Jake and Kelly Go To Doggie Day Care Try It...You'll LIKE It!

Well, Mom was a wreck and the kids had a blast! We had heard about doggie day care centers popping up in Northern Virginia but one had not yet come to Fair Oaks, until now. Kelly, Jake and I went to Petsmart's new PETsHOTEL and Day Care Center this fall. I'm lucky enough to work from a home-based business but wanted Jake and Kelly to indulge in this guilty pleasure once or twice a week for fun and exercise especially with the winter months coming.

As I said, dropping the kids off for the first time was a bit nerve-racking. Petsmart allows you to view the play area through a closed-circuit TV. But you can't go in the back. So I stood there for about 15 minutes trying to catch a glimpse of my kids. Initially, most dogs are shy and feel a little overwhelmed. Eventually they get into the swing of it all and have loads of

fun. It's \$20 per dog per full day. Petsmart doesn't offer ½ day care. They do offer specialty treats during break or nap time which is a

nice touch-but it's extra. They also give you a "Pawgress Report" which I thought was cute. You can even CALL and speak to your dog in the middle of the day if you're experiencing some separation anxiety – believe it. I liked Petsmart and the friendly atmosphere; my only concern was too many dogs in one play time area. They put up to 17 dogs in about 200-300 sq. feet of space. I thought that was a bit crowded.

So I tried Dog Days Play Care in Chantilly. Like Petsmart, Dog Days offers daycare, boarding, grooming and training. It's individually owned with a mandatory interview that costs \$15. Even though it costs a bit more (daycare is \$32 vs. \$20) personally, I preferred Dog Days. It was more personalized attention with fewer dogs to the play area. Up to 12 are permitted in the area where 17 were in the same approximate area at Petsmart. Dog Days offers half

day dog care so Mom purchased a package of 10 for Kelly and Jake – this gives dogs up to 5 hours of play time which is perfect for my 5 and 6 year

Letter From The President

It is the start of another year for GRREAT! I am humbled by those of you who in 2005 selflessly dedicated your time and resources to help GRREAT and Golden Retrievers in need. You have opened your homes, and hearts to help give Golden Retrievers a chance at a better life. You did this because of a passion and a desire to make a difference.

In 2005 you made difference for nearly 300 Golden Retrievers. Let me tell you about five of them.

I will start with Scout. He is now nearly 14 years old, and first came into GRREAT in 1994. He was returned to the rescue this summer when his family relocated to California, and felt that the move would be to much for him.

The next is Tucker. Found in a field, he didn't even get up when the animal warden came to take him to the shelter. Estimated to be between 11-13 years of age, with arthritis and other health issues, like Scout he will spend his remaining days in his foster home.

Another is Paige. Given to GRREAT because a child in the family had cancer, they were unable to provide Paige with the home and attention that she needed.

Tigger is another one that comes to mind, and brings a smile to my face. He is a "tigger" in every sense of the word! He needed bilateral hip surgery, and because of you, GRREAT was able to provide that for him, giving him the pain free and active life that all tiggers should have!

Another is a senior boy who is about ten years old and named Charlie. He was left in the parking lot of a shelter by his previous owner because they were full, and were unable to take him that day. The shelter contacted GRREAT, and he came into the rescue.

These are only five Golden Retrievers that came into GRREAT in 2005. Despite their stories being so different, each had one thing in common; they all needed GRREAT to be there for them. I am thankful that GRREAT was and is here for them. I am most thankful that for a time, they became part of our household in 2005.

I feel that being part of a rescue organization such as GRREAT embraces a respect for life. To be a part of it means sacrifice, sharing and caring enough to step outside ourselves to help a Golden Retriever in need. It involves compassion and tenderness, time and hard work. It is rewarding work. And unfortunately it can be sad and heartbreaking work. Yet knowing all of this we continue to work and strive to make a difference because we care about Golden Retrievers. So, to all of you who have changed lives in 2005, your Golden friends and I thank you! From all of the Golden Retrievers whose lives you will change in 2006, the Goldens and I thank you for that too!

old dogs. (Prices come down a bit with package purchase.) Visit www.dogdaysplaycare. com to learn more.

I'm so happy to have found one of these day dog day care centers in my area. They appear to be springing up everywhere. I heard that Happy Tails in Tysons is now franchising their practice in various parts of Northern Virginia. Doggie day care is here to stay – it obviously benefits boarding facilities by generating more revenue for this service, and it's especially



attractive for active pets during the winter months. Just drop them off anytime in the AM and pick them up later on in the day (they're usually open from about 7am to 8pm.) You can find more info on doggie daycare in your area by viewing www. setia.com – or search Google for dog day care or boarding. The main requirement for doggie day care is that your golden does not have aggressive tendencies toward other dogs and you need to prove all vaccinations to the doggie daycare of your choice. Try it, you'll like it! Jake and Kelly sure do!

