

## CHART 2 FRONT-END WORKLOAD % CHANGE, 1980 - 1989 OR 1990




# CHART 4 RELEASES & SYSTEM'S REVOCATIONS % CHANGE, 1980 - 1989 OR 1990



January 1987 - January 1996




CHART 6

& JAIL BACKLOG RELATIONSHIP




CHART 7

AUGUST 1989 - PRESENT







CHART 8

## CHART 9 COUNTY JAIL BACKLOG






## PROJECTED PRISON EXPANSION SCHEDULE, 1/11/91

# Methodological Note

JUSTICE calculates releases from prison in the following order in attempting to meet the target set for prison admissions.

- The model releases as many inmates as are scheduled to be released under <u>tentative parole</u>. If additional releases are needed to meet the target two additional calculations can also take place.
- \* The model produces additional releases by special parole reviews. If special parole reviews do not release sufficient number of offenders to meet the target admissions, the model can be set to grant a specific amount of good time following the guidelines of the Prison Management Act (PMA). This has the effect of making more offenders eligible for parole.
- None of the scenarios presented here have been run with the granting of PMA good time credits.

# Criminal Justice Policy Council, JUSTICE Simulation 1.2, 2/1/91

#### Proposed Policy:

Aggravated offenders would not be eligible for parole starting September 1, 1991.

# Present Policy:

Aggravated offenders are those offenders adjudged guilty of capital murder, aggravated kidnapping, aggravated sexual assault, and aggravated robbery according to Section 3g, Article 42.12 Code of Criminal Procedure or defendants who have used a deadly weapon as defined in Section 1.07(a)(11), Penal Code, during the commission of a felony offense or during immediate flight therefrom. These offenders are not eligible for release on parole until their actual calendar time served, without consideration of good time, equals one-fourth of the maximum sentence or 15 years, whichever is less. In no event shall the offender be eligible for release on parole in less than two calendar years.

#### Impact:

The jail backlog will be 7,185 higher than that projected under the no change in policy by 1997. The maximum impact would not be felt until well past the year 2000.

#### Long-term Impact:

- The impact of this policy will continue to be felt beyond the projection years. It can be assumed that an additional impact of 1,000 to 2,000 will occur for at least 18 years from initial impact in 1994 (the average sentence of aggravated offenders admitted to prison in 1989). A lesser impact will continue for an additional 27 years to account for the additional time to be served of offenders with up to 60 years of sentence. The table below illustrates the long-term impact of this policy.
- The table below illustrates the impact of the proposed policy assuming that the present sentence distribution of aggravated offenders will be the same in the future if the proposed policy is adopted. For example in 1989, 13.3% of all 3G admissions (333 of 2,510 admissions) had a sentence of 5 years for which they have to serve the two year minimum under present parole policies. Under the proposed policy, these offenders would have to serve until discharge of their sentence, an extra 3 years in prison. The additional time to be served in prison as a consequence of the proposed policy increases with longer sentences. Offenders with 60 years sentences, for instance, will have to serve 45 years longer in prison.

### Qualitative Analysis:

- Offenders that are not eligible for parole tend to behave worst in prison compared to offenders that are granted good time and are eligible for parole. This has security cost implications. For example, the need for additional administrative segregation beds to handle this population would have to be considered a direct impact of this policy. The average daily cost of keeping an inmate in administrative segregation is \$54.46 compared to the systemwide daily cost average of \$44.21
- Aggravated offenders with sentences longer than 30 years would become part of a geriatric population at the care of the Institutional Division. The cost of geriatric services have to also be included in determining the impact of this policy. These cost include staff for additional medical and psychiatric needs.

# Preface

After an examination of the top eight criminal justice impact models in the nation the U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics stated the following about the Criminal Justice Policy Council's JUSTICE model:

"We are impressed with the Texas simulation model, JUSTICE, which integrates a simulation program with a dynamic data base that changes as information is updated" (p. 51).

This report presents an outline for understanding the main components of the JUSTICE model.

# Projections

• Projections are responsible statistical statements that are made based on the empirical understanding of data and certain stated assumptions.

# Main projections methodologies

- Regression and time series models are policy-blind linear extrapolations of the effects of recent past trends.
- Simulation models are designed around the movement of individuals through a defined structure. These models allow for the projection of populations when the designed structure is "simulated" to change because of new policies.

#### JUSTICE

- Simulation model that replicate the structure and policies that affect the flow of offenders through the Texas adult correctional system .
- JUSTICE works with actual computerized records of prisoners and parolees or with records created by the computer for future admissions to prison based on the characteristics of the actual record of offenders admitted to prison during the most recent year prior to the projection. Only the probation system is modeled using aggregate information because of the present limitations of probation data.
- To put it simply, the key characteristics in the record of each offender (like offense and sentence) in the Justice database determine the flow of the offender through the system by triggering certain "rules" or "laws" (like parole eligibility) that affect the time and direction of movement of the offender.

