Nobscot Cabin Camping Trip Packing List (April 5, 2013 – April 7, 2013)

What to pack (Pack in a duffel bag or frame pack, it is your choice. You will carry your personal gear approximately ¼ mile up hill to the cabin):

No Electronics of any kind !! (Cells Phones, IPods, Laptops, etc..)

sleeping bag and small pillow (sleeping in a cabin with a woodstove on cot.). First night could be cold so you should bring a warm sleeping bag (at least 20° bag or bag with blanket or fleece liner bag) sleep clothes - (two sets one if its cool in the cabin, one if it gets warm) change of underwear (one for each day + a spare) socks (one for each day + two spares) pants (two pair) long sleeve shirts (at least two) short sleeve shirts (at least two, including a Troop T-shirt) fleece or Spring Coat (watch the weather reports! If cold weather bring both) personal toiletries (toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, wash cloth, small towel, etc...) hard sided eye glass case (obviously only for those who wear glasses) foot gear (wear boots and pack shoes, it can be muddy if there is no snow) a must !! slippers to wear in the cabin (optional) mess kit (cool whip bowl, cup, knife, fork and spoon are fine) laundry bag (small trash bag is perfect) Scout handbook Deck of cards/board game (talk with friends so we don't have six Monopoly games) Day Pack (this will go with you on the hike) Packed in day pack rain gear sweatshirt or fleece windbreaker (large enough to wear over your fleece or sweatshirt)

Pack by outfits or days in zip lock bags. Put your name on everything. Remember to arrive in Class A uniforms (no neckerchiefs) Eat supper at home on Friday night.

extra pair of socks

water bottle, filled at homeflashlight with extra batteries

Rules for the Road

The following are the basic safety and behavior rules for all trip participants:

<u>Fire</u> - Heat is by woodstove. The adult leaders will maintain the woodstove fires. Scouts will not poke the fire, add a log, or burn trash in the stoves. There is no reason for you to even open the woodstove door. Everyone is expected to help gather firewood. The woodstoves get very hot. Maintain a safe distance and do not dry anything (your wet clothes) on the woodstove or the flue (the pipe running into the chimney). Drying shoes or boots should be at least twelve inches away from the stove.

<u>Cooking & Food</u> - A duty roster has been prepared by each Patrol Leader and approved by the Senior Patrol Leader and the Scoutmaster. This roster shares cooking, cleaning, and other duties as fairly as possible. Patrol members will follow this roster. Any changes require SPL/Scoutmaster approval. The food purchased by your patrol is your patrol's food. It is shared equally only among patrol members. It should not be shared with a non-patrol member without Scoutmaster approval.

This is a guide to help you pack. Watch the weather reports and pack accordingly.
