TWENTY FIFTH ANNUAL CATCH AND RELEASE OUTING PLANS

It is again time already to begin plans and reservations for the OFF winter C&R festivities.

Although it is still summer, it is time to make your plans for our 25th annual Opening Weekend for Catch and Release trout fishing at Bennett Spring. This year the no-creel fishing begins at 8 AM Friday, November 11 and continues on Saturday and Sunday until 4 PM each day. Hard to believe this is our 25th year! (C&R fishing is open on Mondays also)

We have reserved a block of rooms for the weekend at Sand Spring Resort. The restaurant there is now called the Gravel Bar & Grill and will be open only for lunch and dinner on Friday and breakfast (8:00am), lunch and dinner on Sat. and Sunday. As many of you know Ollie's is now closed for good. Breakfast locations are now limited in the area. Our Sat. evening dinner will be held at the Bennett Springs Gathering place, just north of the park entrance (Gaston's old store). It has been converted to a banquet hall and should suit our needs. There will be much more room to move around in than we had at Ollies. We have secured a food source and drinks will be BYO, no bar. Coffee, tea, and lemonade will be furnished with dinner. We suggest carpooling as much as possible, but there is plenty of parking The road is dark and curvy so a designated driver is suggested, if needed. Attn. Thurs Nighters., if interested, we will meet at the meeting room at Sand Springs just to talk and get a chance to see who's there. NO POT LUCK dinner but will have soda and water.

The spring creek will be open for no-creel fishing, but limited to flies and artificial (no bait). Instead of the daily tag of summer, you need only to get a Trout Permit (\$7.00), good until February 2017, which are good at all four trout parks. You can get one anywhere Missouri licenses are sold. No daily tag is required.

Again, we are offering package plans for accommodations plus tickets to the private Club dinner. Types of accommodations and rates will be found in the reservation request elsewhere in this newsletter.

Remember, this is a club weekend, not just "the guys go fishing" at this one. Last year we had many couples. Plan to bring your special "person" even if he/she doesn't fish. There is fun to be had snooping in the antique shops and mall in Lebanon— and there are several nice lunch spots in town.

To avoid disappointment, mark your calendar for Nov. 10-12 and send in your check (required) now. Note: There are relatively few rooms with one bed. If you wish to fish on Mon. also you will have to make your reservation for Sun, night yourself. Due to problems with postal delivery last year, I will confirm receipt of your check by phone, post card or E-mail. Call Steve Antonic (314-401-8874) if you don't get confirmation of your check in a reasonable time.

We do understand how plans can change. If you have a problem, a full refund will be made if you cancel by Oct. 30. After that date, refunds will be made only if we can resell your room. Dinner reservations will be accepted until Nov. 1 when we have to guarantee a count to the restaurant.

Rooms will be reserved only as prepaid reservations are received. Please let us know early if you would like two or more rooms together for a group. Reservations will be confirmed early in November, advising you of your room number (phones in rooms). All sleeping rooms have a percolator, coffee cups and a small refrigerator. The housekeeping rooms have full size refrigerators, stove, utensils and plates, plus a dining table with 4 chairs.


Teaching My Nephew to Fly-Fish at Westover Farms



Fly of the month - August 2016

Andrew Grillo's Hippie Stomper



This time of year it's all about terrestrials. Mayflies are sparse at best; Caddis are not reliable:

And the summer heat brings out hopper, ants, beetles, and every other bug in the woods. I found this pattern on a trip to the Driftless Area of southwestern Wisconsin over Labor Day Weekend. The water was low and clear, and the fields were absolutely abuzz with insect life. The local fly shop proprietor recommended a number of terrestrial patterns, and I thought the name was as appealing as the fly. It floats well, sits flat on the water, has good visibility, and just looks buggy.

Hook: TMC 3761, 10-16 Thread: 6/0 or 8/0 Black Tail: Black Moose body hair

Overbody: 2 layers of foam, black 2mm on top, same color as underbody 1mm underneath

Body- Holographic Flashabou - Red, Chartreuse, Green, Purple...

Wing- White Floating Poly Yarn

Hackle-Grizzly

Legs- Barred Round Rubber Legs

Secure hook in vise, and lay down a tight thread base. Tie in moose body hair tail about equal to the hook length.

Cut two foam strips equal to or slightly wider than the hook gap. One will be the 2mm black over-body and one will be the 1mm colored underbody. To avoid creating a bulky tie-in cut the end of the strips into a point and then tie it in.

Tie in two strands of holographic Flashabou, doubled over your thread. Advance thread to midpoint of hook. Tightly wrap your Flashabou to the midpoint of the hook and tie off.

Pull your underbody foam forward and tie off at midpoint of hook. Put a tiny drop of superglue on the top of the underbody and then pull the overbody forward and tie off.

Advance thread to the end of the hook shank and tie off foam strips. Tie down the foam "thorax" and tie in poly yarn wing on top of front half of fly. Tie in hackle.

Tie in legs on either side of the hook shank. Stretching the rubber while tying in makes for a less bulky tie in.

Densely wrap your hackle forward and tie off. I like this fly to be very heavily hackled making this a buoyant fly.

Carefully pull the foam head and wing out of the way and tie off your thread at the eye of the hook. Glue the tie off. Trim the foam "head" so it's equal in length to the thorax.

Trim the rear portion of the wing so it's half the length of the foam over-body. Trim the front portion of the wing so it's a little bit longer than your hackle. Trim the legs so they're slightly shorter than the overall fly length.

