IMPORTANT 2014 TAX INFORMATION CONCERNING YOUR FORM 1098-T

(A) What's new?	What should you do?
We no longer mail form 1098-T. It is available for your viewing and printing on ECC WEB SERVICES. Your Form 1098-T for calendar year 2014 will be available online for your review and printing starting January 30, 2015. You have until March 16, 2015 to update your records name, Social Security # or Tax Identification # with the Enrollment Services Department, in order to ensure that a Form 1098-T is issued to you and then submitted to the IRS by the March 31, 2015 deadline. Do not wait for the above dates — update your accounts and records now. Please read this entire Notice for more details.	You can access, view and print the form 1098-T using your current Student ID and PIN as follows: Click onto Internet Explorer Type "webservices.essex.edu" in the browser address Click "Enter Secure Area" Enter Your Student ID and PIN Click "Student and Financial Aid" Click "Student Records" Click "Tax Notification" Enter Tax Year (i.e. 2014) Click "Submit" Be sure to follow the link to page 2 which has "Instructions to Students." NOTE> Never used Web Services? Your PIN is your date of birth (mm/dd/yy).
(B) Questions	And answers
What is a 1098-T?	Form 1098-T is a Tuition Payment Statement that colleges must issue to any student enrolled at the institution and for whom a reportable transaction is made, more specifically for qualified tuition and related expense made.
Why am I unable to access the 1098-T form?	 You received financial aid which covered your tuition bill after your payment was made – the refund received returns your out-of-pocket payment to you. OR You are a visa student who does not have a valid Social Security Number (SSN) or Tax Identification Number (TIN) on file. IRS regulations specify that the College is not required to issue a 1098-T in this situation, unless the student requests the form. OR You are a student whose SSN or TIN is not on file, or is incorrect in Enrollment Services.

I reviewed my 1098-T. The SSN or TIN is incorrect. My name is incorrect. What should I do?	Reporting to the IRS depends primarily on your SSN or TIN so it is important to have the correct information on file with the College. Your correct name is also a key element for reporting tax information. Follow these steps to have a corrected 1098-T: Please make corrections before or by March 16 th 2015. Bring your original Social Security card/s or TIN letter to Enrollment Services to correct your student record. If there is a complete SSN change you must present both cards. For name change provide documentation such as a marriage certificate. 1. After your records are updated in Enrollment Services, contact Ms. Maria Garcia at (973) 877-3021 to have our tax records updated. 2. After our tax information is updated you will be able to
	view and print your Form 1098-T on web services at www.essex.edu.
Is a copy of this form sent to the IRS?	Yes. Sec 6050S of the Internal Revenue Code requires institutions to file information returns with the IRS. For tax year 2014 the College is required to file form 1098-T with the IRS by March 31 st , 2015.
What am I supposed to do with the 1098-T form?	Keep it for your records. If you or your parents are required to file an income tax return for 2014, the information contained in the 1098-T will help you to determine if you or your parents may claim an education tax credit or deduction.
Can I get a copy of prior years' 1098-T?	Yes, if a 1098-T form was previously generated for you. Please follow login instructions above. Contact Maria Garcia in the Comptroller's Office at mgarcia@essex.edu or (973) 877-3021 for additional Information.
