Happy New Year:

Congratulations to Ms. Kate Cook, Martensdale-St. Marys High School senior student, for having one of her pieces of artwork selected by the Des Moines Art Center to promote their student program '2011: Nurturing a Student's Vision: Celebrating Students K-12'. Kate's work was one of only four selected from pieces submitted by area high school art students for this promotion and the portrait has been reproduced as a large banner. You can see a copy of the banner hanging in our gymnasium. Kate and Mrs. Angela Davidson, art teacher, deserve our recognition for this honor.

As we end 2011 and approach the end of the first semester of the school year, it is traditional for all of us to make 'New Year's Resolutions'. That is the perfect time for you and your family members to celebrate the successes in the classroom and as a member of our school clubs, teams, and organizations you experienced during the past year and reflect on those instances when things weren't as successful as you expected them to be. There is still time remaining to complete those overdue assignments and projects and review for semester tests.

If you are currently transporting your children to and from school each day, you can help the district bus drivers and assist in protecting our students from accidental injury by dropping your students off at the main school entrance by the superintendent's office. From approximately 8:00 to 8:20 each weekday morning and again from about 3:10 to 3:30 each weekday afternoon, Burlington Avenue essentially becomes a one-way westbound street. When drivers attempt to navigate the street around the parked buses during those times, students run the risk of being injured by a moving car or bus. Taking an alternate route that bypasses Burlington Avenue in front of the elementary portion of the school would help a great deal.

On July 13, 2011, we received an official notification from Ms. Patti Harding, Administrative Consultant, with the Iowa Department of Education Bureau of Nutrition, Health, and Transportation Services regarding federally mandated hot lunch price increases. According to the calculator we were required to use, the Martensdale-St. Marys Community School District is below the minimum federally mandated nutrition

meal, we will lose the reimbursement we receive for the free and reduced-price meals we serve. **Beginning on Thursday, January 12, 2012, the first day of the second semester, the price for an elementary student lunch will be \$1.65 and the price for a secondary student lunch will be \$1.85.** We do appreciate your understanding with this mandated lunch meal increase, but the district cannot afford the potential loss of free and reduced-priced lunch federal reimbursement.

On December 13 and 14, Ms. Keerti Patel, Iowa Department of Education Bureau of Nutrition and Health Services Consultant, conducted a comprehensive inspection and review of the district food service program. During her exit interview with Karen Tomlinson, School Foodservice Administrator, Lorretta Bell, District Food Service Director, and myself, Ms. Patel emphasized the importance of addressing family food service accounts with negative balances and recommended that the district implement the following program to reduce negative account balances. Any secondary student (grades seven through twelve) whose family food service account has a negative balance of \$20.00 or more should be served an alternate lunch meal of a peanut butter sandwich and drink for three days. After the three days of alternate lunch meals, the student should be denied any lunch meal. Elementary students would continue to receive the lunch meals while we work with the family to eliminate the negative family food service account balance. At this time we will not implement this program. It is imperative that we all work together to avoid these changes by keeping meal accounts at a positive balance at all times.

If you are uncomfortable filling out the FAFSA forms, I highly encourage you to setup an appointment with the people at ICAN (Iowa College Access Network) also known as the College Planning Center. They are located across from Jordan Creek Mall in West Des Moines. They will fill out all forms for FREE... You just need to provide the information!

ACT Testing

There are three more ACT test dates scheduled for the remainder of this school year, February 11th, April 14th and June 9th, 2012. ACT Registration packets and practice tests can be picked up in my office. You can also register online at www.actstudent.org

Scholarships

Begin to research scholarships. Keep an ongoing file of scholarships and financial aid information (i.e., criteria, amounts, contact persons, and deadlines). Check out www.collegeplanning.org for free scholarship searches. Don't forget to check out our web site for available scholarships. We keep a hard copy of all the scholarship on the web site in the guidance office. Stop by and look through the scholarship book to see if there is anything of interest to you.

Did you know

Students with a 3.75 GPA or higher can qualify for a full tuition scholarship at AIB College of Business. They offer both Applied Science Degrees (the typical 2 year degree) and Bachelor of Science Degrees (the typical 4 year degree).

Iowa Assessments

Iowa Assessments, the new name given to the ITBS/ITED tests, will be given the week of January 30th - February 3rd. The tests won't look any different. Students will still need a No. 2 pencil to fill in the bubble. The content, though, has changed. The last time the program had a new version was the 2001-02 school year — a lag that is longer than normal, but made sense as the state was developing what is now the Iowa Core. One change is students will be able to obtain an

indicator in the four areas ACT, the college testing group, has established for college benchmarks — English, reading, math and science — and know if they are on track for the ACT exam in high school.

