

A third plan was shown for the Plainview Library project at the Plainview City Council meeting. There will be a public "town hall" style meeting held this Thursday, Nov. 21 from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Library building to take comment and discuss

### **Bond refinance will save \$23,000** that have been put onto the City's

The Plainview City Council agreed to make a change to the City's water bonds, refinancing, in an effort to minimize interest loss over the next seven years.

The City was presented information that showed a savings of approximately eight percent or \$23,000 could be obtained by refinancing the City's current bonding

Currently, the City will continue payments through October of 2021 on the water bonds, with interest counting down on each payment from just under \$10,000 to \$1,800. With the refinancing, the City will continue payments for those seven years, but at drastically reduced interest rates, from a maximum of 4.5 percent to a refinanced maximum of 2.55 percent.

The savings of interest off the remaining \$280,000 or so, should let the City retain \$23,184 in interest payments over the remaining years. The Council voted unanimously to recall and reissue the bonds.

In other large scale funding discussion, the Council was presented with information proposing a number of street improvement projects for the 2014 year as estimated by the City's engineering firm, JEO Consulting of Norfolk.



### County burials policy A.G. gives updated to cremation card scam

The Pierce County Board of Commissioners met on Tuesday, Nov. 12 and took action on county burial policy and discussed the sale of used machinery and a new or used road grader.

The Board first discussed cremation costs and regular burial costs for County Burials.

After doing extensive research from other counties, the Board found that most counties use cremation, and that some counties do nothing for

Board members reported that they had talked to the two morticians in Pierce County and found that they preferred cremation.

As a result of those findings, the Board passed a motion to approve Resolution #2013-21 to change the County Burial Policy to read "Cremation only, for a maximum fee of \$2,435, paid to the County Morti-

#### Machinery for sale

After discussion on what to do with the used 1995 Caterpillar Excavator (backhoe), the Commissioners authorized County Clerk Shannon Wragge to advertise for the sale of the used backhoe, a 1994 Ford Fairlane pickup and a 1983 Drott Excavator.

Bids for the used machinery (with details in this week's public notices section) will be opened on December 9 at 9:30 a.m.

The Board also instructed Wragge to advertise for a new or used motor grader with less than 2,000 hours on it with a trade-in of a Caterpillar motor

#### Road reviewed

Bruce Zimmerman, with sons Ryan and Aaron, came to the Board ask Commissioner Terry Wragge to pull the shoulders on the 849 Road west from 546 Avenue, and, if the road holds, they asked that crushed concrete or gravel be put on the road.

Wragge agreed to pull the shoulders in, but would give no committment to gravel the road. Wragge said they would look into the road in the spring of 2014 and then make a decision on what to do.

Wragge said that, because the road is "pure sand," he does not believe anything would help except hauling clay onto the road. That option, said Wragge, would be very expensive as the clay would have to be purchased and hauled in from a long distance.

#### Distress warrants approved

County Treasurer Chris Bahr came to the Board with Certification of Distress Warrants for approval.

Wragge said Distress Warrant numbers were up to 41, which is greater than last year.

She said dollar-wise it amounts to approximately \$37,000 this year opposed to \$25,000 from last year.

Wragge said that Distress Warrants are delinquent personal property taxes that are uncollectable by the Treasurer. She said the warrants are then turned over the County Sheriff for collection. If the warrants are not paid, the Sheriff can then seize the personal property in question and sell

# warning

Attorney General Bruning issued a consumer alert for Nebraskans to be wary of scam text messages from ALERT@bankaccount that instruct receivers to call (402) 817-4153 to reactivate a suspended debit card.

The Attorney General's Office has received seven reports of this scam in the Lincoln and Omaha area today, mostly from Verizon customers.

"Personal information like bank, debit or credit card numbers should never be given to unknown people or businesses," said Bruning. "And don't be fooled by local area codes - those numbers could be routed anywhere."

Calls to the number provided in the scam texts route to an automated system claiming to be a "credit union center" with 24-hour activation services. Callers are instructed to input their debit card number for reactivation. Once a scammer has access to a consumer's account information, it can be used to make fraudulent purchases or withdraw money from the account.

Nebraskans who have responded to this scam are encouraged to use a trusted number to contact debit card issuers immediately. In addition, notification should be filed with the three major credit bureaus - TransUnion, Experian and Equifax.

### "Lessons from History"

Recently, United States Secretary of State, John Kerry, joined other foreign leaders in Geneva to participate in negotiations with Iran over its nuclear program, a source of great concern to our nation and many of our allies. Negotiators returned home without reaching an agreement.

