### HIDDENBROOKE CHARTER SCHOOL DENIED

On January 24, Dr. Rick Damelio, the State Administrator for the Vallejo City Unified School District, held a special board meeting to announce his decision to deny the Hiddenbrooke Community School Charter Petition. In a second agenda item, the District offered to create a standard district K-5 school in the HB community.

In response to the district'ss denial of the petition, the HCS Steering Committee:

- Endorses the efforts of the district to VCUSD's offer of a disput a quality district school in Hiddenbrooke. We are confident that Hiddenbrooke parents will actively at the new school.
- Urges the Hiddenbrooke community to be diligent in ensuring that the proposed facilities are consistent with what should be provided given the level of taxation on this community and the design aesthetics of the the charter through the appeal community.

### **HCA PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

- The holidays are over and we are back to our normal routines. The torrential rains over the New Year's weekend left a major mudslide on Hiddenbrooke Parkway near Bennington Court. The City of Vallejo crews worked quickly to clean up the mess, but traffic was diverted for several hours to Bennington Drive. If this happens again, please follow the directions of the traffic control staff and don't attempt to drive through the mud. You could damage your vehicle and the landscape underneath. The city has applied to FEMA for disaster relief to pay the clean up costs.
- Vallejo Fire Chief Don Parker recently reported that the Hiddenbrooke ambulance station is expected to open on Tuesday, January 24. The site, immediately adjacent to the satellite site along Hiddenbrooke Parkway between I 80 and the Welcome Center, was expected to be open by the middle of November, but there were several unforeseen delays in the construction. The Vallejo Fire Department is planning to have an open house at the site in February. Please watch Hiddenbrooke News for more information.

This station will be staffed by Medic Ambulance and will be the first responder on emergency medical calls in Hidden-brooke. The Medic Ambulance crew will be trained in CPR and able to operate a defibrillator, but they are not certified paramedics and are not able to administer medication. They also have other duties in transporting patients and may not be here when the call is received. The fire station on Admiral Callahan Lane is still our designated responder in an emergency and they will dispatch a crew at the time the call is received.

Jim Libien and I met with Acting City Manager Nicholini, Fire Chief Parker and Dave Egan from Triad on January 9 to discuss the construction of the fire station. Everyone agreed that a fire station was needed in Hiddenbrooke, but the City still has concerns about getting the funds to staff it. Last year City Manager Kemp informed us that the annual cost of over \$2 million would have to be paid by a special assessment on each Hiddenbrooke lot of approximately \$1,800. The Hiddenbrooke Community Association believes that the City of Vallejo has a responsibility to provide Hiddenbrooke with the same level of fire service as other areas and that there should be no extra tax to provide this service. At our meeting we encouraged the city to develop plans now so that they could use economies of scale and do the fire station grading at the same time Triad is doing grading for Phase III.

Acting City Manager Nicholini stated that the city is about to enter into a contract with a consulting company to study the fire department operations for the entire city and develop recommendations. The study is expected to be completed by June 2006 and at that time they would be better able to decide how to staff a Hiddenbrooke fire station. There would still be time to coordinate construction grading with Triad, as the grading for Phase III would not start until the summer of 2006 at the earliest.

- On February 14, the Vallejo City Council will be hearing an appeal of the Planning Commission approval for Phase III,
  The Grove at Hiddenbrooke. Phase III is located about half way between I 80 and the Welcome Center on the right
  side of the Parkway as you enter Hiddenbrooke. This is the last development that will be built in Hiddenbrooke other
  than the custom home sites. If you are interested in the appeal, I would encourage you to attend the city council meeting on February 14th at 7:00 PM at City Hall, 555 Santa Clara Street in downtown Vallejo.
- The nominating committee is looking for individuals interested in serving on a variety of positions on the Hiddenbrooke Community Association board. The next election will be in June 2006. I would encourage you to contact Priscilla Silvey at 643-0995 if you are interested in improving our community. We live in a wonderful valley, but there are many areas that still need attention. I think you will find participation on the board to be both rewarding and challenging.
- If you haven't joined the Hiddenbrooke Community Association now is the time to take advantage of our reduced dues of \$20 covering the period 1/1/06 to 6/30/06. You can download a membership application at our web site <a href="https://www.hiddenbrookeonline.org">www.hiddenbrookeonline.org</a> and drop off your check at the Welcome Center. We need the support of the entire community as we continue to work for a fire station, park and school in Hiddenbrooke and other improvements such as a tot lot, and land-scape rehabilitation.

### SPRING CLEANING CHECKLIST

Spring is in the air, and as soon as the rains stop, it's time to air.

out our homes and get rid of the stuffy Winter blahs. In other words, it's time for your annual Spring Cleaning. Whether you do it all yourself, or bring in some help, here is a list of items that need to be done at least once a year!

#### **General House**

- \_ Dust out of the way places, like fan blades, door frames, and on top of tall pieces of furniture. Always start at the top, as dust falls, and then vacuum when done.
- \_Wash windows and remove and

hose down your screens.

