WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO BE A STEPHEN MINISTER?

Okay, admit it. Stephen Ministry has crossed your mind a few times. You're wondering: Is this right for me? Following are some guidelines that might help your decision making.

Gifts

A Stephen Minister is a person with the gift of mercy, who shows compassion and gives encouragement to and intercedes for those he or she cares for. Many Stephen Ministers say that they receive much more from the caring relationship than they give.

Commitment

A Stephen Minister devotes time, energy, and resources to this ministry. In return, a Stephen Minister has the chance to participate in meaningful ministry, make a major difference in another person's life, and grow as a joyous child of God.

Training

A Stephen Minister completes 50 hours of training before ever meeting with a care receiver. He or she learns about listening, assertiveness, confidentiality, and many other aspects of caregiving. After completing the initial training, he or she engages in continuing education. Stephen Ministers find their relationships become richer and deeper at home, church, and work and with friends.

Dedicated Service

A Stephen Minister serves whole-heartedly. This isn't a casual ministry. It involves prayer, thought, consideration, study, and commitment. In return, the Stephen Minister receives grateful thanks from his or her care receiver, our Stephen Leaders, the congregation, and our Lord.

Accountability

A Stephen Minister is accountable to God, the congregation, the Stephen Leaders, the other Stephen Ministers, and the care receiver. In return, he or she receives support, encouragement, and guidance in Small Group Peer Supervision.

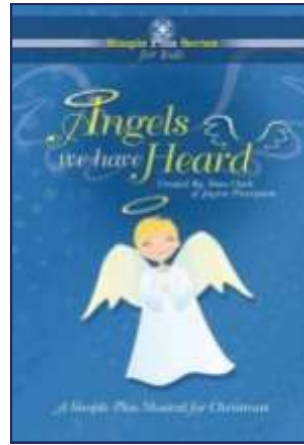
Continuous Learning

A Stephen Minister is open to adjusting and adapting his or her caregiving to fit the needs of the care receiver. He or she learns more about caregiving at each meeting with a care receiver and at each supervision session. Stephen Ministry is an experience of continuous learning, growth, and joy.

Happy New Year! This is a time of making New Years' resolutions and goal setting. Goals are great because they cause us to stretch and grow in ways that we never have before. Consider your health as you set goals.

Use the following tips for goal setting related to your health:

1. Evaluate and reflect - The only way we can reasonably decide what we want in the future and how we'll get there is to know where we are right now and what our current level of satisfaction is. Take time to think through and write down your current situation. Evaluate your health and where you are now so you can determine where you need to go. Take a couple of hours this week to evaluate and reflect.

2. Define your dreams and goal - What are your dreams and goals? What would you love to accomplish? Is your health on the right track to reach those dreams and goals? Write down your dreams. Prioritize those dreams and put them in the order in which you will actually try to attain them. Be sure to include health goals to make those dreams a reality.

3. Make your goals S.M.A.R.T. - The acronym S.M.A.R.T. means Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic and Time-sensitive. Use these guidelines in creating goals related to your health and dreams.

- **Specific:** Ambiguous goals produce ambiguous results. Incomplete goals produce incomplete futures. Be specific on what your goals are.
- **Measurable:** Always set goals that are measurable.
- **Attainable:** One of the detrimental things that many people do—with good intentions—is setting goals that are so high that they are unattainable. Make sure your goals are attainable.
- **Realistic/Relevant:** A goal has to be something that we can reasonably make “real” or a “reality” in our lives. There are some goals that are simply not realistic. You have to be able to say, even if it is a tremendously stretching goal, that yes, indeed, it is entirely realistic—that you could make it. You may even have to say that it will take x, y and z to do it, but if those happen, then it can be done. This is in no way to say it shouldn't be a big goal, but it must be realistic.
- **Time-based:** Every goal should have a timeframe attached to it. One of the powerful aspects of a great goal is that it has an end—a time in which you are shooting to accomplish it. As time goes by, you work on it because you don't want to get behind, and you work diligently because you want to meet the deadline for the goal. You may even have to break down a big goal into different parts of measurement and timeframes. Set smaller goals and work them out in their own time. A S.M.A.R.T. goal has a timeline.

