## Other Important Information About Our School

State Contest Results: The school choir is highly rated in all competitions. The FFA and FCCLA consistently perform well in state competition and have been honored at the gold level for their respective organizations. The JROTC program excels in all areas including color guard and rifle team. Extracurricular Activities: Our school offers Art, Beta, FEA, KJHS, FBLA, FCCLA, FFA, FCA, French, Spanish, SADD, Science, 4-H, and clubs. Other activities include Academic Team, Band, Flag Corps, Choir, PSI, Robinson Scholars, Journalism, Teens for Christ, Upward Bound, Yearbook, Friends of Rachel, and JROTC Drill and Air Rifle Teams. Sports teams available are baseball, basketball, cheerleading, cross country, football, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track, and volleyball. Awards \& Recognitions: We use incentives and public recognition to encourage students. Individual and group achievements are recognized through intercom announcements, daily announcement sheets, and the wearing of our spirit $t$-shirts. An anual award ceremony recognizes students who perform at high levels in the classroom and on state testing. We offer trips, pizza parties, and awards for attendance and academic achievements. Academic and athletic awards banquets are also held.
What We are Doing to Improve: Assessment data is analyzed to identify achievement gaps, improve the curriculum, and plan professional development. Teachers work in groups to assess the implementation and impact of school goals, study the data and make recommendations for school improvement. We participate in AMSP, and we use the freshman academy concept to target at-risk freshmen.

Students are encouraged to take non-traditional courses; we offer career courses and computer software designed to help our students explore career options. Our
Vocational/Technical and Consumer Science programs are available to all students. Extended School Services are available to all students, regardless of achievement levels. Our media center is available to all students and offers extended hours.

## How We Are Doing

Kentucky uses the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System（CATS）to hold schools accountable for student progress．CATS has three parts：the Kentucky Core Content Tests，readiness tests by grade level，and other measures of the school＇s performance，
including attendance，retention and dropout rates．Together these three
elements make up a school＇s CATS Performance Score for every two－year period．The goal is that by 2014 nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished．

## Kentucky Core

 Content Tests： Kentucky＇s tests rate student performance as either Novice， Apprentice， Proficient，or Distinguished． These categories translate into a scale of 0－140， with 100 being considered proficient．This chart compares ou school＇s performance withall the schools in our district and all the schools in Kentucky．
