both career highs - for 463 yards with an interception. He took a hard hit late in the fourth quarter, leaving him with a stiff leg. He was on the sideline for Cincinnati's final drive, which ended with Chazz Anderson's incompletion from the Bulls 15-yard line with 7 seconds remaining. Collaros' injury was being evaluated. The Bearcats self-destructed with a half-dozen dropped throws and 12 penalties for 115 yards. Daniels was a dual-threat quarterback as a freshman, leading the Bulls in rushing. He had struggled this season in a transition to pocket passer, forcing throws while under pressure. Against Cincinnati, he went 13-of-16 for 286 yards without an interception. Cincinnati's inexperienced defense had only two interceptions all season and was looking for a breakout game against Daniels. Sophomore safety Drew Frey stepped in front of a receiver on Daniels' first pass, but lost the ball as he hit the ground. Given a reprieve, Daniels got his act together. He directed a 13-play, 86-yard drive that ended the touchdown drought, going 3 yards on a draw for a 7-3 lead early in the second quarter. Daniels threw a 31-yard touchdown pass to Evan Landi on his next play, then went to the sideline and waved a white towel. South Florida's defense made a pivotal stop, stopping Collaros on a fourth-and-1 from the Bulls 30-yard line late in the third guarter. Daniels then connected with Hornes, who darted through the defense for his 70-yard reception and a 31-16 lead. Collaros' 15-yard touchdown pass to Armon Binns cut it to 38-30 with 5:35 left. Collaros was hit hard while scrambling on the previous play, causing the leg injury. The Bearcats got the ball back at their 29-yard line with 3:25 remaining and drove to the 15, where Anderson threw one away while getting sacked on fourth down.

TAMPA - Senior running back Mo Plancher rushed for a career-high 135 yards to lead the University of South Florida to its 100th victory Wednesday night. The Bulls defeated Rutgers, 28-27, in a BIG EAST showdown at Raymond James Stadium. USF now holds an all-time record of 100-60 with the win, becoming the fastest team in BIG EAST history to accomplish that feat based on games played. The Bulls snapped their four-game losing streak against the New Jersey school, earning their first victory over Rutgers at Raymond James Stadium. Plancher, the senior from nearby Naples, Fla., added 45 receiving yards on three catches, giving him a total of 180 yards of total offense on the night. His 45 yards receiving were also a career high. Sophomore quarterback B.J. Daniels also added to his career numbers. He passed the 1,000-yard rushing plateau with 1,014 rushing yards in his career. Daniels rushed for 15 yards in tonight's victory, while finishing the day with 164 yards of total offense, including 149 in the air. The Tallahassee native completed 10-of-17 passes with two touchdowns and just one interception. Offensive tackle Jacob Sims got his name in the stats column, becoming the first offensive lineman in USF history to score a touchdown after he recovered a Plancher fumble in the end zone with 9:33 left in regulation. His touchdown gave the Bulls a 28-27 advantage, which was good enough for the win. The Bulls were anchored by senior Jacquian Williams on defense. He posted 11 tackles, 1.5 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss. Junior Keith McCaskill tallied his first career safety when he tackled Rutgers running back Kordell Young in the end zone with 1:02 left in the third stanza, snapping the Bulls' 20-game streak without a safety. USF recorded its last safety on Sept. 5, 2009 in its season-opener against Wofford. USF finished with 306 yards of total offense, including 149 in the air and 157 on the ground. The Bulls defense held Rutgers to just 238 yards of total offense (160 passing / 78 rushing). USF's defense put a clamp on the Scarlet Knights' running game, forcing them to put the ball in the air. Quarterback Chas Dodd completed 19-of-22 passes, but was only able to amass 139 yards and failed to reach the end zone. The Scarlet Knights' two touchdowns came from Mohamed Sanu and Mark Harrison. Harrison led the team with 88 yards and has scored a touchdown in each of his last four games. The Rutgers special teams also contributed, scoring on a punt return in the first quarter. The Bulls got on the board first, taking advantage of a mishandled snap from Rutgers that forced a third-and-26 situation. On the ensuing punt, freshman Terrence Mitchell posted a 47-yard return, setting up a four-yard touchdown pass from Daniels to sophomore Evan Landi for a quick 7-0 lead. Later in the first half, after falling behind 10-7, the Bulls responded as Plancher charged through the Scarlet Knight defense to put USF in scoring position. USF capped the drive when Dontavia Bogan, who caught two passes for 18 yards, took a pass from Daniels and glided into the end zone for a six-yard touchdown reception, his third of the season, giving