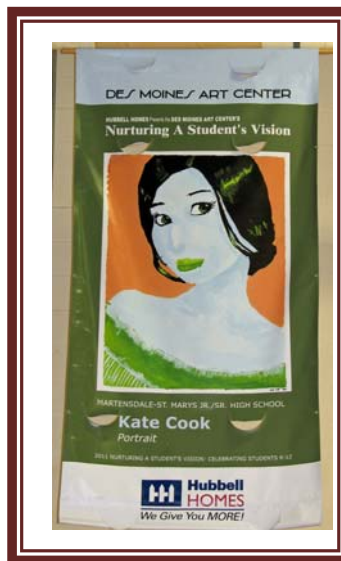

Flu Season is Here

Because of the flu shot shortage, health experts are asking everyone who is healthy and between the ages of 2 and 64 years old to forego the vaccination this year. Here is some important information to help you deal with this year's flu season.

The Vaccine

Young toddlers should be vaccinated.

Children between 6 months and 23 months—healthy or not—should still receive a flu vaccine, as should older adults (ages 65 and older), pregnant women, and healthcare workers.

Some school-age children still need the vaccine.

Children with chronic health problems still need to get a flu shot.

Follow your nose.

The intranasal vaccine (inhaled through the nose) may be available for children and adults, ages 5 to 49, who want protection from the flu but are not considered high risk. Pregnant women should not use this vaccine.

Prevention

Spread the word about spreading germs.

Because germs are invisible, it's difficult for children to understand how dangerous a cough or sneeze can be. Be sure to stress to them the importance of washing their hands, using lots of soap and water, and scrubbing until there are bubbles—before meals and snacks and after coughing, sneezing, or using a tissue. Many brands of liquid hand soap come in fun designs, scents, or colors, and letting children pick their own can be a fun way to encourage hand washing.

Sing the birthday song.

Teach your child to wash their hands for as long as it takes to sing the entire "Happy Birthday" song.

There's a place to cough.

Certainly, children need to learn to always cover their mouths when they cough, but one way to prevent the spread of germs is to have them cough into their sleeves, not their hands.

Keep hands away from eyes, nose, and mouth.

Children sometimes absentmindedly put their fingers in their mouth or nose, or rub their eyes. Help your kids keep their hands away from "germy" areas—eyes, nose, and face.

Tissue talk.

"Used" tissues are full of germs. Teach your children to immediately put used tissues in the trash and then wash their hands.

Too Sick to Be in School?

Extreme fatigue or muscle aches.

Children who can't keep their eyes open, even after having a normal night's sleep, may be coming down with something. Add an "achy" feeling and loss of appetite, and it's likely that

the flu is on the way. If your child is feeling too ill to stay awake in class, consider having him or her stay home. At the very least, alert the teacher and make sure someone is available in case he or she needs to come home. Before returning to school, your child needs to have gone without a fever or vomiting for at least 24 hours.

Get the school's help with make-up work.

Talk to the teacher to find out the best way for your child to make up missed work. Often, a child not quite well enough to return to class can complete assignments at home, making the workload a lot easier to manage once he or she is back in school. Children who are feverish, nauseated, or bone-tired can't learn well and can spread their illness to others, so keep them home. Be sure that if they do miss school, it is for a good reason, and have them make up the work as soon as possible.

I hope everyone had a great winter break! Now, back to reality. ☺ We will be administering the Iowa Assessments (formerly known as the Iowa Test of Basic Skills) to all students in grades 3-6 January 30th-February 10th. The elementary students take these tests over a 2 week period to space them out so they are only testing an hour a day at the most.

Because standardized tests can cause anxiety for some children, it's always a good idea to talk with your child about it to ease their worries. Explain to your child that standardized state tests are yardsticks that teachers, schools, school districts and states use to measure what and how they teach and how well students are learning. Teach your child the following, calling it the A-B-C-D Rules for Test Taking:

- **A**-lways read the directions twice.
- **B**-reathe in and out 5 times to relax.
- **C**-arefully read the questions and answer the easy ones first.
- **D**-on't hand in the test until you have double-checked your work

Bunch called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m. and welcomed all guests.

