When the work was completed there he returned to Yazoo county and was employed by Landrum Oilwell Maintenance Co. which was located at Oil City community.

In 1943-1944 oil was discovered in Jasper County, Mississippi. The Landrum company moved some of the workers to Heidelberg, Mississippi. Since this was a small rural town, housing was scarce so many of the families lived in nearby towns. He and his family moved to Vossburg where they rented an apartment from the Vester Rowell family. Later they would rent a house from Mr. Gay Voss an elderly paraplegic.

About 1947-1948 he obtained a job as a pumper with the Fair and Billings Leasing Company. He maintained the production and maintenance of eight oil wells in the Heidelberg area. In 1950 he moved his family into a

company owned house at Heidelberg.

In 1963 he and Ruth separated and he went to California where he lived for a short period of time before relocating to Louisiana.

He continued in the oil related jobs until his death. At the time of his death he had been employed by an Off Shore Drilling Company as a worker on a shuttle boat to carry men and supplies to the drilling rigs off the Louisiana coast. He lived in Morgan City, Louisiana.

He was a gentle person and loved Nell dearly. He never left the house without kissing her and telling her he loved her, even to do the farm chores. By todays standard he and his family lived a meager existence. They owned 180 acres of land approximately eight miles south of Yazoo City.

They raised corn for the chickens, cows, horse and pigs. He raised cotton for sale to buy the flour, sugar and other staples they did not raise and clothing. They killed hogs in the fall and he smoked the meat and sausage in the smoke house next to house. They raised chickens for eggs and eating. There was always plenty of milk and butter.

In those days refrigeration consisted of an icebox. With delivery twice a week of ice by the store owner Tom Kirk. Milk was kept cool by lowering a jug into the cistern which caught rainwater for drinking, washing and bathing.

After his wifes death he continued to live alone on the 180 acre farm until he died. He is buried at the Mt. Olivet Church Cemetery. in the Mechanicsberg community.

He was summonsed before he got to the main road. By the time the doctor arrived from Yazoo City she was in a coma. She never regained consciousness. She died later that night. Roy was deferred from the draft.

George's death was avenged by the state of Louisiana by sentencing Thomas to a prison term in Louisianna State Prison in Angola, Louisiana. He was an inmate there at the time of the 1920

Federal Census.

He moved with his widowed mother and siblings from Gwinnett County to the Reed Creek District of Hart County sometime in the 1850's. He enlisted in the Confederate service in Co. D, 1st Regiment of GA Reserves on April 19, 1864, at the age of 17. He was a lifelong resident of Reed Creek community, teaching school for a time, also serving as Justice of Peace for the 1115th G. M. District.

The marriage was performed by Asa Avery, M..G., at the home of Jim and Joanna O'Barr Sone of Reed Creek, where Fannie Walters was living at the time.

Frank Estes was licensed to preach June 24, 1882 and was serving Mt. Tabor Church in Anderson County, SC. On Dec. 21, 1883, he was ordained to the full ministry of the Baptist Church at Reed Creek; and served as pastor for many churches throughout Hart and Anderson counties during the next 35 years.

Frank lost one of his eyes due to a neuralgic condition in September of 1887. The eye was extracted in the Medical College in Atlanta, GA on October 17, 1888 and an artificial eye fitted. He has a black eye-patch which he often wore in place of the artificial eye, and in later years wore glasses with a darkened lens over the missing eye. He was about 5'6" tall, fair complexioned with blue eyes and sandy-red hair, and had a red bears. In later his hair and beard were completely white.

Frank Estes died Nov. 5, 1926 at his home at Reed Creek, after several years of ill health. He was buried at Reed Creek Baptist Church where he was a member, and where he had served as pastor. His wife, Fannie, died at home

After the presumed death of his father Samuel, the family was listed on the 1850 Federal Census in Attala County. He had assumed the head of household status at that time. He is listed with his mother Mary and sister Elizabeth. There were bothers but none listed at this time.

In 1857 he took a bride, Sarah Elizabeth Tatum in Yazoo County. This marriage is recorded in the Yazoo County courthouse.

The Civil War was raging and many of the young men from Mississippi joined the ranks, such a young man was Samuel James Dawson

Confederate States Army (CSA).

Copies of his Civil War records list his birth place as Yazoo County.. He enlisted April 4, 1862 in Yazoo County and was assigned to 1st Regiment Ms. Calvary--Company "K" known as Wirt Adams Regiment. (This regiment was also known as Woods Reg't Calvary.) He served under Captain Barnett. He was present at the general muster of the Regiment at Corinth, Ms. on May 9, 1862..

By May of 1862 he was detached to the Navy Gun Boat Yard in Yazoo City. under the command of Admiral Brown. He remained at this command until the end of the war.

His rank was Private.

He applied to the State of Ms. for a Pension on The 1st Monday in Sept., 1900 for his Confederate service.

His grave is marked by a CSA marker which was placed Sept. 10, 1940.

Mechanicsberg was the route taken by the Federal troops to nearby Vicksburg. The town was burned except the church on one such march.

By family history Samuel James had red hair....a true Irishman..

Legend has it that Willoughby moved his family to Bryson City, NC to keep his sons from making corn liquor, which was the custom of family and neighbors in Rabun County, GA. They had twin babies, Columbus and Victoria, who were only six or seven months old, but set out for Bryson City, NC in the cold of January or February, 1860. They spent the nights in churches along the way.

At first the family moved to Bruckner's Branch, near Jackson Line. Later, Willoughby purchased land at Lauada, NC. At one time Willoughby and Mary owned part of the land on which ,Saw Mill Hill Church and Cemetery is located. He helped with building the original church. Both Willoughby and Mary were religious people. They were not rich, but were financially well off for mountain people of their generation.

Charles, the fifth son of Capt. Benjamin and Jemima Smith Merrill was born in November 1761, served in Salisbury District Militia during the Revolution & received his pay in a land grant on March 24, 1784. He was not in Rowan when the 1790 census was taken. It is thought that he went to South Carolina.

Pendleton County, South Carolina, where Charles was thought to have eventually gone and where Abel Merrell was thought to be born in 1793 was formed from Indian Lands in 1789 in the northeast corner of South Carolina. In 1826, Pendleton County was abolished and divided into Anderson and Pickens County. Pickens was divided into Pickens and Oconee County in 1868.

1777: 7 May Jacob Wiseman and Robert Moore were asked to arbitrate a matter over the estate of Benjamin Merrill between Harmon Butner and the Merrill children, Samuel, John, Andrew, William, Benjamin, Penelope, Boyd McCreary and Anna who have interests of Charles, Elijah and Jonathan. Butner was ordered May 9, 1777 to appear in court with Charles, Elijah and Jonathan, orphans of Benjamin Merrill "to be dealt with as the law required." At the next court, Charles, age 15, was to be bound to his brother John who was to teach him the art of being a master blacksmith and to receive a set of tools when he came of age "besides what the law required." Elijah was bound to his oldest brother Samuel to learn the weaver's trade. Samuel was to give him a loom and tackle. Jonathan was bound to his brother-in-law, Boyd McCreary.

1790: Charles, Benjamin, William were in Laurens County, South Carolina in 1790 with 2 males under 16 and 2 females. In 1800 he was in Mudlick Creek, Pendleton District, South Carolina, age (26-45), with 2 males 2 females (under 10): 1 male (10-16) and 1 female(16-26).

I also give and devise to my Daughter Jemima's children that she bear to Benjamin Merrill to Wit: Samuel, John, Andrew, William, Charles, Elijah, and Jonathan Merrill, Anna McCleary, and Penelope Merrill to all and each of them severally fifty pounds.

1803: Jemima Smith Merrell Butner's will probated in 1803 mentions sons Samuel, the eldest, Andrew, Jonathan, Charles and Elijah. Daughters Nancy and Elline.

1843: According to descendants, widow Elizabeth lived with son Benjamin and family in Marshall Co, AL until her death. In the 1840s, Charles Merrill's widow, Elizabeth, filed a Revolutionary War pension claim based on Charles' alleged service. At the time she was in Marshall Co, AL and stated that Charles had died in 1822. A witness

stated that Charles was a son of Benjamin Merrill who was hanged by the British. The pension was denied.