the Bulls a 14-10 lead. After a Rutgers TD gave the Scarlet Knights a 17-14 lead, USF put together a nine-play, 52 yard drive that resUlted in a 47-yard Maikon Bonani field goal with just 32 seconds remaining in the half. The 47-yarder tied his season-high and tied the game at 17 at the break. Rutgers came out of the half and put together a nine-play, 74-yard TD drive to take a 24-17 lead. USF would score a field goal at the 7:16 mark of the third quarter to cut the deficit to 24-20. They followed that with a safety at the 1:02 mark to get within two, 24-22. Rutgers would do a little more damage at the 12:00 mark in the fourth quarter off a field goal by San San Te to take a 27-22 lead, but the Bulls kept battling as Sims recovered a Plancher fumble in the end zone with 9:33 left on the clock to give USF its 100th program win with a 28-27 final.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - After missing a 52-yard field goal with a chance to win at the end of regulation, kicker Maikon Bonani hit a 37-yard field goal in overtime to give the University of South Florida their third straight BIG EAST Conference win, 24-21, over Louisville. With the win, USF became the first BIG EAST team to become bowl eligible. This marks the sixth consecutive season that USF will go bowling. After opening conference play with a pair of losses to Syracuse and West Virginia, the Bulls have now reeled off three consecutive wins in BIG EAST contests for the first time since 2007, when the Bulls closed out the regular season with wins at Syracuse, at home against Louisville and at Pittsburgh. In many ways, it has been a year of firsts in league play for head coach Skip Holtz and the Bulls. Prior to 2010, USF had never won at Cincinnati and Louisville, and had lost to Rutgers in the previous four years. But, in the past three weeks, USF has knocked off all three to move to 3-2 in BIG EAST play. Once again, the USF defense came up with big plays, especially down the stretch, and the Bulls defense stuffed a Louisville quarterback sneak on fourth and short on the first possession in overtime, to set up the game-winning field goal. USF got 106 yards rushing from Demetris Murray in the win, and while guarterback B.J. Daniels managed to throw for only 86 yards on the day, he was able to control the game, completing 11-of-18 passes without an interception on the day. Of Daniels' 87 yards, 48 came on a deep pass to senior wideout Dontavia Bogan in the back of the endzone, just under a minute into the fourth quarter, to give the Bulls their first lead of the game. After a two-point conversion, the Bulls led 21-14. Earlier in the game, a Daniels fumble late in the opening quarter set Louisville u with a short field. They capped the drive with a 20-yard touchdown pass on third-and-19 from Justin Burke to Andrell Smith to take the early 7-0 advantage. A 39-yard field goal by Bonani made it 7-3 with 10 minutes remaining in the half, but Louisville marched 60 yards on 14 plays, eating up six minutes of the clock to take a 14-3 lead on a two-yard touchdown reception by Josh Chichester with under three minutes to play in the half. USF immediately cut into the lead as sophomore speedster Lindsey Lamar returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for the touchdown. It was Lamar's second kickoff return TD of the season, giving him USF's single-season record and tying the BIG EAST single-season mark. With the momentum on their side, the Bulls' defense forced a three-and-out on the opening possession of the second half, and then the USF offense drove the ball 85 yards to set up a 22-yard field goal by Bonani to cut the Cardinal lead to 14–13. Both teams would remain scoreless until the 14:40 mark of the fourth guarter when Daniels connected to Bogan in the back of the endzone for the 48-yard score and the lead. Daniels would then scamper for the two-point conversion to put USF up 21-14. Louisville answered with just over a minute remaining in the game on a 10-yard touchdown on a fade route to Josh Bellamy to tie the game at 21-21. On the ensuing kickoff, trying to keep the ball away from Lamar, Louisville kicked it short to USF tight end Andreas Shields, who returned it 51 yards to the Cardinal 40 yard line. After three short plays for the Bulls, Holtz sent Bonani out to try and give USF the win. Louisville head coach Charlie Strong used a timeout to try and ice Bonani, and after the timeout, Bonani connected on a 52-yarder, but Strong had used another timeout, negating the field goal. After the second timeout, Bonani hooked the second attempt wide left to force overtime. USF won the toss, and decided to play defense first. The Cardinals rattled for a first down, and eventually got down to the USF five yard line, but then Louisville was stuffed short of the first down on consecutive running plays, to turn the ball over on downs. The Bulls then ran the ball on three consecutive plays, leading to the 37-yard game-winner by Bonani.

