Those choosing the full day trip will also hear: The Rev John Philip Newell: Poet, peacemaker, minister and scholar who is visiting from the Church of Scotland. Rev Newell is internationally acclaimed for his work in the field of Celtic spirituality. Newell teaches that "the sound of God resonates in every creature. If we are to listen for God, it is not away from creation, it is not away

from the depths of our being. It is rather in the very heart of our being that we need to turn our attention. For then we will hear that the deepest sound within us which is the deepest sound within everything that has being. Everything arises from this sacred sound." Dear Friends,

The view from the porch today, here in Ridgefield, CT is bright and sunny, looking down a tree lined street at our son and daughter-in-law's home. Tomorrow we will celebrate the first birthday of our first (and only) grandchild, Eliza. Her mother is baking a cake this morning and the plan tomorrow is for a backyard party with both sets of grandparents and both uncles. One of Eliza's presents will be a swimming pool that will be put out in the morning so that the water can warm up.

All of this, of course, brings back memories of childhood and summer. We are,

on this eve of the summer solstice, on the verge of the glory this fair season in Western New York. I hope you are making plans to engage the natural world around us. Emerson said about his own 'backyard' in Concord, MA "within these plantations a decorum and sanctity reign, a perennial festival is dressed, we see not how we should tire of it in a thousand years. Here, we return to reason and faith. Nothing can befall us that nature cannot repair. Mean egotism vanishes. In the tranquil landscape and distant horizon we behold creation as beautiful as our own nature."

Then the old sage says something remarkable, he says the power to produce this delight does not reside in nature, but in humans, and in the harmony of both. It's as if he lifted those words from Genesis and the seven days of creation. There is a deep interconnection between all living things. A harmony we're intended to seek and to experience with our partners and families, fellow human beings, all the earth's creatures, the very earth itself.

If you're thinking this has shades of Buddhism or Native American spirituality, you are right. So often the great religions arrive at the same truths through different paths. What they're saying is that we are best when we are at one with one another, with creation and with God. The Jews call this "shalom."

There is much in our world that works against the harmony of shalom. The mission and purpose of the people of God, of Westminster, of you and me, is to strive for and reflect that harmony with creation in our living. To reveal the glory of God's intention for human life in our actions, despite all the rhetoric, events and forces that counsel fragmentation and fortressing is the best policy for safety and protection. I don't know how that can happen without taking time to engage the world around us – the beauty of nature, our responsibility to be wise stewards of the earth – and to play in its bounty.

Cultivating the Practice of Reading Scripture



Each year I look forward to summertime to catch up on all the books I've put aside; the novels I didn't have time to read and all the recommended books that require more attention then I have during the program year of Sunday School, Confirmation and Adult Education classes. However, reading scripture is not a seasonal practice for me. Reading scripture is a spiritual practice where the more I read, the better reader of scripture I

become. Joel B. Green, Professor at Fuller Seminary, argues that the practice of reading scripture is not about learning how to mold the biblical message to contemporary lives and modern needs. Rather, reading the Bible shapes how we understand our lives and identify our greatest needs. In his article in Presbyterian Outlook's latest issue, Green offers the following six suggestions on how to cultivate the discipline of reading scripture.

- (1) Reading Scripture is not enough. Theological and ecclesial formation informs and are informed by reading Scripture. Communities that put Scripture into practice through seeking the Holy Spirit, confessing sins and forgiving each other, praying for the sick, and offering good news to others find themselves being prepared to read scripture.
- (2) Read and read again. It is easy to turn time with Scripture into a game of "Twenty Questions": how to have a happy relationship, learn financial faithfulness, or whatever. A sharp line can be drawn between utilitarian approaches that treat the Bible as a how-to manual or a database for addressing my questions, and the formation of Scripture-shaped minds that understand God and God's creation through Scripture-shaped lenses. The latter requires patient, deliberate reading—reading, as it were, for no good reason but for the sake of having our dispositions and reflexes shaped by Scripture.
- (3) Read slowly. Those of us who find ourselves moving back and forth between blogs, email, texts, news outlets, and social networks on our smartphones and tablets need different rules of engagement for reading Scripture. This practice concerns not how fast I can get through today's reading, but how slowly, combining prayer, reading, and contemplation. To crib Jesus' words, "Let these words sink into your ears" (Luke 9:44, NRSV).
- **(4) Involve yourself.** If the last century or more has imagined education as the process of stepping back to observe, assess, and attain knowledge, then this practice calls for different habits. This learning is self-involving, a means by which we hear God's address. Why do we resist this text but embrace that one? What does it mean that we are included in the community of God's people addressed by this text?
- (5) Read together. Inasmuch as scriptural texts have their origins and purpose deeply rooted in the community of God's people, we ought to find ways to read in community. By this I refer to the importance of study groups where our assumptions and views are tested, but even more I mean to counter the temptation to imagine that Scripture is simply for me and about me, or that I am tasked with determining its significance apart from the larger church, historically and globally.
- (6) Refuse to distinguish between reading the Bible for a class or sermon and reading the Bible for Christian formation. We come to Scripture for different reasons at different times, but it would be a mistake to imagine that preparing an exegesis paper or sermon required qualitatively different protocols. Should we leave our theological and ecclesial locations behind when doing exegesis? Should work with Scripture in sermon preparation bypass the reservoir of my regular reading practices? Should the crises that arise as I encounter God's voice in Scripture not shape my reading of these texts with and for others?


