METEOROLOGY SUMMARY:

State:

High pressure will drive the overall weather pattern across the state today with another day of mostly sunny skies in the forecast. Like yesterday, a few showers may develop across South Florida, but any that form will be light and quick to leave the area. Otherwise, pleasant and dry conditions can be expected, and this weather pattern will continue into the overnight hours. By midnight, and moving toward sunrise tomorrow, a few areas of patchy to dense fog are possible across North, West Central, and Southwest Florida.

Dry air over North Florida will result in dangerous fire weather conditions this afternoon. As a result, a Red Flag Warning has been issued for Northwest Florida and extreme inland areas of Northeast Florida. Although a Red Flag Warning has not been issued for the Florida Peninsula, enough dry air over the area will bring an increased risk of wildfires to Central and South Florida today.

Very strong onshore flow and rough surf will result in a high risk of dangerous rip currents at all beaches along the Atlantic Coast, throughout Northeast, East Central and Southeast Florida today. The state's Gulf Coast beaches will have a low rip current risk.

Offshore waves near the Atlantic Coast have the potential to reach heights up to 12 feet today. The energy associated with these waves will result in breaking waves of 6-10 feet near the shore. This will lead to the possibility of beach erosion and flooding of areas right along the coast. These hazards will be most prominent during times of high tide starting today and lasting through the weekend.

Tropics: An area of showers and thunderstorms over the southern Caribbean Sea has been given a 20% chance of developing within the next 48 hours. Gradual development of this system is possible over the next couple of days as it drifts slowly to the west.

Lake Okeechobee: average elevation is at 13.32 feet today, which is about 1.68 feet below normal for this time of year.

Space Weather: is expected to be very low today. The Space Weather Prediction Center has placed a 15% chance of weak geo-magnetic activity over the next 24 hours.
