Historical and General Information

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General Description

The Institution Founded in 1889 by Presbyterians, the University of Pikeville is comprised of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), the Coleman College of Business (CCOB), and the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine (KYCOM). The CAS includes undergraduate degrees (with foundations of broad liberal arts and sciences education), while the CCOB includes undergraduate and graduate degrees (Master's). Both provide opportunities for students to develop to their full academic and personal potentials while preparing for specific careers. The KYCOM provides men and women with an osteopathic medical education that emphasizes primary care, encourages research, and promotes lifelong scholarly activity.

<u>Location</u> The University of Pikeville is located on approximately 25 acres in the city of Pikeville, a vibrant community in East Kentucky. Pikeville is one of the state's leading financial centers and has been ranked as one of the "100 Best Small Towns" in America.

<u>Academic Programs</u>
Students may choose, at the undergraduate level, from 3 associate degree programs and 26 baccalaureate degree programs; and at the graduate level, two master's programs and one professional program.

Calendar Semester

Faculty Almost two-thirds (64 percent) of the 69 undergraduate full-time faculty members hold doctorate or terminal degrees and the student-to-faculty ratio is 17:1. All of the 20 medical school full-time faculty have doctoral degrees.

<u>Students</u> Total enrollment is more than 2,200 students from 43 states (including Puerto Rico) and 17 countries, including approximately 1,750 undergraduate students, 40 master's students, and 425 medical students.

Annual Cost (2013-2014)

Undergraduate: \$17,750 for tuition and \$7,000 for room/board.

First Professional: \$38.950 for tuition.

Financial Aid All of the incoming freshmen and almost all (97 percent) of the full-time degree-seeking undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to cover the cost of attendance (e.g., scholarships, grants, work-study, loans, etc.).

University of Pikeville Statement of Mission

Commitment to Christian Tradition

The University of Pikeville, an independent institution with a self-perpetuating board of trustees, was founded by Presbyterians in 1889. The University stands as an opportunity for quality higher education in the heart of Appalachia. Maintaining its commitment to Christian principles, the University recognizes the infinite worth of each person, respecting and accepting a variety of religious expressions.

Commitment to Students

While the institution remains primarily committed to serving students from Appalachia, it encourages and welcomes students from all regions and cultural backgrounds. The University of Pikeville provides an opportunity for students to receive a quality education that focuses on the development of the whole person, including the intellectual, spiritual, social, and physical dimensions.

Commitment to Education

The University of Pikeville offers associate, baccalaureate, and graduate degree programs that prepare students for a variety of professions or careers. The undergraduate curriculum rests on a broad liberal arts foundation, emphasizing communicative and quantitative skills; independent thinking; tolerance of diverse points of view; cultural, historical, and ethical awareness; and preparation for leadership, civic responsibility, and lifelong learning. The Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine (KYCOM) provides graduate students with an osteopathic medical education that emphasizes primary care, encourages research, promotes lifelong scholarly activity, and produces graduates who are committed to serving the health care needs of communities in eastern Kentucky and other Appalachian regions.

Commitment to Community and Region

The University of Pikeville is committed to enhancing the educational, cultural, and economic opportunities for Appalachia through quality academic and continuing education programs as well as involvement in community service and humanitarian efforts.

University of Pikeville Institutional Goals

The University has set the following ten general goals for carrying out its mission:

- To maintain a sense of community which stresses ethical and moral values, fosters an appreciation for diversity, and provides an atmosphere that accepts and respects a variety of backgrounds and modes of religious expression within a Christian context.
- II. To offer each undergraduate student the opportunity to receive a liberal arts education, emphasizing the value of intellectual development through the promotion of independent and creative thinking as well as the development of basic communication and problem-solving skills.
- III. To assist each student in acquiring competence in a chosen professional or career-oriented field based on a broad liberal arts foundation which encourages lifelong learning.
- IV. To enhance each student's sense of self-worth, self-discipline, and personal integrity while developing social responsibility and leadership potential through a comprehensive co-curricular program.
- V. To provide each medical student the personal and professional skills necessary to improve health care services in the Appalachian region.
- VI. To maintain a community of high-quality faculty, staff, administrators, and trustees who are dedicated to meeting the individual needs of students and who promote a caring and supportive environment conducive to learning.
- VII. To provide necessary resources for a quality education through instructional materials, information technology, library and physical facilities.
- VIII. To promote the growth and development of the community at large by encouraging faculty, staff, students, and alumni to serve the community and by encouraging members of the community to serve the institution.
- IX. To maintain efficient and effective administrative services for institutional and educational support programs.
- X. To secure support from private, state, and federal sources to strengthen the institution's viability through sound fiscal policy.

History of the University of Pikeville

The University of Pikeville was established in 1889 as an outreach of the Presbyterian Church after an extensive survey of the religious and educational needs of Eastern Kentucky. An 1887 scouting party, which included Dr. W C. Condit, Rev. Samuel B. Alderson and Rev. James P. Hendrick, set forth, in Condit's words, to "select the location for an institution of higher learning for the youth of the mountains:"

September 16, 1889, was the first day of class at Pikeville Collegiate Institute, located in a four- room brick building situated on three acres of land in Pikeville, Ky. It functioned as both school and church. The institute was not originally intended to confer degrees, but to give "good practical education to those persons who pursue its courses." At that time, the institute offered schoolwork in primary, preparatory and "college" departments.

In 1909, the structure of the school changed and the articles of incorporation were amended to make Pikeville College a chartered college, empowered by the state of Kentucky to offer four years of college work and confer baccalaureate degrees. The school maintained its commitment to primary and secondary education in the region by sustaining the Pikeville Collegiate Academy for grades 1-12. Pikeville College admitted its first college freshman class in 1916. The final two years of college were added in 1955, and the first baccalaureate graduation was held in 1957, a year that also marked the closing of the Pikeville Collegiate Academy.

Pikeville College School of Osteopathic Medicine opened its doors on Sept. 8, 1997, as the 19th osteopathic medical school in the country. The school was the dream of Paintsville attorney G. Chad Perry III, a visionary whose generosity and perseverance paved the way for a new generation of doctors to provide primary care in medically underserved areas in Eastern Kentucky and Appalachia. On May 12, 2001, these medical students were the first at Pikeville College to receive the doctor of osteopathic medicine (D.O.) degree.

Effective August 1, 2010, the University of Pikeville campus became completely tobacco-free. The Pikeville College Board of Trustees authorized creation of the institution's first master's degree program, a Master of Business Administration (MBA), in February 2011. At that time, the board acknowledged that the college, by definition of the programs it offered, was a university. On July 1, 2011, Pikeville College officially became the University of Pikeville, also known as UPIKE.

The Coal Building, a \$34 million educational facility housing the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine, opened in fall 2012. As part of the plan for growth, the University was reorganized in fall 2013 into three colleges - the College of Arts and Sciences, the Coleman College of Business, and the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine (KYCOM).









Distribution of Headcount by Rank for Degree-Seeking Undergraduates












Annual Changes in Tuition Compared to Annual Changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI)













Total Enrollment Ethnic Minority Trends








