# TIPS ON CHOOSING YOUR CLASSES:

### The Class Schedule is available here: http://www.csus.edu/class-schedule/

Note: The Class Schedule is posted in March for the following year. If you are applying for Fall semester and the schedule for your year is not yet posted, please use the fall schedule for the previous year.

#### How many classes should I put on my application?

Students should list a minimum of 8-10 classes they are interested in taking in their first semester only. If you are coming for a full year, enrollment for your  $2^{nd}$  semester classes will take place at the end of your first semester on campus.

#### Will I be enrolling myself into my classes?

No. Global Education staff will begin enrolling you into your classes prior to your arrival based on your list of preferred courses, space availability in the class, and whether or not you meet any pre-requisites listed for the class. You will receive your class schedule at orientation. Exchange students do not have permission to use the registration system until after the International Student Orientation in August or January.

#### What do the Class Numbers mean?

- **Classes numbered 1-99** are entry level courses for first and second year university students. These classes offer a broad and/or introductory look at the subject.
- **Classes numbered 100-199** are for third and fourth year university students with previous knowledge of the subject. These classes teach the subject at a more in depth and/or advanced level.
- Classes numbered 200+ are for graduate Master's level university students only.

#### Where is the description of each course?

The Class Schedule will list a brief description for each class being offered. This is the approved class description and matches our university catalog. An in depth syllabus for the class is available on the first day of instruction.

#### What is the minimum/maximum number of courses I must take each semester? (Note: Most courses are 3 units each).

- Undergraduate International Students must take at least 12 units of courses to be full-time. Maximum is 15-16 units.
- Graduate level students must take at least 9 units of courses to be full-time. Maximum is 9-10 units.

**May I take courses outside my major?** Yes! You are required to take at least 6 units in your "major" / primary academic field of study. You may take additional courses in other areas of interest as part of your American Cultural experience as long as you meet any listed requirements for the class. Popular choices are Kinesiology classes (ie fitness classes), History, Government, Humanities, English and Ethnic Studies. Please include courses taken for interest in your class list.

#### What is a "Pre-Requisite"?

A Pre-requisite is a course that must be completed prior to your enrollment. In the class description, if the course you wish to take lists a "pre-requisite" then please look at the description of the pre-requisite course. If you have previously taken a similar course at your home university, then you meet the requirement. Write the course you took at your home university on the Pre-Requisite line. If you have not previously taken a similar course, then you do not meet the requirement. You will not be able to enroll in courses that you do not meet the listed requirements.

**English Courses:** I encourage students whose 1<sup>st</sup> language is not English to consider enrolling in an English courses to improve your English skills. Some of these courses may be of interest to you:

- English 60M: Reading for Speed and Efficiency for Multilingual Students. 2 units.
- English 85: Grammar Multilingual. 2 units
- English 10M + 11M Academic Literacies. (Students arriving in August only). 2 semester class 3 units each semester. This is a yearlong English writing class which begins in Fall and continues in spring semester.
- English 87: Basic Writing Multilingual. (Students arriving in January only). 3 units. English writing class.

#### Can I change my class list later?

Yes, before registration begins, you will be asked for any updates to the class list you submitted with your application. However, please try to submit your best class list on this application form to minimize changes later.

#### When will I find out my class schedule?

The registration process usually takes several weeks to complete. All students will receive their final class schedule at the International Student Orientation in August / January.

## **CLASSES FOR BUSINESS MAJORS**

**BUSINESS COURSES:** Business courses are listed separately by department. You will find business courses listed under the following department headings:

- Accountancy
- Business Admin MGT
- Business Honors (these courses are not open to Exchange students / non-degree students)
- Decision Sciences
- Economics
- Entrepreneurship
- Finance
- General Management (there are several pre-requisites for GM classes see the list at the bottom of the page)
- Human Resources & Organizational Behavior
- International Business
- Management Information Systems
- Marketing
- Operations Management.

**Pre-Requisites:** Business courses often do not show their pre-requisites in the Class Schedule descriptions. However, each area of Business does have either a lower level course numbered 1-99 - OR - a "101" entry level course. These lower courses, or their equivalent, must be completed before you are eligible to take higher level courses.

#### Courses numbered 1-99: These entry level business classes can be taken by Business majors or Non-Business majors:

- MIS 1: Operating Systems and Electronic Communication (1 unit)
- MIS 2: Spreadsheets (1 unit)
- MIS 3: Word processing and Presentation Graphics (1 unit)
- ACCY 1: Accounting Fundamentals (3 units)
- ACCY 2: Managerial Accounting (3 units) -(<u>Pre-requisite for this class is ACCY 1</u>)
- ECON 1A: Introduction to Macroeconomic analysis (3 units)
- ECON 1B: Introduction to Microeconomic Analysis (3 units)
- MGMT 10: Business Law (3 units)
- MATH 24: Modern Business Math (3 units)
- STAT 1: Introduction to Statistics (3 units)

Upper division courses number 100-199: These classes are only for business majors. The classes listed below are the entry /pre-requisite courses for each business department. Students must have taken the equivalent of the listed course before they are authorized to take a higher level course in each individual department.

