- Students wishing to complete two specializations may not count the same course in both.
- > Students are expected to be competent in the use of Microsoft Office Suite (MS Word, Excel Spreadsheets, MS Access, and PowerPoint) for use in second year and subsequent Business classes.
- > BBA students must achieve an overall 2.5 GPA in all of the Business, Economics, and Mathematics courses required in the first two years of study (minimum C grade in each course). Students failing to achieve this minimum must address this deficiency before commencing upper level study in Business Administration.
- > The 2.5 GPA must be sustained in all required Business and Economics courses taken at the upper level. A minimum C grade is required for each course as well as for IDIS 410 or POLS/IDIS 393.
- > It is the sole responsibility of the student to ensure that all requirements for the granting of a degree or diploma have been satisfactorily completed. Students are therefore cautioned to make absolutely certain that the number and combination of their courses meet all university and departmental requirements for the granting of a degree or diploma.
- > A total of 122 s.h. of credit, including a minimum of 42 s.h. (36 s.h. in the major) of upper-level credit is required for graduation. A minimum overall (cumulative) GPA of 2.00 is required for graduation.
- > NOTE: In order to be eligible for Graduation you must complete an Application for Graduation via the Student Portal and submit a completed checklist to the Office of the Registrar by April 30 of the year prior to your completion (there is no fee to apply for graduation). Once your complete application has been received, a degree audit will be completed for you. This audit will confirm which courses are still outstanding in order for you to complete your degree.