John Cunningham, Cherokee County, Alabama, knew the above applicant and husband in North Carolina in Roan County, and that Charles Merrel was known as a Revolutionary soldier. Benjamin Merrill, son of Charles Merrill, was a blacksmith. His first wife was a Cherokee lady named Nancy Thompson by whom he had 4 children. He then married Margaret and they had children Rutha Emaline, Beverly, Morgan and Martha Jane. He acquired 640 acres of Cherokee land through his marriage to Nancy Thompson, which was called the Merrill Reservation. He was listed as being one of the population of Sims settlement and signed the petition from intruders on Chickasaw lands to President James Madison, dated 5 September 1810, Mississippi Territory, Elk River, Sims Settlement. While there was a Sims settlement of about 100 families on Elk River, the settlers who signed the petition had settled on other tributaries of the Tennessee in present-day Limestone County, Alabama, and Giles County, Tennessee and other areas. More than 50 of the original 1810 petition signers, 16 of whom had been removed from their homes in 1809, did not abandon their original intention to live in the new land and are listed in the Limestone County census. Some of them had bought land in Madison County before returning to Limestone county. Others seem to have survived all the removals and ultimately secured their place in the new county. When civil government was organized, Benjamin Merrill and Thomas Redus became justices of the peace and James Slaughter became sheriff. When the Cherokees ceded their lands in the treaty of 1835, the U.S. Government in turn gave each the option to settle on a 160 acre tract of land of their choice, or move out West to reservations. The Cherokees were given this choice before the white man was allowed to move into the newly ceded territory north of the Tennessee River. Six Indian families assumed English names and acquired the lands by right of preemption. They were: Wade, who settled the section near present Guntersville Dam; Harrison, whose land was near the Capehart place at Columbus City; Edward Gunter, who settled the Dr. L. D. Lusk farm just north of the present George Houston River Bridge; Merrell, who settled Merrell Mountain across the river from Cottonville; Orr, who settled near the Marshall-Jackson line; and Robinson whose section was near the present Guntersville Dam. It is interesting to note that one or two full-blooded Indian families remained in Marshall County as late as World War I. Official TVA maps still list the boundaries which the original six Indian families selected. (Information provided by Dorris McKinney)

On this the _____day of September, 1832, personally appeared, in open court before Ezechel Buffington, Joseph Dunegan and Thomas L. Tate, sitting a court of ordinary judges of the Inferior Court of said County now sitting, John Collins, a resident of Hall County, State of Georgia, aged seventy-one years, who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order too obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed on the 7th day of June, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated, to wit, volunteered under the command of Colonel Neal on the tenth day of May, 1776, he being fifteen years and five months old, and continued in service until about the last of October in the same year, the said Colonel Neal and Lieut. Colonel Watson being with the regiment alternately, that after marching about and having some small skirmishes he marched to what was then called Middle Settlement of the Cherokee Indians, General Andrew Williamson having the command and Colonel Sumpter, Thompson, Middleton and Thomas being along, that on the waters of the Tennessee River they had a general engagement with the Indians.

That sometime about the last of October, 1776, he substituted in the place of a man named Thomas Harrison in the regiment of drafted militia of South Carolina under the command of the above mentioned Colonel Neal and marched to the frontiers of Georgia to guard said frontier against the Creek Indians and Tories. The term of the militia tour in South Carolina, applicant does not distinctly recollect, but thinks it was two months. Having served out his time, he returned to South Carolina and immediately substituted in the place of one Moses Kemp in the Battalion of Horse militiamen under the command of Major Frances Ross and marched towards the Georgia line, passing General Williamson's army near Augusta, continued on and joined the army of General Ashe of Brier Creek(Ga.), and in about three days after his(?) the army was disgracefully defeated. Applicant obtained no knowledge of the officers commanding at the place except he knows General Ashe had the command, and that General Elbert was also there. After the defeat, Major Ross, with much of his men as could be found, returned to where General Williamson "lay"near Augusta. After being detained there sometime, they were disbanded about the 16th of March, 1779. Immediately after getting some deponent substituted in the place of a man by the

name of McIntire (he belives Daniel) and marched in the regiment commanded by Colonel Charles McDowell and Lieutenant Colonel Hugh Tinnin, the former of Burke County, North Carolina, the latter of Hillsborough in the same state. This tour was for three months, after joining headmasters during this campaign deponent was in some small skirmishes, and in the battle at Stono, General Lincoln having the command of the army; General Pulaski was also there, together with Colonel Lewis, Mayborn, and many other officers. General John Butler commanded the regiment in which deponent was.

After being disbanded, deponent returned home sometime in September, 1779, and shortly after substituted in the place of a man by the name of Nichols who was drafted in Lincoln County, North Carolina, to march to Charleston, South Carolina. Deponent marched to Charleston and encamped within a mile and a half of the city until the expiration of his tour, doing no active service, nor mixing with any other troops during the time. Deponent further states that there were four regiments of the North Carolina under the command of General Lillington, Colonel Hampton, and Lieutenant Colonel Hamright, Major Henry Dixon and Major Sharp? being there, deponent being under the command of Colonel Hamright. Deponent acted during this last tour as an Orderly Sergent. Deponent further states that about the time his tour of service at this place expired four Captains turned out to raise a regiment of volunteers to serve until the 24th day of June following, to defend Charleston against a British armed fleet then lying off Charleston. Colonel Archibald Lightti (Lytle) of Hillsborough, North Carolina and Major John Habersham took the command of these companys. Deponent enrolled himself under Captain John Lowman of Sallisburg, North Carolina. The companies were then marched into Charleton and regular discipline commenced, when Colonel Lyttle took deponent from the ranks and appointed him Sergeant Major in which capacity he acted as long as the regiment stood the seige, having lasted about forty-two days, at which time General Lincoln capitulated and made a surrender of Charleston, when the American army became prisoners of war. The militia and volunteers being paroled, deponent returned to Lincoln County in North Carolina, the place to which he was paroled, and after the British over run all South Carolina, Colonel Ferguson marched into the upper part of the State when deponent was taken and carried to his camp, accused with a break of parole, tried for his life and sentenced to be hung, but fortunately effected his escape. This circumstance, and the confused state of the country, induced deponent to - (missing text). Deponent inability to attach himself to a regular army in manner he wished, he fell in with some scouting refugees from the States of Georgia and South Carolina under no regularity of discipline, each one coming and going as he pleased and remained with them until after the Battle of Guilford Courthouse, North Carolina. During this time, he was at the Battle of Kings Mountain where Ferguson was killed and all his men killed or taken. At this battle Colonel Campbell, Cleveland, Shelby and Sevier commanded with some other field officers. Deponent was also at the Battle of Cowpens where General Morgan defeated Colonel Tarleton, deponent and his party getting there after the engagement had commenced and leaving the same night, knows but little of the officers. He recollects, however, that General Morgan had the command and that Colonel Washington was there with his Dragoons. Also recollects a Major Pickens who was there. At Guilford Courthouse the case was pretty much the same. The party with whom deponent went got there after the fighting commenced and left the army the next morning. Deponent had now been about six months with a party of men who(?) no regularity. Sometimes consisting of seventy or eighty men and sometimes not more than ten, sometimes calling one man captain and sometimes another. "Our practice was to keep as near the flank or rear ear of the enemy as we dare do, occasionally taking a horse or prisoner from them. Sometimes chasing a foraging party, and sometimes being chased in turn". After the Battle at Guilford Courthouse deponent, finding himself and horse much emaciated and almost naked except a pair of buckskin breeches, quit the army and went to Henry County, Virginia, where he soon became acquainted with a colonel who informed him that the militia regiment which he commanded was called for and that he would march in a few days, and if deponent would substitute in the place of one of the drafted men, and get himself some clothes, he Colonel Penn would keep his horse well at his own expense, and when they started he would appoint him Adjutant to his regiment, which proposition deponent acceded to, and substituted in the place of one Jones. When arriving at the place of rendezvous, Colonel Penn gave deponent a certificate that he was appointed Adjutant to the regiment with the rank of Lieutenant and was to be obeyed accordingly under this appointment. Deponent remained about six months with the Virginia militia, still acting as Adjutant, though the officers and privates were relieved two or three times. He being in the line commanded by Colonels Penn, Caloway, Jones, Shippen, and Major Warless, Voger, and two others whose names he does not recollect, remained. The brigade was under the command of General Lawson. Deponent was in some slight skirmishes, one at old James Town where General Wayne fought the British with an unequal force. Deponent was also at the siege of York Town where Cornwallis was taken and deponent further states that during this campaign they had General officers with them as General Wayne, Steuben, Major Lafayette and General Washington. Shortly after Cornwallis surrender, the Virginia militia was disbanded and deponent received a certificate from Colonels Jones an Shippen and

returned to what is now called York District, South Carolina, the place of his infancy and childhood and has never seen Virginia since. He remained in South Carolina until the following March, 1782, when there being a call for the militia, he was called on to stand a draft, which he refused to do, preferring to volunteer and did so. Marched to the place of rendezvous at Orangeburg. The South Carolina Militia was badly organized and disciplined, many squads coming to their place of rendezvous without even a Sergeant with them; Colonel Will and about three Captains and three or four Lieutenants had the command of about three hundred men. Colonel Will ordered a part of the men to hold an election among themselves for officers to command them. They did and chose deponent Captain and one man named Black, Lieutenant. Colonel Winn gave deponent a certificate similar to the ones he received in Virginia. That he was elected Captain and was to be obeyed accordingly. Under said certificate, he kept the command of some men until about the last of October, though he knows of no good they did except to eat some beef and rice lying about Orangeburg. Through Isenhole, Bridget and Dorchester he remained with the army, merely for the name of being in the army and being called Captain Collins. Colonels Winn, Britton and Lyons commanded these militia occasionally.

