The Meadows Foundation Awards for the Charitable Schools Program

Believing that voluntary citizen action is one of America's fundamental strengths, The Meadows Foundation is in its 31st year of encouraging youth to improve the lives of others in their communities through volunteer and community service through its Charitable Schools Program.

The objectives of the program are: 1) To encourage and increase the number of students who give back to their communities through volunteer and community service; 2) To increase students' knowledge of their community by encouraging interaction with their beneficiaries – agencies or individuals; and 3) To develop leadership skills among students and maximize their knowledge of community needs by interaction with the service agencies and programs involved in meeting those needs.

Qualifying projects are planned and executed by students under the direction of a teacher sponsor and given a \$500 cash award (one award per school). The Charitable Schools Program allows students the opportunity to develop leadership skills as they expand their life experiences through interaction with citizens in their communities of different circumstances and backgrounds. Their hands-on approach allows them to view the struggles faced by those they seek to help while encouraging a sense of personal responsibility for the welfare of their beneficiaries – agencies or individuals.

Administration and operation of the Center for Community Cooperation, a conference facility for free-of-charge use by nonprofit, educational, and civic organizations that hold meetings and seminars designed to advance management/operational efficiencies of nonprofit agencies in North Texas. The Center serves over 35,000 persons each year. Also includes administration of the Executive Suites programs that houses up to 8 non-profit organizations on a rent free basis with shared office support. Included in this number are expenses supporting Preservation Dallas, a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of historic homes in the Dallas area.

The Wilson Historic District

In 1981, The Meadows Foundation began work on the acquisition and historic restoration of several turn-of-the-century Victorian homes in a deteriorated neighborhood near downtown Dallas.

The project was undertaken in an effort to adapt these structures for use as office space for nonprofit organizations. Subsequent phases of the project have resulted in the assemblage of 22 acres of surrounding property, the construction of new facilities, the renovation of existing buildings, the relocation and renovation of additional Victorian homes and additional site and streetscape improvements.

Today, 34 nonprofit agencies are provided rent-free office space, as well as management and technical assistance. Considered a benchmark for historic preservation and a model project in which to house nonprofit agencies, the first area to be restored within the Wilson Historic District, the Wilson Block has earned a listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

At the heart of the project was the vision to create a neighborhood of nonprofit agencies using rent-free office space to encourage collaboration and improved agency operations. Tenants pay their own electricity and telephone costs, while the Foundation pays for water and provides all maintenance, security, landscaping services and parking facilities at no cost to the tenant agencies. In place of rent, tenants agree to work to improve their management effectiveness and to develop cooperative programs with other nonprofit organizations. In part because of their participation in the project, the nonprofit agencies housed in the Wilson District continue to grow and expand their services.

In 2004, the Foundation renovated a 14,800 square-foot building within the District in which to relocate the Center for Nonprofit Management and create an executive office suite program. Here, up to 12 tenants have individual work stations with shared meeting facilities, a common reception area, and work rooms with code-entry copy, facsimile and postage equipment. Additional renovations were made to the Center for Community Cooperation to update and enlarge the rent-free conference facilities.

Grant Application Guidelines

The Meadows Foundation exists to assist people and institutions of Texas improve the quality and circumstance of life for themselves and future generations. Under the terms of its charter, the Foundation can distribute grants only to qualified public entities or 501(c)(3) charities serving the people of Texas. The Foundation does not lend or grant money to individuals.

Grants are made in five categories:

- Arts and Culture
- Civic and Public Affairs
- Health
- Human Services
- Education

Within these categories of giving, there are currently three initiatives, each with its individual strategic plan.

- Public Education
- Natural Environment
- Mental Health

The Foundation provides grants throughout the State of Texas but tries to allocate between one-third and one-half of its grant resources to organizations helping those in the Dallas area. Applications for specific programs or projects, capital projects and less often, for general operations, are considered Endowment and scholarship grants are rare. The Foundation also considers program-related investment loans as part of its grantmaking activities.

Requests of any amount are considered. There are no application deadlines. Grant applications are accepted at any time. Each organization is limited to one application within a twelve-month period. Applications are acknowledged within one week and are usually processed within three to four months.

No standard application form is required. Applicants may submit a proposal in their own format following the application guidelines set forth below. They also may use the downloadable application form or the online application form, which are available on the Foundation's site. Please note that the Foundation cannot guarantee the confidentiality of information contained in electronic submittals.

The Foundation looks for one or more of the following conditions in an application:

- Foundation support would be vital or catalytic to a proposed project's success
- The project is well planned and the agency has the capacity to execute the plan
- Financial support from other sources exists to ensure that the project will be implemented <u>and</u> continue after the grant period. It will expedite the review process if between one-third and one-half of the needed project funds have been secured before applying

Applicants seeking funding for construction and renovations should review the Foundation's Green Building Guidelines.
