Awards and scholarships bestowed at The Asian Reporter Foundation's 16th annual banquet

The Asian Reporter Foundation's 16th Annual Scholarship & Awards Banquet, held at the TAO Event Center for the second year, gathered 375 members of the community for an evening of awards and performances. Held in advance of Asian Heritage Month, the evening honored elders in the community, highlighted the great work of area nonprofits, issued scholarships to hardworking college-bound students, and showcased dances by local performance groups.

Following a welcome by masters of ceremonies Ronault L.S. "Polo" Catalani, Nim Xuto, and Zeke Smith, and remarks by *Asian Reporter* publisher Jaime Lim, the celebration began with the introduction of this year's most honored elders.

Jess F. Osilla, born in 1935 in Pangasinan province in the Philippines, enlisted in the U.S. Navy after earning his associate's degree. Following 20 years of service, he retired in 1974 with the rank of Chief Petty Officer. After working another 20 years for the Farmers Insurance Company, he retired again in 1997. Jess is an avid tennis player who loves to dance, read history books, and volunteer his time to many organizations.

Sary Khauv was born in 1943 in Beung Keng Kang, Phnom Penh, Cambodia. He worked as a high school teacher from 1966 until 1975, when the Khmer Rouge took Phnom Penh and sent his family to perform forced labor. Sary survived the abuse and terror of war, but some of his family members did not. In 1980, he immigrated to Oregon and became an English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL) teacher. He retired in 2008, but continues to teach Cambodian language and culture.

Sivheng Pao, born in 1940 in Kompong Cham, Cambodia, is one of 10 children in her family. During the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975 to 1979, remarkably, she, her husband, and children survived starvation and forced labor. Sivheng immigrated to Oregon in 2002 to live with her daughter and two of her grandchildren. She has been an active participant in Oregon's Cambodian-American community since her arrival in the U.S.

Following the honoring of community elders, the dancers of Kaleinani o ke Kukui took to the stage. Featuring four numbers, the performers — Maile Taute, Shalyn Wirfs, Ku'ulei de Best, Franchesa Graf, Anna James, Kailani Pou, and Hanaila Starks — delighted the crowd with "Poi Ball Medley," a dance from New Zealand; "I Ali'i No 'Oe" and "Sophisticated Hula," both originating from Hawai'i; and "Ote'a," a Tahitian dance.

Next up was the issuing of college scholarships to the next generation. Nearly two dozen students received awards this year, starting with 17 awards in the amount of \$1,000 each from The Asian Reporter Foundation. Four \$500 scholarships sponsored by the Philippine American Chamber of Commerce of Oregon followed.

This year's students — all slated to graduate from high school next month — attend schools in Beaverton, Oregon City, Portland, Tigard, and Tualatin.

After the recognition of this year's young people, Kanchie Fujima of Fujinami Kai mesmerized the audience with two dances. Her first, "Yamaga Koi Akari" ("Obon Dance from Yamaga"), was a variation of a *Bon* dance from the lantern festival on the island of Kyushu in which the dancer laments the loss of her first love. "Manten No Funauta" ("Fisherman's Song under the Sky"), described the hardships and feelings of a fisherman who works in the cold northern seas: pride in his work — performed in freezing, dangerous conditions — while also longing for his sweetheart back in port.

Last, but a long way from least, two worthy organizations that have been serving the community for decades — the IRCO Asian Family Center and the Northwest China Council — were honored with Exemplary Community Volunteer awards.

The Asian Family Center has been providing multilingual and multicultural community-based services to our area's Bhutanese, Burmese, Cambodian, Chinese, Korean, Filipino, Lao, Mien, Nepali, Pacific Islander, Thai, and Vietnamese communities since 1994. The Northwest China Council, established in 1980, helps educate people about Chinese history, culture, politics, and U.S.-China relations.

After the formal program concluded, the audience headed to the dance floor to continue enjoying each other's company to music provided by DJ Jason Martin of Gaucho Records. Several dozen lucky attendees also went home with Oregon Lottery Scratch-its won in a special giveaway. Whether attendees were lucky winners of a lottery prize or not, everyone hit the jackpot with an evening of great food, wonderful company, and well-deserved recognition of exemplary elders, organizations, and students.