A Breed Apart: Spotlight on a GRREAT Volunteer GRREAT Transport Extraordinaire, Bill Price

"The soul of a Golden." That is how GRREAT Transport Volunteer Bill Price described to me his impression of many of the mixed-breed and purebred Goldens that he has transported from shelters over the years. The phrase prompted me to consider its description—what exactly are the attributes that define a "soul of a Golden?" Warmth, compassion, unconditional love, generosity of spirit, delight in the essence of living...well, these would be my barometers. Though I believe everyone would have their own personal criteria, I don't believe anyone would argue that Bill Price, for the tireless, philanthropic contributions he makes to GRREAT and the world beyond, has "a soul of a Golden" towards the Goldens in his life, and a wellearned recognition by his peers as a "Breed Apart!"

As a Transport Volunteer for GRREAT for the past 5+ years, Bill is responsible for transferring GRREAT's Golden Retrievers distances far and wide; in fact, he is the one often called upon for the rescue assignments requiring more considerable travel, and has often made roundtrip transports that clocked in at 5 to 6 hours (sometimes as long as 8-10 hours). Bill takes this responsibility seriously, with a newly-purchased 2005 Grand Cherokee "dogmobile" [fresh off the lot as of our conversation], including a special transport crate, and a ramp for the less-mobile Goldens. Most of his passengers are described as "very personable" by Bill, particularly one "soul of a Golden" mix, Josh (renamed Joey), whose

transport was made all the more remarkable by Joey's rapid deterioration from lively, at transport beginning, to deathly ill, by transport end. Joey was diagnosed and treated for the fatal Parvo virus. Thankfully, he pulled through, and when Joey was feeling better, Bill took him back to his home for a few days pending a foster home arrangement, where, with newfound health and vigor, Joey exercised his barking cords in the middle of the night. Bill took Josh on a "please be quiet" transport around the neighborhood, ending back at home with his hand on a sleeping Joey in the passenger seat. Bill, not to be limited to just transporting Goldens in his vehicle, settled into the driver's side for his own slumber, his hand never leaving Joey's body.

Beyond GRREAT, Bill is also a proud Freemason and a Shriner, the latter being the largest philanthropy organization in the world. The Shriners support 22 children's hospitals for treating childrens orthopedic needs and burned children. One day about 6 years ago, while on a tour of a Shriner hospital, Bill turned his attention towards therapy



dogs and their handlers at work across the hall. He promptly left the tour to investigate, and since then, Bill has been passionately involved in dog therapy, particularly with the Fairfax Pets on Wheels, where he is on the Board and is responsible for new member orientation and temperament testing. Bill's own two Goldens, Casey and Cody, are therapy dogs registered through Therapy Dog International, and frequently visit nursing homes and the pediatric oncology wing of Fairfax Hospital to make a difference in the lives of both sick children and the elderly. Next month, Bill's work with therapy dogs will take him to Baton Rouge through Hope AACR (Animal Assistance Crisis Response) to help the survivors of Hurricane Katrina.

Bill has remarkable energy and creativity, and is very succinct in his contribution of ideas and encouragement towards GRREAT. Bill is interested in writing an article for the GRREAT News about his experience with therapy dogs, and hopes that GRREAT will continue to find innovative ways to educate the Goldenloving community about the time/money/energy volunteer commitments much needed and appreciated. His compassion and commitment to both rescuing Goldens, and teaming with them to recover and enliven human spirits through canine therapy, allow Bill to make outstanding and effective contributions to GRREAT. GRREAT is so proud to spotlight Bill Price as "a breed apart!"

Tribute to Harley Bonnie Tester-Myers

On October 20, 2005 we showed our beloved GRREAT Golden, Harley (93-180), how much we loved him by letting him cross the Rainbow Bridge. He is now pain free, frolicking around with his other friends who've gone before him and now his is with my Dad. This was by far the most difficult of decisions to make but as those who knew him know he was barely able to walk, was falling often and had other health issues.

As part of my own healing, I'd like to share with you a little story about Harley's life with our family.

I got Harley from a friend who was going thru a difficult divorce and needed to find Harley a home. She and her husband had originally adopted Harley from GRREAT (Golden Retriever Rescue Education and Training).