- \_Clean your window blinds and vacuum your drapes. If anyone in your household smokes, have your drapes professionally dry cleaned.
- \_Have your carpets professionally cleaned.
- Have your vacuum cleaner serviced, or at least take it apart and cut out any tangled hair, thread, or string that might be clogging up the roller. Replace the vacuum bag.

- \_Sterilize your phones using a Clorox Wipe.

## ATTENTION: CALLING ALL GARDENS

We have just returned from a Christmas-New Year's trip to England where we had a wonderful time with our five grand-children. However, we were alarmed when the newspapers carried stories of floods in the Bay Area and showed photos of downtown Napa and San Anselmo under water. On our return home we were relieved to find nothing worse in our yard than some loose soil and wood chips that had washed down the slope and over the driveway.

In this season of gales and floods it may be difficult to feel much enthusiasm for gardening. But time invested now can pay handsomely later, especially for anybody planning to submit their garden for the Hiddenbrooke Garden Tour, which is slated for Sunday May 21, from 1:00pm to 5:00pm.

Now is the time for gardens to be identified that might be suitable for the tour. We need volunteers who will be proud to show off their gardens. Ideally those selected will reflect the range of property types in Hiddenbrooke, from patio gardens in some of the newer homes to the larger lots of the longer established developments.

In the October/November 2005 issue of Neighbors we suggested the focus could be on gardens created mainly by the homeowners themselves, rather than being entirely designed, installed and maintained by landscape contractors. But we don't want to discourage homeowners who started off with professional landscaping and planting but are now maintaining their own yards. And it is not essential that you mow your own lawn or pick up your own leaves in order to qualify for the tour!

All registered participants will receive a brochure containing a description and a photograph for each of the 15 or so gardens to be visited. Individuals or small groups will find their way around the properties in random order, followed by an HCA-sponsored garden party at our home in Lansdowne Place. Those kind and generous neighbors who open their gardens to the public will of course be unable to attend the official tour, but we are planning a preview tour for them the day before followed by cocktails.

We hope to have more than enough submitted gardens so that the Garden Tour Committee can visit all the gardens to make a final selection.

## THE WELCOME CENTER: PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

For visitors and residents alike one of the first visions of Hiddenbrooke is the Welcome Center located near the soon-to-be-completed Hiddenbrooke Plaza commercial center. As Hiddenbrooke continues to attract new owners, it may be helpful to talk about how it got there, what it is, what it is not, and what it could be in the future.

#### **Common Questions:**

One question that seems to come up often is "Why can't we have a gate?" I have learned that discussions about gating Hiddenbrooke were held with the City when the Master Plan was being developed, but because Hiddenbrooke Parkway is a public street, open access cannot be denied, therefore there can be no gates.

Other frequent questions involve, "Can't they stop speeders?", or "Can't they cite people who do not stop at the stop signs?" Well, the answer to both questions is no. The employees staffing the Welcome Center are not police officers, traffic cops, nor are they authorized to stop traffic violators.

#### Past:

The Welcome Center was originally built as a "sales aid" to direct potential buyers to model homes in the different neighborhoods while Hiddenbrooke was still being built up and developed. The building itself is City property, and

is situated on a public street. Up until two months ago, Triad was responsible for managing the Welcome Center operation, but with Triad's eventual exit from the community the Hiddenbrooke Community Association (HCA) agreed to take Triad's role.

#### Present:

The HCA manages the Welcome Center by contracting with a private security firm to staff the building during the day and night. The guards on duty cannot act as a police agency, however they can provide assistance to motorists coming into the community, and they can alert public agencies of incidents on Hiddenbrooke Parkway. On one occasion, a resident needed help, and 911 was called to assist. During a closure of Highway 80, signs were posted at the Welcome Center so residents would know to turn around before getting caught at the freeway. And most recently, during rains in early December, the drain at the intersection of Hiddenbrooke Parkway and Bennington Court (where the new commercial center is being built) was flooded. The guard on duty put cones up to direct traffic to the left lane into the Welcome Center so they could turn left on Bennington and avoid the flooded roadway. They also put up cones on Hiddenbrooke Parkway to show the flooding.



One of the recent changes made since HCA took over is the addition of random community patrols. These patrols cover all the neighborhoods in Hiddenbrooke and the waterfall at different times during the day and evening. They are inspecting Hiddenbrooke Maintenance District Property (HMD) for trouble, and if they notice any unusual activity during one of their patrols, they can alert the proper authorities.

