

"Agribusiness Supply Chain Management"

Introduction:

To communicate and prolong the importance and potential intervention areas for developing an efficient and effective agribusiness supply chain management amongst the stakeholders of agro business, BIF Bangladesh in collaboration with the Market Development Forum (MDF), International Supply Chain Education Alliance (ISCEA), and Care Bangladesh organized a 2-day follow up workshop titled, 'Agribusiness Supply Chain Management'. The objective of the workshop were not only to build cross sector of partnership for sustainable supply chain management, creating consciousness about the effective supply chain process among NGOs & Private Sector but also formation of win-win partnerships between NGOs and Private sector that fulfill the needs, or address the problems among the stakeholders through a well articulated supply chain process.

Using the findings from this workshop, BIF Bangladesh will be able to identify needs of the effective supply chain process and how to solve it through inclusive business solutions. With the help of participating members from the development sector and NGOs, the workshop analyzed sustainable supply chain procedure and why should they work together to maintain a sustainable supply chain route and how effective their activities to triumph in the long run. BIF, ISCEA, Care and MDF brought resources that will help envisioning the future of supply chain progress along with IBs in Bangladesh: namely documentation on how collaboration between NGOs and private sector could happen, types of business partnering – the World Vision example serving as a context for explanation and inspiring examples of IBs and excellent partnership example between PS & NGOs.

The whole workshop was dynamic, fruitful. Resource persons toughly followed small group and, mass communication process to make the workshop more proactive. Participants were receptive and showed their interest and willingness to take part in initiating sustainable supply chain management projects, where poor and disadvantage people will be engaged through inclusive activity. The workshop attracted a host of participants from a variety of private business and development sectors, making discussions held varied and informed. This also made the data collected from feedback and impact evaluation forms highly qualitative.

Feedback Interpretation:

Those data taken from pre workshop and post workshop feedback form, participants indicate to have become much more aware of Agribusiness Supply Chain Management and the importance of NGO-Business partnerships for sustainability for both parties. A noteworthy achievement of this workshop was in battling one of the most crucial understanding about Inclusive Business; with regards to Question No. 2 of the Pre-Workshop Feedback Analysis, 60% of the participants defined it as, 'Doing business in a way that involves low — income people'. However, according to answers to Question No. 4 of the Post-Workshop Feedback Analysis, 93% participants said that they identified a pro-poor inclusive business or project idea that they will develop further after the workshop. Since a majority of the participants were from the private sector, their wish to engage more members from the NGOs to entrance BoP market is a promising sign of the beginning of a socially conscious cross-sectoral relationship to make effective supply chain management. Simultaneously, though, criticism has been made regarding more details on current agribusiness supply chain management and need to more concise focused on some issues related to supply chain, such concerns will be addressed duly in future workshops.
