The purpose of a peer observation is to provide you with the opportunity to learn from your colleagues. Peer observations allow you to learn more about content and classrooms in departments other than your own.

The chance to see inside another teacher's classroom to observe instructional techniques and different approaches can be very beneficial, and provide you with ideas and examples of ways in which you can extend your own skills.

To achieve the most benefit from a peer observation, the observation itself should be conducted thoughtfully, and you should reflect upon what was observed, and what can be learned.