Since my Dad had recently lost his toy Fox Terrier, Jake, I thought that perhaps Harley would make a wonderful companion for Dad. So, having only seen a picture of Harley, I decided to go ahead and pick him up from Elaine and take him to Dad. I'll never forget bringing him home. Dad and a friend were sitting on the front porch and I was late getting somewhere so I basically said "Here is Harley, here is his food, here is his leash, I gotta go.... and off I went". By the time I returned, Harley and Dad were best buds. Dad had trimmed his whiskers and eyebrows because as he put it "they were bothering Harley". From that very moment until Dad passed away, he and Harley were inseparable. Where ever Dad was, Harley was with him. Harley was by far, one of the best things that happened to Dad in his later years while he was suffering with Parkinson's disease. Dad loved Harley and Harley loved Dad.

After Dad passed away in February 2000, my husband George and I kept Harley. And, every place we went (most times) Harley was with us. He loved to be with us. I'd put a bandana around his neck and he would jump into the van and off we'd go. It didn't matter that he

might have to stay in the van while we were doing whatever, he didn't care as long as he was with us. We loved Harley and Harley loved us.

In early 2001, my sister JoAnn Adkins and her husband Roger decided to get a dog and set off to do so at the GRREAT adoption day in Columbia. I brought Harley along and sure enough JoAnn had quickly and enthusiastically picked out Bo and Harley showed his agreement by sitting right next to Bo, not leaving his side. Bo and Harley spent lots of time together at JoAnn and Roger's house and although Bo tried and tried to get Harley to play, Harley never really did. And Bo understood. (Although there were rare occasions when we would catch Harley with a toy!) Bo loved Harley and Harley loved Bo.

Then in the Fall of 2001, while surfing the GRREAT website, I found Tina and had to have her. She was an older Golden, actually older than Harley, but she had such a sweet and endearing face that resembled Harley, I just knew I had to give her a home. Tina came to live with us and at first Harley seemed miffed knowing he'd have to share us with her. In time, Harley and Tina became best friends as was evident when Tina had to have surgery. We brought her home after her surgery and that night, he laid next to her, placing his front paw upon her to comfort her while she was healing. Then, suddenly on March 20th, 2003 Tina passed away. We had woke up to find her unable to stand, rushed her to the emergency vet only to find out that she suffered from hemangiosarcoma, a deadly cancer and there was no hope. Harley went with us to help Tina cross the rainbow bridge and like he had done when she was healing from her surgery, Harley lay next to Tina to say goodbye. Tina loved Harley and Harley loved Tina.

Since Tina's passing, we have devoted our time and our love just to Harley. In the past year or so he began to show signs of arthritis and general weakening. He was put on medication which helped for a very long time. More recently, it had become more and more difficult for him to walk. Harley used to sleep with us and eagerly would jump up on our bed or into the van to go for rides with us. As he started to fail, we even lowered our bed, putting the box springs/mattress right on the floor but in time he couldn't even step up on the bed. So he'd sleep on the floor in his own bed right next to us.

Harley touched and changed many people's lives in his 13½ years of life. He will never ever be forgotten, that is for sure.

Some other facts about Harley:

- Harley was very very afraid of thunderstorms and would try his best to get into the walls in order to get away from the storms.
- Harley loved to go everywhere! Just put a bandana around his neck and he was ready to go.

- Harley never met a stranger, he loved everyone he met. Anyone that met Harley, even if it was only one time, had to love him.
- He loved to lean. He'd lean on you as long as you'd pet him. If you stopped the petting, he'd give you his paw to ask you to pet him some more or he'd rest is head in the palm of your hand to say "Thank you".
- Harley loved Cheese-Its crackers and had nightly rituals eating them with George.
- Harley loved his treats and would let you know where they were. He always got a treat upon returning to the house after doing his business outside. He'd point with his nose to the treat container just in case you didn't know where the treats were located.
- Harley would ring the bells at the kitchen door to let us know he needed to go out.
- Harley was sweet.
- Harley was a gentle dog.
- Harley was smart.

We loved Harley and Harley loved us. When God created him, He threw away the mold. Harley will be missed terribly, but we are all better off for having him touch our lives.

One day we too will cross the rainbow bridge and along with Tina, our beloved Harley will be there to greet us.

Dog Food Recipes

The article in the last newsletter about GRREAT dog Jake and his natural diet for allergies prompted a number of inquiries from the readership about home-prepared meals. For those of you who are interested in a healthy, homemade meal for your dog, I would like to share a few recipes. Keep in mind that a variety of fresh foods are important for good nutrition.

Before changing your dog's diet, schedule a complete physical, including blood work, to determine his overall health. Regular physicals and blood work should then be scheduled to be sure all of his nutritional needs are being met and all of his organs are working properly. Different dogs have different dietary needs and your veterinarian should be consulted for your dog's individual nutritional requirements.

