What is Adopt-A-Wetland?

Delaware Adopt-A-Wetland is a grassroots, community-based environmental stewardship program. It was developed to enhance public awareness of the many benefits of wetlands and for enlisting volunteers in monitoring and protecting these vital resources for the future.



How did Adopt-A-Wetland begin?

DE-AAW offers a wonderful example of the difference one person can make! Back in the late 1980's, Dot White, a retired chemist and farmer, was searching for ways to reduce her land use impacts on the local watershed. She determined that wetlands played a key role, and began working to create a program to promote that message. Since then, from the idea and inspiration of one person, DE-AAW has grown to encompass thousands of people caring for over 100 wetland sites statewide.

Why Wetlands?

Wetlands are dynamic environments, vital to the sustainability of the Chesapeake and Delaware estuaries. Wetlands provide us with a myriad of benefits, including:

- Water Quality trap sediments and filter pollutants for improved water quality.
- Flood Control protect property from the full effects of storms, floods and erosion.
- Recharge hold water in times of drought, helping to sustain drinking water aquifers.
- Habitat provide homes for many rare or threatened plants and animals.
- Nurseries for a high percentage of our commercially-important fish and shellfish.
- Recreation great areas to hunt, fish, canoe, kayak, hike and watch wildlife.
- Relaxation offer beautiful and quiet places to relax, refresh and reflect.



What kinds of wetlands are found here?

Delaware is blessed with a great variety of wetland types, from expansive coastal tidal marshes to small freshwater woodland pools. The northernmost Bald Cypress swamps on the continent occur here, as do hundreds of biodiversity-critical Delmarva Bay wetlands.

What types of activities can be accomplished in wetlands?

- Cleanups
- Nature study
- Birdwatching
- Plant/animal surveys
- Biological Monitoring
- Frog watching
- Environmental education
- Water quality monitoring
- Habitat enhancement projects
- Invasives species removal
- Wetland replanting & restoration
