What is the Lancashire and Greater Manchester Farmer Network?

The Lancashire and Greater Manchester Farmer Network is a new farmer-led Network that has grown out of the successful farmer groups that were established through the Northwest Livestock Programme.

The aim of the Network is to bring farmers together and support them in developing their knowledge and skills, enabling them to keep abreast of new developments in farming and improve the performance of their farming businesses.

How will it be run?

The Lancashire and Greater Manchester Farmer Network is led by farmers for farmers. The management committee is made up of two representatives from each of the existing farmer groups and a chairman elected from the group. The committee members will act on behalf of the groups they represent to develop a programme to meet the interests of the group.

Initially Myerscough College will support the Network by providing management and administration services and expertise in planning and organising a comprehensive programme of meetings delivered by industry specialists. This will include on-farm demonstration events, farm visits and training sessions.

The AGM will take place in the summer of 2014 and members of the Network will have the opportunity to elect the management committee and chairman.

At present the Lancashire and Greater Manchester Farmer Network is made up of six farmer groups: Blackburn and Darwen; Burnley and Pendle; North Lancs Beef and Sheep; Stockport; South Pennines; and the North West Pig Group. If there is not an existing group in your locality please let us know and if there is sufficient interest we will support new groups in an area to become established.

What will it deliver?

Each group will plan and deliver a programme of six meetings each year and membership will entitle you to attend meetings of other groups if you wish.

Any ideas for topics or speakers can be contributed through your group representative.

The benefit of groups working together in a Network allows access to industry specialists and cost-sharing between groups where possible. Myerscough College will act in a supporting role to provide links to the relevant industry specialists.

What does it cost?

Farm membership - costs £60+VAT per year and payment is due by the 31st September 2013. Membership covers up to two people from an individual farming business to attend meetings and one vote at the AGM.

Associate membership - non farming individuals may become members at the same cost of £60+VAT per year, but with no voting rights at the AGM.

The cost of the first meetings and of the services provided by Myerscough College will be subsidised by funding from Defra through the Rural Development Programme until the end of December 2013.