Deponent saith that he became acquainted with said Collins in the Cherokee Nations when they went to war with that nation or tribe of Indians in the year of 1776. He was with him at the Battle with said Indians at the place called Black Hole. He frequently saw said Collins during the war at other Places.

MUCH THE SAME INFORMATION AS ABOVE: John Collins Rev. War Patriot Pension Application in Hall County Ga.

John Collins, Sr., on Jan. 27, 1832 in Hall Co., Ga., made his declaration to obtain a Rev. soldier's pension under the Act of 1832, and stated that he was a resident of Hall county and was 73 years of age on the 9th of December, previously. He stated that he entered the service and served as follows: On or about the 1st of April of 1776, the Cherokee Indians broke out in the frontiers of South Carolina and committed many depredations, and the militia was called out; that he volunteered on May 10, 1776, as a private or militiaman under Capt. John McAfee for six months or during the campaign, and was attached to Col. Neal's Regiment; they marched to a fort on the Seneca River, which he thought was called Fort Independence, and was there six or eight weeks during which time they had frequent skirmishes with the Indians; "from there marched to what was then called the Middle Settlement of the Cherokee Nation where we had a severe engagement with the Indians and defeated them with a loss on our side of 27 killed and 73 wounded. General Andrew Williamson had command of the American Army at this place; Cols. Neal, Thomas, Middleton and Sumter(afterwards Gen. Sumter) were with the Army." After this engagement they marched through the Nation several weeks in skirmishing, then returned to the white settlement and were discharged, Oct. 26, 1776. Deponent stated that he then went to his father's (unnamed) who lived in what was then called Camden District, S.C., where he remained until Oct. 1778, when he left his father's contrary to his father's wishes, and went to where one Thomas Harrison lived, Harrison being a drafted Militiaman, and hired himself to him as a substitute for a two months' tour and was placed under command of Capt. Robert McAfee, Col. Neals Regiment. They marched to Philips 'Fort on Little River in Wilkes Co. Ga., and remained there "some weeks"; they then left a part of their detachment there and he went with other part to a place called

Powells Fort now called Powelton near the high shoals of the Ogeechee River in Ga., where they remained until relieved by other troops, was then discharged and he, the applicant or deponent, then immediately re-entered the service as a substitute for a man whose name was not recalled; the men had about a two months term to serve. After serving this term out, he started home and on the way met a battalion of drafted horsemen under Major Francis Ross, and he enlisted in it as a substitute for Moses Kemp, who was serving at the time as a private. This battalion was under Capt. Thomas Barron. They marched to where General Ashe "lay" on Brier Creek in Georgia, and a few days later his command was attacked by the British and was "shamefully defeated". After this defeat, the South Carolina Militia including himself rambled in small squad up the country to where General Williamson "lay" with a few men near Augusta. Remained there until March 17, 1779. when he was discharged after having served two months and ten days in 1778 and two months 17 days in 1779. He then started to go see his "acquaintances" who lived near the North Carolina line having no home to go to, "just as I got into the settlement where I intended going I met a man by the name of Daniel McIntire who hired me to take his place in the North Carolina Militia for three months". he (Collins) was placed under command of Capt. Benjamin Harden: Co. Charles McDowell and Lt. Col. Hugh Tinningin charge of the Regiment. "We then marched to the little village call Charlotte in Mecklenburg County N.C., and rendezvoused eight or ten days there, waiting for other troops. Then marched to Savannah opposite Augusta, Ga., and joined General Lincoln. They then marched over into Georgia down to Brier Creek, then crossed the river again and pursued the British who were on their march to Charleston. After getting to Bacon's Bridge on the Ashley River they learned the British had changed their route. Remained there several days waiting to learn the enemy's intentions, then marched to Ferguson's Swamp and were there several weeks. The enemy having entrenched themselves at Stono Inlet, they then marched there and attacked the British and drove them out. Then returned to the neighborhood of his friends on the N.C. line where he remained on two nights when a man named James Nichols came and hired him as a substitute for 3months tour of duty as a private.

Deponent was placed under the command of Capt. James Neal and was immediately appointed Orderly Sergeant for his company and attached to the regiment under Col. Hampton and Lt. Col. Hamright. They marched to Charlotte, N.C. from there to Charleston, S.C., or the Smoke Camps near the city where they remained until the company's time expired. General Lennington commanded the brigade consisting of four regiments. The terms of the four regiments having expired, four Captains "turned out, one from each of the four regiments, to raise a company to be called the North Carolina Volunteers",. These four companies thus raised, were raised for the express purpose of defending Charleston against the British, who were then lying near the town in their ships. Deponent, Collins, enrolled himself in one of these companies under Capt. John G. Lowman; they were taken into Charleston and put under strict discipline under command of Col. Archibald Little (Lytle) of Hillsborough, N.C., Col. Little then appointed Collins as Sergeant-Major to the regiment; he served in that rank until they were all taken prisoners in the fall of Charleston. He was appointed about Dec. 1st, and they were taken prisoners about May 12th following.

Several days after the surrender, deponent was paroled to Lincoln Co. N.C.. After being at home about two months he was taken by a "parcel of Tories" and carried to where Col. Ferguson "lay" with a detachment of British and Tories; and was there charged with violating his parole, was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. But by providential occurrences he effected his escape. After this experience and due to the confused condition of the country, he decided to seek refuge in the Army, and not having it in his power to join in the manner he would have preferred, deponent "turned in" with some South Carolina and Georgia refugees "whose practices it was to harass the Tories and occasionally fire on the British regiments as they passed through the country, frequently passing them and our troops; I continued with these men until after the battle of Guilford Court House; during which time I was at Tarleston's defeat at Cowpens, at Ferguson's defeat at Kings Mountain and the battle of Guilford Court House. "After this last battle, being about without clothes and my horse reduced, I went to Henry Co. Va., where I soon became acquainted with a Col. Penn and finding or believing that I possessed some knowledge of military matters, proposed that if I would substitute in place of some one of the drafted militiamen belonging to his Battalion and there by enable myself to get some clothes he would undertake to put my horse in better condition and would give me the appointment of Adjutant of the regiment. I accordingly substituted in place of man named William Jones who had been drafted for two months. Deponent stated that they then rendezvoused at one Hubbard's where Col. Penn gave him his appointment as Adjutant with rank of Lieutenant. They then marched to Powhaten Courthouse, Va., where Col. Penn's term of service expired. Deponent was then recommended by Col. Penn to Col. Calloway and he continued as adjutant under the latter until Calloway's term expire; then Col. Jones succeeded Calloway and he retained Adjutant Collins in his rank. After the siege had started at Little York(Yorktown?..editor) he was recommended to Col. Skipper who retained him as adjutant of his regiment until after Cornwallis' surrender.

Deponent stated he entered the service under Col. Penn April 12, 1781 and was discharged Oct. 24, 1781 and during that time was in the battle of old Jamestown. After obtaining the discharge he procured a certificate from his field officers as to his conduct and their opinion of him, and returned to his old home community in Camden, S.C. where he was reared. He remained there until March of 1782, when a call for S.C. Militia draft was sent out; he volunteered as private for two months. He then found the S.C. Militia in his command badly organized " and most wretchedly disciplined, many if them without a sergeant to command them. He was elected Captain, and then marched to Orangeburg Courthouse and then to Four-holes Bridge, later to Dorchester, then to Bacons Bridge. He continues as Captain until Oct. 1782 when his command was disbanded and he returned home. Deponent stated that he lost all his discharge and certificates of character, etc. when his home burned on Christmas Day, 1825, losing all his effects. He stated he was born in Frederick Co. Md., Dec. 9, 1760 and that the record of his age was taken from the record his father kept(unnamed). He was living when first called into service, in what was then called Camden District but now York District, S.C. He remained in S.C. about 4 years after the war, the moved to Elbert Co. Ga, living there nine years. Then removed to Franklin Co. Ga.,lived there 18 years or until 1813 when he moved about 20 miles away to the place in Hall County where he was living at the time (1834). The application was approved and he was granted a pension of \$88.3 per year form March 4th, 1831, which he drew until his death. Pension File # 28,812 Ga.

