
Planning Ahead For Junior High Schools

CALGARY READS' VOLUNTEERS

Whether you're a seasoned volunteer or just thinking about becoming a volunteer, few charitable experiences are more rewarding than those involving children. For those individuals looking to make a difference to a child in your community, consider donating your time or resources to Calgary Reads.

Since 1998, this not-for-profit organization has championed the cause of early literacy in schools throughout the city. Calgary Reads pairs struggling readers in Grades 1 and 2 with trained adult tutors for one-on-one tutoring in a structured, nurturing and supportive learning environment within the child's school. Tutors spend time tutoring young readers, while providing a strong adult role model in each child's life.

Research is very clear about the impact of literacy on an individual's well-being. Good reading and writing skills prepare children for success in school and in life. Students in Grades 1 and 2 are at the optimum level of brain development to learn these literacy skills.

Consider the following research findings:

- A child's reading level at the end of grade 3 is a strong predictor of school success.
- Reading is not a school subject in and of itself; it is the means by which all other subjects are accessed and understood.
- Strong literacy skills are key determining factors in economic self-sufficiency, and resilient emotional, cognitive and physical health.
- Illiteracy has been linked with emotional problems, school dropout and criminal behaviour.
- Almost all children, with the proper attention and guidance, are able to read.

If you enjoy reading and have two or three hours each week to share with a child, we invite you to help us in our mission to help Calgary's children gain literacy skills, along with increased confidence, self-esteem, and hope.




