School District Profile

Every year the Milnor Public School District, in cooperation with the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, publishes an annual progress report on student achievement called the *SCHOOL DISTRICT PROFILE*.

This profile is now available for your review. I encourage you to access and study this important information. This report demonstrates the progress our students are making in terms of our challenging academic standards.

Simply select the Milnor School District and the most recent year to access the various reports available. If you prefer, the staff at your local school or our central office will assist you and provide a printed copy to review.

The annual *School District Profile* summarizes how well our students performed this past year in reading/language arts and mathematics on the North Dakota State Assessment and on other academic indicators. The annual *School District Profile* presents the percentage of students who have achieved proficiency in reading/language arts and mathematics. The Profile also provides our student attendance rates and graduation rates. The Profile reviews the achievement of all students and of specific subgroups of students. Additionally, the Profile compares our student results over two years to those of the State as a whole.

The *School District Profile* for the Milnor School District is an important summary of how well our students are progressing in their basic academic skills. I encourage all parents and patrons to familiarize themselves with this information. Providing a quality education for our students is everyone's concern. In order for us to improve, we must begin with an understanding of how well our students are performing. We should all take pride in the support we collectively provide our students.

Together, I am confident that we will build on our successes to improve and further raise the quality of education within the Milnor School District. I thank you for your continued commitment to building a strong education system here in Milnor.

Open House/Nurtured Heart

Our annual open house will run from 4:00-5:00pm on August 16th. Grades 7-12 schedules can be picked up in the office. K-6 parents and students may visit elementary classrooms and bring their school supplies.

Starting at 5:00 we will have a Community Kick-off night with Tanya Fraizer, focusing on the Nurtured Heart Approach. We started implementing the Nurtured Heart last year and our teachers did in-service training with Tanya last February. Tanya is a consultant with Heart To Heart Consulting and works with schools, groups, and parents all across North Dakota and the U.S.

Parenting with Love and Logic will be held at Milnor United Metl Church on Monday evaings f rom 6:3&:00pm, beginning on Sept. and going through Oct. 24.

Parent Reminder

Please notify the office if your students are sick or if you know that they will be absent from school. If your child does not report to class, Milnor Public School will call home. We also must have a note or phone call from a parent to excuse an absence. We understand that there are times during the school year when you need to communicate with your child, but calling a student from a classroom disturbs the entire class. If it is not an emergency, we will take a message and your student may call you back.

Visitors

ALL visitors are required to sign in and out of the office. <u>This means parents</u>, <u>salespersons</u>, <u>etc.</u> This is necessary in order for us to keep track of people in the building should an emergency arise and also in order for us to keep our children safe. There is a sign in/out sheet in the office. Teachers and students who need to leave the building during the day will also have to sign in/out of the office.

Material

In compliance with the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA). In the fall of 1988 we performed inspections of our school buildings for asbestos-containing building materials. The inspection findings and asbestos management plans have been on file in the school administrative office since that time.

The EPA requires us to perform re-inspection of the asbestos material every three years. An accredited Inspector/Management Planner from Trio Environmental Consulting Inc. of West Fargo, ND performed the reinspection in our district and issued a report regarding the results. There were no significant changes in the condition of the remaining asbestos.

The Trio Environmental Consulting Inc. has been contracted to provide environmental services, which include maintaining compliance with federal regulations regarding asbestos and other regulated environmental concerns.

All asbestos containing materials in our school are in good condition and we will continue to manage them in place, as recommend by the accredited management planner.

The results of the re-inspection as well as the last 6 month surveillance are on file in the Management Plan in the school's administrative office. Everyone is welcome to view these anytime during normal business hours (M-F 8:30 am - 4:00 p.m.). Our Asbestos Manager will answer any questions you may have about asbestos in our building at 427-5237, or you may contact Scott Seamands, Trio Environmental Consulting Inc. at 701-492-9224

We are intent on not only complying with, but exceeding federal, state, and local regulations in this area. We plan on taking whatever steps are necessary to insure your children and our employees have a safe and healthy environment in which to learn and work.

FERPA

Notification of Rights under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

(400) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the School principle or appropriate school official a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The School official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA.

Parents or eligible students who wish to ask the School to amend a record should write the School principal or appropriate school official, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why is should be changed. If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible students, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them to their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the School as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the School has contracted as its agent to provide a service instead of using its own employees or officials (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. [NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]

(4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the *School District* to comply with the requirement of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:

A Touch of the Tropics: Milnor Students Experience Costa Rica

For many students, the summer of 2016 has been typical, filled with friends, the swimming pool and visits to the Keg. Costa Rica Explorer students have had a very different experience. On July 15th, participating students departed from Milnor School, flying from Minneapolis Minnesota, eventually landing in San Jose, Costa Rica. The students experienced Central America with another American school from Missouri, making friends, learning new language skills and ultimately diving into the most fragile ecosystem on the planet, the rainforest.

While in Costa Rica, Mrs. McCleary's science students saw a vast array of animals, including tarantulas, howler monkeys, iguanas, saltwater crocodiles, toucans and much more. They also learned how sustainable energy works in smaller regions while kayaking on a hydro-electric energy lake. Students planted trees while visiting one of several National Parks, explored the process of coffee bean production and developed insight into the local farming practices that surround many of the smaller villages. Not only was the trip a huge success, but it was above all educational and eye-opening. Despite rain (lots and lots of rain), tons of beans and rice, and great walking distances, highlights of the trip included a visit to a local elementary school, zip-lining through the jungle, guided night walks in the parks, and visiting the beautiful beaches of the Pacific Coast.