At this point, most members of Congress haven't been briefed on the terms of the deal offered by Secretary Kerry. However, the Secretary did update members of the Senate Banking Committee and Senate Democratic leadership this week behind closed doors. Despite this lack of information, what is perfectly clear is that the proposal created great unease among our allies.

The French Foreign Minister described the deal as a "fool's deal" and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu stated that, "the deal that is being discussed in Geneva right now is a bad deal, it's a very bad deal."

Press reports indicate their concerns are well

According to these media reports, the administration was prepared to "unfreeze" billions of dollars in Iranian assets by Executive Order – meaning without Congressional approval – in exchange for an agreement by Iran only to "slow" its nuclear pro-

Many in Congress share our allies' concern with this basic equation and believe that U.S. sanctions

should only be reduced if Iran clearly demonstrates its commitment to a peaceful nuclear program. This would require that the Iranians take tangible steps to comply with U.N. Security Council Resolutions and its treaty obligations.

Suspending the enrichment processes, which the Security Council has demanded Iran do since 2006, would help rebuild the international trust and credibility that Iran has destroyed over the past decade.

Instead, Iran is apparently demanding we concede that it has a "right" to enrich nuclear fuel. Despite the Iranians' claim, there is no "right" to enrich uranium recognized in international law. It's important that we also remain mindful of

Iran's history. Tehran has repeatedly violated their treaty obligations, thwarted international weapons inspectors from doing their jobs, and successfully used negotiations with the West to buy time for their nuclear program to progress. North Korea used a similar strategy in the 1990s,

when it agreed to forego nuclear weapons, only to continue its weapons program in secret. The similarities between recent negotiations with Iran and past negotiations with North Korea do not end there, either. In fact, some of the same negotiators continue to represent U.S. interests. The world knows how that story played out. Winston Churchill famously stated, "Those who

fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it." I believe it is critical – both to our national security and to stability in the Middle East – that the same mistakes of the past not be repeated again.

The United States and our allies must require Iran to take verifiable steps to comply with its international obligations. The Senate Banking Committee is expected to consider additional sanctions on Iran. Though Secretary Kerry is urging lawmakers to stand down, it is exactly this financial pressure that has brought the Iranians to the negotiating table in the first place.

The administration insists that passing additional sanctions could undercut negotiators. However, I believe that increasing pressure would demonstrate resolve and make clear to the Iranians that the United States will not weaken its position until Iran dismantles its illegal nuclear program.

The Senate may also consider this issue during its upcoming debate on the defense authorization bill. Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, Senator Bob Menendez (D-NJ), has indicated he intends to offer an amendment on this issue. I look forward to reviewing proposals put forth and working with my colleagues to move forward towards an effective solution.

I continue to believe our best foreign policy and our best negotiating position - is one of "peace through strength." I will push for policies that strengthen, not weaken our hand at the negotiating

### Women and Smoking: Bad News, Good News

You've come a long way, baby. But really, now, who wants this kind of progress....? Women who smoke are at much greater risk of death from lung cancer and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) than they were 20 years ago. In fact, deaths from smoking are at an all-time high among women in the U.S. Why? Probably because women have started smoking earlier, are smoking longer, and smoke more each day than women did in the past.1

A large American Cancer Society research study also links smoking to breast cancer. During about a year of follow-up, the rate of new cases of invasive breast cancer was 24 percent higher in smokers than in nonsmokers.2

These are just a couple of new findings. You probably already know that smoking increases the risk for lung and other cancers, as well as the risk for infertility and low birth weight in babies.3

Against this troubling backdrop, however, there is something positive to report. People who quit smoking between ages 25 and 34 can gain back a decade they otherwise would have lost as lifetime smokers. Even quitting later in life can buy back some time.1

There's other encouraging news: Your chances of a heart attack or stroke go down if you quit. The benefits of being smokefree can add so much life back into your day to day activities.

That's all fine and well, you might say, but quitting is easier said than done. Of course, that's true. But you've got more help at your disposal than ever before. Aside from counseling, quit-smoking support groups, and smokefree smartphone apps, you can also take advantage of quit-smoking products we carry in our store. Let me know if want to discuss our available products.

If you've tried to quit more than once, you might want to try a prescription medication such as varenicline (Chantix) and the antidepressant bupropion (Zyban). Some people also combine one of these medications with a nicotine patch such as Nicoderm. 5 I can walk you through options like these. Or, if your doctor has written a prescription, I can answer any questions you may have.

Here are some other tips that may make it easier for you to quit smoking: 1. Get rid of all tobacco products and ashtrays ahead of time.

