

The Edinburgh Sikh Community would like you to be made aware of the event planned to celebrate the Festival of Vaisakhi & The 313th Birth Anniversary of the Khalsa on Sunday 22th April 2012, The event is mostly indoors in the Gurdwara (temple) but includes a procession around the Leith area from 12.00 to 1.30pm. This will cause some traffic diversions and drivers may incur slight delays due to single lane closures. (The route is: - Mill Lane, Left at Gt. Junction St., right up Bonnington Rd, left at light along Pilrig St., down Leith Walk, across to Constitution St., left at Bernard St, along to lights then left along the Shore, then right at down to Coal Hill then up Gurdwara.)

We understand that this may affect your normal activity but hopefully with minimum disruption. We would greatly appreciate your understanding and patience for this event and invite you to join us. (ps. head covering and shoe removal is required while inside the Gurdwara).

Vaisakhi is the beginning of the year in the traditional calendar of South Asia (India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, Sri Lanka and other countries in this South Eastern Asian region). It is the first day of the first month, Vaisakhi, and a major harvest festival. Generally it falls on the 14th April.

Does it have any special significance for Sikhs?

Yes. On Vaisakhi in 1699, Guru Gobind Singh, the Tenth and last human Guru of the Sikhs established the Order of the Khalsa by initiating five of his Sikhs, and then being initiated himself too. This event holds paramount significance in the history of Sikhism. Sikhs derive their formal, consolidation identity from this day, including their five articles of faith, distinctive physical appearance and the names Singh for males and Kaur for females. Thus, Vaisakhi has a special spirit of hope, rejuvenation and commitments for Sikhs.

Sikhs all over the world celebrate by organizing religious services, including the completel reading of the Sikh scripture – Siri Guru Granth Sahib ji and community service. Culturally there are activities like parades, martial arts, sports festivals and song and dance performances. Families come together during this important festive occasion.

Nagar Kirthan (Religious Parade through town) - Its purpose.

Apart from the normal method of celebrating our religious date in history it is a good way of promoting who we are, the difference between us and other similar looking ethnic groups. We are Scottish Sikh's. This is our home, this is our religion and this is our culture. It is a good method of creating awareness and breaking down barriers of alienation. It contributes in bringing communities together to take part in cultural activities.

It is hoped that this day of prayerful exploration of the teachings inherent in sacred story - a medium especially loved in Celtic culture - will both introduce the Céile Dé tradition to some and also open many to wider ways of exploring their own chosen spiritual path, whether it be Christian, Pagan or any of the other ways that, ultimately, lead us all to the Sacred Union with the Great Mystery who is beyond naming.

Sister Fionntulach belongs to the Céili Dé (The Servants or Spouses of God), a Celtic Christian Holy Order based in Scotland. She took her vows in 1991. Since 2004 she has been Head of the Order.

Today, she is a teacher of the tradition and an Anam Chara ('Soul Friend' or Spiritual Guide). Her life is divided between leading a contemplative life, serving her community and giving teachings to the growing number of people, both in Europe and in the USA, who feel called to walk the Céile Dé Path in these times.

Sister Fionn, as most people call her, describes the tradition as "a glorious blend of Celtic reverence for Nature, disciplined practice and Christ-consciousness - the transformative power of Love." See: www.ceilede.co.uk

The new Santiago for Scotland

You will be aware of the pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela. When it was revived, in the 1980s, in the first year there were 68 pilgrims. Today, it attracts the well over 200,000 pilgrims a year by foot or bicycle, of which 50% are under 25.

There are plans to revive the pilgrimage to St Andrews along similar lines and a pilot scheme is being introduced this year, which starts at the Catholic Cathedral in the centre of Edinburgh at the top of Broughton Street and finishes in St Andrews on July 5 to coincide with the high mass in the ruins of the cathedral. The route mainly uses existing bicycle routes and way-marked parts, and walkers will enjoy spectacular views.

Accommodation in church halls etc is being made available at various places along the route by the local community without charge.

