

The Mildred Boone Haden Collection

A few months ago I was contacted by a young man whose grandmother, Mildred Boone Haden, had been a long-time Dallas genealogist, researching over a fifty-year time span. Mildred's greatgrandfather was James Jackson Beeman, for whom the "Ranger John Beeman Chapter #45" of The Sons of the Republic of Texas was named. His brother, John Beeman, was the father of Margaret Beeman who married John Neely Bryan, said to be the original settler of Dallas. In addition to her Texas connections, Mrs. Haden had identified four Mayflower passenger ancestors, and had gathered an amazing library of genealogical reference books.

Mrs. Haden died July 26, 2006, at the age of 97, and her grandson requested assistance in safeguarding her genealogy collection. He is currently busy with a young family but may later wish to continue his grandmother's research, so a goal was that the information in her library would be available to him in the future.

I enlisted the help of Lloyd Bockstruck and together we visited the home of Mrs. Haden. I was personally *very* impressed by the fact that she had a file box with index cards cataloging every book in her extensive collection, which had included Texana and gardening books as well as genealogy material. I realized why her collection was in such remarkable order when I was told that she had been a librarian and had spent many happy hours researching in our Dallas Public Library, where on Saturdays she often appeared with her lunch and research material. Some of our long-time DGS members may have met her there.

Lloyd determined that there were thirty-five volumes that he would be very pleased to add to our DPL Genealogy Section. In addition to those, we found two rare leather-bound first editions of *The History of Dallas County* by John Henry Brown (1887), and *History of Texas* (1895) by John Henry Brown's wife, Mary M. Brown, which were welcome additions to the DPL Texas/Dallas History and Archives Division on the 7th floor.

25TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION DALLAS PUBLIC LIBRARY CENTRAL LIBRARY

The first public library in Dallas, funded in part by Andrew Carnegie, opened in 1901 at the corner of Harwood and Commerce Streets and held 10,000 volumes. In 1955, a new building opened on the same site and provided six floor levels and room for 433,000 volumes. By 1970, this facility at 1954 Commerce was overcrowded and could not accommodate new technological developments.

The site across from City Hall for the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library was acquired as a result of a 1967 City of Dallas bond program. In 1972, Dallas citizens approved capital improvement funds for the planning and design of a new central library. The new Central Library was completed in 1982 and the official dedication ceremony was held on Sunday, April 18. The Central Library was named the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library in honor of the former mayor who was a strong supporter of the effort to build a new Central Library. With eight floors above ground and two floors below, the new facility was designed to accommodate future expansion of collections and services.

In celebration of 25 years of service at the 1515 Young Street location, the Dallas Public Library J. Erik Jonsson Central Library will remain open from 9:00 a.m. on Friday, April 20th until 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 21st. Come celebrate 25 years of service with Dallas Public Library staff and take advantage of research collections, library services, and programs. 

Executive VP, Fundraising Elizabeth Kutz

Fundraising was busy this year with lock-ins, lectures and the Summer Institute. January was the Lock-in at the Library. We had seventy-one in attendance with one volunteer. In February we started our lecture series with lectures given by Karen Clifford, FUGA, AG, on "Methods and Sources for Online Research." The attendance at this event was 139 participants and 12 volunteers. The TMG (The Master Genealogist) SIG sponsored Bob Velke, the founder and developer of TMG, in March. Sixty-one TMGers were at the event with 6 additional volunteers. In April the lecture series continued on the subject of "Immigration and Naturalization" with Gladys Friedman Paulin, CG. There were 109 participants and 19 volunteers. In June there was another Lock-in in the Library. This lock-in was a little smaller with 51 in attendance and 3 volunteers. In July we had the Summer Institute with three lecturers, Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck, FNGS, Patricia Law Hatcher, FAGS, and John Sellers, on "Mining Genealogical Treasures." Eighty-three people were in attendance with 13 volunteers. The total profit for 2006 was seventeen thousand three hundred twenty-five dollars (\$17,325).

Treasurer Paul Rimmer

We made a \$40,000 donation to the genealogy section of the Dallas Public library in December. The society closed out the year with \$7,581 in the checking account and \$56,085 in CDs for a total of \$63,666 in cash assets.

VP, Membership Sharon Henry

During 2006, the office of Membership has been actively welcoming 95 new members and 8 members converting to life membership status. With the addition of these new members, the total membership as of December 31st was 889.

After we had selected the books we needed at the Dallas Public Library, I contacted the Mesquite Library to see which of the remaining items they might need for their collection. One reason for this choice was that the Mesquite area has been a gathering place for the Ranger Beeman SRT Chapter and many of the researchers at the Mesquite library have an interest in the Pleasant Mound Public Cemetery where early Beeman family members are buried. Librarian Elizabeth Welch was delighted to select many books from the remainder of the collection.

On the scheduled "book retrieval day," Ed Millis and I appeared at Mrs. Haden's home along with Elizabeth Welch, and Bobby Rutherford and Marjorie Bays from the Mesquite Genealogical Society. In addition to receiving books, they were delighted to become the custodians of Mrs. Haden's vertical files. The remainder of the collection has been distributed among various libraries.

One of our special finds during the book retrieval were some old manuscript papers in a box upon which Mrs. Haden had written "Old Book Written by my Grandfather James J. Beeman." [See picture on page 26 for our happy faces as we enjoyed this once-in-a-lifetime find.] Once these fragile pages have been conserved, we hope that, if the material has not already been published, members of the Ranger Beeman SRT chapter will be permitted to transcribe and publish the contents.