Trim the underside of the hackle nearly flat on the bottom. This doesn't affect the fly's buoyancy and ensures that it will float upright on nearly every cast. Trimming the hackle also forces the fly to sit lower in the water, giving the fish a better look at their next meal. Apply a tiny drop of head cement to the Flashabou body, to make it more durable.

Fish this fly dead-drift with the occasional twitch. Don't be too timid about the delivery - Terrestrials tend to land with a plop often triggering reaction strikes. Try it in just about any color that Flashabou and foam come in. It was originally red, but we fished them in pink and chartreuse. It is also buoyant enough to fish as a dry-dropper rig.

Carpin' On the Fly

I have been intrigued by catching carp since I was a little kid, I even made my own "secret" dough bait. These things get big, so it was probably inevitable that I had to try my luck at Feather-Craft's annual carp trip to Beaver Island, MI. Where to begin? Wow! and Da-am!! come to mind. This trip was awesome in every respect and my expectations were GREATLY exceeded. First of all, Beaver Island is a cool place - has a nice little village with good food and coffee and super friendly folk. It's not tiny either being about 10 miles long.

The accommodations provided by Indigo Guide Service, The Fisherman House (www.carptrip.com), were absolutely first rate - "wife-approved" class The water will make you think you're in the Caribbean - super clear, blue, turquoise, green, seagulls - you get the picture.

You're fishing an entire chain of islands - not just Beaver Island, an archipelago - boundless options

These carp are huge. When they are breeding in the bays it sounds like a runaway washing machine. A cruising carp is not an easy thing to catch! They will take a fly IF you put it right on their nose. They frequently change both their direction and swimming depth it's a 3D target. They are also really sensitive to vibrations having 5 (count 'em 5!) lateral lines. A foot-shuffle in the boat and they are spooked - voice of experience here!

And then there is the wind and the need to make decent casts. However, after a while you get the hang of it and your line gets tight! The word that comes to mind to describe the take would be EXPLOSION. These things DO NOT like the feel of the steel and they let you know in a nanosecond. That first few seconds reminds me of watching a bull-rider immediately after the gate is opened. You WILL say non-church words and your guide WILL laugh and it is a ton of 'effin' fun!! You can also stalk them in the reeds and try to get one a close range. How was the fishing? I caught nine and most of you have seen me cast (i.e. no Brian Ellis here), so I can pretty much guarantee you're going to hook up with some serious fly fishing action.

The Indigo Guides, Kevin, Steve and Austin, were real pros and a pleasure to be with - very cool dudes. Super passionate too - think carp tattoos on their forearms.

Host Evan Muskopf from Feather-Craft was a lot of fun to be with too - great, great guy. Smart, pleasant, a delight to be around and an excellent fisherman.

The smallmouth? There are some really BIG smallmouth too. These are more than just a bonus to the carp main course - there were smallies were everywhere - attracted by the same warming sun in the shallow water. The picture below is, believe it or not, pretty typical. One of the people in our party caught one slightly over 6 pounds.

Bottom line - I HIGHLY recommend Feather-Craft's Carp Trip.

Fly Casting Tip August 2016

Double Haul – What does it do? Does it just increase the line speed? What does increasing the line speed do?

The haul does speed up the line. It also increase the bend in the rod and reduces, that every present enemy of casters, – slack.

Faster line speeds conserve energy throughout the fly cast. (This is why double hauling short cast is beneficial.) Double hauling leads to tighter loops, easier casting into a wind, and longer casts. It can also lead to more casting faults (especially tailing loops) if done incorrectly.

It is my opinion that before a caster should attempt to double haul they should be able to cast at least 40 feet of line with a *tight loop*. If you cannot cast 40 feet, *with a tight loop*, practice this first and your double haul will be much easier to learn.

When to haul? After you start to accelerate the rod and while the rod is still loaded. Do not forget to give line back to the cast or you cannot double haul. (Mel Kreiger's "down / up")

If you would like to learn more about double hauling come to the club's practice sessions before our monthly meetings.

A second tip this month – the limpcobra.com website. I found this site from a discussion thread of bamboo rod makers. Check it out, seems to have a lot of good thoughts on fly casting, fly tying, and fly fishing in General.

Fishing the Missouri and Columbia Rivers - Part 2 Continued from July Newsletter

During the month of May I also fished:

Current River & Montauk State Park and CFS Water Flow Measurements

There were poor conditions on the Current in May which averages 300 CFS but was running 500 CFS So I fished at a secret spot in the park – almost guaranteed to catch fish – not the hatchery! Ask me next time you see me.

Additional Information - CFS

CFS = **Cubic** Feet per **Second**

A cubic foot is like a box of water measuring one foot by one foot by one foot. The USGS defines cubic foot per second (cfs) as "the flow rate or discharge equal to one cubic foot of water per second

USGS Flow rates on line.

You can get real time flow rates of most streams by going to the site waterdata.usgs.gov/mo/nwis/current/?type=flow&group_key=county_cd

Either putting in the name of the stream or going to the list of Missouri counties in which the stream is located.

How to do a rough measure CFS – The Boy Scout Method

Get a rough measure of the average depth of the water and average the width of the stream. Then drop in a small stick or bobber and count how many seconds it takes to travel 20 feet.

EXAMPLE: 1 FOOT DEPTH X 20 FEET WIDTH TOOK 10 SECONDS TO GO THUS

1 X 20 FEET X 10 SECONDS = 200. 200 FEET DIVIDED BY 10 SECONDS = 20 CUBIC FEET PER SECOND.


