2. The first column of numbers shows how many times the *headword* is used. The *headword* is the word shown on the left. For example, the *headword* **a** is used a total of four times. The *headword* **be** is not used at all.

3. The second column of numbers shows how many times a *word family* is used. For example, **a** and **an** are used a a total of five times (which means **an** is used once) and the words in the *word family* **be** are used 14 times.