The happy outcome of this unusual opportunity is that a copy of every book that was in Mrs. Haden's collection is at our Dallas Public Library, the Mesquite library became the caretaker of a very rich collection of original research

material, and the Hopkins County Society (home of John Sellers, one of our favorite DGS speakers), the Irving and Denton libraries, and the Balch Springs History/Genealogy organization have added useful books to their collections.

And I personally had the unique opportunity to review the contents of each volume in Mildred's collection, many of which provided additional background information on several of my 8th and 9th greatgrandparents who were early New England settlers.

What a great treat—made possible by the generosity of the Haden family.

DALLAS COUNTY ONLINE RECORDS ALERT! BY SHARON GAYLE

If you have any family history in Dallas County after 1964, you've got to see this website! Effective June 5, 2006, the office of the Dallas County Clerk made real estate records available via its Official Public Records website. All Dallas County real estate recorded since January 1, 1974, are available as images online. You can print the images on your home computer at no charge. Records dated 1964-1973 are indexed only.

The website suggests that the database contains only records dealing with real estate. That's not entirely true. "Assumed names" or DBAs were among the records found. Such documents rarely involve real estate. And, as most genealogists know, other documents are frequently recorded among deeds. For example, performing a search on my mother, I received 10 hits,

including deeds where she purchased property in 1970. But I also discovered an "Affidavit of Heirship" related to my grandmother's estate. This gem resulted in obtaining a copy of my grandmother's will. Her estate involved house and land, but it was considered too small an estate to probate. So, her executor elected to distribute the estate through an affidavit to avoid the higher court costs of probate. This is something to consider if you don't find that ancestor's records in any probate file.

The types of records reportedly available are too long to list here. However, a random sample of the records found follows:

* In 1979, an Application for Exemption from Self-Employment Tax (an IRS form) was found for Timothy M. Cardwell, filed in 1979. Mr. Cardwell was a pastor at the First Baptist Church in Mesquite, Texas.

* In 1980, James B. Gardner and his two partners in Brown & Co. filed an amendment to that partnership. The amendment reflected changes in the organization's leadership.

* In 1980, Darlene Law, mother of Patrick Wayne Grubbs, legally changed her son's name to Patrick Wayne Law.

* In 1980, in the court of Judge Dee Brown Walker, La Rhonda Frances Osborn changed her name to Frances Isbell Young, an alias that she had apparently been using for some time.

* In 1976, Elizabeth Holder Cabell petitioned to have the will of her husband, Earle Cabell set aside in an "Election Not to Probate." Mr. Cabell was mayor of Dallas at the time of the John F. Kennedy assignation.

* In 1980, the will of Cyril Frederick Vincent, "late of Laconia, New Hampshire but a resident of Dallas at the time of his death," was certified by the Probate Court of Belknap County, New Hampshire.

* In 1987, Charles C. Cravens and Britton Reed Cravens were granted legal guardianship over their father, Charles Ray Cravens, who suffered from dementia and terminal illness. The petitioners were residents of Tarrant County. Their father was a resident of Dallas.

Currently, the Dallas County Clerk's Office processes more than 2,300 records a day. With this new system, all new records are processed and indexed and available on-line within 48 hours. Future researchers will be able to access even more records.

The database search engine is somewhat cumbersome in that not all documents within a record can be found using the query. This was the case of my grandmother's will. If I had searched specifically for a will, I might have

missed finding it embedded in the "Affidavit of Heirship." Another weakness of the search engine, for genealogists, is the lack of a soundex or "wild card" feature that allows for variations in spelling. A third issue is that these records are only those which were filed with the County Clerk and do not represent all such documents filed in the various county courts. For example, my mother was granted guardianship of two grandchildren in 1979. This document, filed in the records of the 256th Family District Court, was not found in the OPR database.

A couple of additional caveats need to be outlined here as related to viewing the available images. The technology used to display and print the images requires an application extension to Microsoft's IE Explorer 6.0R and Microsoft.NET 1.1R. For those folks whose eyes glazed over at that previous sentence, you can recruit one of your friends who understand techno-babble to help you with the details. Unfortunately, even for the geekier of us, the website does not have all the instructions for setup on a single page. Various instructions necessary to set my computer up for access were found on three separate web pages and still I had to call the "live help" phone number before I understood what I needed to do.

Once the technical problems were resolved, however, the database came to life like Aladdin's lamp. It was a delight to peruse. The database is available at: http://www.realestate.countyclerk.dallascounty.org/.

In Memoriam Weldon I. Hudson Longtime DGS member



Weldon I. Hudson, 90, passed away Saturday, February 3, 2007.

Weldon was born September 3, 1916, in Dublin, Texas to John and Delphia Hudson. He served in the Coast Guard from 1942-45 in the American and Asiatic theaters during World War II. He married Lillie Baugh in 1946 and resided in Richland Hills for all of their married life.

Weldon was a past president of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society, past president of the Hudson Family Association, a member of the Texas State Genealogical Society and was a professional genealogist.

Before delving into published sources, however, it is always important to pause long enough to organize one's own personal papers and review standard research

These approaches correspond to the distinct change in the legal status of African Americans in the United States before and after the Civil War.