Sary Khauv

Sary Khauv was born May 28, 1943 in Beung Keng Kang, Phnom Penh, Cambodia, and, along with four siblings, was raised alone by his mother after his father passed away. He became a high school teacher in 1966 and married his wife Kim Nhorn Khauv in 1967. After the Khmer Rouge took Phnom Penh in 1975, he and his family were sent to the countryside to perform forced labor. Persevering through a great deal of difficulty and hardship losing many family members, suffering deprivation and abuse, and enduring the terror of war - Sary and his family were able to escape into Thailand and enter into a refugee camp where he found work as a teacher. Because he had been a civil servant before the war, his family was given priority status and in 1980 he immigrated to the U.S. via a distant cousin in Oregon. His first job after arriving in Oregon was as a part-time English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL) teacher at Lincoln High School in Portland. He served as a community agent beginning in 1982 and became a special education teacher in 2004. Although he retired from the school system in 2008, he continues to teach at the Cambodian language and culture school on the weekends and in his 10 years of teaching Saturday school, he has only missed twice, once to visit his grandson and once a dear friend. He lives with his daughter Ratha and her family in Beaverton. His daughter Rany lives in

Portland and his son Navy resides in Arizona.

Jess F. Osilla

Jess F. Osilla was born May 3, 1935 in Santa Barbara, Pangasinan province, the Philippines. He attended Santa Barbara High School, received an associate's degree in commercial education at the Philippine College of Commerce, and enlisted in the U.S. Navy after graduation. He met his wife Grace, who recently passed away, in 1958 at a dance in Bremerton, Washington. The couple married two years later and had five children. Jess now has eight grandchildren. While in the navy, Jess earned an associate's degree in General Studies with honors at Clark College. He retired from the navy in 1974 after 20 years of service with the rank of Chief Petty Officer. He was then hired by Farmers Insurance Company as an agent where he worked for 20 years, retiring in 1997. He is currently active in many veterans' organizations: American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Fleet Reserve Association, and the National Association of Chief Petty Officers. He is also a member of Kiwanis International, BPOE Gateway Elks Lodge #4211, and The Odd Fellows Villa Lodge #124. Jess volunteers with Meals on Wheels, helps out at a downtown chapel which serves the poor and the homeless, and is the senior usher at the Grotto during Sunday mass. He is an avid tennis player and loves dancing and reading

history books. In addition, every Veterans Day he speaks to high school students about World War II.

Sivheng Pao

Sivheng Pao was born May 15, 1940 in Kompong Cham, Cambodia, one of 10 children in the family. She married her husband, Pea Ith, a former government official with the Department of Justice, at a young age and they had six children - Sovy, Sochenda, Sokanchana, Somony, Sophal, and Sovimol. Under the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975 to 1979, she and her family endured extreme hardship through forced labor, starvation, and living under the threat of death. Remarkably, her husband and children all survived the ordeal. Pea passed away in 1993, and in 2002, Sivheng immigrated to Oregon to live with her daughter Sochenda and two of her 14 grandchildren. In 2008, Sovy later joined Sivheng and Sochenda in Oregon; the rest of the family still resides in Cambodia. Sivheng is a member of the Cambodian Buddhist temple in West Linn, Oregon and is a strong supporter of the Cambodian-American Community of Oregon. She often volunteers to cook for the community and offers financial support. She also gives back to her homeland by supporting the Golden Leaf Education Foundation (GLEF). In addition, she has two greatgrandchildren.



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

IRCO Asian Family Center

The IRCO Asian Family Center (AFC) was established in 1994 by the Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO) to provide multilingual and multicultural community-based services. The nonprofit center serves more than 5,200 individuals and families each year in our area's diverse Asian communities - Bhutanese, Burmese, Cambodian, Chinese, Korean, Filipino, Lao, Mien, Nepali, Pacific Islander, Thai, and



Vietnamese — as well as mainstream the population. In the past year, AFC has worked on many projects impacting the Asian community, including the Diversity and Civic Leadership program's "Engage" civic engagement survey, which helped Asian and Pacific Islander (API) community leaders collect, analyze,

and report data to city and government officials; the Asian Pacific Islander Community Leadership Institute, a program that builds leadership skills and addresses racial disparities facing API communities; and the Cover Oregon Outreach and Enrollment program, which assists APIs in accessing health insurance. In addition, AFC has several ongoing outreach programs, including afterschool programming that supports school-age students' academic achievement; programs that assist families in preparing children younger than five years old for school; anti-poverty programs that help families stay in their homes and keep their utilities on; and more. Northwest China Council