Pension of Phoebe Sailors Collins widow of John Collins, Sr.

On Jan. 31, 1853, In Cobb County, Ga., Mrs. Phoebe Collins of that County, made her declaration to obtain a widow's pension, and deposed that she was the widow of the above John Collins, Sr., and was 82 years of age; that she and her said husband were married Nov. 30,1786 in Burke Co. Ga., and her maiden name was Sailors; that her husband died in Cobb County, near the village of Acworth, March 8,1852, age 91 years. Silas Prichard and Sanyek Carruth, residents of Cobb Co., near Acworth, testify for the widow, and said they knew her and her husband well and that the deceased and his wife had resided in Cobb County for the past 20 years, and were highly esteemed for their pure moral character and exemplary lives. They stated they had examined the old family Bible in the handwriting of John Collins, Sr., and it shows his marriage as aforesaid.

Nathaniel owned several hundred acres of land on Generostee and Twenty-six Mile Creeks, and Rocky River, in South Caroling; and also owned land and lived in Franklin County, Georgia. He was married at the Pendleton, SC courthouse to Nancy Findley, and they had the following children; Samuel, Thomas, Macajah, Nancy, Elizabeth, Jane, Cain and Cooper.

We have no further information on Nathaniel's daughters, Elizabeth and Jane; and of Nancy, we know only that she married Robert Richardson at Vironas, SC. Samuel Estes, eldest son of Nathaniel, was born in 1802 in South Carolina and married Elizabeth Moore at Slabtown, SC. We know nothing more of him, except there was a Samuel Estes in Gwinnett County, Georgia in 1840 who may have been him.

James Fleming's estate was administered in the year 1822. His estate papers reveal he was a

co-partner with a Mr. A. Power, but does not state the type of business involved; it believed to have been a blacksmith shop or a grist mill. One of the daughters of Jamie Fleming married a Mr. Sharpton, another married Mr. Jackson and moved to Tennessee.

Deeds of 9 Step from George Smith, Esq, to Benjamin Merrell for 240 ac.; same, 512 ac.; same, 10 Sept 1760, 419 ac. The property was located on the north side of the Yadkin River, St. Luke's parish. According to descendants, the property was about 2 miles north of Jersey Baptist Church, about 5 miles south of current Lexington in Davidson Co, NC. Descendant C. Phelps Merrell elated: "When I visited the old Merrell plantation in August 1983, now owned by Mr. Bill Sheets. An old barn stands on top of a knoll said to be the location of Capt Merrell's home. Off to one side, Abbotts Creek meanders by and the farm land rolls off in all directions."

Capt. Benjamin Merrill and the Merrill Family of NC by W.E. Merrill says he was a gunsmith using river water power for boring operations.

1761: 25 Apr court James Smith, Benjamin Merrill, Andrew Smith and Willis Ellis served on the jury under foreman George Magoune in the case of John Howard vs George Smith. Served on other juries in 1761 and 1762, threatened with a fine for absence.

1767: NC Regulators established at Maddocks Mill near Hillsborough, 4 Apr.

1771: 14 May, Battle of Alamance in Orange Co, NC, now Alamance Co. Gov. Tryon shoots Robert Thompson dead and two hr battle ensues, Regulators were routed. Capt. Merrill not at the battle, but on way with 300 men, took most of Gen. Waddell's men prisoner.

1771: 1 June brought by Col. Fanning to the Jersey Settlement, hanged in the courthouse yard of Hillsborough, Orange Co, NC on 19 June 1771.

Capture, Trial and Execution of Captain Benjamin Merrell and Fellow Regulators From Some Neglected History of North Carolina by W.E. Fitch, 1905, pg. 239-256.

King's Chief Justice passed the following sentence on Capt. Merrill and twelve others which was

"that you be taken from the place whence you came, that you be drawn from thence to the place of execution, where you are to be hanged by the Neck; that you be cut down while yet alive, that your Bowels be taken out and burnt before your Face, that your head be cut off, your Body divided into Four Quarters, and this be at his Majesty's Disposal; and the Lord have Mercy on your Soul."

A historical marker in Hillsborough, NC reads, "On this spot were hanged by order of a Tory Court, June 19, 1771, Merrill, Messer, Matter, Pugh and two other Regulators". Six were pardoned by Gov. Tryon. The six men pardoned were Forrester Mercer, James Stewart, James Emmerson, Hermon Cox, William Brown and James Copeland. Not one of the pardoned, but one of those who were executed, while standing on the gallows Captain Merrill professed his faith in Christ, sang a Psalm, described that fifteen years previously he had professed belief in Christ, had subsequently backslid, but now felt forgiven. He repented for his actions and appealed that the Crown not punish his wife and children for his actions saying

"in a few moments I shall leave a widow and ten children. entreat that no reflection should be cast on them on my account, and if possible, shall deem it a bounty, should you gentlemen petition the governor and council that some part of my estate be spared to the widow and fatherless."

There is evidence that Gov. Tryon honored the latter request. There is evidence that Capt. Merrill was of such high moral character that he expressed a sorrow and conflict of conscience over the fact that he had committed treason to his King that were demanded by his principles and expressed sorrow as he swung free of the gallows into eternity prior to his disembowelment. In 1776 of the 47 articles of the Constitution of the state of North Carolina, member of the newly independent American nation, 13 articles embodied the principles first put forward by the Regulators under Capt. Merrills' influence. Many historians believe that the Battle of Alamance was a turning point in American History and there was a time when it was considered as important as any one other event leading up to the American Revolution. However, it lost that designation and was ignored after the Civil War when the American history books became largely written and published in the northeast and the contributions to American freedom and the revolution were hidden.

Capt. Benjamin Merrill, of the Jersey settlements near Salisbury, was another of the unfortunate victims of Tryon's brutal tyranny. He was on his way to join the Regulators at Alamance, with a company of more than three hundred men (see Waddell's resolutions passed at Potts Creek, Salisbury, and Capt. Alexander's oath, p. 198), when he intercepted Gen. Hugh Waddell and forced him to flee to Salisbury, after taking most of his command prisoners. Captain Merrill was within one day's march of the Alamance when he heard the cannonading, and soon afterwards heard of the victory of the Governor's army. He is said to have regretted that he was not present with his men to have bled with those who fought for liberty. After hearing of the defeat of his comrades he disbanded his men and returned home. He was taken prisoner (State Rec. of N. C., Vol. 19, P. 849) by a detachment under Colonel Fanning, and brought to Tryon's army, encamped at "Jersey Settlement Camp," on Saturday, June 1, 1771; to the west of the Jersey settlement near the Yadkin River, and put in chains with the other prisoners and dragged through the country to Hillsborough, where with his life he paid the forfeit. In this trying situation he gave his friends satisfactory evidence that he was prepared to die, for he not only professed faith in Christ, his hope of heaven, and his willingness to go, but sang a psalm very devoutly, like the Covenanters in the grass market in Edinburgh, and died like a Christian and soldier. On being permitted to speak just before the execution, he said that fifteen years previously he had been converted, but had back-slidden, yet now felt that he was freely forgiven and that he would not change places with any one on the grounds. In conclusion he referred feelingly to his wife and eight children, saying, "I entreat that no reflection be cast upon them on my account"; and requested that some part of his estate be spared for the widow and fatherless. It is said that one of Tryon's soldiers was heard to declare that if all men went to the gallows with a character such as Captain Merrill's, "hanging would be an honorable death." If Captain Merrill with his three hundred men had reached the Alamance the day before the battle, the Regulators would have had a commanding officer, and the result might have been quite different from what it was.

These men may have been rash, but they were not cowards; they may have been imprudent, but they were suffering under wrong and outrage, and the withholding of justice and the proper exercise of the law. And if oppression and extortion will make a wise man mad, then ten years of oppression and extortion which these men suffered would have proved them fit for subjection had they been submissive. Capt. Benjamin Merrill's friend, Capt. Raleigh Southerland, coming with the force of Surry County to help the Regulators, when hearing from a distance the guns at the Battle of Alamance, wept because he was not there with his countrymen "who were shedding their blood in defense of their rights." He was animated by the same patriotic spirit which led Gen. Francis Nash to say with his dying breath, on the field of Germantown, "From the first dawn of the Revolution I have been on the side of liberty and my country." The difference was in Southerland's favor, that he was the first to recognize the dawn of liberty's morning. (McCorkle in North Carolina Booklet.)

Captain Benjamin Merrill--His Ancestry, Home, Family Descendants, Execution, Christian character and Patriotism.