- DS 101: Data analysis for managers (3 units) (<u>Pre-requisite is Math 24 & STAT 1</u>)
- ENTR 187: Entrepreneurship (3 units)
- ENTR 189: Corporate Entrepreneurship (3 units)
- HROB 101: Management of Contemporary Organizations (3 units)
- INTL 190: International Business (3 units)
- FIN 101: Business Finance (3 units)
- MGMT 102: Business Communication (3 units) (Advanced English proficiency is required)
- MIS 101: Computer Information Systems for Management (3 units)
- MKTG 101: Principles of Marketing (3 units)
- OPM 101: Operations Management (3 units) (*Pre-requisite of a statistics course and the equivalent of "Decision Sciences 101" which would be an advanced statistics / data analysis course*).

**General Management courses:** General Management courses are only open to students who have already completed the equivalent of ALL of these courses already: DS 101, HROB 101, FIN 101, MGMT 10, MKTG 101 and OPM 101.

All other Business courses numbered 103 – 199 require completion of one of the above listed pre-requisite course.

For example, if you wanted to enroll in Marketing 122, you must have taken the equivalent of Marketing 101 entry level course first.

#### Business Courses numbered 200+ are for Master's students only.

# **HOUSING INFORMATION: LIVING ON / OFF CAMPUS**

Please read the housing information below and choose if you are interested in on campus or off campus housing on #15 of the application. If you choose to live on campus, your information will be shared with our housing office. The housing office staff will contact you directly with additional instructions about how to sign up for campus housing online, once the application is available in mid-May / mid-November. Note: We have a special application process to assist exchange students with on campus housing, so you will not need to apply online before being contacted by the housing staff as they will be tracking you differently.

### LIVING ON CAMPUS

Great Choice! Exchange and Non-degree students find living on campus not only convenient but also the easiest way to make lots of new American friends and keep in close contact with your fellow Exchange students. Students on a one semester program are especially encouraged to live on campus. By living in the American River Courtyard, you will enjoy the convenience of easy access to the university and university events (concerts, theater, movies, clubs, etc.), a social environment of activities planned with American and other international residents, and you will not need to worry about furniture or transportation to the campus for classes.

**On Campus "American River Courtyard":** The American River Courtyard houses over 600 students. The American River Courtyard offers apartment style living for 4-5 students per apartment. Each apartment is fully furnished with:

- Room types: 4 or 5 Single student bedrooms per apartment or 2 shared student bedrooms (2 students / bedroom).
- Each bedroom is furnished with a bed, mattress, desk, chair dresser, and wardrobe/closet
- Furnished living room with a sofa, coffee table
- Kitchens have a refrigerator, microwave, and sink. (A limited number of apartments also have an oven/stove).
- 2 Bathrooms per apartment with a sink, toilet and shower.
- Computer lab on site and free Wi-fi access throughout the building
- Laundry facilities, game room / TV room, Swimming pool, tennis and basketball courts

**Dining:** A campus meal plan is required for all residents to dine in the campus dining commons. Students have the option to choose meal plan A (10 meals/week), plan B (15 meals/ week) or plan C (8 meals/week).

**Costs:** The cost varies by room type and your choice of meal plan. Costs range from approximately 5200 - 6300/ semester or 9400 - 11500/year. This cost covers living on campus during the semester. There are additional costs to move in early or to stay on campus during university vacation periods (ie winter break / summer break – students usually use this time to travel around the US).

#### LIVING OFF CAMPUS

If you choose to live off campus, then you will need to make your own housing arrangements. Here are some tips to get you started on your search. <u>Please do not sign any lease agreements until after you have been accepted to the exchange program by our</u> <u>university.</u>

**THE UPPER EASTSIDE LOFTS:** The Upper Eastside Lofts are a modern, loft style (tall ceilings, very open space with few walls) housing complex affiliated with the university. The Lofts are located a few blocks away from the south side of the university campus – about a 10-15 minute walk from the campus. The Lofts offer furnished accommodations. This complex is just for university students, so they often have social activities scheduled and student resident staff living on site. Rent varies by floorplan: \$500-1069/month. For full details, floorplan options and prices, please see their website at www.uelsacramento.com.

• Note: Please make sure to read the terms and dates of the lease before you sign it. Most leases are August – August, but they can adjust it for exchange students. They may ask for a US financial guarantor when signing. I cannot be your financial guarantor. Please inform the Loft management when you apply that you are an international exchange student. They will give you alternative options such as pre-paying your rent for the semester or submitting a security deposit which would be refunded to you at the end of your stay.

**THE ELEMENT:** The Element is not affiliated with the university. It is a privately operated, off campus student apartment complex about 1.5 KM from the university. The Element is popular with exchange students as it offers furnished apartments. Unless you choose to live in a 1 bedroom, students lease their own bedroom and then share the rest of the apartment with roommates. You do not have to find your own roommates; the Element will place you into available apartments with other students. It is also across the street from a new Target store (for easy shopping and grocery access). Rent varies by floorplan: \$550-900/month. For more information, go to www.elementstudentliving.com.

**OTHER OFF CAMPUS RENTAL LISTINGS:** There are several apartment complexes available close to the university campus. I do not recommend that you sign a lease at another location before you have a chance to visit the apartment complex / house in person after you arrive in Sacramento. The website <u>www.the-deans-list.com</u> is a popular place for students to find open apartments and search for roommates / rooms for rent.
