

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2008 - 2009 Continuing Education and Professional Development Calendar

The 2008 - 2009 Continuing Education and Professional Development (CEPD) calendar is aligned with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine's (NOSM) social accountability mandate and academic principles, and has evolved from a combination of the feedback received about last year's programs, an open request for suggestions of topics and speakers, and a large number of faculty participating in working groups to flush out the detail and pull it all together. Thank you to all the dedicated people that have contributed to the development of the calendar and to the CEPD team. As a result of their efforts, we present a very exciting and full program with some new features. More events will be held off campus and delivered live and archived for asynchronous viewing. The NOSM CEPD Committee has implemented a process for in accordance with our application for a NOSM accredited CEPD office.

The calendar will be regularly updated online. During the 2008/2009 year, we will send out a survey to all health professionals in Northern Ontario to ask for feedback on the calendar, which will contribute significantly to future calendar development. We encourage you to respond to this survey in order to ensure that the CEPD calendar truly belongs to you – designed and delivered in the North for health professionals and communities in the North.

New features include many more Continuing Medical Education/ Continuing Professional Development (CME/CPD) events with some new progressive programs:

- Researcher in the Room
- UME in CME events correlated to the UME curriculum
- Chronic Pain Series Tuesday evenings: The Management of Chronic Pain
- OCFP series Wednesday evenings
- Teacher Training will be on Fridays (full-day, lunch time and half-day sessions)

Module orientation will be available online, except for the Integrated Community Experience (ICE) modules 106, 108, and 110.

The NOSM CEPD Committee has endorsed a new process for presenters to undertake in their delivery that will support our application for an accredited CME office in 2008-2009. Beginning in the fall 2008, all presenters will be asked to:

- Declare any conflict of interest at the start of any programmed event;
- Refer to clinical guidelines where appropriate in the body of any presentation; and,
- And, at the end, provide tips and strategies for teaching the subject matter in NOSM programs.

The calendar will be updated regularly online, but until NOSM has its own accredited CME office [late 2008-2009], CME credits may only be available through individual online application for recently added events.

NOSM Key Academic Principles Definitions

Interprofessional:

The term interprofessional includes the key features of partnerships, participation, collaboration, coordination and shared decision making. The term is applicable to all NOSM endeavors.

Integration:

Integration is the combination, and interaction of, individuals around common purposes and goals to create meaningful experiences for students, residents, faculty and staff.

Community Orientated:

Community orientation is the conceptual and pragmatic understanding of the dynamics of communities in the North and the creation of meaningful, enduring partnerships between all Northern communities and NOSM.

Distributed Community Engaged Learning:

Distributed Community Engaged Learning is an instructional model that allows widely distributed human and instructional resources to be utilized independent of time and place in community partner locations across the North.

Generalism:

Generalism is defined as a broad and holistic view and approach to activities, values and knowledge in education, organizational and patient care activities.

Diversity:

Diversity encompasses a set of values that recognizes the richness of all cultures of Northern Ontario and the important ways they contribute to our lives.

Guidelines Advisory Committee (GAC)



About the GAC:

The Guidelines Advisory Committee (GAC) is an independent partnership of the Ontario Medical Association (OMA) and the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC). It was established to promote evidence-based health care in Ontario by encouraging physicians and other practitioners to use the best available clinical practice guidelines.

To assist in its tasks, the GAC created the Ontario Guidelines Collaborative (OGC) as a multi-stakeholder, interdisciplinary, informal network of organizations and associations involved in educating physicians in Ontario, or improving the process and outcome of health care among Ontario physicians.

NOSM is a member of the Ontario Guidelines Collaborative and is supportive of the GAC's intent to provide an evidence-based framework for continuing medical education programs. As a member, NOSM will support the process of disseminating, implementing, and evaluating GAC-endorsed, evidence-based clinical practice recommendations.

GAC Mandate:

To succeed in its mission, the GAC engages in four core activities:

- Evidence Review and Endorsement: Identifying and evaluating evidence-based recommendations for best clinical practices.
- Summary Development: Summarizing evidence to highlight its usefulness and relevance to clinical decision making.
- Evidence Dissemination: Improving the availability and accessibility of evidence.
- Evidence Promotion and Implementation: Increasing the adoption of, and adherence to, evidence-based recommendations in clinical decision making.

Key Highlights of the GAC's Review Process:

- The GAC does not develop guidelines. It reviews the literature for existing guidelines in a clinical topic area.
- Each guideline is reviewed independently by four reviewers.
- GAC reviewers use an internationally validated guideline assessment tool, called the AGREE Instrument, to evaluate the quidelines.
- Guidelines are endorsed based on the methodological rigour of the guideline development process, the quality of linkage between
 evidence and recommendations for best clinical practices, and applicability in Ontario.
- Summaries developed by the GAC are based on the endorsed guideline(s).

Microscopic hematuria that is otherwise unexplained is fairly common and often discovered incidentally. In most patients, especially those under forty, it is benign. Yet, a finding of incidental microscopic hematuria can be a source of anxiety for patients, and frustration for physicians who must exercise due diligence in ruling out significant renal and extar renal pathology.

- Identify the group of patients who need investigation and close follow-up
- Discuss what constitutes adequate investigation in the primary care setting

Transformative Mindfulness

Transformative Mindfulness helps individuals manage physical and mental pain and discomfort by addressing underlying causes of suffering through very simple but effective receptive visualizations and meditations which can be coupled with drawing, writing or dialogue. The techniques support and complement conventional treatment modalities, while dealing with the grief, anxiety and stress often associated with life challenges and illness. Adaptable to many clinical situations, ages, cultures and traditions, these tools can be used by any professional who has a wish to ease suffering.

This course will introduce the latest research on mindfulness-based practices such as those taught by Jon Kabat-Zinn in the Mindfulness Based Stress Reduction Program at the University of Massachusetts Medical School. This approach focuses on recognizing that sensations such as "pain" are separate from "self", and these methods have been shown to modify the body's physiological responses. Transformative Mindfulness exercises are an effective non-confrontational way to communicate with clients, and address the interdependence of causes and conditions of pain, both mentally and physically. Profound changes are possible by gently accessing the underlying thought processes that support the cognitive awareness of pain. The exercises are used by practitioners in a wide range of areas including palliative care, chronic pain management, physiotherapy, weight reduction, mental health and addictions counselling

Intended Learning Outcomes Participants will:

- Understand the relevance of current research which supports the use of these techniques in the clinical field:
- Experience mindfulness-based practice and Transformative Mindfulness. Participants will have the
 opportunity to explore and transform their own stress related to working in the health-care field and caring
 professions; and,
- Practice Transformative Mindfulness with another participant to gain competency in applying this exercise
 with their clients, helping them to access and accept the uncomfortable sensations in the body,
 whether physical pain, or the physical effect of mental pain.

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
