There are different definitions of dialogue, but DDG defines it as a guided conversation where people from different backgrounds can speak from their own experiences in an exchange of ideas with others. This helps people find common ground with individuals they might not otherwise talk to, while also learning about their own identity. Unlike debate, dialoguers listen to understand, not to prove a point or convince others of our points of view. There is no emphasis on winning, but rather on learning, collaboration and on creating new and shared understanding.