The people of North Carolina will ever feel a keen interest in the life and tragic end of Capt. Benjamin Merrill, This interest is heightened when they call to remembrance the dark, stormy days and years which preceded the Revolutionary Warp and his espousal of the cause of liberty. The people were sorely oppressed by the minions of British power. And when thus wronged, patriotic blood leaped with such pulsations to resent every abuse of such power. They had been wronged and insulted; they had borne and endured, until "forbearance ceased to be a Virtue." Again and again they sought redress of their grievances--peaceably if they could, by military power if they must. Those were brave men who knew nothing of military lifes and but little of the great principles involved, save as they lived in their hearts and heaved in their bosoms. The struggles and trials which led up to the war of the Revolution are fraught with thrilling interest. In these times that tried men's souls is found the history of Benjamin Merrill.

HIS HOME

His plantation, on which was his home, (1042 acres) was some four miles south of Lexington, NC and about two miles east from Jersey Church. The writer recently visited the spot where once stood the residence of Captain Merrill. The venerable oaks standing there could they but speak might tell us much of valuable history in the eventful years, in the long ago, now buried forever in the wreck of time. It is said that our hero was a gunsmith, and that the strong branch running at the foot of the hill near where his residence stood afforded the power necessary to operate the simple machinery used in boring out the barrels. In the evening he would arrange a barrel for boring and start his crude machinery and leave it running all night.

FAMILY DESCENDANTS

His wife's maiden name could not be ascertained. As to the number of children there are two statements: Gov. Tryon spoke of his "wife and eight children but Captain Merrill said, "widow and ten children." Of the names of his children, of what became of them or their descendants we know nothing., save one son, who was blessed with a family of five children. Their names and date of birth are given below: Benjamin Smith Merrill, born September 10., 1774; Bettie Merrill, born May 2., 1776; Azariah Merrill, born May 26, 1779; Jemima Merrill born October 6, 1782; Sallie Merrill, born July 15, 1784.

All the Merrill's in this section of the State descended from Azariah, a grandson of Captain Merrill. He was the father of Deacon Ebenezer Merrill late of Jersey church and Benjamin Merrill, late of Fork church Davie County. Elder George L. Merrill is a great-grandson of Captain Merrill. Tradition and history prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the subject of this sketch had a brother whose name was Azariah.

It is handed down in the family that Azariah would imbibe too freely of strong drink, and when in this condition would exclaim, "My father was hung in defence of the truth, and I am willing to die for it."

Just before his execution, which took place at or near Hillsboro, NC, on the 19th day of June, 1771, he made a request. Here it is:

"In a few moments I shall leave a widow and ten children. I entreat that no reflection may be cast on them on my account, and, if possible, shall deem it a bounty, should you gentlemen petition the Governor and Council that some part of my estate may be spared to the widow and fatherless."

Here follows what Governor Tryon said:

"Benjamin Merrill a Captain of the militia, left it in charge of the officers to solicit me to grant his plantation and estate to his wife and eight children, Wme. Tryon."

No record is left to inform us as to what was done in regard to the request. We would naturally suppose that it was thrown aside and never more thought of but Mr. A. J. Owen, a member of Jersey church., whose mind was sound and memory strong, told the author several years ago, that the grant was actually made as requested to the widow and children, and that the document given by Governor Tryon was handed

down, with other old papers belonging to the Merrill family and finally lodged in the hands of Wilson Merrill, brother-in-law of Mr. Owen. In 1855 Mr. Owen got possession of the rare document and held it till 1872, when he went West, at which time it slipped from him. And though the paper was an hundred years old yet the writing was just as

legible as when first given. It was written on coarse heavy paper and folded like a deed--it was in fact their deed their deed then. Mr. Owen committed to memory its contents. On the back of the folded instrument was inscribed:

"To JEMIMAH MERRILL AND HER CHILDREN." The contents were: I, Wm.

Tryon, Governor and Captain-General for the Province of North Carolina; To Jemima

Merrill and her Children: You are commanded to hold and possess the land and

tenements, goods and chattels of the late Benjamin Merrill, hung for high treason till his Majesty's pleasure shall be known and all his tax collectors and receiver shall take due notice thereof. Done at Hillsboro---June, 1771. "Wm. Tryon"

After his execution the widow remained on the old homestead. The late Miss Susie Turner, a very worthy and aged lady, told the author that she recalled well, when a young girl of hearing her aunt Mary Workman tell of calling to visit the widow while on her way to meeting at Jersey church. Her aunt told her that the widow was blind. Whether, the blindness was caused by so natural defect or from excessive grief at the sad and untimely death of husband was not known. She was never herself after the death of her husband she never recovered from the shock. She was almost crazed at the cold, cruel fate which befell her in thus being bereft. She suffered great mental distress and spent much of her time in walking to pass of the melancholia which clung to her only to darken her days of grief and bitterness. Her mind was scarcely ever free from her affliction while awake.

No doubt exists as to his patriotism. He was true to his country. And was also a religious man. Tradition says that he was a member and deacon of the Jersey Baptist church. As to his character Caruthers, in his life of Caldwell, says:

"He was regarded as a pious man; and was much esteemed wherever he was known. He was within an easy day's march of the place of meeting (Battle

of Alamance) with three hundred men under his command, when he heard of the defeat; an if he had got there in time the result would have been different. His men

immediately dispersed, but he was taken prisoner, and his life was the forfeit. In this trying situation he gave his friends satisfactory evidence that he was prepared to die; for he not only professed his faith in Christ his hope of heaven and willingness to go, but sung a song very devoutly just before he swung off, and died with the resignation and composure of a Christian. One of his enemies was heard to say "If all went to the gallows with Captain Merrill's character, hanging would be an honorable death."

But a part of his speech upon the gallows has been hard to reconcile with what we believe to be true patriotism; and it has been a source of sincerest regret to thousands who love his memory. He condemned his course and explained his connection with the Regulators in a compromising way. He seemed to apologize for the course he pursued, but let's not judge him harshly. We are too apt to judge him from our

own standpoint, with all the light we have. Our country's freedom was then in a germinal state. What the outcome was to be was uncertain, The future held no shining light to beckon oppressed people on to freedom. No one had gone before to blaze the way to freedom's heights. The people had been taught to "obey the powers that be." This teaching was fully brought out while considering the Mecklenburg Declaration of

Independence. A member of the committee arose and addressed the chairman as follows: "If you resolve on Independence how shall ye be absolved from the obligation of the oath we took to be true to King George the Third about four years ago, after the Regulation battle, when we were sworn, whole Militia companies together?" A halt was called; discussion ensued; at last their consciences were eased when some one suggested that the oath was binding only while the King protected us, our rights and liberties as they existed at the time it was taken.

At the time of which we write it looked very much like all their efforts had been in vain and our mind reverts to another day--the time when our Divine Lord was crucified. The disciples were scattered and discouraged. It looked to them like the efforts of the Master to establish his kingdom had failed. This thought is emphasized in the

conversation which took place between Jesus and the two on the way to Emmaus. How, dolefully they discussed the situation! "We trusted that it had been which should have redeemed Israel." Were they disloyal? No. They loved their master but their eyes were holden. The bright day was just ushering in but they could not see it. Was not this true of Benjamin Merrill? Could he have been permitted to look into the future a few years he would never have said what he did. Let us pass by what seems to have been a mistake and throw over it the mantle of charity and do him honor as a Christian and patriotic hero.

CAPT BENJAMIN MERRILL

b abt 1730 Hopewell, Mercer, NJ, d 19 Jun 1771 Hillsborough, Orange, NC

This is the famous Benjamin Merrill so brutally executed for his participation in the Regulator revolt. Benjamin was a descendant of the immigrant Richard Merrill of Warwickshire. The Merrills and many others of their community in New Jersey moved south to Rowan Co NC in the mid-1700's after many property and title disputes in New Jersey. This was a Baptist community; in North Carolina, they founded the Jersey Settlement and established their church.

Benjamin's story has been told by many historians and genealogists. Rather than rewrite their findings, as I have no further insight to add, I here present some of the more interesting sources I've found. Notes for Benjamin's wife, nee Jemima Smith - said to have gone blind from the trauma of her husband's end - follow.

source: All his tree from WE Merrill (1935) history, "Capt. Benj Merrill and the Merrill Family of NC." There the children listed are: Sam'l, John, Andrew, Wm, Chas, Elijah, Jona, Anna, Penelope. Came from NJ to the Jersey settlement of then Rowan Co, now Davidson Co, NC between 1751 - his 2nd son John having been born at Hopewell, NJ 11 Dec 1750 - and 1755 - Benjamin's being cited in the following Jan 1756 record. source: Rowan Co NC Court Book 2:107.