TAMPA - A strong defensive performance from the University of South Florida football team that allowed just three points in the first half wasn't enough as the Bulls dropped a 17-10 decision to Pittsburgh Saturday afternoon at Raymond James Stadium in front of a season-high crowd of 43,844.Sophomore quarterback B.J. Daniels completed 15-of-29 passes with 132 yards for the Bulls, while the USF offense was anchored by the rushing game of Mo Plancher who picked up 67 yards on 13 carries and Terrence Mitchell with 45 yards and a touchdown in the Bulls' loss. In the air, Dontavia Bogan, who forced several defensive penalties for Pittsburgh, led the way with 60 yards on four receptions, followed by Evan Landi with 31 yards on four receptions. The Bulls finished with 285 yards of total offense, notching 153 on the ground and 132 in the air. On the defensive side, USF kept Pittsburgh off the scoreboard for much of the first half as the Panthers scored 14 of their 17 points in the second half. Safetys Jerrell Young and Mistral Raymond led the defensive efforts for the Bulls with eight and seven tackles, respectively. Eight tackles was a career-high for Young. The USF defense collected four sacks on the day, including a career first for Julius Forte, who also contributed three solo tackles in the loss. Pittsburgh totaled 292 yards of total offense with 150 rushing and 142 passing. Tino Sunseri led the Panther offense, completing 11-of-16 passes for 142 yards and a touchdown, while running back Dion Lewis added the spark in the running game with 105 yards on 22 carries with a touchdown. Sophomore running back Ray Graham contributed on the ground and in the air for Pittsburgh with a total of 53 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown reception in the third to give the Panthers10-3 lead.USF saw a slow-moving first half as the first stanza saw just three points scored with the only action coming from the navy blue and gold as Panthers kicker Dan Hutchins capitalized on a 36-yard field goal for a 3-0 advantage with 9:26 left in the first. Neither team would see the end zone until the second half. Maikon Bonani responded with a 35-yard field goal at the 14:57 mark of the second quarter to knot the score at three apiece, giving the Bulls a little bit of life. A heavy defensive effort from both sides of the ball kept Pittsburgh and USF quiet as the game remained locked at 3-3 going into the break.USF's defense continued to put the pressure on the Panther offense as they kept them off the scoreboard for much of the third quarter. Pittsburgh struggled to find a scoring opportunity until Graham managed to sneak by the Bulls' defense for a 12-yard touchdown pass, giving Pittsburgh a 10-3 lead. The Bulls never gave up and continued to cover ground and work for opportunities on the offensive end. They managed to catch Pittsburgh off guard in the third as Daniels anchored a reverse play that opened a gap down field, allowing Mitchell to grab his first career touchdown with a 45-yard rush to the end zone, putting the Bulls back in the ballgame as they tied the game at 10. With Pittsburgh holding on to a 17-10 lead going into the final 4:30 of play, the Bulls looked to their defense, which had been strong all day, allowing the Panthers to convert just 2-of-9 on third downs and leaving them 0-for-1 on fourth down conversions. USF's defense put in work and forced Pittsburgh to go for a 43-yard field goal with 1:31 left on the clock. The Bulls caught a break as Hutchins sailed the ball wide to the left, giving USF another opportunity and 1:31 to score. Unfortunately for the host, time ran out as the Bulls fell 17-10.

MIAMI (AP) -Demetris Murray had a 1-yard touchdown run in overtime as the University of South Florida stunned Miami 23-20 at Sun Life Stadium. The win was the Bulls first win over the Hurricanes in three tries. Bobby Eveld, who entered the game after halftime for an injured B.J. Daniels, tied the game with a 1-yard run with 2 minutes left in regulation, then got the Bulls back to the 1 with a 9-yard pass to Joel Miller in overtime. Murray went over the top of the pile one play later, and the Bulls rushed the field wildly. Miami had a chance to win in regulation, but Jerrell Young intercepted Jacory Harris - with the Hurricanes in field goal range - with 5 seconds left. Matt Bosher kicked a 38-yarder on the first possession of overtime for Miami, but it wasn't enough as the Hurricanes finished 3-3 at home for the first time in 14 seasons. Murray had two TD runs and Mo Plancher rushed for 103 yards for the Bulls. Storm Johnson had a 71-yard touchdown run for Miami. The Bulls led 10-0 in the third quarter, before Lamar Miller's 8-yard run finally got Miami on the board. And when Johnson got loose up the middle on Miami's first play of the final period - his first carry of the game - the Hurricanes seemed to have control. But in the end, an interception spelled trouble. Instead of giving Bosher a chance to win it in Miami's home finale, Harris was picked off by Young, and the Bulls immediately began celebrating, as if they just knew they would pull it out in overtime. Which they always do - USF is now 9-0 all-time in overtime. The Bulls forced Miami to punt on their first six possessions, then finally got something going late in the first half, driving 57 yards to get a first-and-goal at the USF 1.The end result? No points. Damien Berry was stopped on first down by Sam Barrington and Tyson Butler, starting quarterback Stephen Morris was stopped on second down by a host of Bulls led by Kayvon Webster, and Berry not only was stopped on third down, but David Bedford forced a fumle. The ball flew out of the end zone for a turnover with 3:43 left in before intermission. The Bulls then drove 77 yards, and Maikon Bonani's 21-yard field goal with no time left in the half gave the Bulls a 3-0 lead. Morris was intercepted by Jacquian Williams on Miami's first possession of the second half, setting up a two-play, 18-yard drive that was capped by Murray's touchdown run that put USF ahead 10-0. Miami ran off 17 straight points to take a 17-10 lead with 8:44 left in the game. After the teams traded short possessions, USF got the ball on its own 19 with 4:54 remaining and proceeded to march 81 yards in nine plays. After a one-yard run by Plancher, Eveld hit Miller for 15 yards, followed by a 37-yard connection to Dontavia Bogan that set the Bulls up at the Miami 38. Plancher then scampered for 16 yards, and after two straight incompletions, Eveld again hooked up with Bogan on 3rd-and-10 for 21 yards, giving USF a first down at Miami's one yardline. Two plays later, Eveld snuck in for the TD, tying the game at 17. Eveld ended the game going 8-of-15 for 120 yards, while adding the rushing TD. In addition to the ground attack, Miller caught four passes for 60 yards and Bogan added 56 yards on three catches.