#### Baseline vs. Simulation

- The status quo projections using the JUSTICE model is based on parameters that have been set in JUSTICE to reflect the present admissions policies, capacity constraints (including capacity already funded for the future) and parole release practices. All baseline parameters, reflecting the most recent data loaded in the model (like incarceration and probation probabilities, and parole recidivism rates among others), stay the same during the years of the projection.
- Changes in any of the baseline parameters will be considered a projection under simulated conditions. Comparing the projections under simulated conditions with the baseline would then give an estimate of the impact of the new policies being proposed.

#### Admissions Module

- The population—at—risk in Texas (the population most likely to engage in criminal activity) is used as a predictor of total arrests for offenses most likely to result on a felony conviction. The probability of an adult felony arrest to be convicted is used to project felony convictions.
- Probation and incarceration probabilities from convictions are used to project all admissions to felony probation directly from courts (regular probation and other diversion programs) and admissions to prison directly from courts.
- All offenders sentenced to prison, as well as those being revoked to prison from probation, parole or mandatory supervision are assumed to enter prison if the combination of prison capacity and an specific scheduled prison admissions policy allows for enough space in prison. If there is not enough space in prison to absorb the projected admissions, then some offenders will be held in jails awaiting transfer to prison.

- The term "admissions pressure" is used to refer to the number of offenders that would have entered prison if prison capacity would have been available. "Admissions shortfall" occur when the number of offenders that would have entered prison if prison capacity would have been available cannot be admitted to prison because of capacity limitations.
- The on-hand jail population of felons awaiting transfer to prison is the starting jail backlog (since the projection of jail backlog is not starting at zero). The records of this population, as well as the records of the added backlog are used to determine who is eligible for parole-in-absentia from county jails or other programs like boot camp. Those eligible are transferred from the on-hand jail backlog to the proper module in the model.
- Admissions to prison are given a record based on data from the most recent admissions. The records of the admissions have key characteristics that determine how long the offender stays in prison and enables the model to simulate the impact of policies.
- Felony probation admissions (all regular felony probations and probations to diversion programs directly from courts), shock probations and boot camp transfers from prison and the probation population at the beginning of the projection are applied a "turnover rate" (or average length of stay in probation) to project the probation population under supervision. The probation module uses aggregate data because of the present limitations of probation data.
- Probation revocations to prison are projected using a recidivism rate derived from a three year follow-up of probation intakes as estimated by a theoretical cohort propagation model. Some of the probation revocations to prison can be diverted to probation violator facilities if these facilities are created in the future. Parole revocations to prison are projected using five-year recidivism rates for offenders grouped by categories of offenses.

# Prison Population and Release Module

- Records of offenders in the prison on-hand population at the beginning of the projection and records created by the computer based on the most recent records of admissions to prison are used to extract the key characteristics of offenders in prison or admitted to prison that will determine how long they stay in prison.
- To put it simply, the key characteristics in the record of each offender (like offense and sentence) determines the flow of the offender through the system by triggering certain "rules" or "laws" (like parole eligibility) that affect the time and direction of movement of the offender.
- The model reads actual "tentative parole dates" case records of the on-hand population calculates and assign these dates for projected admissions based on the "parole scores" distribution of the most recent admissions. The "tentative parole date" is the date that determines when an offender will be released unless prison capacity constraints require that offenders be released before their tentative The model calculates "special reviews" parole date. of cases to increase the number of releases necessary to meet capacity constraints. All the rules programmed in the model to calculate tentative parole dates and the number of special review cases are those use in actual parole practices.
- There is the option to simulate when the PMA good time credits have to be given in order to enlarge the parole eligible pool to maintain the prisons open.
- Offenders eligible for pre-parole and half-way houses are released according to the probability of release of offenders eligible for these programs. The number of releases on pre-parole is not only driven by eligibility but also by the capacity of halfway houses.


# Supervision and Revocation Module

- Records of offenders in the parole or mandatory supervision on-hand population at the beginning of the projection, and the records of offenders released to parole or mandatory supervision, are used to determine the success of offenders under parole or mandatory supervision. Offenders revoked are then admitted to prison with a new sentence (a sentence that will keep them in prison longer than the sentence for which they were paroled) or with their original sentence (technical revocation).
- A proportion of parole revocations are diverted from prison to parole violator facilities according to the capacity available in these facilities. Those that failed in the parole violator facilities are revoked to prison.
- Offenders successfully completing their supervision are given "annual report" status (offenders report their activities annually by mail) and are eventually discharged from supervision based on the probability of offenders in specific offense and sentence categories of successfully completing their supervision.



Schematic Flowcharts of the Main Modules of the JUSTICE model


Flowchart 1: Schematic Description of JUSTICE Model 1.2




Flowchart 2: System's Admissions and Jail Backlog Module