"24 Jan 1756. Ordered that a summons issue to Michael Myers, Dan'l Little, Benj Merril & Michael Arrand to show reason for not going out against the Owens who it was thought committed several misdemeanors." Apparently he didn't care to be part of that posse! Daniel Little may have been of a related family: Benj's nephew (Dan'l, son of Wm) married an Eliz Lytle, dau of Tho Lytle... source: C. Phelps Merrell says he went abt 1750.

The Jersey settlement in the Yadkin Valley was on portions of land purchased out of the 100,000 grant from King Geo II to Henry McCulloch, Esq of Turnham Green, Co of Middlesex, England.

"The main north-south road was called the `Grand Road,' winding southward through Phila, across MD and down the valley of VA. The old road followed the present-day US1, as far as today's city of Raleigh, NC at which point it split into a coast road and a SW road through GA, AL, and around the southern end of the mountains. Just north of what is now Richmond, VA, the wagon trail would have left the main road and turned SW into the Piedmont section of rich meadow and cozy nooks in the rolling hills. The `Grand Road' would have been a routed mire dirt road with fords crossing the smaller streams and barge ferries to cross the rivers. The Rev. John Gano of the Phila

Baptist Assoc of NJ tells us that in 1756 he traveled to the Jersey Settlement. It was a long, expensive and tedious journey ... arrived there in abt 5 wks after traveling abt 800 mi." CPM says Benj was a deacon of the Jersey Baptist Church in Rowan Co, NC, organized in 1754.

"Geo Smith sold 1042 ac of land to Benj Merrell 9 Sep 1760, Rowan Co Deed Bk4, pp363-5. The property was located on the north side of the Yadkin River, St. Luke's parish. The plantation was abt 2 mi N of Jersey Baptist Church and abt 5 mi S of the present day city of Lexington, Davidson Co NC.

"When I visited the old Merrell plantation in Aug 1983, now owned by Mr. Bill Sheets... An old barn stands on top of a knoll said to be the location of Capt Merrell's home. Off to one side, Abbotts Creek meanders by and the farm land rolls off in all directions.

"It is said that Benj was an intelligent, ambitious and hardworking young man as a farmer and gunsmith. He built a waterwheel to provide power for the machinery. In the evening he would set barrel blanks for boring and leave the machine running all night, and in the morning it would be ready for finishing.

"Benj Merrell prospered and we know by the records that he became a leader in the area and Capt of the Rowan Co militia." source: 1759 Rowan Co tax lists

Benj Merrell & negro Phyllis. Wm Merrell is also taxed (on himself only). source: Rowan Co deeds; cited at 2:319 and 4:363-366.

Entered 22 Jan 1761. Deed of sale 9 Sep 1760 from George Smith, Esq, to Benj Merrell for 240 ac. Same, 512 ac. Same, 10 Sep 1760, 419 ac. Could this be Benj's wife Jemima's uncle Geo? Note that Geo Smith was a justice of the Co court 24 Jan 1756. source: Rowan Co Circuit Court records

25 Apr 1761 court case of Jno Howard vs Geo Smith found Jas Smith, Benj Merrill, Andrew Smith and Willis Ellis serving on the jury under foreman Geo Magoune. Benj served on juries 24-25 Jul 1761; was absent for jury 21 Oct 1761 and to be fined "if he doesn't show reason for absence" - along with 5 others; served again on a jury 24 Jul 1762; was on a venire list to serve in the March Superior Court 1762. I have not finished going through the court abstracts. source: WE Merrill; similar material in many other sources.

Men of Orange Co NC met at Maddock's Mill, near Hillsborough, 4 Apr 1767 and formed a body called Regulators, an assoc. for regulating public grievances and abuse of power. The reason for this gathering was the continued abuses of Gov. Tryon's officials, who required \$15 for a marriage license when the legal rate was \$1, and so on, at a time when cash was very scarce. Protests to the Gov. had been ineffective. The officials in the western areas had too little supervision. From 1767 on, friction grew between the Regulators and the Governor's officials. Tryon imprisoned some of the leaders; the Regulators deliberately annoyed the officials. Resentment against the officials is said to have prevailed in the Piedmont. Finally, the Gov. decided the Regulators should have no more meetings, and fully capitulate to official power; he sent 300 men and 6 cannons from New Bern to challenge the Regulators. Militia

companies joined this group along the way, so that he is said to have had 1100 men camped with him on the banks of Alamance Creek in then Orange Co, now Alamance, on 14 May 1771. Five or six miles west of his camp, some 2000 Regulators are said to have been gathered - but not to have expected to fight. Not more than half had guns, and no one acted as commander. They sent a message to Tryon on the 15th, again asking for justice in their grievances. In answer, the next day, he sent a paper saying they should lay down arms, go home, and obey the King; and he drew his men up in battle lines half a mile from the Regulator camp. Both advanced. Tryon shot Robert Thompson, who had been sent to treat with the Governor. A two-hour battle ensued, with many Regulators fleeing. Afterwards, the Governor returned to Hillsborough, sentenced 6 of the leaders to be hung, and the sentences were carried out 19 Jun 1771. Many people claim that this was the seed of Revolutionary ardor in the state. Benjamin Merrill was a Captain in the militia, and was on his way to join the Regulators at Alamance, with a company of 300 men. He met Gen. H. Waddell on the way and forced him to flee to Salisbury. A day's march away from Alamance, he disbanded his men upon receiving news of the Governor's victory, and so was not in the fateful scene. But Col. Fanning took him prisoner and brought Benjamin to Tryon. He was put in chains with the other prisoners and dragged to Hillsborough.

Quoting NC Colonial Records, vol 8, pp642-3; 65, 656: "The Supreme Court of Oyer & Terminer, for the Tryal

of the Regulators in the Back Country, began at Hillsborough 30 May, and continued to the 20th inst (Jun 1771); during which, 12 were tryed and condemned for High Treason. The Gov. was pleased to suspend the execution of 6, till His Majesty's pleasure be known; the other 6 were executed on Wed 19 Jun at Hillsborough. Among the last, the most distinguished was Benjamin Merrill, who had been a Capt of Militia in Rowan Co. When the Chief Justice passed sentence he concluded in the following manner: 'I must now close my afflicting duty, by pronouncing upon you the awful sentence of the law; which is, that you, Benjamin Merrill, be carried to the place from whence you came, that you be drawn from thence to the place of execution, where you are to be hanged by the neck; that you be cut down while still alive, that your bowels be taken out and burnt before your face, that your head be cut off, your body divided into four quarters, and this be at His Majesty's disposal; and the Lord have Mercy upon your Soul."

Notes for Jemima Smith:

There have been various names given to the wife of Captain Merrill. My grandfather wrote in his notes that her name was Mary Smith; others contended that she was Jemima Stout of Stoutsburg, New Jersey; others gave her the name of Sarah. Now we know that she was none other than Jemima Smith of Hopewell, NJ This fact is self-evident if we consider the records. Andrew Smith of Hopewell made his will October 17, 1874, and bequeathed to his daughter Jemima "one Spanish Pestole to her forever, if it should so happen that my Daughter Jemima Should become poor and Needy in this life I do Require my Exers to give her Reasonable Relief out of my estate. I also give and devise to my Daughter Jemima children that she bear to Benjamin Merrill to Wit: Samuel, John, Andrew, William, Charles, Elijah, and Jonathan Merrill, Anna McCleary, and Penelope Merrill to all and each of them Severally fifty pounds." Now if we examine the records in Rowan County, North Carolina, we find land deeds made and sighed by Benjamin and Jemima Merrill, when they sold a part of their holdings to John Ganoe in 1770

Benjamin died on June 19, 1771 and his widow, Jemima Merrill married Harmon Butner of Rowan County on February 20 (28) 1775.

One May 7, 1777, Jacob Wiseman and Robert Moore were asked to arbitrate a matter concerning the estate of the

late Benjamin Merrill between Harmon Butner and the Merrill Children, Samuel, John Andrew, William, Benjamin and Penelope, and Boyd McCreary and Anna, who have the interests of Charles, Elijah, and Jonathan. Note that this list of Merrill children corresponds precisely with that found in Andrew Smith's Will. there are other records which bear out this point.

Just a few minutes before Benjamin was executed, he is quoted as saying: "In a few minutes I shall leave a widow and ten children. I entreat that no reflection be cast on them on my account and, if possible, I shall deem it a bounty, should you gentlemen petition the governor and Council that some part of my estate may be spared to the widow and fatherless." Here follows what Governor Tryon said, "Benjamin Merrill, a Captain of the militia, left it in charge of the officers to solicit me to grant his plantation and estate to his wife and eight children. Wm. Tryon."