The Northwest China Council (NWCC) was established by the Asia Society of New York in 1980 as one of 12 Regional Councils to help educate the American public about Chinese history, culture, politics, and U.S.-China relations. The organization, which is currently made up of 250 members of both Chinese and non-Chinese ethnicities, is also a

regional resource providing educational programs, information services, and foreign trade expertise in Oregon and southwest Washington. In the past year, NWCC held a two-part program addressing the U.S.-China relationship and China's food safety risks; a talk by Mel Gurtov, professor emeritus of Portland State University, on the future of



U.S.-China relations; monthly business presentations and regular business networking mixers; and monthly movie nights and book club meetings. The group also offers ongoing Mandarin language instruction classes, cultural and educational presentations and activities, and programs on current events in China. Additionally, the organization leads cultural and business tours to China and sponsors various China-related events with other organizations in the area. To learn more, visit <www.nwchina.org>.

Philadelphia Zoo lets tigers stretch legs on trail

Philadelphia Zoo might want to beware of stray cats: A new enclosed passageway allows lions and tigers to roam outside their exhibits.

Humans, though, can safely gawk at the predators travelling along Big Cat Crossing. The protected, open-air path snakes above the felines' habitat to an archway over the zoo's main promenade and ends at a viewing spot along a lake.

The concept for the catwalk stems from the increasingly common practice of animal rotation, which lets animals take in new stimuli while visitors encounter them in unexpected places.

"It becomes much more of a safari-like experience," said Philadelphia Zoo CEO Andrew Baker.

The \$2.3-million project, paid for with state and private funds, is the latest addition to the zoo's comprehensive travel system.

Within the past three years, it has opened a similar trail for small primates and another for orangutans. The trails system was primarily designed to improve animal wellbeing, but "we realized that there were huge opportunities from the guest experience side as well," Baker said. By that, Baker means that visitors

might be challenged to track down animals that aren't lolling around in their usual habitats.

That could be fun for older kids, said Alexis Brookens, who visited the zoo with a group including her two-year-old daughter. But parents with younger children might prefer animals to stay in their assigned spaces, she said.

California museum to return statue to Cambodia

PASADENA, California (AP) — The Norton Simon Museum has agreed to return a 10th-century statue that may have been looted from a Cambodian temple during that country's genocidal civil war in the 1970s.

"Temple Wrestler," a sandstone figure missing its hands and feet, has been displayed at the museum for nearly four decades. The five-foot-high work depicts Bhima, a heroic figure in the Hindu epic Mahabharata, in a fighting pose.

The sculpture is one of three being returned to Cambodia from the U.S.

Museum officials met with Cambodian officials earlier this year and are returning the statue "as a gesture of friendship, and in response to a unique and compelling request by top officials in Cambodia, to help rebuild its 'soul' as a nation," the Pasadena museum said in a statement that was given to The Associated Press.

"The Norton Simon properly acquired the Bhima from a reputable art dealer in New York in 1976," the museum said. "However, the facts about the Bhima's provenance prior to the dealer's ownership are unclear because of the chaotic wartime conditions in Cambodia during the 1970s."

"I think it would be neat to see them walking around instead of just lounging," said Brookens, of Bear, Delaware.

Animal rotation has become more popular in the U.S. as "the public challenges zoos to improve," said Ed Hansen, CEO of the American Association of Zoo Keepers.

Among the earliest efforts was the O Line at the National Zoo in Washington, which allows orangutans to travel between enclosures by swinging from cables high above the property.

At the Denver Zoo, keepers rotate lions, African wild dogs, and hyenas through a habitat. next occupants.

"It's to replicate the natural environment as best as we can," Hansen said. "It's enriching to their environment and their mental capacity."

In Philadelphia, the zoo has meshed those two concepts — travel and timeshare. Lions, tigers, pumas, jaguars, and leopards already rotate among five exhibits. Now, they'll take turns using Big Cat Crossing.

Brother Amur tigers Wiz and Dimitri wowed a crowd as they scampered along the trail, occasionally peering down at visitors.