High School Principal's Report

Dear Parents and Guardians,

The start of our new school year is just around the corner, and I'm sure it feels like your summer has come and gone in the blink of an eye. I want to take some time to inform everyone on some changes that will take place starting this new school year. Our goal at Milnor Public School is to provide a safe and secure place for everyone to learn and grow.

Handbook changes:

- Any student who is tardy more than five minutes to class will be considered absent. (page 8)
- Any additional tardies over 3 the student will need to make up the time either before or after school. (page 9)
- Consequences for inappropriate use of electronic devices are:
 - o First offense device will be taken away and handed into the office. The student may pick up the device at the end of the school day or later.
 - Second offense device will be taken away and the student will be required to come and pick up the device at the end of the week or later.
 - o Third offense device will be taken away and the student's parents will be required to come and pick up the device at the end of the week or later.
 - o Fourth offense device will be taken away and the student's parents will be required to come and pick up the device at the end of the week or later and the student will serve one day of ISS. (page 24)
- ZAP Policy (Zeroes Aren't Permitted) This policy was put in place to help students get their work in. If the student has an assignment missing or one with less than 50% credit, then he/she will be required to turn the work in with a grade of 50% or better. It is up to the teacher's discretion to determine what the assignment will be worth. The students will be able to work with their teacher during bison block or from 8:05am to 8:25am.

School Lockdown changes:

- The school will be adopting the ALICE training format. ALICE stands for: Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate. Our top concern at Milnor is for everyone's safety. It is our goal to stay on top of the changes in how we protect our students and staff. We plan on having some drills and practicing what to do during lockdowns and natural disasters.

The NHA is a communication style that helps bring out the positive character traits in students, helping students to become the best version of who they really are. The focus is on noticing what students are doing right and giving positive energy and praises for making the right choices, while decreasing the negative energy given to inappropriate behaviors. With The Nurtured Heart Approach students feel more engaged during class because they hear their teachers honoring who they are and speaking about their greatness. When students are recognized for their success and positive choices they begin to crave even more recognition for doing the right things. With this new classroom environment students really want to be in class because they want to be a part of their own success. The Nurtured Heart Approach uses consistent rules, consistent consequences, and many positives. The NHA is used school-wide it changes what is happening in the classrooms, hallways, playground and cafeteria. The approach changes how students are greeted at the beginning and end of the day and how discipline concerns are processed. The approach taken as a whole brings positive changes to the culture and climate of a school. Other schools that have implemented the NHA have seen overall academic scores rise along with a decline in discipline issue. The Nurtured Heart Approach can make a positive difference in the lives of our adults, students and their families. The Nurtured Heart Approach also has a parent component for families that would like to find more success and who want to raise the bar from good to great parenting. Parents who learn The Nurtured Heart Approach say that it is a life-changing experience that helps to make family life more enjoyable. Plus, having a consistent system at home and school has proven to be beneficial. Classes in how to use the Nurtured Heart Approach will be offered this school year. 

The Rewards of Reading

The seeds for success in the classroom are sown at home. Encouraging children to read at home is one of the most powerful ways that parents can support students' learning. Just 15 minutes of reading at home per day can make a difference in students' reading fluency. Prioritize reading with these tips.

Always have books on hand. Keep a book in your bag

or your car's glove compartment so your child can read in the car, or while waiting in line at the grocery store. Make regular trips to the library, and keep an eye out for books at bargain sales or garage sales. Or, consider holding a "book swap" with neighbors and friends. For birthdays or holidays, give your child new reading material.

Keep it up. Find ways to encourage your child to pick up new reading material to read once one book is finished. For instance, introduce him or her to a series or ask your librarian for books by the same author. Draft a "to-read" list that your child can check off. Consider subscribing your child to a magazine for kids.

Focus on their interests. Encourage your child to check out books from the library that feature characters or topics he or she is interested in. Whether it's NASCAR to NASA, the topic doesn't matter (as long as it's age-appropriate), as long as your child is reading.

Read out loud together. Schedule time to read aloud together, taking turns to read passages. Invite your entire family to participate. Use different voices for different characters, or invite your child to make sound effects for the story.

Make it a routine. Consider how to make reading habitual. Your family could have a weekly read-aloud session, or you and your child could read each week before bed.

Be a patient listener. No matter how slowly your young learner reads, avoid finishing sentences for your child.

Gently correct mistakes, sound out words together, and let your child know you're proud.

Cut the distractions. During reading time, turn off or put away electronic devices. Make sure you follow the rule, too.

Ask questions. Ask your child about what he or she is reading in school or what you are reading together. Try open-ended questions such as, "Why do you think the character did that?," "What would you do if you were in that situation?," or "What do you think will happen next?"

Read beyond books. Invite your child to read menus, greeting cards, movie listings, newspaper comic strips, or directions to a destination. Word recognition is an important step for

reading fluency, so consider using strips of paper and tape to label everyday objects in your home to boost your child's familiarity with words.
