It is the mark of people who have demonstrated that they are people of character and who are devoted to a cause. People who strive for perfection while knowing that even the best is not enough. People that hold the welfare of others before self: Scouters who live up to all that name implies.

Awarded to a Scouter on the basis of what he or she thinks and is more than on what he or she knows, they must demonstrate that they have 'know-how' too. Good intentions count for little until, by the application of ability and determination, they produce results that count. Striving for perfection in themselves that they might train others better.

New Med Forms &

Deciding which version of the BSA's Annual Health and Medical Record you need shouldn't raise your blood pressure. And starting today, you're getting a streamlined version of the BSA health forms and an easier-to-use website to accompany them. The site is the result of several BSA teams (professionals and volunteers) joining forces to make this process a painless one for you and other Scouters.



The Annual Health and Medical Record (hereafter AHMR) comes in several flavors, and until now some Scouters and parents found it a little difficult to determine which version of the AHMR they or their Scout/ Venturer needed.

Taking your Cub Scouts on a local tour or your Boy Scouts on a two-night camping trip? The forms you'll need are different from those required on a camping trip lasting more than 72 hours.

Visiting the Florida Sea Base, Northern Tier, Philmont or the Summit? Be sure to print off some additional information to give your doctor.

It's all spelled out for you on the new site. Figuring out which forms you need is a snap thanks to logos, clear language and so-big-you-can't-miss-'em buttons you'll click to download the proper form. Speaking of, you'll know you're using the right form if it says "2014 Printing" in the lower right corner.

Spring Camporee & Merit Badge U හ

Merit Badge University is just around the corner now, so if your scouts are interested, please sign up right away! The registration form is attached to this newsletter. It's a totally different format than in years past. We are combining several events into one. We are doing our Merit Badge University during our Spring Camporee in Black Creek Park. We will have 10 merit badges, 2 of which are Eagle required. Since this is outdoors, all Scouts are asked to bring their own merit badge book and printed copy of the MB handout for the course that they are taking. Essential details:

Date: April 25-27

Place: Mendon Ponds Park (note the change in location!)

Cost: \$10 (there are no price changes based on registration time or duration of stay)

Merit Badges: Most merit badges are being offered twice, once Saturday morning and once Saturday afternoon. Scouts should sign up for only one session. First Aid and Forestry merit badges require both the morning and afternoon session. Scouts must provide their own blue cards! Partials will be given where work is not complete to the satisfaction of the merit badge counselor. CPR is available to Scouts taking First Aid Merit Badge for an additional \$5. Bring cash to the event and be prepared to pay for this additional certification on site. Units should prepare alternate programming for Scouts who are not taking merit badges.

Order of the Arrow: Units should make every effort to ensure Scouts elected into the OA are present for the evening call-out ceremony. This ceremony is the crucial beginning of a series of activities a Scout participates in as they become members of Scouting's Honor Society.

Campfire: Units will be called upon to contribute a skit, song, or other element to Saturday evening's campfire.

WINK MURDER

Equipment - none

Method - Sit the Scouts down in a circle and take one Scout out. He is the detective and must go out of the room or hide his eyes while the Leader gets all the Scouts to close their eyes as he walks round the ring and silently taps three Scouts on the shoul-



der. These are the murderers and no one must know who they are to start with. The detective comes back and stands in the ring. Everyone must watch each other carefully as the murderers must wink at other boys to murder them, without the detective seeing him wink. Any non-murderer who is winked at must die and lie down dead. The detective has three guesses to work out who is doing the winking, the winker is the next detective. **Tips-** The odds and difficulty can be changed by having only one or two murderers. You can use this as a chance to involve new or shy Scouts into some of the action. If you want a really quiet time then Scouts must die quietly, but part of the fun is with the blood curdling screams that accompany each dramatic death. This game can seriously alarm passing parents or visitors.

Scouting for Food and Clothing 80

This year's Scouting for Food and Clothing Drive is another one for the history books. Even though the weather was a little on the cold side, Saturday morning of the collection spirits were high as Scouts and Scouters went door to door collecting bags of clothing, and nonperishable food products. Here are the totals for the Black Creek District:

3/15 Drop Off Participation: 289 Youth and 172 Adults.3/22 Pick Up Participation: 273 Youth and 149 Adults.Total Boxes of Food Collected: 474

Tops Food Markets: (Note, these are not included in numbers above.) Jefferson Road: 6 Youth and 4 Adults, 12 banana boxes of food Buffalo Road: 6 Youth and 4 Adults, 19 banana boxes of food



This represents 15 Cub Packs, 20 Boy Scout Troops, and 20 Girl Scout Troops within the Black Creek District. The total collection was up this year by 13% from last year, and I can assure you that the food agencies are thankful for everything they received. detachment from work, learning experiences, and well-being at work. There was a positive relationship between their scores in all those areas and the amount of time spent volunteering. In addition, participants who felt their needs were being met reported improvements in active listening at work the following day. The researchers say volunteering can benefit the workplace by helping people disengage from their work and satisfying needs that aren't met there - like mastering new skills and relating to people socially.



SCOUT DAY AT THE MUSEUM

Genesee Country Village & Museum in Mumford NY will celebrate Armed Forces Day on Saturday, May 17, 2014 with Military Heritage Day—a showcase of the importance of the military in the lives of Western New Yorkers since before the Revolution. The focus this year will be demonstrating how military technology has evolved over the decades. Reenactors and exhibitors will represent the French & Indian War, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Civil War, Spanish-American War and World War II.