II. Consent Items

Harper asked about the annual fund balance and Gavin informed her that is the yearbook account. Harper asked about the revenue for the month in the Elementary Student Council fund. It was discovered that the amount was taken out of the account by mistake and then was put back in. Mr. Gibson motioned to approve the consent items, seconded by Mr. Furness. Roll call: 4 ayes.

III. Celebrations

Mr. Wood congratulated Dakota Gibson for winning the essay contest last year as a 6th grader and he recently found out that Dakota was selected Honorable Mention out of the whole state of Iowa. Congratulations Dakota!

Mr. Wood announced to the Board that he had 99% parent teacher conference attendance on November 1st and 3rd. Conferences went really well.

Mr. Crozier announced that the High School performed the Fall Play on November 11-12 and that it was a huge success. He was proud of all of the students and even those students that worked behind the scenes did a great job.

IV. Public Comments – None

V. Old Business

A. Reports

Supt. Newsum

- 1) MStM Music Booster Minutes - minutes from the October 10, November 7 meetings and the treasurer's report were provided. Mr. Furness mentioned that they did some fundraising during the Fall Play.
- 2) MStM Athletic Booster Minutes – minutes from the September 15 and the October 12 meetings were provided.
- 3) MStM PTO Minutes – minutes from the October 10 and November 8 meetings were provided.

B. Presentations

1) Facilities Report

Mr. Gibson went over the 5-year Facilities Report and noted that the two big ticket items that needed to be discussed were replacing the elementary gym roof and replacing the baseball lights at the baseball field. Three quotes were provided to the Board for the gym roof. The gym roof has been a concern for several years showing signs of breaking down in areas due to tar content being dry and brittle. Another concern of the roof is the asbestos in the roof. Mr. Newsum mentioned that because of the scope of the project we found out that we do not have to take the membrane off and deal with the asbestos. After much discussion that included: getting in writing from an inspector that we do not need to worry about the asbestos, hiring an architect to get the job done right, and do we remove the whole roof or just put another layer over it. The Board requested to hire an architect, have an inspector put in writing about the asbestos and update the 5-year spreadsheet to show what year the money is coming out of.

The Board also decided to put a hold on the baseball lights. They felt it was more important to concentrate on the gym project right now. If the lights go out we can find a contingent plan for playing games. The Board did request more information about needing a new transformer to hold not only lights but a new scoreboard.

The Board also discussed putting new cabinets in the Family Consumer Science classroom and will wait to see what that quote will be. They talked about putting a concrete parking lot at the football field and

do it in phases. They asked what kind of funding that would take. The Facilities Committee will meet again before the December board meeting.

2) Nutrition and Healthy Kids

Mr. Crozier informed the board about the Nutrition and Healthy Kids meeting that was held on November 10, 2011.

Parents, students and staff members were invited to the meeting. They discussed why the district needs to raise prices for elementary and secondary lunches to meet federal guidelines, they discussed new options for breakfast and lunch, they went over the Healthy Kids Act, and reviewed briefly the board policy. The policy was revised two years ago and this committee will discuss the policy again at the next meeting. Mr. Crozier discussed how the staff did a Biggest Loser contest last year and there are staff members working out after school and in the mornings. Mr. Crozier is now working on allowing each secondary class to pick a meal once a month.

3) Principal's Report Mr. Wood

Mr. Wood presented the 1st Quarter Gold and Blue Honor Roll. He reviewed with the Board the equity audit data that covers gender and the free and reduced population. The data will help identify problems and look into solutions.

4) Principal's Report Mr. Crozier

Mr. Crozier presented the 1st Quarter Discipline Report. Detentions are continuing to decline and contributed to calling home for every detention, the advisor/advisee program, creating relationships between students and staff members and having the staff correct the students on the little things. Suspensions are also declining.

Mr. Crozier had 47% participation at our parent teacher conferences. This is normal in the secondary level. The staff communicates with the parents all the time and the parents know their grades throughout the quarter with the access of JMC.

Mr. Crozier presented the 1st Quarter Honor Roll. He went over the power point presentation that was used at the Parent Advisory Committee meeting on November 3rd. The purpose of the meeting was to provide ideas, suggestions and guidance as the administrators consider educational improvements. They discussed the 1:1 computing program, the Valedictorian selection, the school web site and what programs should be added when funding becomes available.

Mr. Crozier stated that the play went very well but the attendance was not great and they will try to get the word out more. The Board talked about the Variety Show in the Spring and how to present it differently this year.

Mr. Moser updated the Board about the last Professional Development meeting. The staff is reading three articles from Education of Leadership.