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To Jemima Merrill and her children:

You are commanded to hold and possess the land and tenements, goods and chattels, of the late Benjamin Merrill, hung for high treason, till His Majesty's pleasure shall be known: and all his tax collectors and receivers shall take due notice thereof.

Done at Hillsboro,-----June, 1771. Wm. Tryon.' "

The correspondence between Governor Martin and the Earl of Hillsborough clearly shows that the estate was given back to the family.

"Dec. 4, 1771 -- The Earl of Hillsborough to Governor Martin: In the last letter I received from Mr. Tryon relative to the affairs of North Carolinas and which is dated from New York, he expresses a wish that the plantation and estate of Benjamin Merrill, a Captain of the Militia and who was one of the six rebels executed on the 19th of June may be granted to a wife and eight children he left behind him, and I have a command from the King to signify to you His Majesty's pleasure, that you do accordingly take proper measures that whatever property belonging to that unhappy person became forfeited tot he Crown by his conviction should be regranted to his Widow and Children."

"Dec. 12, 1771 -- Gov. Martin to Earl of Marlborough: Benjamin Merrill one of the six criminals executed soon after the action with the insurgents has left and innocent and miserable family consisting of his widow and seven young children who must starve unless his Majesty will be graciously pleased to continue to them the possession of the lands of the delinquent. I am therefore my Lord engaged by the feelings of humanity to implore his Majesty's favor to this wretched and fatherless family."

"Oct. 25, 1772 --Gov. Martin to Earl of Hillsborough: I am to acquaint your Lordship, that I have displayed His Majesty's most gracious Acts of beneficence to the family of Benjamin Merrill, -- and I have the satisfaction to see them received with most dutiful and lively gratitude."

After his execution the widow remained on the old homestead, a valuable and well cultivated farm. Miss Susie Turner, a very worthy and aged lady, tod Rev. Henry Sheets that she recalled hearing her aunt, Mary Workman, tell of calling in to visit the widow while on her way to meeting at Jersey Church. Her aunt told her that the widow was blind. Whether the blindness was caused by some natural effect or from excessive grief at the sad and untimely death of her husband was not known. It is said that she never recovered from the shock and that she suffered great mental distress and spent much of her time in walking to pass off the melancholic which clung to her and darkened

her days with grief and bitterness. Regardless of all this we know that she returned to the old homestead and lived there with her children for several years. During this time she remained faithful to her church and one

articular occasion in November, 1771, she and the children attended Soelle's services in the river Settlement. Soelle

said, "She cannot forget the fate of her husband."

In 1775, Jemima married Harmon Butner who came to live with her and the Merrill children on the Merrill plantation. On May 9, 1777, the court ordered Butner to bring Charles, Elijah and Jonathan, orphans of Benjamin Merrill, into court to be dealt with as the law required. At the next court Charles was bound to his brother John, who was to teach him the art of being a master of the blacksmith trade and when he became of age he was to receive a set of tools, besides what the law required. He was fifteen at the time he was bound to his brother. Elijah, fourteen years old, was bound to his eldest brother Samuel. He was to learn the weaver's trade. Samuel was to give him a loom and tackle and twelve pounds besides what the law required. Jonathan was bound to his brother-in-law, Boyd McCreary.

Jemima Merrill Butner lived about thirty years after the death of Capt. Merrill. She made her will on May 7, 1801, and it was proved in February, 1803. It is quoted below:

In the name of God Amen. I, Jemima Butner of the county of Rowan and the State of North Carolina being in perfect mind and memory, but weakly in body and calling to mind my mortality think proper to make and ordain this my last will and test: knowing that it is appointed unto men once to die, do think proper to confirm my intention by these presents, and in the first place I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God, and my body to be decently buried, at the discretion of my executors, and as touching such worldly estate, as it has pleased God to bless me with, I dispose, devise and give in manner and form following, that is to say,

- 1. - 2. I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy my negroe woman, Hagar, which is to be valued, and John, William, and Charles Meril is to have an equal part of the value of said negroe in money; also I give one-half of my wearing clothes to my daughter Nancy.
- 3. I give and bequeath to my daughter Ellien one negroe girl named Rose which is also to be valued and the above John, William, and Charles Meril, is to have an equal part of her value in money. I also give to by daughter Elline the other half of my wearing clothes.
- 4. I give and bequeath to my son Andrew Meril my negro boy named James, which is also to be valued and the above John Meril, William and Charles Meril to have an equal part of the value in money, also I give to my son Andrew an equal part of my moveable property, that I do not mention in my will.
- 5. I give to my son Jonathan Meril, my negroe boy named David and he is to pay to my son Charles Meril ten pounds, current money, too years after my decease, I give also to my son Jonathan Meril an equal part with the rest of my sons of my moveable property which is not here mentioned or given.
- 6. I give to my son Elijah Meril an equal part of my moveable property which is not mentioned as given in this will.

Lastly, I also appoint, constitute and ordain, my son Andrew Meril and Jonathan Meril whole and sole executors of this my last will ad test: and I do hereby revoke all others wills and test: at any time by me made, and in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal,

this 7th day of May, 1801.

It is not known whether the Nancy and Elliane mentioned in the will are Merrills or Butners for the records are not clear. Harmon Butner made no provision for them in his will.

"Mr. A.J. Owen, a member of the Jersey Church, said, `that the grant was actually made as requested to the widow and children, and that the document given by Gov Tryon was handed down, with other old papers belonging to the Merrill family, and finally lodged in the hands of Wilson Merrill, brother-in-law of Mr. Owen. In 1855, Mr. Owen got possession of this rare document and held it until 1872, when he went West, at which time

it slipped from him. ... Mr. Owen committed to memory its contents. 'On the back of the folded instrument was inscribed: 'To Jemima Merrill and her Children.' The contents were: 'I, Wm. Tryon, Gov and Captain-General for the province of NC: To Jemima Merrill and her children: You are commanded to hold and possess the land and tenements, goods and chattels of the late Benjamin Merrill, hung for high treason, till His Majesty's pleasure shall be known; and all his tax collectors and receivers shall take due notice thereof. Done at Hillsboro. --- June. 1771. Wm. Tryon.' The correspondence between Gov Martin and the Earl of Hillsborough clearly shows that the estate was given back to the family. 'Dec 4, 1771 - The Earl of Hillsborough to Gov Martin: In the last letter I received from Mr. Tryon relative to the affairs of NC and which is dated from NY, he expresses a wish that the plantation and estate of Benjamin Merrill, a Capt of the Militia and who was one of the six rebels executed on the 19th of June may be granted to a wife and eight children he left behind him, and I have a command from the King to signify to you His Majesty's pleasure, that you do accordingly take proper measures that whatever property belonging to that unhappy person became forfeited to the Crown by his conviction should be regranted to his Widow and Children.' 'Dec 12, 1771 - Gov Martin to Earl of Marlborough: Benjamin Merrill one of the six criminals executed soon after the action with the insurgents has left an innocent and miserable family consisting of his widow and seven young children who must starve unless his Majesty will be graciously pleased to continue to them the possession of the lands of the delinquent. I am therefore my Lord engaged by the feelings of humanity to implore his Majesty's favor to this wretched and fatherless family.' Oct 25, 1772 - Gov Martin to Earl of Hillsborough: I am to acquaint your Lordship, that I have displayed His Majesty's most gracious Acts of beneficence to the family of Benjamin Merrill, - and I had the satisfaction to see them received with most dutiful and lively gratitude.'

"After (Benjamin's) execution the widow (Jemima) remained on the old homestead, a valuable and well-cultivated farm. Miss S. Turner ... told Rev. H. Sheets that she recalled hearing her aunt, Mary Workman, tell of calling in to visit the widow while on her way to meeting at Jersey Church. Her aunt told her that the widow was blind. Whether the blindness was caused by some natural effect or from excessive grief at the sad and untimely death of her husband was not known.

"It is said that she never recovered from the shock and that she suffered great mental distress and spent much of her time in walking to pass off the melancholia which clung to her and darkened her days with grief and bitterness. Regardless of all this we know that she returned to the old homestead and lived there with her children for several years. During this time she remained faithful to her church and on one particular occasion in Nov 1771, she and the children attended Soelle's services in the River Settlement. Soelle said, 'She cannot forget the fate of her husband.'

Brief History of the Willoughby Winchester Family:

In the book THE CALL OF THE BIG EASTATOE by Lillie Winchester Smith, the following is stated as being an inscription on a silver bowl in the possession of Moses Columbus Winchester family of Pickens, SC around 1900:

"Willoughby Winchester -- Valor--Battle of Boyne July 11, 1690--Awarded by William III, King of England, Ire."

This is Willoughby Winchester would have been a great-grandfather of ours about ten or eleven generations ago.