TAMPA - The University of South Florida rallied from 10 points down to tie the game at 16, but Connecticut answered with a 52-yard field goal from Dave Teggart to give the Huskies a 19-16 win over the Bulls Saturday night in front of 41,809 at Raymond James Stadium in the Bulls' regular-season finale. With the win, the Huskies claimed the BIG EAST title with a game-winning field goal at the 17-second mark of the final stanza. USF dropped to 7-5 on the season, while the Huskies improved to 8-4 and secured a spot in a BCS bowl. Prior to kick-off, USF honored its 19 seniors for their contributions and dedication to the Bulls' football program. The 2010 senior class has posted a 32-19 overall record, which ties them with the 2008 class for the second-most victories by a senior class in USF history. True freshman quarterback Bobby Eveld celebrated his 19th birthday with the first start of his young USF career. The walk-on from Tampa, Fla. completed 22-of-41 passes for 195 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions, while rushing for 29 yards. Anchoring the USF offense was senior wide receiver Dontavia Bogan, who closed out his final home game with seven receptions for 70 yards and a touchdown. Fellow senior tight end Kevin Gidrey finished the night with three grabs for 43 yards. Wide receiver Evan Landi contributed significantly on offense as well with four catches for 40 yards in the loss. Doing the work on the ground for the Bulls was the running duo of Mo Plancher and Demetris Murray, who rushed for 59 and 48 yards, respectively. Plancher, another senior for the Bulls, had a total of 15 carries in his final home game as a Bull, while Murray, Eveld and Bogan combined for 15 carries. Defensively, USF was led by senior Jacquian Williams with seven tackles, including three for a loss. He was assisted by DeDe Lattimore with seven tackles and Quenton Washington with six. Senior Terrell McClain also added to the defensive stat line with five total tackles. Sophomore safety Jon Lejiste made a significant impact on defense, earning his first career interception when he intercepted a Zach Frazer pass and returned it for 42 yards to the USF 49-yard line. USF finished the night with 333 yards of total offense, including 195 in the air and 138 on the ground. They outnumbered the Huskies, 333-232, in that category. The Bulls were 6-of-16 on third down conversions and were 3-for-3 in the red zone. The defense forced a fumble and an interception. The Bulls got on the scoreboard with a pair of field goals from sophomore kicker Maikon Bonani, who hit a 42-yard attempt at the 10:17 mark of the first quarter, giving USF its only lead of the game, and a 38-yarder at the 2:49 mark of the third. Going into intermission, the Huskies held a 10-3 lead as the Bulls looked to regroup and find their momentum. Coming out of the locker room, the Bulls s howed a little more fire and determination as they looked to continue their streak of being the comeback kids. They hit a field goal in the third to get within 10 as UConn held a 16-6 advantage going into the final 15 minutes of play. USF scored its first touchdown of the game at the 8:38 mark of the fourth quarter. Senior Craig Marshall forced a UConn fumble at the 9:22 mark with Sam Barrington recovering, which set up a 28-yard reception to Bogan from Eveld for the Bulls' score, putting USF within three, 16-13. The forced fumble was the first of the season for Marshall, while Barrington picked up his first career fumble recovery. Bogan's 28-yard touchdown reception was the 11th of his career, moving him into sole possession of third on USF's all-time list. The Bulls weren't done yet. Bonani came through once more with 1:16 left in regulation as he sailed a 22-yard field goal through the uprights, deadlocking the game at 16 apiece. UConn got the ball back and got a 39-yard kickoff return from Robbie Frey to give the Huskies great field position at their own 40. The Huskies moved the ball into position for Teggart to attempt a 52-yard field goal with 17 seconds left on the clock. The junior, who had just hit a 50-yarder in the beginning of the fourth, didn't disappoint as he nailed the career-long kick with plenty of distance to give UConn the win.
