Keynote Speaker

R. Kevin Grigsby, MSW, DSW serves as Senior Director, Leadership & Talent Development at the AAMC. From 2000-09,



he served as Vice Dean for Faculty and Administrative Affairs and Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at Penn State College of Medicine in Hershey, Pennsylvania. Dr. Grigsby's experience includes a history of program planning, implementation, and evaluation in the area of innovative home and community based health and mental health services. During the past two decades, the focus of Dr. Grigsby's work has shifted to organizational development in academic medicine and science. Developing a future-oriented perspective in academic leaders and the alignment of resources with missions are other areas of inquiry. He has been instrumental in developing career development programs and was an Editorial Advisory Board Member and frequent contributor to the AAMC publication Academic Physician & Scientist.

In 2010, Dr. Grigsby and colleagues published an article, "Learning About Teams by Participating in Teams" in Academic Medicine. The authors studied whether a transdisciplinary program for enhancing teamwork was effective in educating individual team members to translate lessons into productive outcomes for their own institutions' teams. This approach was found to be effective in breaking down barriers that typically separate academic

departments, reducing traditional barriers between employees and management, promoting faculty and staff participation in decision-making processes, and solving organizational problems that seemed to be intractable in the past.

VCU SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

From our beginnings in 1838 to today, as part of a thriving urban comprehensive academic medical center, the VCU School of Medicine has maintained a reputation for excellence in teaching, research and health care. Over 809 students each year from around the world come to our School to pursue their M.D. and learn from our renowned faculty, many nationally and internationally recognized, who represent more than 200 specialty areas. The School also offers dozens of master's, doctoral and interdisciplinary programs in graduate education. Of the 93 full-time dental school faculty, 41% are women.
