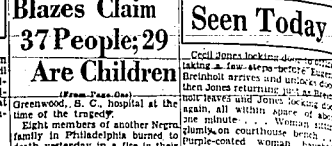

WASHINGTON—Congressional and administrative leaders are in the thick of the money, credit, spending and other forces that free trade of the United States and its possessions on the ground.

Although the reasons for this truly startling development are highly technical, it is a fact that the removal of a large family could not be kept from children and even distant relatives from spending or borrowing more dollars than they have in the bank. Many of their expenditures and investments will result in a total loss.

HEADS INCREASED LIVING COSTS—This paradoxical situation accounts for the constant increase of prices. It heralds a new era of inflation. It means when union contracts expire in key industries within a few months, it accounts for Uncle Sam's loss of money. It means that the rates, and for the first time of many investors to buy them at a price, preferring cash for their maturing securities.

It contributes to the accelerating decline in the value of the once stable dollar, and to a run on our gold and silver reserves. It means that a billion dollar drop in exports because other nations can undercut us on the world market.

PERILOUS THREAT TO U.S. ECONOMY—Two groups have had a launch in investigation of this major problem before the most serious threat to the nation's economic and financial structure in modern times.

The primary cause of the federal reserve board are marketing Uncle Sam's securities, which were once considered a safe investment. They will try to find some means for exerting their control through their management of money and credit.

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD LIMITATIONS—The Fed's experiences during the recent recession and partial recovery demonstrate that its conservative powers are extremely limited. It has not been able to lighten money demand, and has been forced to use the supply to combat recession. But its position as a 100% business-usury lender of money and credit, it has followed instead of influencing economic trends.

Its lack of control over the cost of borrowing money from the banks to two and one-half to three per cent is not expected to cause even a ripple in the money market.

Investors are refusing to buy long-term bonds issued from the government because of their fear of continued inflation which operates against a low and fixed interest return. But the tax-exempt term securities will force Uncle Sam to pay a much higher interest rate.

BILLIONS AND MORE BILLIONS—To make money matters worse, the government will need 725 billion dollars in the next two years. Under these conditions, the \$6-billion-dollar-a-year interest on the public debt may soar to 10 billion dollars, according to the estimates of the Federal Reserve Board. A national mortgage may hit the unprecedented figure of 300 billion dollars.

The other reason for loss of control over inflationary spending results from increasing resort to "back door and short-cut" approaches to the treasury. It is the budget bureau's responsible way of distributing the taxpayers' money.

METHOD ADOPTED IN 1935—This method was adopted as a means of financing the new federal construction finance corporation need funds in a hurry to jack up the falling economy. It was carried out by the Federal Reserve Board, which is authorized to obtain it through the normal process of congressional authorization and appropriation.

The plan is to issue \$100 million in new treasury and spending proposals by legislative, authorized committees, by the appropriations committee and by the budget bureau. The "back door" approach effectively muzzles these watchdogs.

BACK-DOOR APPROACH PLEASES TO SPENDERS—This process proved to pleasing to the spenders that it has been extended to almost a score of other agencies. It is now being used by all congresses has approved the expenditure of more than 150 billion dollars in this manner.

It is this system that has given rise to the \$100 billion dollar high school fund that has authorized to pay another untapped 20 billion dollars. And many billions of this fund are now being used to build new schools. Congress continues to pretend that Uncle Sam is being reimbursed.

Rules Chairman Howard W. Smith of Virginia and Appropriations Chairman Clarence Cannon of Missouri have demanded an end to this multibillion bypassing. They insist on a return to strict checks by congress. But it is opposed by Speaker Charles McNary and powerful committee chairman who finance their projects in this uncontrolled manner. The Smith-Cannon resolution is given only a slim chance of passage.

When talk swings around to the angry young men of the new generation, the notion can easily develop that individual protest really works up in the chests of America's young folk.

Most of our youngsters seem to want a shell of security put about them. Their hope is for a safe, sure job, a solid family life, and so on.

Nothing more in wanting some fundamental assurances. In seeking the good, stable things of this life. But there is more to it than just that.

Life is also risk-taking. Risk-taking for a cause, breaking old molds, dating new ground.

Protest, that is merely a howl of pain or rage isn't sufficient. We need men today, as always have, who are willing to hurt themselves against the untamed sea to venture down the dark, tangled path, to strike out toward a horizon which shimmers in a haze of uncertainty.

If we don't get enough of them, the day will come when an unseen but powerful felt-limit will check our freedom. We will be traveling an ever narrowing corridor course, with our aspirations and our achievements contracting with each diminishing circuit we make.

For the Chamber, which ordinarily picks career businessmen, industrialists or financiers as its top officer, Canham is the first newspaperman in the organization's line of 32 presidents. He succeeds S. L. M. Baker, William McCord, who now becomes board chairman.

"The 1959 concept of capitalism is a thing very foreign to the capitalism of today," Canham told reporters after his election. "It is a business," he said, "has accepted a deep responsibility and accountability to its customers, its civic neighbors, its workers and its stockholders."

"Economic power has been shifting in this country. It is moving still in the direction of a balance and economic balance is as necessary to economic freedom as the political balance of power is to political freedom."

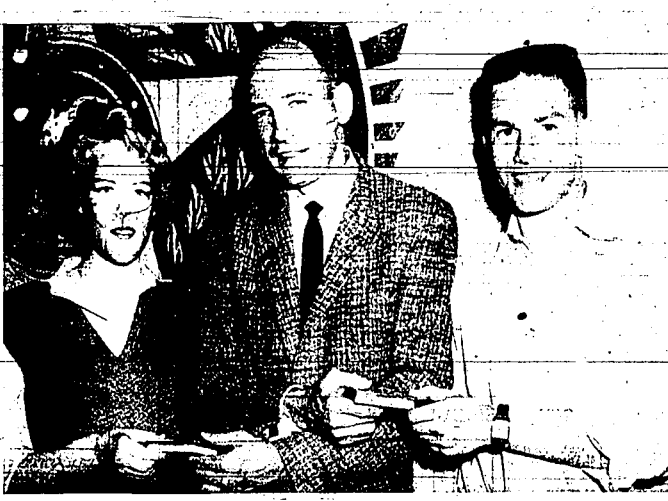
