I use the subjects in order as they appear on the HSLDA Required Subject Summary:

"(grades K through 12): patriotism and citizenship, about substance abuse, traffic safety, fire safety; (grades 1 through 6): arithmetic, reading, spelling, writing, English, geography, United States history, science, health, music, visual arts, and physical education; (grades 7 and 8): English, history and geography, science, mathematics, physical education, health, art, music, practical arts, and library skills; (at least once in first 8 grades): United States and New York history and constitutions; (grades 9 through 12): English, social studies—including American history, participation in government, and economics—math, science, art or music, health, physical education, and electives."

This doesn't have to be long, mine is usually only 1 page. I have several books that I use for English such as one for spelling, one for grammar, one for reading/phonics – so it takes a few lines to list them all and what they are for. For the most part all I do is list something like:

MATH - Saxon 87 Math Textbook and Test Book (That is my actual line for math.)

This page accompanies the IHIP form from the school district which is where I list the dates for the Quarterly reports, and when the SAT' will be given and so on...

Then I copy, cut and paste the exact list from the IHIP and fill in what they covered in those books I listed. I also state that we are ¼ or ½ done with the book depending. If I have an actual grade for the class such as math, I simply do a reminder of the book that was used for the quarter, the amount done and the grade.

Such as:

<u>MATH</u> – Sarah has been using the Saxon 76 Math Textbook and Test Book. She has completed 30 out of 140 lessons, which is about ½ of the book and has taken 5 tests. Her average for the quarter is 93%.

That's it.

Repeat for each subject. If no grade then simply state doing well in this subject or struggling with this subject and we are going to try something else... Be honest, remember these are your records too.