RAW DIET FOR A 50 POUND DOG

From Natural Nutrition for Dogs and Cats, The Ultimate Diet by Kymythy R. Schultze

Raw meat: 3/4 to 1 cup muscle meat (plus organ meat

or egg

Raw bone: 1 turkey neck or 6 chicken necks

Veggies: 3 tablespoons pulped Kelp/Alfalfa: 2 teaspoons Cod Liver Oil: 1 teaspoon Essential Fatty Acids: 2 teaspoons

Vitamin C: up to 3,000 to 6,000 mg

For those who prefer the simplicity of a pre-mix:

Home prepared meal for a 25-50 pound dog

1 cup Sojourner Farms European Style Dog Food Mix ½ cup meat – lightly cooked or raw

1 ½ cups water

Mix ingredients and place in refrigerator for at least 15 min-

BEEF MEAT AND RICE DIET

1/3 pound very lean beef (raw weight), cooked

2 cups rice, long-grain, cooked

Combine all above ingredients. Add water to cover ingredients, simmer, stir, and add more water as needed until cooked. Should be thick enough to be molded into patties. Add sprinkling of raw, grated carrots, raw yams or alfalfa sprouts.

Ask Goldie Your Questions Answered

I would love to take my Golden for a walk – but instead, the dog takes me. When we're headed down the street, she pulls me as though she is a sled dog. How can I take control of the walking so that I don't feel that a walk around the block with my dog is a training session for the Iditarod?

Dear Non-Musher:

A Golden Retriever's exuberance and joy in living are two of the loveliest attributes in this breed – unless you want to take a leisurely walk with an untrained, unrestrained Golden. At such times, the Golden is likely to exhibit his enthusiasm in such unappreciated behaviors as pulling you down the street. And, unlike smaller dogs, you can't count on brute strength to restrain your Golden buddy. You can, however, deal with your Golden's walking issues in the following ways:

Get the right collar. The right collar, such as a plain fabric or leather collar that either buckles or snaps, can help a dog learn to walk more politely without causing the animal any discomfort. The collar should be snug enough to not slip over your dog's head, but not so tight that it is uncomfortable for the dog. Don't use a choke chain or prong collar – they are rarely effective and can cause injury to the dog.

Get the right leash. A six-foot leather leash is your best option. Leather is more expensive than nylon, but leather is much easier on the hands – an important consideration if you are dealing with a puller. Don't use a retractable leash – the spooling action of such leashes actually encourages the dog to pull.

Bring an attention-getter. For your dog to walk nicely on the leash, he must be willing to ignore some significant distractions, such as squirrels and moving cars. The best way to counter such distractions is to shift your dog's attention to you. Tasty treats are one way to do that. Plenty of praise helps, too.

Assume the position. Place your leashed Golden on your left side, and loop the leash around your right-hand wrist. Grasp the leash just below the loop with your right hand, and also hold the leash a little lower down with your left hand.

Get moving. Start by walking just a few steps, and then asking your dog to sit. If he complies, reward with a tasty treat and lots of praise. After repeating this sequence at least a few times, your dog is likely to start sitting automatically when you stop. At this point, gradually increase the number of steps between stops until the two of you are strolling along nicely for at least for 20 to 30 steps. Slip him a treat every now and then for continued good walking manners, and provide lots of praise.

Change direction. If your dog suddenly catches sight of a squirrel or other distraction and pulls the full length of the leash, quickly turn and walk in the opposite direction. Your dog will be forced to divert his attention from the distraction back to you. Another strategy: stop completely, and don't resume your walk until the dog has stopped pulling.

Use his head. If your dog is a really stubborn puller, try using a head halter such as a Gentle Leader or Halti. This device consists of a loop of nylon webbing that encircles a dog's nose and a strap that goes behind the neck. Although it looks like a muzzle, it functions the same way a horse's bridle does. Another option is the Easy Walk Harness, made by the same company that manufactures the Gentle Leader.

VOTING ELIGIBILITY

It's rarely during regular vet working hours, but invariably on a Sunday or late at night. And, if you are anything like me, I panic because I can't find the phone number!

Below is a chart you can cut out and keep by your phone of some of the emergency clinics in the GRREAT area. It is also a good idea to actually drive to the emergency vet before you need to use it. Trying to find a vet you've never visited, and possibly driving on unfamiliar roads in the dark, can make a situation where you are already upset because your best friend is sick even more stressful. Make sure to call the clinic to let them know you are coming (and check that they are still at the same address.)