2. Ask others not to smoke around you or to leave evidence of cigarettes where you can see them. Also tell them not to buy you smokes after you quit, even if you ask them to.

3. Change your routines for a while so you're less likely to trigger the desire to smoke.

4. Find relaxation techniques that work well for you. But minimize drinking

alcohol. It may actually derail your efforts.6

5. When you feel an urge coming on, find a way to distract yourself—make a phone call, go for a walk, or come talk to me. I'll cheer you on!3

### **No-till focus of Columbus workshop** hosted by UN-L Extension agency

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension and Nebraska OCIA will cosponsor a no-till organic crop rotation workshop from 1:30-4 p.m. on Jan. 11 at Central Community College, in

Randy Anderson, USDA-ARS research agronomist at the North Central Agricultural Research Laboratory in Brookings, S.D., will present his research findings followed by a farmer roundtable discussion on cropping systems. Cost to attend the workshop is \$15. Registration is at the door and the event is open to the public.

Anderson, a weed ecologist, will discuss the goal of his research program to develop a continuous no-till cropping system for organic producers. He will present results on converting red clover fields to cropland without tillage and describe a no-till cultural system that suppresses weed growth in soybean more effectively than tillage-based management. Though this is focused on organic producers, any producer wanting to decrease input costs will find this information useful.

Anderson also will discuss the impact of underseeding clovers in winter and spring wheat on downy brome growth. Producers will learn how to minimize the need for tillage to control weeds and how a system based on winter-killed cover crops can control weeds adequately to grow no-till.

Anderson's research focuses on reducing the need for weed management inputs by understanding the aspects of weed population dynamics. He developed a population-based approach to weed management that reduced input costs for weed management 50 percent compared to conventional practices. He looks at the benefit of crop diversity and crop sequences that are synergistic and improve growth efficiency of the following crop, thus crop yield can increase without needing to increase resource inputs such as fertilizer or water. He has observed that tolerance to weed interference is greater with synergistic se-

quences, thus possibly reducing the need for herbicides.

Producers using no-till rotations can learn more about how synergistic crop sequences are improving land productivity, farm economics, soil health and resource-use-efficiency in the semiarid Great Plains. UNL will share an update on organic research results using crimper and flamer to manage weeds.

A round table discussion will follow so producers will have a chance to discuss their crop rotations and how they can reduce tillage and improve soil

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

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



### Johanns: "Shortfalls not only issue with Obamacare plan action"

Trillion-dollar spending shortfalls aren't the only deficits the Obama Administration is racking up. Last week, we learned more people have been notified that their health insurance plans will be cancelled than have been able to sign up for plans on the new Obamacare exchanges.

Nationwide, only 106,185 Americans were able to register for new government-mandated health insurance on the individual market with the vast majority doing so through state-operated systems. The federally-run HealthCare.gov logged fewer than 27,000 successful enrollments. These figures fall far short of the 500,000 target the Obama Administration was hoping for. Meanwhile, more than 4.2 million Americans have learned that their current policies will be cancelled, despite President Obama's promise that you could keep your plan.

More than 80,000 Nebraskans received cancellation notices because of Obamacare, but only 338 Nebraskans were able to enroll in private plans through the government exchange in the first month. About three times as many Nebraskans contacted my office to express frustration with the law, including its higher premiums, deductibles and out-of-pocket requirements.

Another common theme in many of these letters was the sense that Americans were duped by the President. So, to save face and assuage Congressional Democrats facing an angry electorate, the President tried to preempt a congressional effort that could expose growing opposition among those in his own

The president announced last week he would allow Americans to keep their plans for another year if insurers continue to offer them, which allows him to skirt his broken promise. It stands as yet another example of the President choosing by executive decree to ignore parts of his own law.

The House passed a bipartisan bill last Friday to change the law legally instead of from a White House podium, and open the door to allow Americans to keep their plans. But the President threatened to veto the bill, which gained the support of 39 Democrats. It's clear that, even with bipartisan efforts to help make Obamacare's rollout less painful for folks across the country, the President is determined to prevent Republicans from changing his beleaguered namesake law.

Perhaps the most frustrating element of all of this is that it could have been avoided. It's no surprise that the President was never going to be able to keep his promise the way this law was written. I warned of this very situation on the Senate floor in 2010, and even Democrats admit they knew millions of Americans would not be able to keep their plans despite repeated pledges from the President.

The President is now left playing whack-a-mole with his own law. Every time he tries to tamp down a problem,

another one pops up. Unfortunately, this is not a game he or anyone else will be able to win. Caught in the middle are millions of American families who must bear the brunt of the consequences.