#### Future:

What can the Welcome Center become? Well, as the Contract Manager for the Welcome Center, I can get ideas from Hiddenbrooke residents, and if not prohibited by law or budget constraints, I can take those ideas to the HCA Board, and the City, or the Security firm to see if any of the ideas could be accommodated. The new year could bring many opportunities to make the Welcome Center even more of an asset to Hiddenbrooke, so please, if you have some suggestions, send them to Hiddenbrooke wc@yahoo.com. ## GOLDEN EAGLE, RED-TAILED HAWKS BATTLE OVER HIDDENBROOKE

If you were to look up over the eighth fairway one Sunday morning last fall, you would have seen three Red-Tailed Hawks, with a wing span of 49 inches, harassing a Golden Eagle, with a wing span of 79 inches. The eagle was not at all terrified by the hawks, and simply stretched out its legs and talons in the direction of the dive-bombing hawks, sometimes flipping on its back to do so. This aerial ballet went on for about fifteen minutes, until the eagle decided to fly west over the hills. The hawks did not pursue.

The Golden Eagle and Red-Tailed Hawk are not the only birds that spend time here. According to the Napa-Solano Audubon Society more than 150 species of birds might be found at Hiddenbrooke. In fact over the last year my wife Sandy and I have recorded more than 80 different birds in our beautiful valley.

The winter season seems to have the greatest variety of birds here as well as at the nearby marshlands in American Canyon where many ducks and

shorebirds can be seen. In fact, the Hiddenbrooke valley is one of the areas that is covered in the yearly Christmas bird count.

The variety of habitats in Hidden-brooke support a wide spectrum of bird types, some are resident all year, some are summer nesters, and some are winter visitors. These include birds as large as the Golden Eagle and the Great Blue Heron and as small as the Anna's Hummingbird, as plain as the Brewer's Blackbird and as colorful as the Belted Kingfisher. There are magnificent flyers such as the Barn Swallow and walkers such as the California Quail, and divers in our ponds such as the Pied-Billed Grebe and the Double-Crested Cormorant.

So, next time you are out for a walk, look up and scan the skies. Perhaps you may see a White-Tailed Kite with black shoulder patches, hovering with talons extended. Or maybe you'll hear the very noisy Killdeer, with double black neck rings, on the golf course or in the fields. You may see the Great

Egret and Snowy Egret on the edges of the ponds.

We would be delighted to instruct anyone in the Hiddenbrooke community about the birds here, although we are far from experts, and to learn from those of you who also "bird" the area. For a complete list of all birds that we've identified here in Hiddenbrooke so far, please feel free to e-mail me at aalsml@msn.com.

One last word about environmental concerns. The creeks, ponds and vegetation in Hiddenbrooke support many kinds of birds. These areas are off-limits to golfers or walkers, and I am sure the community golfers and neighbors are respecting that limit. As neighbors and residents, we should also remember that some of the water. debris, excess pesticides and fertilizer that gets into the storm sewers ends up in the Hiddenbrooke ecological system. Also, pet cats that are free to roam can also do a lot of damage to the bird population, and may be the reason for the very small number of quail in the area. Please be mindful of these issues.

### CALIFORNIA GARDENS CAN BE WORKED YEAR ROUND

Most gardeners are conditioned to think that winter is not only a time of dormancy for their plants but also a time to take a reprieve from the garden. Although this often is true in other parts of the country, most California gardeners are not aware of the many opportunities that can be realized in their gardens this time of year. These opportunities are found in availabilities of particular plants, fertilization to ensure tremendous spring growth. and organic solutions preventing various pests and funguses in the yard.

January and February typically are known for being what is called the "bare root" season. In short, certain plants, which are dormant, are transplanted from their field locations to the local nursery without being containerized. This reduction in the labor process creates an opportunity for the consumer to be able to get a quality plant at a lesser price. The most common plants found are bare root roses and deciduous (plants losing

their leaves) fruit trees.

Most growers such as Jackson Perkins, Weeks Roses, etc. do their shipping only once a year, therefore the greatest number of varieties can be found during these months. Some new roses for 2006 are Beloved, Black Cherry, Spellbound, Fragrant Waves, Tahitian Sunset, Wild Blue Yonder, and Sixteen Candles. Some Fruit Trees to consider might be pluots (plum-apricot crosses), multi-graft fruit trees, and many other varieties.

Fertilization during the winter months can Spraying fruit trees and roses for funensure tremendous growth during the spring, as energy is stored in the plants. A healthy plant will be more resistant to diseases and will bloom and grow more vigorously. Because growth in the winter is mostly in root establishment and energy for future blossoms, the nitrogen content (the first number on a fertilizer bag) should be very low. A typical fertilization formula may be for example a 0-

10-10. The maximum nitrogen (the first number) should not exceed a 5. Granular fertilization is typically applied monthly.

In conjunction with fertilization, using minerals as a means of increasing the nutrient content is also advised. The most important nutrients to consider are iron, sulfur, manganese, and zinc. Mineral additives will aid in disease resistance as well as increase blossom size and sweetness of fruit.

guses and pests can be accomplished through organic means. This will help prevent powdery mildew, black spot, rust, peach leaf curl, as well as control an infestation of a variety of insects. The organic sprays are Copper Spray, Sulfur Spray, and Horticultural Oil.
