## School Goals

Literacy Goal: All staff will use small group instruction (guided reading), co-created anchor charts/ rubrics and explicit feedback/ instruction (3 questions) so that $56 \%$ of students will move up one level and $44 \%$ of students will move within a level for reading for meaning as measured by May 31 , 2011
Numeracy Goal: All Primary, Junior and Intermediate teachers will use Supporting Understanding in Mathematics (SUM) teaching strategies so students can more effectively solve a mathematics problem and justify / explain their thinking by June 2011

## How to Encourage Mathematical Literacy

## Mathematics is Everywhere

Mathematics no longer takes place only in the classroom. Mathematics is everywhere. To reach their full potential in the twenty-first century students need to have an understanding of mathematics.


Mathematics skills are for everyday life. Mathematical skills required to function in today's world include the ability to:

- set up problem
- use a variety of techniques to solve problems
- work with others to solve problems
- apply mathematical concepts to complex problems.


## What is Mathematical Literacy

Mathematical literacy involves more than executing procedures. It implies a knowledge base and the competence and confidence to apply this knowledge in the practical world. A mathematically literate person can estimate, interpret data, solve day-to-day problems, reason in numerical, graphical, and geometric situations, and communicate using mathematics.
Mathematical literacy is necessary both at work and in daily life. It is one of the keys to functioning in a changing society. At home, provide opportunities for your child to make every day life connections as you share with them your mathematical experiences. Tell them about your banking, household budgeting, expenses, utility bills, and grocery costs. Children need to hear what they'll be required to know in their adult lives. Here are a few additional activities that will support mathematical literacy:

- Simple board and card games develop logic and number sense.
- Make and do puzzles (2D, 3D, crossword, word) can be used to practise patterns and vocabulary and to develop spatial sense
- Make a budget, estimate the cost while shopping, watch for fluctuating gas prices. Children who see every day life connections develop an interest in math. They will want to run their households successfully as adults.
- Practise with fractions and measurement while cooking and baking.
- Home renovations and construction often require measurement and geometry knowledge and skills learned in mathematics classes.
- Take a minute to reflect on the math you do automatically. This information can be shared with your children.

Between May 30 and June 30, our school child will be taking part in the provincial Assessment of Reading, Writing and Mathematics, Primary Division (Grades 1-3). This assessment is administered to all Grade 3 students in Ontario's publicly funded school system by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO), an independent agency of the Government of Ontario.
EQAO assessment questions are directly based on the expectations set out in The Ontario Curriculum, which is what teachers teach in the classroom every day.
We use this EQAO data as a school community, along with other information, to guide our school improvement initiatives for reading, writing and mathematics. This benefits not only your child but all the students in our school. The results are also used by our school board and the Ministry of Education to direct attention and resources where they are needed.

A note from the heart and stroke foundation:
Thank you for your child's participation in the Jump Rope for Heart program. We very much appreciate your support. As a health charity, the Heart and Stroke Foundation's overarching priority is the health of Canadians.
You might be aware that Health Canada recently amended Schedule I of the Hazardous Products Act regarding phthalates. Phthalates are a family of chemicals commonly used as plasticizers that have a large number of industrial and commercial applications. Phthalates are added to vinyl plastic to make it both soft and flexible. Jump Rope for Heart program prize levels $1,4,5$ and 6 do not meet these new Health Canada standards. Although the new regulations only come into effect this June, the Heart and Stroke Foundation has decided to remove the impacted items without delay. In an effort to minimize the inconvenience to parents, we intend to ship to schools all Jump Rope for Health program prizes when we receive the replacement items.
We apologize for the disappointment and inconvenience this causes our young fundraisers and you. We are making every effort to replace the impacted prizes with similar items before the end of the school year.

## PLANNING TODAY TO ENERGIZE EDUCATION TOMORROW

During the 2009/10 school year, the DSBN engaged in a system-wide review of our school buildings which enabled trustees to gain an overview of how our facilities are being used, and to identify potential areas for growth and revitalization in the future.

The majority of school boards throughout Ontario are facing the challenge of declining enrolment because of changing demographics. Parents are having fewer children later in life, which reduces the number of students starting Kindergarten each year.

One way school boards can address the issues of declining enrolment and aging facilities is through accommodation reviews. Through this process, education can be rejuvenated by building some new schools, consolidating some schools, renovating some schools and closing some schools.
At their most recent meeting, Trustees passed a Facilities Planning report which examines how to provide optimal learning spaces for students by initiating three phases of accommodation reviews beginning in September, 2011. Phase one accommodation reviews will undertake an in-depth study of central and south St. Catharines and Thorold secondary schools as well as elementary schools in Fort Erie.
Over the coming months, Board staff will begin to assemble an Accommodation Review Committee (ARC) for the two reviews. Each committee will undertake an in-depth study of the school planning areas and provide recommendations that will help guide Trustees in their decision making. Each ARC will include a business community member and/or a municipal representative, parents, a trustee, and DSBN staff. All ARC meetings will be open to the public, and the public will also have an opportunity to provide feedback during specially scheduled public meetings.

Moving forward, our goal is to continue serving students with excellent programs. The accommodation review process will ensure that funding is spent on enriching the educational opportunities for students

## Do You Have A Child Between The Ages of 4 and $6 ?$

If so, please take a moment to ensure that your child's immunizations are up-to-date and that he/she has received:
a booster dose of diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus and polio (DPTP/Quadracel) between the ages of 4 and 6; and, a second dose of the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine.

If your child has not yet received these vaccines, your child can be immunized for free at one of our Public Health Immunization clinics. Please call 905-688-8248 or 1-888-505-6074 ext. 7425 for more information and/or to schedule an appointment. You can also call your child's doctor to make an immunization appointment or visit a local walk -in clinic. If you are a parent/guardian not wishing to immunize your child, you can submit to us a notarized Statement of Conscience/Religious Belief Affidavit.

Niagara Region Public Health is required by law to have an Immunization Record on file for every child attending a school in the Niagara region. The importance of having this information on file helps us to protect all children in the event of an infectious disease outbreak.
