# **Advanced Placement World History**

### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course, as designed by College Board, expands upon the traditional World History curriculum by extending both the years of history covered as well as the depth and complexity of analysis. In addition to assessing the interactions between various cultures and changes that occur across different time periods, A.P. World History also includes an analytical writing component for the students.

The course is designed to increase the students' understanding of history content through a combination of factual, course content and key, necessary analytical skill(s). The course, while rigorous in content, is also a skills-based course that focuses on writing historically. The students' A.P. exam score is derived from equal parts essay scores and multiple-choice score, making a comprehensive approach to both sections key throughout the school year.

The key to success in this course, as in any A.P. course, is staying prepared for class discussion and activities by actively participating and having completed your readings and/or work as assigned beforehand – not the period before arriving to class. Time management is **CRUCIAL** to the success of all students in A.P. World History.

**SUMMER SCHOOL:** If you earn a grade in A.P. World History with which you are NOT satisfied, you <u>cannot</u> repeat A.P. World History in summer school to fix this grade. Fixing a grade in summer school can only be done if you complete <u>the exact same course</u> you took during the year while in summer school. There are no A.P. courses offered in summer school, therefore you cannot fix your grade in A.P. World History by attending summer school.

### **ABSENT WORK, LATE WORK & EXTRA CREDIT:**

**ABSENT WORK:** In the event of an EXCUSED absence, you have as many days as you were absent by which to complete the assignment(s).

If you know AHEAD OF TIME that you are going to be gone, you need to make every effort to get assignments early and take tests and/or quizzes prior to your absence.

**IF YOU MISS A TEST OR QUIZ:** If you are absent and miss a test or quiz, you will be given an alternate form of the test/quiz. Traditionally, this alternate form is 100% free response where you write out the answers to key questions – not multiple choice or matching. You will still be asked questions in regards to the exact same content presented on the regular exam/quiz, but in a different format.

If you make arrangements ahead of time when you know you are going to miss a test or quiz, it is possible (though not guaranteed) that you will have the opportunity to take the traditional version of the exam and/or quiz.

#### LATE WORK:

1 DAY LATE = 50% (half credit) deducted from possible points 2+ DAYS LATE = zero (no) credit available

**EXTRA CREDIT:** Extra credit opportunities will ONLY be offered to those students who have turned in ALL of their regular assignments. Even if you turn something in two or more days late, you will have turned it in and will eventually be eligible for extra credit should it be offered to the class.

DO NOT ASK FOR EXTRA CREDIT – it is a privilege, not a right.

**PRESENTATIONS:** Each semester there will be two presentations: one group, one individual. Each presentation will be scheduled with ample notice to the student so that they may budget their time accordingly. Each presentation will be worked on outside of class and should show that the student(s) has/have clearly followed the provided guidelines and is prepared to present on the day assigned.



- Copy, fax, duplicate, or transmit, using any technology, assignments that will each be turned in as "original work.
- Exchange assignments by printout, disk transfer, mode, or other electronic recorded means, then submit it as "original"
- Write formulas, codes, and/or key words on your person or objects for use in a test.

- Use hidden reference sheets during a test.
- · Use programmed material in watches, calculators, cell phones, or computer programs when prohibited.
- Exchange answers with others (either give or receive answers).
- Submit someone else's assignment as your own, in whole or in part.
- Submit material (written or designed by someone else) without giving the author/artist name and/or source (e.g., plagiarizing, or submitting work done by family, friends, or tutors).
- Take credit for group work, when little contribution was made.
- · Do not follow additional specific guidelines on cheating as established by a department, class, or teacher.

**TURN IT IN.COM:** During this school year, you will read 33 chapters of information from our assigned textbook. It is your responsibility to type an outline of the information IN YOUR OWN WORDS to demonstrate that you have both read the information AND internalized it. You will turn in a printed copy of your outline in class, but you will also submit an electronic copy of the same outline to my TurnItIn.com account.

### **COMMUNICATION:**

If you do not understand an assignment, if you do not understand concepts, or if you are unsure of a procedure or expectation – ASK ME!