4. Have accountability - When someone knows what your goals are, they hold you accountable by asking you to “give an account” of where you are in the process of achieving that goal. If a goal is set and only one person knows it, does it really have any power? A goal isn't as powerful if you don't have one or more people who can hold you accountable to it. Share your goals so you can be held accountable.

Evaluate and reflect on the past goals and dream big for the New Year. Your health is essential for reaching your dreams. Set new goals and strive for success.

The parsonage is nearing completion. Carpeting will be installed after the Sunday, December 20 open house.

Discussion Item:

The Gretchen Johnson Fund (currently a \$25,000 Church Extension Fund Certificate of Deposit) will be used for a humidifying system for the sanctuary.

Dear members of Our Redeemer,

Greetings from south central Texas! Virginia, Simeon, and I are happy and thankful to be in New Braunfels, Texas for vicarage. The pastor and members of Cross Lutheran Church have shown us kindness, and provided an excellent environment for learning and practicing pastoral skills. We continue to rejoice as we experience the love of Christ through our fellow Christians. I'd like to share a piece of a message I wrote for Cross' website that speaks to the connection we have in Christ:



Before we had met any of you, or even knew to what region of the country we were moving, we had everything in common in Christ: "There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call--one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all" (Eph 4:4-6). Many things can bring people together--common goals, interests, or ideas--but we share a unity that only Christ can pull off. When we eat Jesus' body and drink his blood in the Lord's Supper, we are physically united to Christ, and to all believers across time and space, as His body.

We thank God for the unity that we share with you, members of Our Redeemer, and for the love you have shown us with your prayers and financial support.

Summer was a rollercoaster, and we just got off the ride. A few days after the spring quarter ended, I flew with fellow students, pastors, and professors, to Israel for a two week intensive course on the geography of the Holy Land and its significance for preaching and teaching. Before the trip, we spent 30 hours studying maps. Then, during the trip, we visited many of the Biblical sites, read the applicable Biblical passages, discussed the geographical significance, and applied it to teaching and preaching. This was more helpful than I can express in words. I used to skip over names of places. Now they hold meaning and provide context for the Biblical events, and they reinforce the fact that God revealed himself to us in real historical events. I am excited to use my pictures and experiences to bring the text to life for my future parishioners.



While I was in Israel, Virginia and Simeon spent time with her parents in San Francisco. When I arrived back on U.S. soil I drove to Denver, where they joined me, and spent time with my family. From there we drove to San Francisco for more time with her family, then down to L.A. to visit my grandparents, and finally through Arizona and New Mexico to Texas! It was wonderful to see so much family.

After 4,000+ miles, Simeon was ready to get out of the car. He is almost eight months old now and crawling everywhere! Virginia enjoys staying home with him and participating in church activities such as hand bells, Bible studies, and LWML.

So far I've enjoyed the change from attending seminary classes to practicing pastoral activities. I preach once a month, lead liturgy when I'm not preaching, teach 7th Grade Confirmation and a Bible study that meets twice a month, and write for Cross' monthly newsletter. If you'd like to hear me preach, you can find my sermons from August 23rd, September 20th, and October 18th at crosslcms.org in the sermon archive.

Thank you again for your continued prayers and support. We thank God for you and keep you in our prayers. Blessings on your ministry.

Concordia Special School

The Concordia Special School has been in Macau for a number of years. It is a project of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod.

Initially, it was designed for deaf students. However, over the years the school has evolved into a facility for special needs students.

Every Friday morning there is a chapel service officiated by Pastor Michael Wu of the Concordia Lutheran Preaching Station.