Hopefully, the numbers will grow to emulate Santiago de Compostela. . Of course, It is, a "rolling pilgrimage" - i.e. it can be done at any time and from any place. Everyone is welcome, whatever their religion or belief.

You will be aware that in the recent Budget, the Chancellor announced a proposal to abolish the currently available zero rating for VAT on alterations to Listed Buildings. In future therefore VAT would be standard rated on such alterations. The Chancellor suggested that Churches in future will be able to apply to the already-over-stretched Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme. However, there appears to have been no promise of additional Government money to go into that scheme and, in any event, its current mode of operation means that there is no certainty as to the likely level at which any VAT recovery might be made.

The Church of England has estimated that the proposed change will cost it up to £20 million per year.

An e- petition has been set up to call on the Chancellor to bring back zero rating and I set out below an extract from a Church of England Press Release which contains a link to the e-petition.

The matter was discussed yesterday at a meeting of the provincial Buildings Cottee and I should be grateful if you could draw this to the attention of your Diocesan Buildings Committee and indeed any others you think appropriate in your Diocese, since the more signatures on the e- petition, the better.

I have raised the matter with the Scottish Churches Cttee and I expect we will be putting in formal representations on the subject on behalf of the Scottish Churches after the next meeting of that Cttee.

The Church of England has today created an e-petition calling on the Chancellor to bring back zero rate VAT to alternations to the CofE's 12,500 listed churches. It follows the recent launch of a consultation by HM Revenue & Customs on VAT charging to approved alterations to listed buildings, which closes on 4 May 2012. The e-petition can be signed online now at: http://epetitions.direct.gov.uk/petitions/32229.

In a letter to the Chancellor, sent today, Anne Sloman, chair of the Church Buildings Council, writes that a very large proportion of the alterations to listed churches "are concerned with making these buildings viable for use by the wide community... The imposition of 20 per cent VAT on this work means in practice most of it will simply stop... it seems that this VAT proposal was aimed at householders and that the implications for the Church were not fully understood."

The Bishop of London and the Second Church Estates Commissioner, Tony Baldry MP, have also written letters to the Chancellor to voice serious concerns about the proposed imposition of VAT on alterations to listed buildings.

Dear Colleagues,

Public Entertainment Licences (PELs)

It is clear that the Council have received representation from a number of charitable bodies concerning PELs. In the light of this the Council is looking at adding a new option which would in effect be an exemption for varieties of functions providing there is no charge (or donation asked) for attendance at these events.

The Council is proposing that the following activities would not require an entertainment licence:

- * Functions for charitable, religious, youth, sporting, community, political or similar organisations;
- * Exhibitions of art work;
- * Readings, story-telling and other oral recitals; and
- * Premises where live music is incidental for example, record shops that host one-off performances to promote record sales

providing these events allow free public access and the venue can hold no more than 200 people.

A Public Consultation went live on the web a few days ago and responses are invited **by 13th April**. (We have been told that responses can also be made until 19th April). The link to the questionnaire can be found half way down the following web-page:

The questionnaire is about this specific proposal and does not take long to fill in. It would help greatly if as many Churches as possible responded.

It would be helpful for respondents to highlight:

- Support for the exemption this proposal will make a considerable difference to many Churches and together
 with the exemption already in place for activities connected with a religious body's normal activities, it should
 cater for most Church activities.
- That it would be of public benefit if a **further Licence type or amendment were added for fund-raising events** *of a charitable purpose* **for which a charge is made or a donation sought**, such as a musical concert for the Church or the Organ Fund or a charity such as Christian Aid, etc. We think it would be good to reflect that these are not commercial events and to suggest that they are either included in the exemption or that a further Annual Licence is created at modest cost to allow Churches and others to offer these events regularly.
- You may wish to express a view on the numbers permitted at events covered by the exemption. This is 200 at
 the moment but this aspect appears fluid. It would seem to add to the scope of the arrangement if the number
 were higher so we suggest a figure of 400.

It is accepted that in the case of commercial lets a Church will need to apply for a commercial license, such as when Church premises let their Hall for a Festival function. The discussion we are having applies to events that are 'free' or linked to charitable fund-raising.
