Radionuclides in the Food Chain

A conference entitled *Radionuclides in the Food Chain* will be held **November 2-5, 1987** at the Laxenburg Conference Center near Vienna, Austria. This conference is designed for an international audience from all relevant disciplines, including scientists, industrial managers, and policy makers working in the food industry, government agencies, universities, and international organizations. The scientific and policy perspectives discussed will contribute to the worldwide harmonization of exposure standards for radionuclides in foods.

The program has been developed by a Scientific Advisory Council composed of leading scientists representing several countries and diverse disciplines. The conference sessions include I) a review of fundamental information on radioactivity and radiation including environmental pathways critical to man; 2) consequences of radionuclides release to health, safety, and the environment; 3) comparative effects of radionuclides and other contaminants of food and water supplies; 4) risk management of food and water supplies; 5) regulatory and control programs; and 6) development of guidelines for safety evaluation of food and water after nuclear accidents.

The program is being sponsored by the International Life Sciences Institute (ILSI) in association with the International Institute of Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA). CAN AN EMPLOYEE WITH AIDS INFECT OTHER EMPLOYEES?

The AIDS virus cannot be spread by everyday contact in the workplace. An employee with AIDS can infect another employee only if they have sexual contact or share intravenous drug needles.

CAN THE AIDS VIRUS BE SPREAD BY USING A TELEPHONE OR WATER FOUNTAIN?


No. The AIDS virus is not spread through air, water, or on surfaces, such as telephones, door knobs, or office machines. The virus is spread mainly through an exchange of body fluids during sexual activity, or the exchange of blood as occurs through sharing contaminated IV drug needles.

SHOULD I PROVIDE OR DESIGNATE SEPARATE BATHROOM FACILITIES FOR EMPLOYEES WITH AIDS?

There is no need to. The AIDS virus is not spread through ordinary use of toilets, sinks, or other bathroom facilities.

CAN I TELL IF SOMEONE IS INFECTED WITH THE AIDS VIRUS?

There are many *carriers* of the virus who do not have the symptoms or signs of the disease and may or may not develop the disease. A carrier of the AIDS



virus can infect other people but not through ordinary workplace contact.

WHAT IF I TOUCH A COWORKER WITH AIDS WHO HAS A BLEEDING CUT?

There is no reason to believe that AIDS could be spread this way. Whether a person has AIDS or not, all open, bleeding cuts should be taken care of by observing good health and hygiene practices.

HOW SHOULD EMPLOYEES WITH AIDS BE TREATED?

On a day-to-day basis, treat them normally. You and your employees should learn about AIDS, and when dealing with their problem, use compassion and understanding.

Above all, remember...

AIDS IS HARD TO CATCH.