The zoo plans eventually to extend and connect all three trails. So in the winter, when it's too cold for orangutans to be outside, cats can use their trail, said Baker. Hooved animals like rhinos and giraffes also will get to travel.

Anecdotal evidence indicates animals are enjoying the trails and finding new stimuli, he said.

One species of monkey has been making territorial sounds that keepers typically don't hear. Another small primate was once found on the trail watching a construction project that had captured his attention, Baker said.

Five-year-old zoo visitor Noah Dzielak, of Wilmington, Delaware, said he likes the idea of a tiger being able to walk around.

"Because then he can see the zoo," said Noah.

Cambodian officials believe it was looted from the 1,000-year-old Prasat Chen temple. Arrangements for the return will be announced at a later date.

As part of the return agreement, Cambodia will periodically loan other ancient statues to the museum, the Norton Simon said.

The decision marks the latest progress in efforts to bring back together nine figures that once formed a tableau in a tower of the temple. The scene captured a famous duel in Hindu mythology in which the warrior Duryodhana is struck down by his cousin Bhima at the end of a bloody war of succession while seven attendants look on.

Experts say looters hacked the figures off their bases during the civil war. Some were apparently smuggled out of the country and eventually wound up in the hands of private collectors or in museums abroad, as did many statues from other temples that the Cambodian government now hopes to reclaim.

The figures of three onlookers to the duel are now in Cambodia, including two that were returned in June by New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Sotheby's auction house has agreed to return the footless figure of Duryodhana, valued at \$2 million to \$3 million, which was placed in Sotheby's catalog in 2011 after the widow of its former private Belgian owner gave it up for sale. Sotheby's later pulled it from its catalog. Last year, the auction house agreed to surrender the statue, settling a lawsuit filed by the U.S. government on Cambodia's behalf.

Also, Christie's auction house will return a statue of the mythological figure Pandava. The auction house sold it to an anonymous collector in 2009 but bought it back earlier this year after officials determined that the sculpture had been looted, according to a *New York Times* report.

Ji-sung Park announces retirement

SUWON, South Korea (AP) — Ji-sung Park has called time on a trailblazing career that was launched in South Korea's unlikely run to the World Cup semifinals and really took off during his seven seasons with one of the world's biggest clubs.

The long-time Manchester United midfielder told a news conference at a stadium named in his honor that he has retired from top-flight football. In his immediate plans are two friendly matches this month and a wedding date in July.

The 33-year-old Park played his last season on loan with PSV Eindhoven in the Dutch league. He retired from international football in 2011, after representing South Korea at three World Cups, and rejected calls for a return to help the squad at Brazil 2014.

A high-energy, hardworking midfielder, Park followed manager Guus Hiddink from the national team to Eindhoven after the 2002 World Cup, then became the first South Korean to make an impact in the Premier League after signing with Manchester United, where he won the 2008 Champions



League and four Premier League titles.

At the time of negotiations for his last contract at Manchester United in 2011, manager Alex Ferguson said the Korean's "career at United has been nothing but excellent, a tremendous professional."

Park left Old Trafford in 2012 after seven seasons to make an ill-fated move to the Queens Park Rangers. After the team's relegation from the English Premier League, Park was loaned to PSV Eindhoven, where his European journey had begun in 2003.

"Tve been mulling retirement since February, and I've concluded that my knee won't hold up for another season," the domestic Yonhap news agency quoted Park as saying. "I have no regrets

about my career. I do think about what might have been if I hadn't been injured, but I have no feelings of disappointment or sorrow as I leave the sport."

Park had operations on his right knee in 2003 and in 2007. He was sidelined for eight months after the second surgery and had occasional trouble with the knee in recent seasons.

He recently said he'd accomplished more in football than he'd imagined possible.

He sent many benchmarks for Asian footballers, including being the first to score goals at three World Cups.

When his country co-hosted the World Cup with Japan in 2002, Park netted the winner in an upset 1-0 victory over Portugal in the last group match to get South Korea into the knockout stage for the first time. The South Koreans were the first from Asia to reach the World Cup semifinals.

In 2006, he scored the equalizer to hold eventual finalist France to a 1-1 draw and, in 2010, he scored in the 2-0 win over Greece that helped South Korea reach the Round of 16 for the first time on foreign soil.