The first record we find of our Winchester family is in 1790 in Fairfield County, SC, where Willoughby Winchester was given grant of land. This Willoughby moved on to Pickens County, SC. To trace or lineage, his son, Daniel, who married Sarah Kazaleriee Irwin, moved from Pickens County, SC to Haywood County, NC. We have very distant cousins in and around Pickens County, SC and Haywood County, NC.

Daniel's son, Jonas, (b. 1828 d. 1915) married Sarah Ann Noblett (b. 1831 d. 1902). They had five boys and our Willoughby was one of them. Of the other two, Marcellus and Asbury died in early manhood. Pinkney and Thomas married and had a family. Most of Pinkney's descendents live around Anderson, SC and most of Tom's descendants live is Walhalla, SC.

Our Willoughby (b. 1847 d. 1948) was born is NC, but the family moved to Burrell's Ford Section of Oconee County, SC by 1860. There is a Winchester family cemetery here. Willoughby married Mary Magdaline Ridley (b. 1845 (?) d. 1942) and later bought land in Rabun Country, GA. across the river from Burrell's Ford Section of SC. All their children were born in this area. Their children were: Jonas "Jody" (b. 1872 d. 1944), Roxie (b.

1873 d. 1957), Lucinda (b. 1875 d. 1982), Daniel (b. 1880 d. 1958), Luke (b. 1882 d. 1975), Elbert (b. 1886 d. 1953), ** William "Bill" (b. 1884 d. 1905), Benjamin "Ben" (b. 1886 d. 1918), Victoria (b. 1889 d. 1951), Columbus "Lum" (b. 1889), and Rosevelt. As you can see, the are errors in some if these dates, but they were taken from the tombstones. Willoughby, Mary and most of their children who are dead, are buried at Saw Mill Hill Cemetery.

Legend has it that Willoughby moved his family to Bryson City, NC to keep his sons from making corn liquor, which was the custom of family and neighbors in Rabun County, GA. They had twin babies, Columbus and Victoria, who were only six or seven months old, but set out for Bryson City, NC in the cold of January or February, 1860. They spent the nights in churches along the way.

At first the family moved to Bruckner's Branch, near Jackson Line. Later, Willoughby purchased land at Lauada, NC. At one time Willoughby and Mary owned part of the land on which ,Saw Mill Hill Church and Cemetery is located. He helped with building the original church. Both Willoughby and Mary were religious people. They were not rich, but were financially well off for mountain people of their generation.

A painting of Mary called "Aunt Winchester" is hanging in the pioneer museum near Cherokee, NC.

Notes for Winchester: Origin of Winchester Surname

The Winchester surname is of Anglo-Saxon origin. The first record of the name was found in Hampshire, England. It is believed that a Saxon Lord was displaced in Hampshire in 1066 and moved north to Scotland where he acquired lands in the country of Ahrshire and Landarkshire.

The surname Winchester has included the spellings Winchester and Wincester, and these variations in spelling frequently occurred even between father and son.

Thomas Winchester along with John and Henry of Lanarkshire rendered homage to King Edward I of England on his brief Conquest of Scotland in 1296. Later in 1495, William Winchester of Vicar of Grantully, and Andrew Winchester of Minister at Fishwick. The family flourished and was found at Ardtrailye, Aberchirder, St. Andrews, Artelle, Spymie, Glasgow, Banff and Cannongate. In Ireland the family settled in Upster. In later years the family name branched south to Malden in Surrey, and Henry Winchester was Sheriff to London in 1826. Distinguished members of the family at this time included Sir Thomas de Winchester.

Migrants to America bearing Winchester surname or a variable spelling include Andrew Winchester, with his wife and child, who settled in Virginia in 1639; John Winchester settled in Virginia in 1636; William Winchester arrived in Maryland in 1732; William Winchester, Sr, arrived in Maryland in 1790; and Samuel Winchester arrived in Baltimore in 1822. Our Willoughby Winchester, born in 1696 in London, came to America on the boat, where he settled in South Carolina and died in Craven County in 1768.

Winchester Coat-of-Arms

Coat granted October 3, 1826 to Henry Winchester, Esq. References: Burkes General Armoury; Burke's Landed Gentry; Fairbairn's Book of Crests

Arms: Ore (gold), on cross azure pierced of the field, between four mascles gules, as many crosses crosslet fitches argent.

Crest: In front of a cress croslet fitches or a lion passant azure, the dexter fore paw supporting a mascle as in the arms

Motto: "Hoc ardur vircere docet." This teaches us to overcome difficulties.

Description:

Cross: All crosses denote Crusader ancestry. The cross fitchee, or pointed cross has an interesting story: Picture a band of men, mounted, banners flying -- these banners, their cloaks, their shields, and the blankets on the horses all beating a cross in some form, painted or sewn, having the same color and form. These Crusaders are going through a wilderness section, and the going is rough. The sun is at the zenith point, men and horses alike stumble under the excessive hear, but "HALT" comes the command, in English, Franch, in German or Italian, according to the country from which they come. The men look up and see a cross held aloft; it is their signal for noon-time prayer, and is held by the leader. The cross is make of a branch slashed from a tree during their marches, and roughly shaped with the aid of crude knife. It is pointed (fitchee)-- the prayer time over, the leader plants the cross in the ground, the point easing the way into the sand. This points the way for the next band approaching. The plain blue cross extending across the shield represents the Passion the Cross of Calvary.

Mascle: A diamond shaped figure with the center cut out. Guilim says, "This is a mesh of net, which in the Holy Writ is the Hieroglyphic for persuasion."

Lion: Is the king of beasts, emblamatical of service.

Colors: are representative of the personal characteristics of the original bearer, and are granted only upon merit.

Ore (gold) - denotes generosity and elevation of mind. Guiles (red) - denotes military courage and magnanimity.

Argent (Silver) - denotes sincerity and peace.

Azure (blue) - denotes loyalty and truth

The "Mantling" was a large scarf of heavy cloth or leather thrown over the helmet to protect the neck from the heat of the sun, the armour from rust, and to foil the enemy's sword. There is a "wreath" of the colors holding the mantling on to the helmet, six strands showing, the first of the metal, second of the color, and then alternating. Upon this six-stranded wreath, the crest rests.

Notes for Merrill Family: MERRILL FAMILY LINEAGE

Those who have made an extensive study of the English and French histories, genealogies and works of heraldry tell us that the Merrill Family of England was descended from the French Huguenot family De Merle of the Province of Auvergne in central France. This family migrated from this mountainous section of France after the bloody events of St. Bartholomew's Day in Paris in 1572. The tragedy of St. Bartholomew's Day marked the culmination of the great struggle between Catholics and Protestants which devastated France in the latter half of the sixteenth century. During the reign of Francis I and his three successors the Huguenot (French Protestant) character was formed and the nation gradually separated into two parties so fanatically hostile that the extermination of the weaker seemed the only possible means of reestablishing the unity of France. The Massacre of St. Bartholomew's Day is one of those historic crimes which defeated its own purpose by reacting against perpetrators and advancing the cause of those who suffered. One eminent author (Merrill, Samuel, "A Merrill Memorial," Cambridge, Mass.) stated that the evidence presented in the old Coat of Arms, taken along with all the other facts, was conclusive that the Merrill family of England was of French Huguenot origin.

COAT OF ARMS

The Coat of Arms as used today is described as, "Arms. Argent, a bar azure between 3 peacocks' heads, proper. Crest, a peacock's head erased proper."

HOW DO YOU SPELL YOUR NAME?

There are numerous ways of spelling the family name. Oftentimes in the same document it is written in several forms, e.g., in one Court Record we find Merrill, Merel, Meril, and Merrell. In another record Marrell and Morrell are used. When the French family De Merle went to England it was necessary for them to use an English spelling, so they changed their name to Merrill. In most of the documents, writings et cetera this -- Merrill -- spelling is used.

GENERAL FAMILY CHARACTERISTICS

In making this study of the Merrill family certain characteristics have been noted throughout the various generations. Perhaps the two most prominent are the religious trends and the spirit of adventure. Since the earliest times these people have been Protestants. They left France during the Huguenot Revolution. They left England perhaps on account of religious troubles as well as for adventure. Shortly after arriving in America they became associated with the Baptists. The family is still mostly Baptist. It has furnished preachers, deacons, and

worthy lay workers.

The members of this group have leaned more to farming and the trades than to the professions. The most of them have been good livers through few have been wealthy.

It is a rare occurrence for any member of this clan to be in court. they have been law abiding, co-operative, and good citizens.

We should not gloat over the good traits and deeds of our ancestors, but should take these as stepping stones to a better, more educated, and more progressive family.
